THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
25th March, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

This "Chronicle" will be available on Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week, which we hope may be kept free from social engagements, so that you may, as far as you possibly can, spend some portion of each day in meditation and worship. You will find particulars of Holy Week and Easter services have been re-printed in this issue, with the addition of the Passion Play on Maundy Thursday, to which reference is made elsewhere. There will, of course, be no meetings of our clubs and societies in Holy Week; members are invited to attend the daily services, particularly on the day of their regular meeting. Our young people are reminded that the proper observance of this Holy Season concerns **them** as well as their seniors.

We hope you will continue to protest against anything and everything which mars the solemnity of Good Friday. There are many amongst us who want this to be a Christian country, who want to think of themselves as Christians, regardless of the fact that they are doing nothing whatever to keep it or themselves Christian. How can we claim to be a Christian nation while we permit, without a protest, the use of the most sacred day in the whole year, the day on which our Lord was crucified for us and for all men on Calvary's Hill, as a day devoted to pleasure and material gain? Ample provision is made by the Church for you to spend Good Friday quietly and thoughtfully. We would especially commend to you the Three Hours' Service, which will be conducted this year by the Ven. Arch-deacon Robertson.


If you expect to be absent from the parish on Easter Day will you help by sending or bringing your Lenten and Easter offerings before leaving? We are trying to increase our Lenten gifts for the Church Missionary Society and the Australian Board of Missions this year, so that we may help both Societies to accept the many opportunities for development which are facing them in these days of rapidly rising costs.

The message the world needs to-day is that the One who was crucified and rose again is in the midst of human life **here** and **now**. His spirit still moves in the midst of a troubled, weary, perplexed world, amidst its blundering and sinning humanity, to reveal yet again that the only abiding thing in all the changes of life is the Love of God, which was revealed in the great triumph on Calvary and which in the Risen Saviour imparted peace and power to those bruised and broken disciples. Easter brings a message of the victory of good over evil, of light over darkness, of love over hate. But we should not be content to speak of it in terms of the world and humanity; it must grip each heart; the mystery of the crucifixion of sin and the re-birth to newness of life can and must begin in us if we are to witness for Him, and help Him rebuild the world which He died to redeem. His love calls for our loyal response; the invitation of the Risen Christ to allow Him to come into our lives, once again sounds in our ears and challenges our way of living. May we experience His abiding presence and know the "power of His resurrection."

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be very acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory no later than Saturday morning, April 8th.

Harvest Festival Gifts.—The Rector has pleasure in passing on to you the following letter of thanks and appreciation from the matron of The Home of Peace:—"I want to extend to you and your parishioners a sincere 'thank you' for the wonderful supply of gifts received as a result of your Harvest Festival Services. It is good to know that your people, in expressing thanks to Almighty God for His many blessings, continued to have such a practical interest in the work of this hospital, and wanted us to benefit from the material expression of their thanks. I feel it is very difficult to express adequately in words just what these gifts mean to us. The groceries, including eggs, flour, jams, other tinned goods and jellies helped to fill up our depleted shelves and will mean a big reduction in our monthly accounts. Some of the eggs we put down in waterglass to help us in the weeks ahead. The fruit and vegetables were a wonderful boon: a quantity of the fruit was used immediately, but the majority of the gifts were prepared for preserves, jams and chutney. With the other donations we received we were able to preserve in Fowler's jars—apples, pineapples, peaches, pears, quinces, grapes, plums, rhubarb, carrots and beetroot. Thus we saved waste and ensured a good supply for months to come. With all this extra work it has been impossible to write to you sooner, but I am sure you will understand. The official receipt for donation of £1 is enclosed."

Diocesan Festival.—The Diocesan Festival is to be held in the Sydney Town Hall on Friday, 5th May, when tea will be provided in the Town Hall, at 5.45 p.m., and tickets for this are obtainable at the Rectory. Tea will be followed at approximately 6.45 p.m. by the Annual Meeting of the Society in the Main Hall, when, in addition to a new film depicting many aspects of Home Mission Society work, a musical programme of items by well known artists is being arranged. His Grace the Archbishop will chair the meeting and an address on the work of the Society is to be given by Bishop Hilliard. Preceding the Festival Tea the Annual Service of the Society will be held in St. Andrew's Cathedral, at 4.45 p.m., when the Ven. Archdeacon R. B. Robinson will preach the sermon. Church people are urged to make every effort to be present at these important functions of the Diocese and especially for the Festival itself. Young and old alike are asked to help make up a party in order to fill the table of this parish.

