Rector's Notes

My Dear Friends,

Last month I reported that the evening service was to be cancelled for the present. It was a decision I had not liked arriving at. But it was the feeling after discussion of problems affecting the service in the winter. Since then I'm glad that further discussion has taken place with a wider circle of parishioners. We now plan to continue the service, but at an earlier time. For the coldest months of July and August the service will start at 5 p.m. instead of 7 p.m.

It is felt that it would be wise to plan to do this each year for the cold months. So next year we plan to move the evening service to 5 pm. during May, June, July and August. The service will follow a contemporary language pattern with an emphasis on being less formal in atmosphere. It is hoped that this simplicity will provide an opportunity for any who are less familiar with the traditional Anglican forms, to feel 'at home' in worshipping with us. I'm sure that this decision is the wiser one, and I pray that the Lord will bless our efforts to honour Him and extend His Kingdom.

I was invited to represent this congregation on Sunday, 26th June, at an Inaugural Service of Church Union, at the Ashfield Methodist Church. This was to mark the coming together of the Methodists and the majority sections of the Presbyterian and Congregationalists. It is an interesting and exciting development in the course of modern Christian History. The resulting body is to be known as the Uniting Church of Australia. We pray that our brethren will find much spiritual blessing in this very significant step in furthering Christian Fellowship in Union.

On Wednesday, 20th July, the Bush Church Aid Society will hold their Annual Fair in the Chapter House in the city (next to the Cathedral). This Society's mission is to serve Australians situated in "Out-Back" areas with the message of the Christian Gospel. They represent you and me in carrying out our Lord's commission to share the Good News with our fellow men. If you can help in stocking stalls your gifts may be sent in through us here at the Rectory. Of course the other practical way of helping is to patronise the Fair on the day. Make It a Date!

Another date to mark in your calendar is our Annual Consecration Dinner — Friday, the 12th of August — Make a Note Now! Further details will appear in our next issue. The last few years we've enjoyed a very happy evening together, and we look forward to a repeat this year.

THE CHURCH BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

It appears that the local children must think the working men's club needs their assistance in finding work. Since the last issue they have broken two tiles on the Parish Hall roof with stones weighing half a kilogram, knocked out the glass panes from the Boyle Memorial lamp, ripped off five fence palings, burned a mattress and set fires against the Western wall of the church. As a trap for young players they took up the gratings over the drain in the parking area and filled it with bricks and mattress springs, leaving the drain open. As an encore performance they put a stone through one of the kindergarten windows.

All Saints volunteers have remedied the broken tiles and the glass in the "Boyle Memorial" and put six new palings onto the fence and cleaned out the drain.

Work has started on repairs and alterations to the windows in the Parish Hall. The windows on the church side can now be opened and closed easily and safely and more will be done before the August Chronicle is due. When the job is finalised we will see about repairing the kindergarten windows.

A working bee on Saturday, comprising the Rector, wardens and John Nance successfully used the bowls club trolley to move the piano from the kindergarten into the Church and then moved the piano from the Guild room into the kindergarten. The old organ now stands in the back porch. As a finale the excess kindergarten chairs were moved into the office adjoining the Y.C.I. room.

It is hoped that next month we can tell readers what has been done without a recital of vandalism. In the meantime,

A PERSONAL VISIT MAKES PERMANENT LINK

Jane Talbot, a Sydney medical student reports after a visit to Chile for her elective term.

"Meeting the S.A.M.S. family in Chile was a joyous experience I made that meeting toward the end of 1976 when I arrived in Chile to spend three months working and sharing with S.A.M.S. as part of my free term that final year medical students have in the course.

Before I went to Chile I had little real concept of the scope and direction of S.A.M.S. work over there. In fact, my whole image of missionary work was hazy. What I saw certainly changed both my impressions and commitment to missionaries.

At first I was in Santiago, busily learning Spanish (I still cannot but be admiring of the effort missionaries put into learning both a new language and absorbing a new culture. Believe me, it is not as easy as it seems), meeting the S.A.M.S. family of the region, and studying at a University Hospital.

My real commitment began, however, when I travelled 870 km south of Santiago to Hospital Maquehue, a small cottage hospital 24 km outside of Temuco, and run by two S.A.M.S. midwives, supported by a S.A.M.S. doctor. Fortunately, because of my arrival, one of the midwives could go on a much deserved holiday.

What a place! The hospital serves the Araucanian Indians—simple folk but many very aware of the power that God has over and in their lives. On the medical level, I often found the work frustrating, both from language difficulties and because the total medical facilities in the South of Chile are less than adequate. However, our hospital played a vital role in basic health care, educating mothers about hygiene, checking up the children, and being involved in ante natal, post natal care and family planning. The hospital also has 22 TB patients, many of whom have been converted through their illness.

However, I found my commitment to the hospital was not just on the medical level. For the fellowship that everyone in the country community enters into, both missionaries and nationals, is both supportative and challenging. The church that I saw there was to me like an early Christian Church, aware, caring, loving and very alive. My, do you know how to praise God!

Then also their great faith forced me to examine the strength of my own. By now I was feeling uneasy—I realised that I was leaving far more enriched than when I arrived there. There, too, I witnessed the real power of prayer. There I was seeing prayers answered, not also as the person expected, but the very sincerity with which people entered into prayerful relationships with God because of their simple yet total commitment, taught me something great and humbled me completely.

Now I'm back in Australia and where has this experience, so real and precious, put me? Through having been involved with missionaries and shared their lives for a brief interval, I can recognise that hardship and often real deprivation they can live with — uncomplainingly. I can also see the part that we in the Society can take.

S.A.M.S. is growing, the needs are beyond measure, the results—dynamic growth of churches—real. There is the support of missionaries—important by keeping in contact with them, writing to them, sharing with them, supporting them prayerfully and financially, utilising our resources in fellowship. S.A.M.S. can only grow and develop overseas if there is paralleled support and commitment here, and that lies with you and me by encouraging others and actively making the Society Known."

JOKE SECTION


Three little boys were discussing their father's work. Said one, "My Daddy just writes something on paper, sends it away and gets \$5 for it.
