

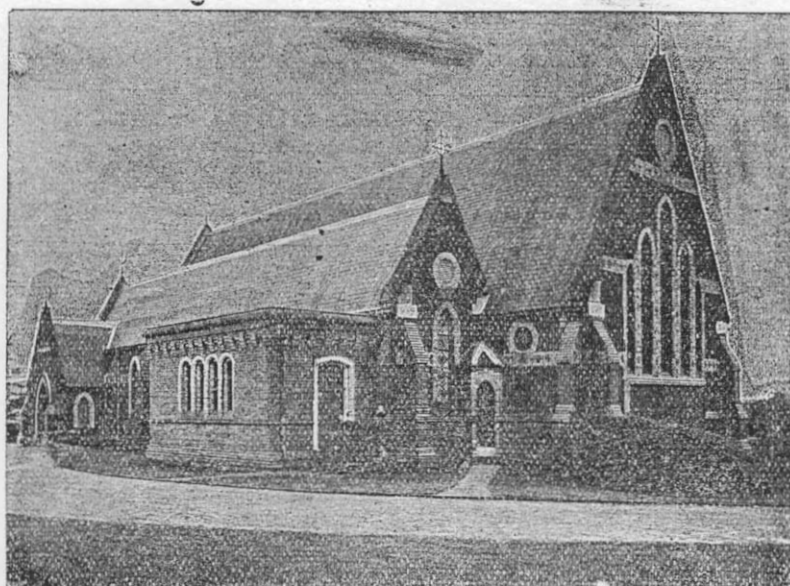

The Rector hopes that there may be a good attendance of Petersham Church People, both from All Saints' and from the Mission Church, to hear what the Speakers have to say about the very important and extremely interesting Conference to be held in London next year, and at which all the Australian Dioceses are to be represented.

All Saints' Church Council.—A SPECIAL MEETING of the Council was held on Monday, June 24th to receive the further report of the Committee appointed to obtain a professional opinion on the condition of the Rectory, and the best means of dealing with it. Before proceeding to business the Rector referred to the great loss the Church and the Council had sustained in the death of Mr. Forster who had been for many years the Clergyman's warden, a most active member of the Council and the School Board, and a generous helper in all good works. The appreciation of Mr. Forster's services to the Church, the keen sense of loss sustained by this parish in his death, and the deep sympathy with his widow and relatives in their bereavement was expressed in a resolution which was spoken to by the wardens and several members, and carried in silence, all standing. The committee then presented the report of Messrs. Ellis and Sons, architects, who suggested that the damp, insanitary, and unsuitable conditions might be dealt with by demolishing the kitchen annex abutting on Hopetoun-street, and in place thereof building two rooms on to the present front of the house, raising the floors of both stories and the roof some four feet, and making provision for intercepting damp, and arresting subsoil drainage, and for repainting, etc. The estimated cost of this work was £750, and for making provision for opening out the main portion of the house so as to secure proper lighting and ventilation, a further sum of about £120 was estimated, making £870.

After lengthly consideration and much discussion, the Council instructed the Wardens to obtain Architects plans for a new Rectory to cost not more than £1200 and to submit them to the Council.

THE ORDINARY MONTHLY MEETING of the Council was held on Monday, July 1st. The Churchwardens submitted their accounts for the quarter as printed in this issue. The Secretary reported that he had sent out a number of letters calling attention to the great reduction in the amount of the General Church Fund owing to the death and removals of so many contributors, but that, so far, only one gentleman had replied. It was generally felt that it would be necessary to follow up the letters by a personal call from a member of the council. Mr. H. D. Williamson consented to join the sub-committee appointed for that work. Mr. Bateman was elected a member of the Committee and of the Council. The Committee will meet in the Vestry on Friday, July 12th, at 8 o'clock.

CLERGYMAN'S WARDEN.—The Rector announced that he had followed the course adopted on the last two occasions and appointed one of the existing Wardens to the position of Clergyman's Warden. He felt sure the parishioners would welcome the nomination of Mr. A. J. Gaston who had already rendered good service.

The Church Lads' Brigade.—Since we last went to print, the Petersham Company has met on two Saturday afternoons in addition to the regular Friday evening parade. On Saturday, May 25th, a drag picnic to Wonders Park served the double purpose of celebrating Empire Day, and of giving the lads an opportunity of shewing their appreciation of the many kindnesses extended to them by Mrs. Johnstone, whom, with her friends, they invited to be present. A lovely day made a well organised and well provided picnic an unqualified success. The next occasion was on the last Saturday in June, when the company paraded in the Church ground for the purpose of being photographed, so that copies together with views of the district, might be sent to England to the Petersham Company who have already presented us with a silver bugle and pictures of their neighbourhood. After the ordeal Mrs. Goddard entertained the Company at afternoon tea. Captain Wills and the officers deserve every commendation for the excellent manner in which the company is progressing. A Church Parade will be held on Sunday evening, July 28th, at All Saints' Church.

Obituary.—STEPHEN FORSTER. It is with a keen sense of the loss which the Church in Petersham has sustained that we chronicle the death of Mr. Forster, who for many years has been the Clergyman's warden at All Saints'.

Mr. Forster, who has been in failing health for some months passed peacefully to his rest at his residence, "Ravensworth," Stanmore, early on Thursday morning, June 6th, after a distressing and painful illness of a month's duration.

The funeral took place on Saturday, June 8th, and was attended by his relatives with a large number of friends and former associates in business and in Church work, amongst whom were the Rev. C. Baber (former Rector of Petersham) together with past and present members of the Church Council. The first part of the Burial Service was said in All Saints' Church, the opening sentences being read by the Rev. Luke Parr, and the Lesson by the Rector, who also conducted the service at the Waverley Cemetery. Both in the Church and at the grave side the service was choral, the gentlemen and boys of All Saints' Choir giving up their Saturday afternoon as a token of their affectionate esteem for one who had repeatedly shown his appreciation of their work in the Church.

Mr. Foster's death leaves a large gap in the already much diminished list of well known men who have held office in All Saints' Church. First as people's warden, and for the last fifteen years as Clergyman's warden, he has given ungrudgingly of his time, attention and energy to the duties of his office, and by his genial manner and his consideration of the feelings of others he has promoted that good feeling which so far has marked our church life. He was ever ready to give his generous practical support to the maintenance of Church work and to help forward any scheme for the furtherance of her activity. He was a member of the Parochial Day School Board from its inception and took a warm interest in its welfare. Mr. Forster was well known as an industrious and upright man of business, a warm friend and most charitable to those whom it was his pleasure to help in times of distress and difficulty.

Expository Lectures on Wednesday Evenings.

The attendance at the Wednesday Evensong at All Saints' has shown a marked increase since the end of May, when the Rector commenced a series of lectures on the New Testament. The subjects have been (1) The Growth of the New Testament. (2) The Origin of the Gospels. (3) The Epistles in connection with the history of the Early Church. (4) S. Paul's Epistles. (5) The Epistles to the Philippians (its outlines).

The Rector proposes now to take the Philippians as the subject for more detailed study. Members of the Congregation are asked to bring their Bibles with them,

Confirmation. The time for beginning preparation for Confirmation is drawing near, and the Rector asks that those who desire to attend the lectures will send in their names to him as early as possible. The first Lecture will be given on Sunday, July 28th, at 4.30 in All Saints' Church, when all (both males and females) are asked to attend so that arrangements for future meetings, may be made to suit convenience of all.

After the presentation of a bouquet to Mrs. Goddard, and an opening song by the scholars, business began, and eventually resulted in the raising of £34 odd.
