## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

28th February, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints',

This letter comes to you at the beginning of Lent. We need, indeed, the whole world needs, the message of St. John the Baptist: "Repent ye, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand," because we are in a most appalling muddle through leaving God out of things, or thinking that we can use Him for our own ends. Evil is rampant although often dressed up to make it look as if it were good; and God is calling us to repent, to change our outlook, so that we can see what He wants. There is no need for me to define what I mean by saying that evil is rampant in the world. You have only to think of the selfishness of nations, classes and individuals, of the power of money and vested interests, of the entirely materialistic outlook of nations and individuals, to realise that evil stalks about the world as it is to-day. For evil is that which leaves God out of account and puts self first. We who are privileged to live in such wonderful times, we who have seen vast realms of new knowledge made available for man, we who have seen so immense an enrichment of the material side of life, we who in the light of all this new knowledge ought to be able to see the glory and grandeur of God as no generation has ever yet seen them, are failing to see God in it at all, which largely accounts for the unhappy state of our world. Lent, then, calls us to look into our own lives, to see whether we are fighting all that leaves God out, or whether we are just following the crowd and taking the line of least resistance. Men hawk round new systems, they invent so called remedies for society; but no system, financial, social or international, however good in itself, which is run on selfish lines, is going to bring peace and contentment to the world because it is contrary to God's law of love.

The many illustrations we have of the power and deep penetrating influence of human love are but poor reflections of the illimitable power of God's love, and if love is the strongest and most beautiful thing in man, it is also the strongest and most beautiful thing in God. It is through that love that God is saving the world. Not through fear of punishment or retribution, not through the awesomeness of justice, but through love, the love that was revealed in Jesus Christ, that took Him even to the Cross. It is that love which sustained the martyrs in the arena, which has sent missionaries into distant lands, and which has inspired the servants of God in all ages. It is that alone which can save mankind now. In this Season of Lent let us reflect once more upon that love of God, which was so strong that it could agonise and even die for the world's redemption.

Boxes and envelopes are available, and I ask again your co-operation in the matter of Lenten gifts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two great Missionary Societies—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Quite recently, we were reminded by the retiring Chairman of the A.B.M. that, owing to increasing costs and the opportunities for development, which are challenging them on all sides, every Mission under the Board has been compelled to ask for a larger grant this year. The whole Church of Australia is asked, therefore, to increase its giving to Missions by 18 per cent.; I hope we shall do our part towards meeting this necessary increase.



how much to be thankful for we in Australia have; it should spur us on to do all we can for our friends in Britain, who still need all the food parcels we can send.

We appreciate the efficient work of our Choir through the day; the artistic decoration of the Church, for which Mrs. Morris and her helpers were responsible, and last, but not least, the practical assistance of Mr. A. J. Harris in transporting our gifts to the Home of Peace, where they are so thankfully received.

We were pleased to have with us recently Bishop G. F. Cranswick (Bishop of Tasmania); unfortunately it rained almost without ceasing all day, and some were prevented from hearing him speak in his interesting way about Lambeth and the Amsterdam Conference.
