All Saints' Rectory,

28th April, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once again we would record our thankfulness for our Easter Day Services, together with our thanks to ALL who contributed in any way to their success. The Church was most beautifully decorated for the Festival, with a profusion of white dahlias, palms, etc., and we are grateful to those who sent gifts of flowers, particularly to Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Bosward, from whose garden there came over 300 magnificent white blooms, not to mention many others, which came from the same source prior to Easter. When one thinks of the conditions under which our relatives and friends in England worshipped this Easter, one wonders if we Australians are sufficiently thankful.

Our Lenten offerings for C.M.S. and A.B.M. were nearly £6 less than last year, but the children's Lenten offerings for A.B.M. were larger than we have ever had, so I am hoping that in the aggregate we shall not be so very far behind the total for 1940. At the moment of writing, we have in hand £15/14/7 for C.M.S. and £8/3/- for A.B.M., exclusive of the children's Lenten offering. If there should be any Lenten boxes or envelopes outstanding, may we have them as soon as possible, please?

The attendance at the Annual Vestry Meeting, held on April 23rd, was disappointing. Messrs. L. C. Calver and W. J. Cooke were unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King kindly accepted nomination as Rector's Warden. The meeting elected Messrs. J. M. Boyle, A. S. Cusiter, S. L. Derrett, D. B. Hunter, H. F. Jones, W. Sopwith, Junr., C. E. Tanner,


A. H. Thomas, and W. Webster to the Parish Council; whilst Messrs. J. Williams, A. J. Harris and A. E. Carruthers were nominated subsequently by the Rector. Messrs. R. K. McWilliam and S. L. Derrett were re-elected honorary Auditors.

We have good reason to be thankful for what we have been able to accomplish during the past year, but, in these times, the call goes forth for more effort and more sacrifices for the Cause of Christ. We are living in most critical and anxious days, when a colossal struggle is going on for the things which we believe make life worth living. I have no doubt there are dark days ahead. What happens to us individually is not of so great importance as we sometimes imagine, but what happens to the Cause of Christ is of most vital importance to the whole world. We can only safeguard that Cause by renewed and increased loyalty to His Kingdom; and I fail to see how we can express that loyalty, except by redoubled activity in His Church and a devoted service to all it is trying to do, to build up that Kingdom. Seen only from our personal view-point, our problems and difficulties sometimes seem insuperable, but viewed against the Vision of the Risen Christ, we have the assurance of the ultimate world-triumph of His Kingdom. It means more sacrifice than we have ever before made, and a resolution to pray, think and work together for the things we rightly hold dear. In that spirit, we can give thanks for all that has been achieved during the past year, and in that spirit, we may face whatever lies ahead, humbly, hopefully and courageously.

I wonder if you saw a very good letter in the daily Press recently, written under the heading of "The Willing Horse," and signed "Common Soldier" (S.M.H., 22/4/1941)? After pleading that seriousness should take the place of frivolity, and that everyone should contribute some war effort, even if the effort be only in the nature of a personal sacrifice, the writer goes on to say: "Instead of this, we hear complaints about working conditions, complaints about taxation, complaints about petrol rationing, and complaints about one hundred different things, from people who refuse to face realities, and whose only concern is that their comforts and contentments and pleasures of life should be in any way disturbed. In a supposedly Christian country, I should also have expected to see some revival of Christian faith. Although I am no churchman, I should, nevertheless, have expected to see people who profess to believe in God, as most of us do, going to the House of God to ask His mercy, and His help in this time of terrible trouble, but, instead, we find the churches practically empty. Wake up, Australians, before it is too late!"

I would draw your attention to the two great festivals of the Church, falling within the next few weeks, Ascension Day, May 22nd, and Whitsunday, June 1. Ascension Day is frequently unrecognised by many people, even by many Church people, yet it ranks in the Prayer Book with Easter and Whitsunday, having proper Psalms and a proper Preface in the Service of Holy Communion.

**The Sunday School.**—For the past eight weeks, the honours for attendance have gone to the girls. Several girls' classes have been up in the eighty and ninety-per-cent. grade, whilst the boys' classes have scarcely risen above seventy per cent., and some have not even attained that status of mediocrity. The writer refuses to believe that boys are less energetic than girls; but, there the figures are—and he feels it keenly! Of course, much depends on the teacher—if a teacher attends erratically, his class will do likewise; if a teacher makes a habit of coming late, his class will form the opinion that punctuality doesn't matter. We are encouraged by the excellent response from the children's Lenten boxes for the Australian Board of Missions—£8/2/9 being now in hand—good work! The best result yet; and one that heartens us, because it points to the fact that the girls and boys are really learning what Lent means, and, incidentally, giving help where it is most needed.

