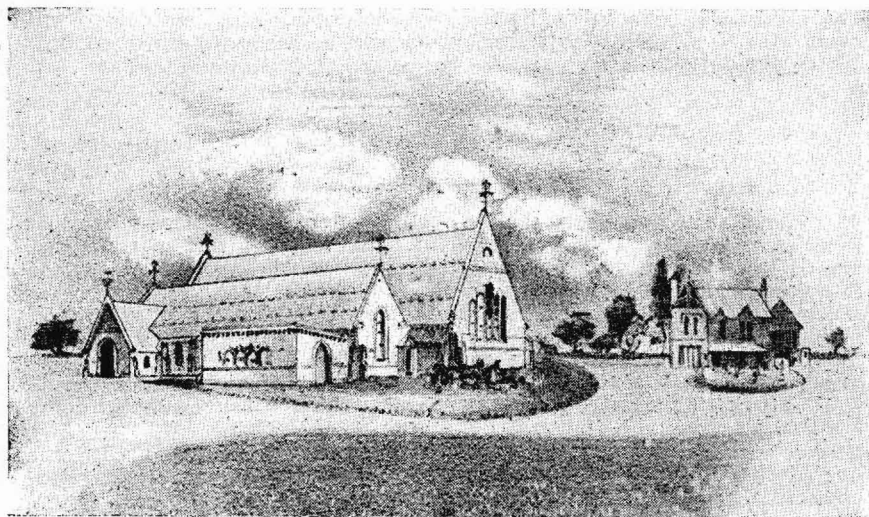

## CHURCH NEWS

**Columbarium Dedications:** On Sunday, 14th July, the Rector conducted a brief Service of Dedication for the ashes of three former parishioners placed in the Columbarium. 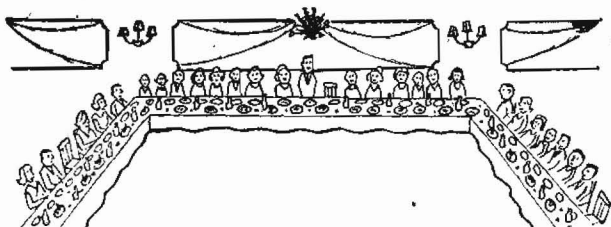

The First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

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Paul's Letters to the Church at Corinth seem to fill a very large part of the New Testament. We cannot say that this is because of the importance or special place of the Corinthian Church in the life of New Testament Christianity as a whole, or its special place in the affections of St. Paul, but rather that the problems and difficulties raised there required all that St. Paul was able to give in the way of guidance and instruction.

Again, as in so many other parts of the Bible, we see in this Corinthian situation a means which God has used to disclose His mind to His people, in every generation. The difficulties of the infant Christian community at Corinth reveal to us aspects of the nature of God and the kind of lives we are called to live in serving Him, that we could learn in no other way.

Paul's first visit to Corinth and his founding of the Church there is described in the eighteenth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. Corinth had a reputation for being one of the most riotous and vicious cities of the ancient world, but in the lives of some Corinthians the Gospel triumphed and a Church was founded there. Later from Ephesus Paul began his correspondence with the Corinthian Christians.

From our two Corinthian letters we learn that there were at least four letters sent from Paul to the Church there, the second and fourth surviving in the New Testament as our 1st and 2nd Corinthians. The occasion for his writing our 1st Corinthians was his hearing of troubles in the Church (Chapter 1 v. 11).

Among the things which the Corinthians wrote to Paul there seems much that is a little irrelevant to us, the eating of food offered to idols, drunkenness at the Lord's supper, confusion about spiritual gifts, do not normally form part of the day to day problems of ourselves or our Churches. However, from Paul's dealing with these things we learn the basic principles on which Christian and church life should be constructed.

We may be surprised at the uncertainty in the minds of the Corinthian Christians about the nature of the resurrection, but the teaching that Paul gave as a reply, remains a foundation for Christian theology on this subject and explains to us what the meaning of Christ's resurrection is in the faith of the ordinary Christian.

Out of the, as yet, immature lives of the Corinthian Christians, their doctrinal uncertainties, their disorder in public worship, we see the mind of God disclosed through His Apostle, making known to us the principles on which many many wider problems should be dealt with. And far from being a mere official document the first Corinthian letter speaks of the power of the Gospel in pagan Corinth and discloses to us the heart of an Apostle deeply concerned for the lives and faith of his converts.
