

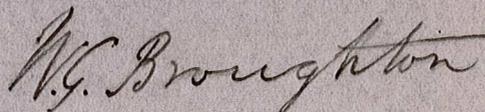

My dear Sir,

The very handsome and flattering manner in which you are so good as to offer the Curacy of Brighton to my acceptance demands from me the sincerest acknowledgment. I cannot better show my sense of its importance than by desiring to have a short time allowed me for weighing your proposal in my own mind, and for consulting with some of my friends on whose better judgment and greater experience I am accustomed to rely. If therefore you can without inconvenience afford me until this day week for the purposes here stated, I promise by that time to send you my decisive reply. The chief objection which strikes me, on the short consideration which I have been able to give to the subject, is the want of a house. To be able to accommodate as many pupils as I do here, I should require a house containing three sitting rooms, and seven or eight bed chambers; besides lodging for servants. It is scarcely to be expected that such a house could be hired in Brighton expecting at an expense which would reduce the stipend, however handsome in itself, to almost nothing. This at least is the impression on my mind, and I am in the habit of considering Brighton an expensive place of residence. I confess at the same time that I know but little of it; and should be greatly indebted to you for any information upon the subject; especially as to the matter of house rent. If I were to close with the proposal, it would not be in my power to enter upon the duties of the cure before the month of August; but I believe I am correct in supposing that you would be able to make a temporary arrangement until that period arrives. Mrs Broughton begs to unite in compliments to Mrs Wagner with my dear Sir,
