KNOW YOUR PARISH

Continuing the "Chronicle's" special monthly series Mrs. Ditchburn, Honorary Secretary of the Physical Culture Club, tells us of her organisation.

Physical Culture Club:

It was in 1942 that Miss E. V. Adams, sister of our then Rector, the Rev. C. E. Adams, decided upon a Physical Culture Club for the girls of All Saints'. The aim of the venture was to provide them with a good sound knowledge of the benefits of exercise and deportment. The Club began with nine girls enrolling on the first night, which was a start at least, but not a very encouraging one.

However, our Club enrolled more and more girls, and we were enabled to engage the services of a teacher from Bjelke-Petersen's School of Physical Culture. These classes meet each Monday night from 6 p.m. to 8.15 p.m., teaching girls from the age of five years and upwards. We have had quite a few awards come our way in the Annual B.P. Competitions, and many awards have been given in our own local Church Competitions held every year. Our Annual Concert is always looked forward to, as well as the Plain and Fancy Dress Frolic.

It has been the pleasure of this Club to help our Church financially on several occasions.

Hundreds of girls have been in the "Physie" over the period of twenty years, and we are very proud of the fact that we are now enrolling the daughters of our older girls who have married and now have girls of their own. Our Club is not limited to All Saints'—it is open to and welcomes all religions.

May we say thank you most sincerely to our Rector, the Rev. T. E. Champion and to Mrs. Champion, for their help and inspiration given so freely at all times, which in turn provides the inspiration to work harder still to make our Club a "Happy Club". Classes start at 6 p.m. for the Seven and Nine Years, up to Senior Classes for girls over fifteen years of age.

The Ladies Classes commence at 7.45 p.m.

New members will be most welcome for any of the Club's age groups. Mrs. Ditchburn will only be too pleased to enrol new girls at Monday night in the Parish Hall.

MASONIC SERVICE AT ALL SAINTS'

Members of Lodge Peace of Marrickville attended a Masonic Church Parade at All Saints' on Sunday Evening, 22nd July. The Masonic Choir rendered five greatly appreciated Anthems, and the Rector is grateful to the Ladies who entertained the Choir to Tea. In response to a number of requests, we are printing the text of the Rector's Address at this Service:

Eccles 12-1. "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say I have no pleasure in them."

First of all, may I say, how pleased I am to have members of Lodge Peace and their friends here this evening for a Church service. We give a special welcome too, to members of the Masonic Choir and thank them for their Anthems.

Though Freemasonry is not a religion it is based on the teaching of the Bible, it seeks to remind man of his immortality and that one day he must give an account of his life to the Great God above.

Within the Sacred Book, entrusted to our care, are definite plans provided for our use and guidance. We may accept those plans and heed them as a wise Master builder, or we may be foolish and disregard them to our own discomfort when we stand before the Almighty in the world to come.

No thinking person could possibly think this life is all—and that there is no hereafter. Beautiful as this world is, one feels that life here is incomplete unless at some later stage the injustices of this life are put right, and there are fair rewards for those who have laboured to build a superstructure that will stand the test of time and eternity.

One thinks of the skilled artists in music, painting, sculpture and so on, whose years are spent training and developing their gifts under guidance of older and more experienced craftsmen and then one day receive the call to put down their tools and pass on.

Each generation has to qualify by heeding the skilled workers of those who went before them that they in turn might become patterns to those who follow them.

Surely the Great Creator has not given man the desire to develop his talents and then have no further chance beyond the grave. I have frequently said that Heaven to me will be a place where we can use our God given talents to the Glory of God and the benefit of those with us in the beyond, without the hindrances and frustrations so common in this life.

There may be some who call themselves "educated" who deny they believe in a future life, but such an attitude is foreign to the experience of man and leaves so much to be desired.

Many like to think they are independent of God and man, and can shape their own destiny without any help. But God is long suffering and often gives these people untold opportunities to see the light and do the right thing.

It is a true saying that God does not settle His accounts every month.

Life is progressive; it cannot stand still. If a grain of seed falls to the ground it dies to give life to a new plant which will spring forth and bud and flower.

Surely no one could imagine a Great Loving Creator, creating beautiful flowers with no possibility of their continuance.

If in nature there is provision for the continuance of life, surely Man too, will live on in a future state.

The life of man is superior to all other forms; how appropriate are the words that God "created man in His own image." Not in the sense of having arms and legs and head, but a trinity—body, mind and spirit.

The body is of this earth and to the dust it shall return, but the Spirit shall return to God who gave it.

The sage of old says "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth." Youth is essentially a time of growth and improvement, but we do not stop learning at 21.

