## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
24th November, 1951.

Dear People of All Saints',

Most of us are a bit "collar-proud" when we resume duty after holidays—particularly so if that holiday has been a lengthy one; but I can truthfully say that the warmth of your welcome softened considerably the stiffness of the harness! My wife and I do thank you most sincerely for the "Welcome Home" on 8th November, and for your handsome and useful gift. We hope that **all** who contributed in any way to the great success of the evening will realise that our appreciation is much greater than words can convey.

We are most grateful for the realisation of an old desire to visit England; for the lovely memories which are ours for ever; for the beauty of that land which many Australians still regard as the "Motherland," thank God; for the historic Church, the beauty and dignity of its cathedrals and parish churches, for its story through the ages which is so largely the story of Britain; and for the people for whom we have the greatest admiration. Is it any wonder that a B.B.C. Broadcast to-day by Howard Marshall on "Autumn in Britain" (mentioning so many lovely places we have seen) aroused feelings of nostalgia and the desire to go back one day?

We resume our work together at the beginning of a new Church-year, 2nd December being Advent Sunday. Whilst we look forward to the Festival of Christmas which commemorates the Coming of God into our world in a new and convincing way, we are also reminded of the solemnity of the Advent message, with its call to **AWAKE** from carelessness, apathy and indifference which make our religion ineffective and hinder the progress of God's Kingdom. Bearing in mind the fact that the Advent message warns us that we must one day give an account of the manner in which we have used God's gift of life, and realising that material things loom so largely in the lives of so many people in these unsettled and dangerous days, "The Call to the People of Australia" (which came to us in the morning paper of November 12, signed by the Heads of Churches and the Chief Justices) is most timely. His Grace the Archbishop has asked that it be given the widest publicity, and I therefore include it in this issue. Will you read it

carefully, think over it and pray for grace to heed its warning and power to act upon it? Christianity does not merely point us to high ideals; it offers the power to attain to them, which no other religion does. It was the gift of this power that made St. Paul able to say, "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

At the Women's Guild Missionary Luncheon held last June, an appeal was made for the Diocese of New Guinea, to help rebuild that section of the Mission destroyed in the Mount Lamington disaster. I notice that, so far, we have received little more than £10. For some years now we have raised an additional £100 per annum for missionary work over and above moneys received in boxes and through the Lenten offerings. I know it will be more difficult to attain this objective, in view of the greatly increased cost of living; but I feel sure our people will make the necessary sacrifices in order to help this greatly needed work of re-construction in New Guinea. If you can help in any way, will you please send your gift to the Rector or Wardens, marked "New Guinea Appeal."

No doubt there are many people who will celebrate Christmas again with little or no thought of Christ, and who will therefore have no real Christmas happiness. They may have lots of pleasure; but pleasure is not the same thing as happiness.

Ivor Brown, in one of his books, tells us that in the Christmas season of 1949 he received from his local parish church an invitation that struck him as really lamentable in its tone. "Christmas Day is the Birthday of our Lord Jesus Christ. Will you let Him share it with you at one or other of these services?" Ivor Brown goes on with his comments. "Will I let Him? Should I not be told firmly, even fiercely, that if I believe in the facts of the Christian story, then it is a supreme privilege to be allowed to share in this grandeur of spiritual opportunity, and that I am committing unpardonable folly if I miss the chance of sharing such communion? Will He of His mercy let me, not will I of my kindness let Him, is the only dignified, the only reasonable approach." How true that is! I refer you to page 9 for the Advent and Christmas Services.

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### A CALL TO THE PEOPLE OF AUSTRALIA

There are times in the histories of peoples when those charged with high responsibilities should plainly speak their minds.

Australia is in danger. We are in danger from abroad. We are in danger at home. We are in danger from moral and intellectual apathy, from the mortal enemies of mankind which sap the will and darken the understanding and breed evil dissensions. Unless these are withstood, we shall lack moral strength and moral unity sufficient to save our country and our liberties.

Our present dangers are a challenge to us; but in meeting the challenges of history, peoples grow in greatness.

The dangers demand of all good Australians community of thought and purpose. They demand a restoration of the moral order from which alone true social order can derive.

We remind all Australians that we are members one of another, dependent even for our daily bread on the work of many. From the community we have our livelihood, culture, protection in a reign of law. To the community we owe a just return of loyalty and service.

### WE BELIEVE

That each of us has a duty to defend the community against evil designs and aggression and to preserve for our children that which was given to us,  
 that each of us has a duty to deal fairly with his fellows in the transactions of life,  
 that each has a duty to himself and to his fellows of honest work,  
 that the development of a true community amongst ourselves and with all peoples of good will is the one way to peace at home and abroad.

### THEREFORE

We call for a new effort from all Australians to advance moral standards. We ask for it from individuals in their personal and vocational relationships; in and through the lives of families; in and through all our voluntary associations—trades unions, employers' and professional groups, the organisations of women, of servicemen, and all the societies which our people have created to express their cultural, social and economic interests.

We call for an adequate understanding of the nature of law and its necessity as the principle of order in a free society.

We call on all Australians to take an active concern in public affairs proper to citizens of a free society.

We call on each Australian to examine his conscience and his motives in all his associations with his fellows. If each does his part, the whole community will be renewed.

We call on our people to think now of the future into which our children go, that we may shape it well and wisely for them.

We call on our people to remember those whose labours opened this land to the uses of mankind; those who bore and reared the children of a new nation; those who died in battle for us, bringing splendour to Australian arms; those who worked with mind and muscle for the heritage which we, please God, shall hold and enlarge for our children and their children.

And that this may be so, we ask that each shall renew in himself the full meanings of the call which has inspired our people in their highest tasks and in their days of danger.
