THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

27th September, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once again the time has come to prepare for, and remind you of our Patronal Festival, which will be observed on Sunday, October 31st—the day before All Saints' Day. Although (owing to the absence of the Archbishop and Bishop Hilliard) there is no Confirmation here this year, we still hope to make our Patronal Festival a Reunion of all who have been confirmed here during my incumbency. I particularly ask each one concerned to come to the early celebration on the Festival Sunday. Those who are not now living in the parish may find this difficult, but we hope that, if possible, even they will attend, at least, one of the services on October 31st, and that all parishioners will make the occasion a day of real Thanksgiving and Dedication. The Church keeps such Festivals to remember and give thanks for the past; to consider and pray for its life and activities in the present, and to think of and re-dedicate itself to the work of the future.

In these days, when there is so much apathy and indifference towards the Church, it is heartening and encouraging to take up a book and read: "Right across the page of modern history there hangs the glory of the Christian Church." So writes R. A. Edwards in his book, "The City of God," and he goes on: "Whichever way you look at it, the Church is one of the most striking phenomena in history." It is hardly too much to say that it is the greatest marvel of all time. Consider its earliest days; what was it that transformed a handful of discouraged and disillusioned men into a power that turned the world upside down? Its persistence is no less astonishing: throughout the centuries, in season and out of season, in high places and in lowly spheres, harried by persecution, torn by tragedy, swayed by fluctuating tides of thought, the Church has endured and shed its healing rays upon a distracted world. Its growth is a greater miracle still: it has expanded and developed until to-day millions upon millions are within its borders, countless shrines have been erected wherein men may lift up their hands in prayer, so that there is hardly a corner of the earth where its influence is not felt. Even to-day, notwithstanding the tragedies of our time, it stands a glorious Church amid the ruins of a war-scarred world. It is this Church to which **YOU** belong!

The children will have their own Festival Service on Sunday, November 7th, at eleven o'clock, when we want every girl and every boy present; and we hope that many parents and friends will come with them. We have been hoping that for many years now. Special invitations to parents are sent out year by year, and the number of parents who accept them is comparatively small. It is disappointing to find that so many parents are not sufficiently interested in what the Church and Sunday School is doing for their children, to be present at their Anniversary Service, which is the children's share in the Festival of All Saints. However, we shall continue to hope and pray that one day the barriers of apathy and indifference may be removed.

We commend again to you the War Memorial Fund and ask your help. The sooner we receive your gift or your promise, the sooner shall we be able to commence the work. If you have not kept your July "Chronicle," in which the appeal was launched, just send your donation, marked "War

Memorial Fund." In inserting names in the "Book of Remembrance" it will be possible only to use one Christian name; therefore, we ask that the Christian name customarily used, be supplied.
