

## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear People,

Why must we come to Church? I might begin with an old saying I read somewhere which says: "If our Church is to be a 'Going Concern' our people must achieve church-going-concern." There is abroad these days apparently the popular idea that it doesn't really matter if you actually attend worship services or not.

People seem to be saying that we can be good members of Christ's congregation without attending worship. They feel that if they support the Fete, the Tea, the Drive, the mid-week group, or perhaps receive a Chronicle or send in the occasional donation that they have fulfilled their Christian duty. There are more and more people who seem to be willing enough to help keep the Petersham plant going, but not for them. They feel the Church must go on, but for somebody else.

**Why?** Isn't it good enough for them? Do they not need a time of self-examination? Do they not want to hear the Word of God any more? Have they nothing to confess? Are they so sufficient that they can go it alone without God's help, without his guiding hand, without his gentle admonition and loving forgiveness? Do they feel that they just do not need to worship? Can they find no more joy in the familiar hymns and chants? Do they not need the fellowship and friendship of fellow travellers on the road of life—who must of necessity travel the same road as they do? Do they know so much about life, philosophy, wisdom, and truth that the considered efforts of a careful preacher can no longer in any way be of assistance to them as they face life's struggle?

Or is there something about our traditional form of worship that is blocking the people's ability to find the fulfilment they desire and deserve? Is it perhaps that our services are held at the wrong hour; on the wrong day of the week? Is the Church too uncomfortable, the pews too hard. Why do so few want to come to Church?

Is it possible that many people have missed the point of even having a Church? It was natural that around the original centres of Christian worship a warm and active fellowship should have grown up. This busy happy throng of souls engaged in doing the thousand and one things that need to be done to support a temple of worship and its subsidiary buildings, was inevitable.

But can it be that the supporting machinery has forgotten what it is supporting? Does the machine go on running just to amuse itself, no longer empowered and directed by its original central purpose; the Worship and Service of God, and the broadcasting of His word and His love? Have we forgotten whom we are?

**For it is because of whom we are that we must come to worship? We are the children of God and He is our Spiritual Father. Without Him we are orphans; knowing not where to go or what to do. We are ships without rudders floundering in a sea that is not always calm, and around which are the rocks of destruction, dissolution, and despair. Without the God of love at the centre of our lives weird and terrifying spectres step in and take over in His place, and under their command man enters the Hell which is their design, instead of the Heaven which is God's design. Without God man is lost! Without the uplifting of God's moral direction, man succumbs to the down-pull of the world. And once he is down man cannot pull himself up by his own boot straps.**

We are weak—but the word of God strengthens us. We are blind—but the light of Christ guides us. We are selfish—but the love of God broadens us. We are dead—but the hand of God enlivens us. That is why we must come to worship, because of what we are. And

by our very presence there we encourage others to come and so give strength and light to them also. All people love to be where others are. And so we have a duty, not only to ourselves, but to other people. And that duty is to be present at the worship service of our Church.

The world is scattered with fossils, empty shells of life that once were. Is that us? Have we really lost our faith? Or are we just lazy? Or is it that we have become so selfish that we do not care anymore how life goes? Does it matter if the light of life goes out and the human race enters the joyless winter of despair? Do you care?

If there is anything you can do, or suggest that we all might do together, to make our worship here at All Saints' more attractive, more efficient, and more fulfilling for the souls of men, will you come forward? If there is something wrong, will you help us right it? If there is something missing, will you help us include it? If there is something missing, will you help us include it? If there is something lost, will you help us find it? Will you stay with the ship and keep fighting for her life, or will you abandon her to disappear, and man to sink into the final abyss, without God. God loves you. God wants you to love him. And man needs God, and therefore man needs you! That is why we must come to Church; because we need, and because we are needed!

● **Centenary Fund:**


