ANNUAL REPORT

1975-1976

At the Annual Meeting held on 21st April, 1975, Mrs. G.M. Bent took office as President and was installed at a well attended and inspiring service held at the Church of Christ, Belmore, on 24th May. Under her wise guidance the work of the Council has been maintained and a happy spirit of fellowship continues to mark our activities.

In recognition of their long and faithful service, Life Membership was conferred on two greatly valued members, Mrs. R.H. Dougherty and Mrs. J.B. Montgomerie, both former Presidents of the Council.

We have continued to hold our Council meetings in the Pitt Street Congregational Church, and would wish to express thanks to the Minister and church officers for their kind courtesy in this regard. We appreciate, too, the arrangements made by the Department of Administration of the Methodist Church for our Executive to meet in their Committee Room, month by month.

Thanks are due to the following ladies who have addressed our meetings:- Mrs. Heather Stevens, following her return from Malaysia where she had represented Australian Church Women at the Seminar on Family Life Education held in Penang in April 1975; Mrs. Mary Weme of Kenya, the 1975 Winifred Kiek Scholar, who, at our August Council meeting, told us much of her country and its people, and of her plans to help the women there; Mrs. Joy Cooke, Vice-President of Christian Women's Conventions, who spoke in November of the development, programme and plans of the movement; and Mrs. Dorothy McMahon, who at our final

meeting in March, gave a most informative and stimulating address on the World Council of Churches Assembly, held in Nairobi late last year. Our horizons have, indeed, been widened as a result of all that we have heard and learnt from our visitors.

At the biennial meeting of the National Committee of Australian Church Women, held at Lincoln College, Adelaide, in August 1975, the Council was represented by the President and Hon. Secretary as delegates, while Mesdames M. Stanhope and D. Woodhouse attended as observers. Reports presented at the meeting indicated gratifying developments in the life and work of State Units, together with increased interest in and support of the Winifred Kiek Scholarship Fund and the Fellowship of the Least Coin. The Working Committee of A.C.W. is now located in Western Australia, and plans are in hand to hold the next biennial meeting of the National Committee in Perth in August, 1977. Copies of "Women at Work" issued by the Working Committee are distributed among our members and provide an opportunity of keeping in touch with the activities of A.C.W. in all States.

Observance of "Fellowship Day" in July and "World Community Day" in October provided many opportunities for churchwomen in city, suburban and country centres to worship together, discuss matters of common interest and concern, and create and deepen friendships. We express our heartfelt thanks to Mrs. Mary Down, who, over a number of years, has organised the despatch of material for Special Days and has received and collated the reports from centres where services have been held. Mrs. Down's resignation from the Council has been received with great regret, and we have recorded our appreciation of her assistance so cheerfully given.

The Council presented a submission to the Committee of Enquiry into Religious Education in NSW Government Schools in November, 1975. Our thanks go to Mrs. M. McCann and the members of the sub-committee which she convened for their help in collecting material and preparing the submission.

The final event in our busy 1975 programme was an Ecumenical Day of Retreat, held on Monday, 8th December, in the Crypt of St. Mary's Cathedral. The theme of the W.C.C. Assembly, "Jesus Christ Frees and Unites" provided the basis for addresses throughout the day, and the final Act of Worship, in which representatives of our member Churches took part, gave opportunity for recollection and renewal of our commitment to our task. We thank Mrs. Joan Curtin

and her assistants for all they did to arrange such a happy and helpful day and look forward to similar experiences in the future.

In conclusion, I should like to record my thanks to our President for her leadership and thoughtfulness, to other office-bearers and Executive members for their loyal support throughout this past year and to all Council members for their continued interest and co-operation, so generously given.

CONVENORS' REPORTS

Fellowship of the Least Coin - During 1975 over 100 letters were received from interested correspondents and groups, many of whom have participated in F.L.C. over a number of years. Quite a few new enquiries have also been made. Invitations to talk to groups about the Fellowship have been welcomed from both outer suburban and country areas. The 4th Quarterly News Bulletin for 1975 featured an article by Mrs. Shanti Solomon in which she spoke about our world in travail and how more than ever we need to pray for peace and for men that they may see the vision, accept the responsibility and work to bring it into being. The Bulletin gave news of the programme of the Asian Church Women's Conference showing how, for leadership development purposes the area would be divided into four zones. Allocations for 1975 were listed, the Australian project approved being the Aboriginal Medical Centre in Redfern. The "Circle of Prayer" Vol. VI has been printed and copies are expected shortly. During 1975 our N.S.W. offerings for F.L.C. totalled \$1758. In 1976 two Australian projects have been approved for grants - Nungalinga College in Darwin - an Aboriginal Training Centre - and the work of the Missionary Sisters of Charity among elderly aborigines in Bourke, N.S.W.

