The WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION N.S.W. Bicentennial Year Celebration was held at the C.M.S. Conference Room, on 13th September. Mrs. Brigadier Minnie Rawlins, World President of W.C.T.U. was the guest speaker; she is from Canada and her lifelong interests have been the Salvation Army and the Girl Guide Movement.

THE MEN HEARD THE WOMEN!

The prayers of Christians around the world were answered at the Lambeth Bishops' Conference. The presence and prayers of women were appreciated by many bishops from around the world.

The Episcopal Women's caucus accepted the presiding bishop's invitation originally proffered by the Archbishop of Canterbury "to bring your Diocese with you". The E.V.C. invited women involved in ministry from Africa, Australia, Canada, the Caribbean, Central and South America and the Philippines to join them in prayer vigils, lectures, seminars, workshops, worship and hospitality.

Each day focus was made on different parts of the world from where the women came. Highlights of the programme included the celebration of 44 years of women in the Anglican priesthood. The Rev. Dr. Li Tim-Oi, ordained in China in 1944 and Rev. Joyce Bennet ordained in Hong Kong in 1971 were in attendance, when a video entitled 'Return to Hepu' was screened in the University Theatre. It was a stirring documentation of the life and ministry of Florence Li Tim-Oi who was an honoured guest. (In the Lambeth Conference Souvenir brochure, a photo appeared of Rev. Li Tim-Oi and Deacon Mary Andrews.)

'Women's stories in Scripture and Today' was the focus of Bible Studies by Dr. Ellen Bacon McKinley, a specialist in psychiatry and religion from U.S.A., which were very challenging.

The Rev. Nan Peete was the first ordained woman to make a presentation at Lambeth Conference for which she was given a long standing ovation.

On August 1st, the Conference resolved 'That each Province respect the decisions and attitudes of the other provinces whether in favour or against the ordination and consecration of a woman in the episcopate maintaining the highest possible degree of communion with provinces who differ.'

2. 'That bishops exercise courtesy and maintain communications with bishops who may differ and with any woman bishop ensuring an open dialogue in the church to whatever extent communion is impaired'.

The bishops voted by an overwhelming 90% for the resolution. There was stunned silence in the theatre, where by means of closed circuit television, the press and the women's conference members listened to the Archbishop of Canterbury announce the result.

As the Women's Witnessing Community left Lambeth, it was with thanksgiving that women's voices were heard at the Conference with reference to problems of poverty, hunger, health, ordination and ministry in the Church.

The Archbishop of Canterbury in his farewell message said: 'We kept our eyes on Jesus and we did not sink (as the media foretold). Go back to your dioceses and attempt great things for God'.

Two new titles for 8-12 year olds have recently been released in this Australian series.

They are WHY ME, GOD (which asks the question 'Why does God let awful things happen to me?') and DOES GOD LOVE ME? ('Does God love me even when I do wrong things?')

The first in the series, a simple unambiguous statement of the gospel for 8-12's is called BECOMING GOD'S FRIEND. It has proved very successful, already having sold over 4½ thousand copies.

The series is delightfully illustrated in full colour and the language and style perfectly suit this age group.
