From your Minister's Desk



My dear friends,

Not so long ago our daughter entered a poster competition through her school. You can imagine our happiness and satisfaction when we heard that she had won a second prize. My wife and I, though not interested in the particular competition as such, were very interested in attending the presentation of awards! That sort of thing is true of most, if not all, parents. In photos of school sports it is obvious that the ones we are shown are of that one special figure striving in the various events! Now if you think that is rather silly, you aren't a parent.

Anything our own children do or achieve has a hundred times more thrill than anything someone else's child has done. Thomas Campbell was a noted poet. His father was a simple man who seldom read a book in his life. His famous son used to send him copies of his published books. One day the old man was found standing with a volume of his son's work in his hands saying, "To think that our Tom made that!" It was Tom's book, and Tom's dad was thrilled.

Has it ever struck you that God is like that — about you? He is our Father. We are His children. All the time He looks down and watches what we do. It's not that He's watching like some ethereal policeman or stern schoolmaster or some snooper out to catch us out, ready to pounce on us. He watches as a parent watches his child. When we do well it makes Him glad — when we do badly it makes Him sad.

Surely the most tremendous responsibility of human life is that we, being such as we are, can bring joy or sorrow to God our Father!

Once as Robert L. Stevenson was leafing through some press clippings about his works a friend asked: "Well, is fame all that it's cracked up to be?" Stevenson's reply was serious and universally true — "YES, when I see my mother's face."

His mother's joy in his successes was dearer to him than all his famous reputation with others!

Long ago St. Augustine said "God loves each one of us as if there was only one of us to love." And that means that each one of us has it in himself or herself to bring pride or grief, joy or sorrow to the heart of God.

Now there, indeed, is something to live for, isn't there! What a colour and direction that will give to everything you ever do! What a difference it makes to the understanding of the guidelines we find written in the scriptures.

FROM RICHARD AND ANNETTE SMALL AT QUEZON
IN THE PHILIPPINES

Richard says "on our arrival the first thing to hit us was the heat. Being a tropical climate, the temperature averages 32°C and the humidity is high, high, high! The second thing was the traffic — seeing is believing!! There are very few (if any) road rules. The Philippines is made up of 7,107 islands, the largest being Luzon where Quezon City, our home, is. The total population is 45 million, Quezon City, Manilla and the surrounding area accounting for 12 million. The countryside is tropical and characterised by rice paddies, palm, coconut and banana trees. Tagalog is one of the most commonly used dialects. There are 37 trainees from Bangladesh, Nepal, Singapore, Hong Kong, Thailand, Malaysia, Philippines and Australia. It is very exciting and vision stretching spending time with these people. They are most about our age, and each concerned about reaching their homelands for the Lord.

We began last week with a retreat and introductory conference in the cool mountain city of Baguia. Some of this time was spent sharing our faith in the market areas and it was very encouraging to see 45 of the 75 people we shared with pray to receive Christ. Our schedule will be lectures and seminars in the morning and campus work in the afternoons on the University of the Philippines. This is one of the six universities we are all working on.


We are both looking to Go to teach, train and develop us in many areas, so that we will be well equipped as the Lord's soldiers on the Australian campus scene.

We are very happy with our accommodation, and the training centre is only 1½ blocks away where most of our meals are provided. We are living with a couple from Singapore and four girls from Nepal and the Philippines.

“RADDA FAMILYNE”

Mrs. Joan Shilton, wife of the Dean of Sydney, wrote recently of her experiences with the “Save the Family” Movement in Sweden.

“You’ve been to Sweden, have you?” said the Finnish girl in London with a smile. She had been a youth-worker in Scandinavia.

“Radda Familyen . . .” said a Swedish man in a lift in Bremen, thinking I was Swedish, and looking very queerly at me.

“Do you know what that means?” asked our Danish guide, with a searching look.

“Radda Familyen . . .” said the hotel attendant in a lift in Aalborg, Denmark, laughing to his friend.

These questions were in response to a little red badge I was wearing on my lapel with the words “Radda Familyen” written on it. This is Swedish for “Save the Family”. The badge was given to me in Stockholm by a Lutheran Pastor who is the leader of the “Save the Family” movement, which aims to do just what its name implies — save the family — because the family is in danger of becoming extinct. The badge was designed to publicise the message of the movement and give opportunities to talk about it. I found it certainly was achieving its object in a variety of places to a variety of people with a variety of responses.

The following, I believe, are some of the reasons why the family is in danger in many parts of the world today:

Firstly, the over-emphasis on the right of a woman to an identity of her own and to a career, if she wants it, seems to be leading to an under-emphasis on the importance of the home and family and the training of children for maturity which, I believe, can best be done by parents in a family situation. In Sweden, the family where a mother does not work is taxed more highly than one where she does work. Women are often made to feel lazy if they do not have a job outside the home.

Secondly, sex education in schools very often teaches the opposite to chastity before marriage and fidelity afterwards. The prevailing attitude to sex is becoming a do-as-you-please attitude which does not encourage family life.

Thirdly, there is a rejection of God, and so of His law that marriage is a life-time commitment. Church attendance is less than 3% in Sweden, which is less than in Russia and much less than in England or Australia.

But there are many encouraging signs. Movements such as “Save the Family” are springing up in many countries. Mary Whitehouse’s petition for common decency, signed by 1,350,000 people, was presented to Parliament while we were in Britain.

In many places we visited in the United States, England and Scandinavia, the Jesus Movement is bringing new life and seems to be a part of a wider movement of youth towards spiritual reality.

The human family is a reflection of the spiritual family of God to which we, as Christians, all belong. It is the way God ordained that we should grow to maturity as Christian people. Let us oppose the forces in Australia which would destroy our family life, and let us be loud in proclaiming the true way of faith in Jesus Christ and the positive message of human love that God planned.