E. V. Adams' Memorial.—At the Annual Meeting of the Women's Guild it was decided to continue, this year, the work of their late beloved president, who was instrumental in raising for the five years prior to her death (at least) £100 for the Missionary work of the Church. This year being the centenary year of the Australian Board of Missions, the Guild wishes the £100 its members hope to raise to be given for extensions to the House of The Epiphany (in this parish), in which Miss Adams was so interested, and of which she was such a friend. In place of the customary luncheon to launch this special appeal, the Guild is arranging a *Conversazione* for Wednesday evening, May 3rd, at 8 o'clock, to which all parishioners are invited. An excellent musical programme is being arranged and supper will be provided. The speakers will be announced later. We ask you to note the date and keep it free.

Good Friday.—His Grace the Archbishop (in appealing to the Church people of the Diocese to observe Good Friday as it ought to be observed), writes: "I urge you most earnestly to take your place in the Great Procession of Witness which assembles in the Domain behind the Sydney Hospital, at 4 o'clock, and marches to the Cathedral for a short, concluding service." Parishes will again be grouped according to Rural Deaneries. All Saints' is in Petersham Deanery. We hope our parish may be well represented on Good Friday afternoon.

Women's Guild.—The quarterly Rally was held in the Chapel on Thursday, March 9th. This meeting was well attended and a very helpful address

was given by the guest speaker, Mrs. Hulme-Moir. At the conclusion of the service all present adjourned to the Parish Hall, where Miss Brown's group dispensed afternoon tea. On Thursday, 23rd March, the Annual Meeting was held, the Rector presiding. All retiring officers were re-elected. The Secretary's report showed a year of steady work both for parochial and outside interests. The amount raised this year has not been as much as previous years, but has still enabled us to pay our quota for the Parish Hall fund, and assist in Missionary work. The Rector thanked the members for their continued loyal support to the Church and wished the Guild every success in the ensuing year. Browning have kindly accepted the joint leadership of the Kindergarten, and we feel sure the staff will give them the same co-operation and loyalty given to their late beloved leader. We welcome to our teaching staff Miss Peggy Style, of Gunnedah, who has recently commenced her studies at the House of The Epiphany.—M. REX, Secretary.

Passion Play.—The Order of the Comrades of St. George (the A.B.M. youth organisation) will present the Passion Play, "Via Dolorosa," in our Parish Hall on Maundy Thursday, April 6th, at 8 p.m. The Vice-president of the Comrades writes: "We believe that, through our efforts in this play we can bring home to the people the stark drama of the events leading up to the Crucifixion, and make them realise such events really did happen. . . ." We commend this Passion Play (which takes the place of the service that evening) to our people, and ask them to come, as part of their Holy Week devotions. There is no charge for admission, but there will be an offering during the evening for the work of the Australian Board of Missions.

The Annual Vestry Meeting.—We hope for a representative attendance of parishioners at the Vestry meeting on Wednesday, April 26th, at 8 p.m.

Parish Hall Fund.—The Wardens and Council have decided upon the issue of boxes for the reduction of our Parish Hall debt. Boxes will be available on Easter Day (April 9th) and will be recalled on August 20th, which will be observed as our Consecration Festival.

Thanks.—We are grateful to Mrs. Robert Sharp for additional altar flowers on March 5th, in memory of her beloved sister; and to Mrs. Hills for the Stone of Remembrance flowers on March 26th, in memory of her daughter, Ruth.

The Fellowship.—Since resuming activities, our energetic Secretary, Elvy Olofsson, has been obliged to resign, having taken over additional work in the training of the choir boys. We are sorry to lose Elvy and thank her for the good work she has done in the Fellowship. We welcome Mary Marsh as our new Secretary, and assure her of our co-operation. Successful manuscript journal, Lecturette, and Quiz Evenings have been held during the month. The lecturettes given by Thelma, Maureen, Peter and Norman were most interesting, whilst the Quiz Night revealed that, although we are reasonably well-informed, taking us "by and large," there is no immediate danger of the "Quiz Kids" losing their job! Inter-Fellowship "Circlos" competitions will commence shortly, and will appeal to those Fellowshipippers who are quick of eye and nimble of foot!
