THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory, 31st July, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints'—

As already intimated, Confirmation Classes commence during the first week in August. It is most essential that candidates should put their preparation classes before all other engagements, and attend **regularly**. Special arrangements can be made for adults who wish to be prepared for Confirmation, and who are diffident about attending a young people's class. If you are eligible for Confirmation, do not defer it; grasp the opportunity offered you **now**.

Confirmation will be administered at the eleven o'clock service on October 22, and the candidates will make their first Communion at the eight o'clock celebration on October 29, which Sunday (being nearest to All Saints' Day) we shall observe as our Patronal Festival.

The day of our Consecration Festival draws very near, and I hope we may have the utmost co-operation and support of **every parishioner** in all that is being arranged to mark the occasion. Sunday, August 20, is the Festival to which we specially invite all former parishioners. We know there are not so many of them as there were in 1932, when we first arranged these "Back-to-All-Saints" services; but there must be some of the members of their families who would be glad of the opportunity of renewing their associations with All Saints', Petersham. No special card of invitation is being issued, but we suggest you send this paper to your friends who are former parishioners, drawing their attention to page five.

Let us make August the twentieth a day of Thanksgiving and Dedication. It should recall to our minds the fact that those who have gone before showed great vision, faith and foresight in erecting our beautiful parish Church, and also enthusiasm, generosity and hard work in removing the debt which its erection incurred. It is, therefore, fitting that we, who have entered into the heritage of a fine old Church, should thankfully remember those who laboured here in days gone by, and pledge ourselves anew to do our part loyally for Christ and His Church in our own day and generation, and for the sake of those who shall follow us. Never was the dedication of ourselves more needed than it is to-day. Religion and life are indissolubly united. The moment that either is separated from the other it becomes empty and void of meaning. Religion must find its expression in life, and life must find its inspiration in religion.

Those who hold collecting boxes, issued some four months ago, will please return them on the Festival Sunday, August 20. We hope that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally; but, if you find you cannot possibly attend the services, you could help by sending the box by your friends. An envelope is issued with this "Chronicle," in which those who have no box will please place your **special offering**.

The Festival Tea and Social Reunion will be held on Wednesday, August 23. Notwithstanding the difficulties of rationing, we feel we can, with your co-operation, uphold the high standard of previous years. Donations are requested from any who may be willing to give a table, or a portion thereof, and promises of donations in kind will be most welcome. Tickets (costing one shilling and sixpence, admitting you both to the Tea and Social Reunion) are now available, and may be obtained from members of the Women's Guild, from your District Visitor,


or may be obtained at the Rectory. The early purchasing of tickets will be appreciated, for it is only by the sale thereof that the organisers of the Tea can hope to approximate the number of people for whom it will be necessary to provide.

We are not arranging a Men's Breakfast this year. The matter was discussed at a recent Parish Council meeting, when it was thought that in view of the absence on active service of so many of our men, and also in view of the difficulties inevitably caused by rationing, it would be advisable to ask the members of the Women's Guild to devote all their energies to the organising of the Parish Tea. Nevertheless, we trust the men will readily appreciate the position, and that they will attend the early celebration on August 20, as they have done hitherto.

We specially invite the relatives and friends of All Saints' men and women serving in the Forces to attend the evening service on the Festival Sunday, when Chaplain Blake will be the occasional preacher.

We should be glad of gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Festival.
