My Dear Friends,

It is with pleasure that I write this my first letter to you after such a wonderful induction service in your lovely Church on Tuesday, 27th March. It was an inspiration to see so many parishioners and clergy present at such a busy time of the year. I was sorry to know Archdeacon Kerle was unable to conduct the institution as arranged but very grateful to Archdeacon Bidwell, who so readily offered to take the service. This was the second occasion that Archdeacon Bidwell inducted me to a parish, and he did it with his usual sincerity and dignity. Bishop Hilliard preached the sermon, having known me for many years. The Bishop ordained me in Nelson, New Zealand, in 1937, and performed my marriage in 1938. Again, I was his assistant at St. John's, Parramatta from 1952-53.

The music at the induction service was a credit to both the organist and the choir of All Saints', creating a wonderful atmosphere that I will never forget. The Church was beautifully decorated and I am grateful to the ladies for the part they played in that respect, and also for the yeomen service performed by many of them over many days in cleaning the Rectory.

The ladies again helped us by preparing a very nice lunch on the day we arrived with our furniture.

To the small band of men who painted out the bedrooms of the Rectory I cannot fully express my thanks. They did an excellent job and their choice of colours was admirable. From the bottom of my heart I say a sincere "thank you" to all who helped make the Rectory so attractive for us. I also wish to thank Mr. Eric Olofsson for his kindness in putting an extra power point in the laundry.

Easter has now come and gone and our services on Good Friday and Easter Day were very well attended. I regret having a cold in the head over this period, but am the more grateful to the Rev. A. E. C. Gardner for his assistance with the services.

My wife and I are looking forward to a lengthy stay in your midst and feel greatly encouraged already by the warmth of your welcome. We hope to come to know you all personally in time and share fully with you the work of the Master in this important parish.

Our New Rector.—The Special Service for the Institution and Induction of the Reverend Thomas Eric Champion as Rector of All Saints', Petersham, was held in the Parish Church on Tuesday evening, the 27th March. Archdeacon Bidwell conducted the service and he was assisted by the Rural Dean, Rev. J. R. Le Hurang, and the Acting Rector, Rev. S. V. Satchell. The reverence and sincerity of the service made a deep impression on the large congregation. The Rt. Rev. W. G. Hilliard, M.A., Coadjutor Bishop, was the preacher. The Bishop, in his address, referred to his close association with All Saints' Petersham, and expressed his great pleasure at the knowledge that many of those he had known in his early days at All Saints' are still actively working for the parish. Bishop Hilliard congratulated the Parish on its selection of the Rev. J. E. Champion as Rector. He felt that Mr. Champion's ability, experience and personality would be of great value to the Parish and that in his ministry he would be ably supported by his good wife. He expressed the hope that parishioners generally would support their new Rector in his arduous and important duties. The Bishop's address was greatly appreciated by all, and in particular by his many friends in the Parish of All Saints', Petersham.
