Dear Friends,

At the end of June we shall be having a Confirmation at All Saints', Petersham. Five teenagers have been attending preparation classes over the past two months. Do pray for these young people and if possible come to the Confirmation Service on Sunday, 30th June at 7.00 p.m. The date is not hard to remember, it is the last day of the financial year.

Confirmation is an important step for young people. It is far more than just becoming a member of the church congregation or even of a denomination.

Confirmation and Baptism are linked. The promise made by parents and god-parents at an infant's baptism are the same promises which are required from the teenager or adult who presents him- or her- self for Confirmation. Often a candidate for Confirmation will say they are taking upon themselves the promises that were made for them when they were baptised as infants.

We might ask what are, or what were, those promises?

Simply these three:

1. To turn away from things that are wrong.
2. To believe that Jesus Christ is God and that He died to forgive every one of their sin and to restore us to fellowship with God.
3. To keep God's commandments and to do His will all our days.

They are simple promises, but not easy to keep. I would say they are impossible to keep without supernatural strength. That supernatural strength is available to all who honestly seek God's help.

How wonderful! God sets standards impossible for men to keep, yet at the same time is willing to give help to those who honestly try to attain them.

The promises made at Baptism by the parents, or at Confirmation by the candidates are simply the basic steps for anyone to become a Christian—nothing more, nothing less. The whole purpose of Confirmation is to afford members of the Church

the opportunity of making a public confession of their faith in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour. It is a most important, and very serious step for anyone to take. Again please, please remember these young people in your prayers this month.

There is an added blessing in Confirmation. Many confirmees find that in joining a particular Church or congregation means that the other Christians in that Church or congregation help them. They share their experiences as Christians; they talk about what they read in the Bible—God's word of instruction—they discover how older Christians, faced with the same temptation overcome them; they find Sunday services strengthen their faith, teach them more about God; even the hymns are worth singing during the week when they need a bit of encouragement.

Pray for the congregation at All Saints, that we may be able and willing to share the things of God with those who make a profession of their love of Christ as their Saviour and Lord.

MEALS ON WHEELS

The Marrickville Municipal Council is in urgent need of volunteers to assist with the meals-on-wheels programme. This service provides meals to people temporarily or permanently who have difficulty in preparing their own meals and who have no other source of obtaining meals. This aid is delivered to the person's home by volunteers who spare a few hours per month or weekly to make a contribution to the welfare of their community.

Volunteers rostered as drivers generally provide their own 'wheels' and a petrol subsidy is available. Helpers who accompany drivers to deliver meals do not need their own car provided they can get to and from the meals-on-wheels centre by their own means, transport subsidies are also available.

Other helpers can offer to be on call as emergency drivers/helpers. Regulars can be rostered for duty on the same day every week. Delivery rounds only take about 1-1½ hours.

COMMON CUP CLEARED

Findings of Melbourne study group

No special measures need be taken against the possibility of cross infection by use of the common cup.

That is one of the major findings of a working group established by Archbishop Penman, the details of which were outlined fully by the Archbishop in his charge to Melbourne synod on March 21.

"With the spread in our community of the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, concern has been expressed over the use of the 'common cup' in our churches. For this and other reasons, in late January, 1985, I established a special working group on 'the Church, Homosexuality and the AIDS crisis,'" said the Archbishop.

Working closely with the Melbourne Social Questions Committee, that working group sought advice from experts qualified to speak on the medical and scientific aspects of the risks attached to the sharing of the common chalice in the service of Holy Communion where there is a possibility of the congregation including people who are suffering from AIDS. It reported:

"The advice which the group has received from those qualified to know is that there has been no reported instance in which the virus which causes AIDS has been passed from one person to another by the use of a drinking vessel.

"The assurances which have been received indicate that it would be quite sensible to take no special measures against the possibility of cross infection by use of the common cup, but as it is also said that there is no absolute certainty in the scientific world, the working group accepts the advice that it would be good practice to use a purificator after each communicant has drunk from the cup. The cloth should be, when first used at the service, clean, recently laundered and ironed; it should be used to wipe the lip of the cup, inside and out, firmly and not with a gentle dab, but the same cloth could be effectively used up to a hundred times. For similar reasons it is preferred that the cup be made of an impervious metal rather than earthenware china or wood, and fortified wine used, with only a small amount of water add."

RELIEF COMES BY "OTTER"

The MAF — unsung heroes

Every day there are men who fly life-and-death missions across the famine-ravaged interior of Ethiopia. The lives they save are not their own—thousands of people depend on these men for their daily existence.

They are the pilots of the Mission Aviation Fellowship, a vital link between the warehouses of food in Addis Ababa and the distribution centres in other parts of the stricken country. These pilots guide two World Vision Twin Otter aircraft to the dusty landing strips at Alamata, Lalibella and other feeding centres. They often make three return flights a day. Without the lifeline, death could come quickly to many of the thousands of starving Ethiopian people who have no source of food other than the health and nutrition centres.

The work of life-saving is not always one-way. Occasionally the plane is needed to rush a critically ill child back to the capital for emergency treatment. The MAF pilots take upon

themselves substantial responsibilities for these lives under difficult and sometimes dangerous conditions, but instead of being daunted by the enormity of the task before them, these quietly-spoken and unassuming men see a challenge in their work. They seek no other reward besides the knowledge that they are helping to save lives—helping alleviate the suffering of the Ethiopian people is enough for them.

Besides their love of flying, the thing which bonds these men is their personal faith in Jesus Christ. Each believes he is in Ethiopia to serve God by serving the people who need them.

Canadian Jim McAlpine, 28, said: "I never thought of myself as a preacher or teacher, but to take a skill and to be able to use it for the Lord is very rewarding."

The MAF consortium has been flying the African continent for 35 years. It is now an international organisation — the largest private, non-profit air service in the world. The idea was born during World War II when several Christian military airmen saw the plane as a tool to extend help to remote places. Small aircraft were soon warmly welcomed as they pioneered supply lines in the skies, saving days, weeks, even months by flying over inhospitable terrain.

Said MAF president Charles Bennett: "The hard truth is that all the food in the world will not help the people who are starving if it does not get delivered."

The men of the MAF have certainly won the admiration and respect of all who work in Ethiopian relief efforts. Appreciative accolades come from the World Vision staff who fly with the pilots almost daily, from many other agencies, and from the many journalists and others who have visited the camps. But the greatest love comes from the Ethiopian people themselves, as they stand in repeated awe and amazement as the Twin Otter touches down with yet another load of life-giving supplies. It is no wonder that the Ethiopian people have dubbed the Twin Otter "The white bird which brings gifts from the sky."
