## THE OPENING OF THE QUEEN VICTORIA BUILDING

We are able to publish a firsthand account of this event. Two of our parishioners were privileged to have front row positions to observe the happenings and their discription is given below. There is no prize for dicovering who they are but they have every reason to be proud of their association with it.

### OUR CORRESPONDENT WROTE

We watched the opening from a Town Hall window right opposite the main entrance of the Queen Victoria Building where the ceremony took place, under three Q.V.B. flags. The Q.V.B. Wishing Well was on one side and two huge round lights on very high posts on the other. This will be most attractive at night.

The entrance was lined with guards in Beefeater uniforms (red coats white trousers etc). Between these two ranks continual entertainment from bands, clowns, jugglers and dancers took place from 10am until 11am, when the town cryer in uniform announced the arrival of the Lord Mayor. After giving an address he asked our Jim to cut the ribbon with him and declared the Q.V.B. open for business.

The public were invited to enter the building which soon became a surging beehive of people, on every level.

Using the Lord Mayor's words in his address, "This is truly one of the most significant tourist attractions of the future."

Telegrams of congratulations were received from The Queen, the Minister of Tourism, Mr. John Brown and Mr. Milton McCrae grandson of the original builder.
