#### **FROM NATIONAL CONVENOR WKS - Jenny Jarvis**

**The following is taken from the taped interview with Rachel Rolland mentioned in our last edition.** The interview was conducted by Jenny Charlesworth in Rabaul.

Although the interview began tentatively, requiring much prompting from Jenny, Rachel soon warmed to the opportunity of expressing her gratitude for the things she had learned during her time in Rabaul.

It was obvious that she suffered some home sickness, as she spoke in loving terms of her two married sisters and her three younger brothers still at school.

She was on a steep learning curve during the course since she had to learn Melanesian Pidgin in order to communicate with her classmates. Jenny explained that she had jumped that hurdle very well.

Her course covered topics as diverse as writing business letters and understanding office structures, to theology, sermon preparation, leading services, evangelism and mission. On the recreational side there was a good deal of craft work such as basket making, crotchet, patchwork and making children's clothing. Much of the craft work is sold at a special fete each October to raise money for the college.

Of the electives offered during the year Rachel chose a course in the co-ordination of women's ministry, as this was her area of special interest.

She enjoyed her times of sharing with other students in Bible Study and loved the sporting activities, picnics and singing. She explained that in her Presbyterian church at home there were no 'sing-a-longs' and she hoped to introduce this innovation on her return. She also hoped to introduce the use of instruments to accompany singing.

She concluded by saying how much she enjoyed her time in Rabaul and expressed her hope and prayer that other women might be encouraged to take up the challenge of further study as she had.

### FLC NATIONAL CONVENOR - Eileen Holley

The following applications for grants from FLC funds 1998 have been received and submitted by the National Executive to the International Committee of FLC for consideration at their Annual Meeting to be held in Finland early October 1997.

#### 1. Somali Refugee Women's Sewing Group.

This group meets in the Auburn (NSW) Uniting Church each Monday and is sponsored by the NSW Ecumenical Council.

As well as providing an opportunity for the women to learn the skills relating to sewing, they are able to mix with others of their culture. As they meet they establish links with Australian women also and are able to learn to speak English and gain confidence to help them in their communities. Their children who attend with them benefit also.

#### 2. Young Aboriginal Women's Self Esteem Program.

Sponsored by Crossroads: Aboriginal Anglican Ministries NSW.

The purpose of the project is to take young Aboriginal women away from the inner city environment to a place where there is little to do but talk, build up self esteem and present Christ. The many issues which affect these young women - racism/discrimination, poor health, alcohol/drugs, teenage pregnancy, lost identity and domestic violence are addressed and it is hoped these cycles will be broken down and the young women transformed by the power of the Gospel.

#### 3. Life After Prison Association

The Life after Prison Association is an Ecumenical Christian Ministry. Its objectives are to provide support and practical assistance to the families of prison inmates as well as to the inmates themselves. They also aim to provide support and assistance to the victims of crime and their families and to assist in reconciliation between victims and the perpetrators of the crime. The Association is also involved in working with youth and young people at risk of being involved in criminal activities.

Many interesting reports of FLC activities, especially the 40th Anniversary celebrations in various countries has been published in the ACWC Newsletter. Space does not permit a reprint here but for your interest we have a summary of the 1997 Grants on the next page.

At the May Unit meeting the History Sub-committee formally presented this book to the Unit President, Mrs Anne Murray. ## WESTERN AUSTRALIA Unit:

Lorna Hudson from Derby, Western Australia, a recipient of a grant from FLC visited our May meeting to show the artefacts that have already been made with the monies provided to raise funds for the Aborigines in Derby. These will be sold in the markets at Derby and Broome. Lorna is an ATSIC Regional Councillor this year and is a Community health worker; she is very aware of the health problems especially of the children and was happy to report that since 1984 problems of ear, nose and throat have improved. She was in Perth to attend the Heart Foundation Conference.

Thirty-eight women, representing seven denominations attended a 'Day of Reflection' in March at the Redemptionist Monastery in North Perth. All participants felt the day was very worthwhile, a day of togetherness and spirituality, of thanksgiving and assurance and rejoicing in God in whom we trust.