Good Neighbour Council

The Annual Conference held on June 14th, 1975, marked the 25th Anniversary of the Council. In welcoming the delegates and guests, the President, Mrs. J. Metcalfe, MBE, BA, Dip.Ed., spoke of the aims and objectives which were formulated 25 years ago as being basically those of the Good Neighbour Movement throughout Australia today - the welcome, welfare and integration of our new citizens. The Conference was officially opened by the Hon. A.J. Grassby, Special Adviser on Community Relations; Mr. M.S. Ruddock M.L.A. represented the Premier of N.S.W. In the evening delegates and friends attended the Shell National Folkloric Festival at the Opera House.

The Annual General Meeting took place on 1st December, 1975. The Annual Report covered the many-sided programme of the Council, with special reference to the decentralisation of activities, the Home Tutor Scheme, Ethnic Radio, and the contribution made by the many contact workers through their welcome and follow-up visits to new arrivals. The work of the staffs in the Regional Offices was highly commended, and the hope was expressed that additional funds would be made available to enable more of these offices to be established, so that all migrants might be provided with localised neighbourhood services.

GLIMPSES OF ZAMBIA

The Revd. Dorothy Wacker, President of Australian Church Women, was one of the Australians who attended the World Council of Churches Assembly in Nairobi, Kenya in November-December, 1975. Later she visited Zambia, spending several weeks with Violet Sampa, a former Winifred Kiek Scholarship holder, whom many of our Council members met during her stay in Australia. Here is part of Dorothy Wacker's account of her visit to "Violet's World".

"Violet's everyday world of 'school and church' became mine during the three weeks that I stayed in the Southern Province. At Njase Girls' Secondary School, 5 miles from Choma, 120 miles north of Livingstone and the Victoria Falls, her chaplaincy duties were minimal because it was holiday time - but members of the staff from India, England, the United States, Scotland, Holland, Zaire and Zambia were to me a sign of the complexity of the task of independent-nation building. At St. Andrew's Church in Choma, the congregation witnessed to Violet's creative ministry and more than fulfilled her expectations as they presented their own nativity play on Christmas Eve - a play marked by reverence AND hilarity ... as they overflowed the little buildings on Christmas morning ... as they burst into song during my sermon-time ... as they shared with deep faith and emotion in a family's mourning at the funeral service marking the death of their 17 year old son ... as they met as a Women's Sisterhood for learning and serving ... and as they gave me a copper plaque as a token of their wholehearted acceptance of me as their Christian colleague from Australia. At the school chapel, the Zambian world of 'participatory democracy' came alive in the Synod meetings of the United Church of Zambia, held there from 5th-12th January. Delegates from all the member-churches were given TIME - to think, to ask questions, to make comments, to gather information and to be involved in the decision-making process of this 8 year old church bringing together Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches and the Paris Evangelical Mission. The chapel walls with their 8 large murals of gospel scenes, in which all the participants were painted as black Africans, were very appropriate walls to surround such meetings.

This world was very much a world of 'demand and promise', 'of people and the future'. The need for leadership, skills and facilities in the Southern Province is great and the willingness of people to learn is very noticeable. The Church at Maamba, the mining centre that provides all of Zambia's coal requirements, is a symbol of the demand and promise. People worship now in the Mining Company's hall and sit on the floor unless they bring their own chairs - nearby, the concrete base of a church building has been paid for by the worshippers, the walls will be paid for by the mining company, while the roof and furniture are still a matter of prayer and hopefulness. The Production Unit at the school is a symbol of people and the future. Each High School is required to have one, in an attempt to upgrade agriculture and the rural scene in the eyes of people being lured to the city by the power of a developing technological world ... and last year, at Njase, the 400 girls produced enough maize and chickens to provide for their needs."
