Dear Friends,

Recently I heard of a journalist who went to investigate how people looked at the job they were doing. At one stage he came to a sandstone quarry and talked to three men as they had their "tea-break". Two of the men agreed that they were there getting stone out of the quarry as a means of earning a livelihood, but the third fellow said, "The stone we are getting out is going into a Cathedral, so I look at my job as helping to build that great structure.

The point of the story is that a great deal depends on how you look at what you are doing. That surely is something which we need to do in this parish. We are occupied with having Church Services, Sunday Schools and other organisations, but what are we doing? Just parish work? Surely much more than that! We are part of the whole big work of God in the world. We are part of the Anglican Diocese of Sydney — part of the Anglican

Church of Australia — part of the whole Anglican Communion in the world — part of the whole Church of God in the world!

Ours is not just the little effort that we are making here in Petersham — ours is an effort which is part of the work of the Kingdom of God — we are part of the effort that is being made to bring that Kingdom on earth! To see things this way is to have the heart uplifted and the spirit encouraged!

Sometimes it is good to look at a map of the world and, as you note the various countries, to recall that, in this age in which we live, the work of God is going on in every one of them. The witness is there — maybe in very small ways in some areas — BUT THERE! We need always to remember that we are part of that big work and making a very necessary contribution to it.

However, let it also be remembered that, with the realisation and encouragement that comes there is also a responsibility. Responsibility to see that what we should do is the best, for only as each part is at its best can the whole be what it should be and as effective as it ought to be.

Each one of us is a part of that great whole work of God, so let your prayer be—

“Lord I thank you that I am part of your work in this parish and part of your work in the whole world. Help me to be what I ought to be — a workman acceptable in your sight and so a means of bringing your kingdom on earth. In Jesus name I pray. Amen.”

THE PATTERN**by Rene Wilkey**

I had had a terrible day trying to make a dress. Seams had been sewn and then unpicked; adjustments here, alterations there — I was beginning to despair of ever being able to wear it.

It was 4 p.m. when I heard the side gate click. My daughter was home from school.

“Mum, I’m home,” called a cheerful voice. “I’m in here sewing,” I answered. My despair must have shown on my face, because a sympathetic daughter said, “What pattern are you using Mum?”

“Well, I’m using this skirt pattern and from this pattern I’ve cut out the top, and I want this kind of sleeve,” I said, showing her a third pattern. She looked at me in dismay. “Oh Mum, I’m sure you’d have much less bother if you followed only one pattern and did it slowly, step by step.” Wise words!

God told Noah to make an ark of gopher wood. He gave him all the details and the necessary measurements. Noah didn’t try to alter God’s pattern. The Bible records, “Noah did . . . all that God commanded him.” because Noah was obedient and followed God’s pattern faithfully, he and his family were saved, just as God had planned. God has plans for us too, but in spite of knowing from experience that we can trust Him we persistently try to alter His plans to suit ourselves.

The Israelites, after long years of slavery in Egypt, were led to Mount Sinai. High in the mountain, in the awe-inspiring presence of God, Moses their leader was given commandments for the people to live by, and heard this wonderful announcement. “Let the people make Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell in their midst; according to all that I show you concerning the pattern of the Tabernacle and all its furniture, so you shall make it.” Then God gave the directions to Moses, even as to the decoration and colour of the embroidery on the linen of the priest’s clothing. Every detail has its special significance.

God never intended people to live haphazard lives. A well known Bible scholar recently wrote that few people find it easy to keep up the daily discipline of the Christian life. It’s harder than ever today when the ideal is to do one’s own thing, to live

by impulse and not by any orderly plan. Our times of prayer and devotion must be regular and orderly if we are to grow spiritually.

The most common pattern non-Christians follow to earn favour with God is that of 'good deeds', but the Bible makes it clear that this is not the way of salvation. God's pattern for our salvation is faith in His Son, who came to die for our sins, "the righteous for the unrighteous that He might bring us to God."

The ten commandments were a pattern for Godly living given to the undisciplined slaves from Egypt to shape them into the righteous nation God required. Jesus' teaching in the Sermon on the Mount, and in His parables, set the pattern of life for those who belong to the kingdom of God. Paul in his letters unfolds the pattern of true Christian love which enables us to live in harmony with others.

God wants us to follow His patterns, obeying the instructions carefully step by step. Old ways have to be discarded, like unsuitable clothing. And the best pattern of all is Jesus Himself, for "He has given us an example, that we should follow in His steps".
