



A PROBLEM TO SOLVE

The Church of England Homes have problems which could be solved by some of our parishioners.

The need is to place young people in suitable homes after they leave the care of the Boys and Girls' Homes to go to work.

The numbers are not great in any one year, but they do present a challenge, because these young folk have no-one to whom they can turn for advice when they go out into the world; owing to their wide dispersion, it is impossible for the Homes to continue to watch over these boys and girls during these critical years.

Moreover, each one of them does need a good Christian home-life and the help that you can give in order to keep their feet on the path that the Homes have tried to place them, so that they might be absorbed into the community as good citizens and loyal followers of The Master Who said, "inasmuch as you did it to the least of these my brethren, you did it unto me."

As these young folk would be earning wages, they would be able to pay board and lodging within their means.

The Homes organisation is trying to build up a register of parishioners who would be prepared to receive these young people from time to time as they move out into the various parishes to make their way in the world.

PERSONAL

Our sincere sympathy is extended to Mr. A. H. Thomas and his son, Ron. in the sudden passing of their wife and mother, Mrs. Marjorie Thomas, on 26th March. The Thomas family were well known All Saints' parishioners before moving to Pambula, on the South Coast, a few years ago, and the funeral Service was conducted by the Rector in All Saints' Church.

Our sincere sympathy is also extended to Mrs. Archer in the sudden passing in April of her daughter, Norma, with whom she lived at Auburn. We pray that Mrs. Archer and her family may be comforted at this time.

Parishioners will also be saddened by the passing of one of our oldest parishioners, Mr. J. M. Boyle, on Sunday, 28th April. Mr. Boyle had been associated with All Saints' all his life, and indeed, All Saints' was always a very important part of his life. Well known to many parishioners past and present by his work in the Sunday School, the Y.C.I. (of which he was a foundation member in 1910), and the Cricket and Baseball Clubs, Mr. Boyle served most faithfully for many years as a Parish Councillor and Parochial Nominator and he was widely known through his work with the Churches' Cricket and Baseball Unions. Almost four years ago, Mr. Boyle suffered a road accident which impaired his health but he continued to attend All Saints' regularly, and was never without a cheery word for all he met here.

The heartfelt sympathy of all at All Saints' is extended to Mrs. Boyle and Allen, and we pray that the knowledge that so many of their friends are feeling with them, may be of comfort at this time.

SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS

Annual General Meeting: The Sunday School Annual General Meeting was held on Wednesday, 17th April, in the Rectory at 8 p.m., and was fairly well attended by members of the staff. The officers for the previous year were re-elected unanimously, the positions concerned being: Hon. Treasurer, Mr. E. Quelch; Registrar, Mr. A. Jones; Hon. Secretary, John Nance.

Financial Statements: The Statements for the period 1st May, 1962 to 31st March, 1963 were read by Mr. A. Jones on behalf of the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Quelch, while Mrs. Quelch presented the Kindergarten Statement.

It is interesting to note that although offertories for the year from the Senior Sunday School amounted to £75, payments for teaching books, missions, prizes, and picnic, etc. amounted to nearly £150. This amount was lightened considerably by money received from the Parish Council, the Sunday School Concert, and the Tupperware Party which realised just over £3.

Our payments were made up as follows: Picnic, just over £70; teaching books and film strips, £16; Prizes, £30; and donation to Missions, £57. We gave £25 to the Church Missionary Society, £25 to the Bush Church Aid Society, £5 to the A.B.M. for work in Korea, and £2 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The bulk of our finance comes from the offertories received in Sunday School each week, so any support we receive is extremely appreciated. At the same time, the Sunday School would like to express its thanks to all parents, parishioners, and friends who have assisted us in any way through the year and we trust and depend on your continued support throughout the coming years.

Kindergarten: The Kindergarten is in urgent need of new members, boys in particular, so any parishioner who knows of a new family in the district, and who could send their children to Sunday School, is invited to pass the information on to the Rector or a Sunday School officer, as this would be assisting us in no small way.

Dates to Note: The special functions at the end of the year will be the Kindergarten Christmas Party on Saturday, 7th December, and the Sunday School Picnic, set down for Saturday, 30th November.

Vicar's Version

An English Vicar has aroused a storm of controversy by rewriting the 23rd Psalm.

The Vicar, the Rev. Norman Baldock, offers the new version in his parish magazine with the comment that money has become the religion of far too many men and women.

People, he wrote, "Seek holiness in a bottle of detergent, peace in a bottle of pills, and hope to discover heaven in a pound note."

He explains that his present day Psalm might be considered "semi-blaspemous" but for the fact that it summed up so accurately the religion of so many people.

The psalm reads:

"The union is my shepherd I shall not work,

It maketh me to lie down on the job,

It leadeth me besides the still factories,

It restoreth my insurance benefits.

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of unemployment, I will fear no recriminations, for the union is with me.

Its restrictive practices and shop stewards comfort me.

It prepareth a works committee before me in the presence of my employer.

"It anointeth my hand with pay rises.

My bank balance runneth over.

Surely never-never payments and union dues,

Shall follow me all the day of my life,

And I will dwell in a council flat for ever."



The Rector will present his Annual Review of the work at All Saints', reports will be given by the various Parochial organisations, and the Wardens and Parish Council for the year ahead will be elected.

● The following interesting facts have been given to us by the Australian Board of Missions. Of every Pound received by the Board:

14/- goes direct to the Mission field;

1/7 is spent in Australia for mission needs and training;

3/7 is spent in educating the Church at home;

10d. is spent on administration.

The A.B.M. is a big organisation and relies on folk like us for the funds to keep going.
