"For man is not just a chance configuration of atoms in the slipstream of meaningless chance history. No. Man made in the image of God has a purpose — to be in relationship to the God who is there."

Who am I? Where am I going? Is there a purpose and meaning for my life? And if there is a God of love, why do I not experience Him and see His love more evident in the world?

## A real purpose for life

"So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. And God blessed them, and said to them 'Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth' . . . . And it was so. And God saw everything that He had made and behold, it was very good."

Genesis 1:27–31

# The purpose rejected

## I. We don't love God

"Whatever else is or is not true, this one thing is certain — man is not what he was meant to be."

G.K. Chesterton<sup>4</sup>

If you have an Old Testament you might want to read Genesis 3:1–13 which tells of man's initial disobedience and rejection of God's purpose for him, which has continued throughout human history. The result for all of us is that left to ourselves we do not think straight about God, we do not by nature love God and we do not choose God's will above all else.

The following Bible passage describes what is typical of man's response to God.

"But this command I gave them 'Obey My voice and I will be your God, and you shall be My people; and walk in all the way that I command you, that it may be well with you.' But they did not obey or incline their ear, but walked in their own counsels and the stubbornness of their evil hearts, and went backward and not forward . . . I have persistently sent all My servants the prophets to them, day after day; yet they did not listen to Me or incline their ear, but stiffened their neck."

The Bible clearly states that man's rejection of God is motivated by moral rather than philosophical or scientific issues. This is illustrated by the following statement of Aldous Huxley:

"I had motives for not wanting the world to have a meaning; consequently assumed that it had none, and was able without any difficulty to find satisfying reasons for this assumption. The philosopher who finds no meaning in the world is not concerned exclusively with a problem in pure metaphysics; he is also concerned to prove that there is no valid reason why he personally should not do as he wants to do, or why his friends should not seize political power and govern in the way that they find most advantageous to themselves . . . For myself, the philosophy of meaninglessness was essentially an instrument of liberation, sexual and political."
