## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

During the past month we have had some very unpleasant weather and there have been a great number of colds about, this has had an effect on our congregations. 22nd June, 1955.

The Bishop of New York, the Rt. Rev. H. W. B. Donegan, is to be in Sydney, on Wednesday, July 6, and the following day.

This is the first time a Bishop of New York has visited Australia. He was unanimously chosen as Bishop of New York for the first time in the history of the Diocese. He was Rector of St. James', New York, for many years and is greatly interested in the problems of cities. In September he becomes the Chairman of the Overseas Department of the American Church, and comes to Australia on his way from Honolulu to the Philippines inspecting the work of the American Church in both Dioceses.

On Thursday evening, July 7, the Bishop will address the meeting in the Assembly Hall, at 7.45 p.m. He will speak on the American viewpoint of the Church and World Affairs. Reserved seats are available at 2/- each at Church House, and a collection will be taken up to meet the expenses. I shall be most grateful if you will do everything in your power to interest your people in this memorable visit.