One looks at the trees and sees in them symbols of life, some have grown straight, they were cared for in youth so that in old age they are a picture of loveliness.

Others show lack of training in youth and consequently are deformed and ugly in old age.

Training in youth puts something into the character of a man which cannot be put there when he is old.

There are influences which mould the character of youth for good or evil which have a strong lasting effect upon the life of man.

Fathers and Mothers can bequeath to their children something more precious than gold and silver, when they leave them a godly example that they might follow in their steps.

Many are conscious of hindering powers in life which came to them in infancy and youth and which have dogged their footsteps all through life.

A young man came to see me recently—he was a packet of nerves and could scarcely put three words together without pausing. I thought he was an alcoholic. He said, Sir I have never touched strong drink, but I am the son of an alcoholic who went to a drunkard's grave.

Truly the sins of the fathers rest on the children unto the third and fourth generation.

I myself have possibly gone three-quarters of the way through life, and as I look back I thank God, most of all, for my parentage and home life.

My parents were very conscious of their responsibility towards their three children and though limited in this world's goods, they did their best to shape the characters of their offspring to the glory of God.

I thank God to-night I had Christian parents who tried to give something money could never buy—an example of how to live and remember my Creator in the days of my youth so that in old age I could meet Him face to face and not be ashamed.

We all make mistakes at times and do things we should not do. God has made provision for that and we are told, "If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness, but if we say we have not sinned we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us."

As life goes on it seems to get harder rather than easier. A changing world brings new challenges and as physical strength fails it is nice to have treasured memories of service rendered in years gone by.

Whilst we may have regrets over lost opportunities and remorse over bad workmanship in the past, we can at least learn from the past to be more faithful in the future.

Some live so Godlessly and selfishly that old age is a nightmare. They are spiritually dead long before they die physically.

We cannot put the clock back, we can only try to make the most of the years which are left.

Oh, if we could only put old heads on young shoulders or give people in their prime one peep into eternity, how different the world would be.

To me one of the most soul moving dialogues in the N.T. is that in the Parable of Dives and Lazarus, where Dives pleads with Abraham to send word to his brothers back on earth to live better lives.

Abraham replies "They have Moses and the Prophets, let them hear them." Yes, and we have the Gospel of Jesus Christ the story of Redemption by the Cross of Calvary and many sneer or make light of it.

The first text I learned as a child was on a card in my bedroom "Those who seek me early, shall find me."

Lay a good foundation in youth and then even though life's experiences may be rough and the going hard, one will have something on which to build a superstructure which will be of lasting value.

Well does the man of Wisdom say to us to-night—Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not nor the years draw nigh when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them.

An old friend of mine, now gone to his eternal rest bequeathed me a book and in the covers of which I found the following poem. To me it is like him speaking from the other world.

Dig channels for the streams of love

Where they may broadly run,

And love has over flowing streams

To fill them everyone.

But if at any time thou cease

Such channels to provide,

The Very springs of love for thee

Will soon be parched and dried.

For we must share if we would keep,

That good thing from above.

Ceasing to give, we cease to have,

Such is the law of love.

● **Fete Meeting:** The Parish Fete Committee would like to meet at least one representative of each Stall on Tuesday, 7th August, at 8 p.m. in the Parish Hall. The Committee is looking for new ideas for the Fete on 17th November, and therefore would like to see as many folk as possible who are connected with the Fete, come along and air their views at this meeting. Convener of the Committee is Mr. Bert Shaw.

● The Young Churchmen's Institute (Y.C.I.) extends a welcome to all men of the Parish and their men friends to come along to the meeting on Friday, 17th August, when the Rector will deliver a special talk on the occasion of "President's Night". The meeting will be held in the Y.C.I. Club Room of the Parish Hall, commencing at 8 p.m.

● We are sorry to report that Mrs. Furnell and Mrs. Sharpe are both still in Hospital, but we pray that they will be blessed with better health and be back with us soon. Mrs. Shaw was out of action for several days last month, while among the menfolk, Messrs V. Barrett, T. Bosward, A. Cook and J. Humphreys have not been Ail, and have been undergoing treatment.

● **Legacy:** The Rector has been notified by the Solicitor handling the estate of the late Mrs. Holland of John Street that the sum of £100 has been left to the Church by Mrs. Holland, who passed away last month.

● Plans were recently announced to build a third Home of Peace at Greenwich, to accommodate approximately 100 beds, and the Hospital Committee, of which the Rector is a member, plans to erect the first part of the building—to house twenty patients—and the staff quarters as soon as the necessary finance is received. Some £35,000 is already to hand, but another £20,000 is necessary before a start can be made.
