## From your Minister's Desk



Dear friends,

On Tuesday, 7th October, the annual meeting of the Diocesan Synod (or Parliament) will commence. The meetings continue in the afternoons and evenings on Wednesday 8th and Thursday 9th, and then the following Monday and Tuesday. All sessions are open to the public, though seating for the public is somewhat limited, owing purely to the numerical size of Synod and the physical size of the Synod Hall (the Cathedral Chapter House).

Obviously there are periods when routine and procedural matters make the proceedings slow and far from exciting. However, there are always the more informative discussions, and even "lighter" moments, which make attending to observe the conduct of our church affairs, worthwhile.

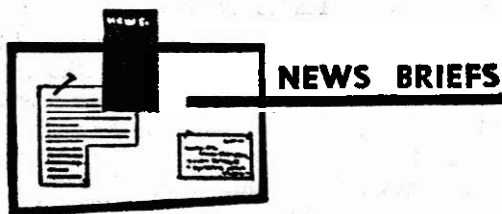
I would encourage our parishioners to take an active interest in Synod and its meetings by attending at least some of the sessions. It helps us understand how very democratic the government of our church affairs is. But even more so, I would encourage you to pray regularly for the guidance of God's Spirit to be with all the representatives in their deliberations and decisions. And particularly that He will enable those responsible for presenting the various resolutions and motions to be clear and logical in the information provided. His Grace the Archbishop also needs our special support, together with the Chairman of Committee, in the supervision of the debate and the ruling on points of procedure.

Make it an opportunity to share more intelligently in the life and work of your church.

The other matter I would draw to your mind is the Special Family Celebration of God's Love, on Sunday, 26th October. This will take place in Hyde Park, City, from 1.30 p.m. If you value the institution of the Family, and if you value God's Law of Love as enshrined in the Ten Commandments, be there!!!

### **"THE FRIDAY CARE AND SHARE GROUP"**

"Many are asking today, 'Where is Jesus Christ at work in our world? How does he touch the problems of society in this twentieth century?' The answer is that he is at work exactly as he was at work in his lifetime on earth, doing precisely the same thing. In the days of his flesh he did his work through one solitary, earthly, physical body. He is doing the same work now through a corporate, complex body which exists around the world and permeates and penetrates every level of society. It is called the Church, the body of Christ, but its ministry is to the same race Jesus ministered to, under the same basic conditions, facing the same attitudes and problems."

The above is a quote from Dr. Ray Stedman's book called "Body Life" — the book the Care and Share Group is using as a basis for its discussion on a Friday morning. Over the past weeks and months those of us who come together in this group have found the discussions stimulating and challenging — and really enjoyable.