**Parish Hall Fund, 1941.**—For the fifth year in succession, we have dispensed with a Parish Fete, which has always reminded the editor of this paper of those mythical people "who earned a respectable living by taking in each other's washing"! We have done much better by our box method of tackling our Parish Hall debt; and the boxes have again been issued. This explanation may seem to some, "tedious as a twice-told tale, vexing the dull ear of a drowsy man," but there are always others to whom the method is new; so, we do not apologise for stating that between the issue of the boxes—(Easter Day) and August 17 (our Consecration Festival)—there is a period of 21 weeks. If you will take a box and put something in it **REGULARLY** each week, you will be helping to lessen the debt on the Parish Hall. Even if one could spare only sixpence per week, that would amount to 10/6 by the time the box is due for return; and there are few who could not do this. May we again point out that this plan concerns not only the senior members of our congregation, but also the **younger people**, who, through the various clubs and societies, derive much enjoyment from the use of a spacious Parish Hall, and who must therefore be prepared to shoulder at least some of the responsibility entailed in its erection. It needs also to be stressed that the moneys collected in this way do **NOT** go to general Church expenses: the box collection is a special appeal to meet our Parish Hall commitments. The Churchwardens tell us that we have to find £200 by August, and all parishioners, young and old, are asked to set to and find it in this regular, systematic way. Ask for a box at Church, or ask your District Visitor for one; but, **DO IT NOW!**

**L.H.M.U.**—The Annual Meeting of All Saints', Petersham Branch of L.H.M.U. was held on Tuesday, March 18th, the Rector presiding. Mrs. Lindsay's resignation as President (owing to removal from the parish) was received with deep regret. We thank her for her enthusiastic and ever-ready help. We welcome Mrs. Ward as our new President. The other Branch Officers were unanimously re-elected. Deaconess Baker gave a most interesting account of her work at Yarra Bay, making us realise the great work being done by the Deaconesses, and how important it is we should back-up their efforts by prayer and practical service.

**C.E.F.**—The former Communicants' Fellowship is now the Church of England Fellowship, or C.E.F., to which we hope to be admitted as a properly constituted branch after the regulation three months' probationary period. We meet on the 1st and 3rd Sundays, after Evening Service, and

on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays in the month—the Sundays being our Study Group, for specific religious purposes, and the Tuesdays mainly for physical, intellectual and social activity. Those who wish to belong to C.E.F. must aim at the “four-square” ideal, based on St. Luke 2:42, where we read that our Lord in His Youth increased in wisdom—intellectually—; in stature—physically—; and in favour with God—spiritually—; and with man—socially—.

We are grateful to three Fellowship members from other branches, who came on Tuesday, April 22nd, to give us a lead, and, although our numbers were small, there was a keenness and enthusiasm which augurs well for C.E.F.

**Ascension Day.**—There will be a celebration of Holy Communion on Ascension Day—May 22nd—at 7.30 a.m., and Evening Prayer, with an address at 7.45. (This will take the place of the usual Wednesday Evening Service during that week.)

**Home Mission Society.**—The Reverend Canon R. B. Robinson, General Secretary of the Society, will preach at All Saints', Petersham, on Sunday evening, May 25th, and will also come to give an Illustrated Talk on the work of H.M.S., at the Girls' Club Evening, on June 2nd. The Club is making this an open evening, and hopes all parishioners will take this opportunity of knowing more of the great work the Home Mission Society is doing.

The tea was held in our Parish Hall, and the attendance numbered 70, representing 13 parishes in the western suburbs. The speaker at the tea was Rev. E. H. Lambert (of St. Luke's, Mosman), who also preached at Evensong. The tea itself was an outstanding success, due mainly to the work done by Mr. and Mrs. Bosward, Mr. Atkinson, and the young ladies who served on the tables. To the above-mentioned people the C.E.B.S. says “Many Thanks.”

**C.E.N.E.F.**—All Saints' (Petersham) Branch of C.E.N.E.F. is one year old, and the following is a short resumé of the work accomplished during that period. The first donation towards the Hut Fund was the sum of £2/2-. Since then the sale of buttons and brooches has amounted to £9/17-; Mile of Penny Cards, £1; Xmas Cheer, 11/-; and £20 proceeds from the 3 to 5 Fete. Other donations to the Hut were eleven dozen tins of salmon and thirteen dozen tins of fruit. An Australian Flag costing 17/6 was presented to the Hut. Members also contributed gifts to the stalls for the Allies and Australia Days Carnivals held in Martin Place. A Field Communion Set, suitably inscribed, together with Communion Linen, the total cost being £8/12/3, was presented to Padre Hammond. During the year an American Tea, two Games Evenings, functions kindly arranged in their homes by Mesdames Jones and Rowley, and donations from members, have enabled us to buy wool, writing material, tobacco, etc., for our own Comforts Fund. Two large boxes of comforts have been sent abroad to Padre Hulme Moir, and individual parcels have been given to the boys of our parish when leaving for abroad. The following garments have been made by members during the year:—184 pairs of socks, 79 bags, 72 caps, 15 Balaclavas, 5 vests, 1 pullover, 4 pairs knee caps, 13 shirts, 11 pairs underpants, 8 pillows and one dozen elbow rests for hospitals abroad; 63 "hussifs," 40 scarves, 48 washers, 19 milk covers, 4 pairs mittens, 12 hot water bag covers, and 51 handkerchiefs. Three dozen towels have been brought from the Hut to be hemmed. Gifts of books, magazines and papers

have been sent into C.E.N.E.F., as well as our own donations of socks, scarves, etc. All Saints' Branch of C.E.N.E.F. meets every 1st and 3rd Thursday in the Guild Room, at 8 p.m. Parishioners are cordially invited to join up, and do all they can to help our Church Huts in the various camps, and incidentally our Church lads who are in those camps.
