Sharing the Loaf



The Conference was held in the Salvation Army Conference Centre at Geelong, a well appointed venue which proved ideal for our purposes. Situated at the edge of the Botanical Gardens and across the road from a golf course it was a bushland setting, and the landscaping of the site featured Australian native plants. We were within walking distance of Eastern Beach on Corio Bay, but apart from the day we arrived few would have explored this area.

The Conference was the culmination of ACW Victorian Unit's term of office and they had chosen the theme, 'Sharing the Loaf'. New South Wales was well represented with eighteen members in attendance.


Early morning offered the opportunity to walk, swim, use gym equipment, or to join in group activity comprising gentle exercise, basic tai chi and circle dancing. Sessions followed a fairly traditional pattern but we enjoyed the features it contained. Morning and evening devotions organised by State and Territory Units fitted well into the theme and program, despite the fact that as far as I am aware there is no checking between Units as to what approach they will take.

Bible studies were presented by Dr Merryl Blair, Lecturer in Old Testament at the Churches of Christ Theological College in Melbourne. Her enthusiasm and vitality combined with sound scholarship to take us down familiar paths, but we were asked to see things we had perhaps never considered before.



Over three days we focused on 'Sharing the Loaf of Desperation' based on Elijah and the Widow of Zarephath; 'Sharing the Loaf of God's Overflowing Generosity' on the Miraculous Feeding and the Bread of Life; and 'Sharing the Loaf of the Journey' on the Walk with a Stranger to Emmaus. There was plenty to talk about as we met in groups following Merryl's input.

Two speakers came to share with us their particular projects connected with prayer. Janet Nelson has produced a book titled *Let Us Pray*, the outcome of writing intercessory prayers around the three-year cycle of readings as set down for Sunday liturgy in the *Revised Common Lectionary*. In addition, she has prepared prayers for special occasions and major festivals of the Church.





The second speaker was Betty Carpenter who not only spoke but showed some samples of The Prayer Quilt Ministry. Quilts are made and given to recipients who have been consulted as to whether they would like to receive them. The emphasis is centred on prayer. The layers of the quilts are secured by knots, and each knot is tied with a prayer for the person who is to receive the quilt. A Winifred Kiek Fellowship enabled Shu-Wen Chiang, the Executive Secretary

of Asian Church Women's Conference to be a guest at Conference. National Executive had asked for a quilt to be made, and this was presented to Shu-Wen when Conference members had tied knots with prayers as requested by her.

The Ecumenical Service was a memorable occasion. The Welcome to Land by Vince Ross reminded us of our heritage as Australians, and President Elaine Johnson welcomed us as members of Australian Church Women. We were able to join in the theme chorus written for Conference by Lynette Green, as well as sharing in the chosen hymns and hearing a vocal solo by Debbie Howard. Dr Jill Tabart gave a challenging address, and others contributed as they led prayers, provided music and read the scriptures.

And there were the business sessions. Some of these dealt with remembering those who have died since last National Conference - and NSW had quite a long list – Olga Badger, Rosalyn Bemrose, Olive Beverley, Heather Stevens, Jean Todd and Marjory Verco. A single stem was placed in a vase in memory of each person.



Following the death of Marjory Verco, NSW proposed Edith Ridge as a second National Life Member. The ACT Unit was very happy to endorse our recommendation, and Edith was duly welcomed in this capacity. She joined Olive Ackland, Shirley Brooks, Ailsa Skippen, Juanita Miller, Janet Watts, Shirley Wells, Eunice Reidy, and Dorothy Wright, the other National Life Members attending Conference.




Other business included the report of the Winifred Kiek Trust and the inclusion of twelve more entries for *Honouring Australian Church Women*. From NSW there were Nancy McLaren, Joan Tong and Shirley Wells in recognition of their contribution to ACW as National President 2003-2005, Asian Church Women's Conference and Fellowship of the Least Coin respectively, as well as their commitment to Australian Church Women generally. Photos had been found for two of the earlier entries, leaving only one entry in the book still requiring a photo.



Shu-Wen Chiang delivered a detailed address covering the history of Asian Church Women's Conference and changes that have taken place over the 50 years of its existence. Current concerns include sensitivity to the political situations in some member countries, awareness of gender issues and violence against women, and HIV/AIDS. One of the most disturbing sections of her report related to the destructive denominationalism in Asia, a legacy of Western mission activity which sadly is an ongoing problem. On the brighter side Shu-Wen told of the Post-Tsunami Project in India and Sri Lanka and of the success of students who were supported by funds through ACWC. Through the Christian Conference of Asia a Taiwanese woman, Rev Dominica, has worked in Cambodia in a program called 'Women's Ecumenical Accompaniment for Vision and Empowerment'. She is now to go to East Timor for two years, again with support from CCA, with the rider that if evaluation at the end of this time is positive, ACWC will take care of the program from 2009.



Kaye Viney from Alice Springs was accompanied by two Aboriginal women from Hermannsburg, Clara Inkamala and Noreen Hudson. Despite voice problems they were still able to sing for us in Aranda and Pitjantjatjara, and we tried our best to read and sing some short songs with them. Clara is a potter at Hermannsburg and some of her art works are illustrated here. It was somewhat ironical that as some ACW members resisted strongly when they were encouraged to make use of computers and internet, Clara in a dismissive way referred people to her website to find out more about her and her art and craft.



This extract from Clara's website is instructional.

"Aranda people like to learn and work in new things. My grandmother learnt to crochet for the church, my uncles learnt watercolour painting, my grandmother Clara was Albert Namatjira's half sister (they had the same mother). And now, in this generation, we are first in pottery and we are traveling the world."

Most reports to Conference were as in the Working Papers, with the opportunity for presenters to comment briefly if they wished. They make interesting reading, but I make no attempt here to tell of their content.

The launch of the much awaited Australian Church Women website was a triumph for those who have worked for years to bring it into being, and credit must go to Brenda Dickinson for her determination to make it happen. We congratulate her!

The work of the Victorian National Executive on ACW finances resulted in a number of resolutions, and it is to be hoped that there is greater clarity for future treasurers. We were interested to learn that the Auditor advised the reversal of the Victorian National Executive with regards to GST. The NSW Unit had proposed a change in the name of Social Justice Issues Convener to Social Issues Convener in an effort to encourage Units to tackle tasks within their capability, issues that would meet needs and not be divisive. It must be said that the response from the floor was rather fierce and the motion was lost.

There was an excursion which took us to an Aboriginal gallery and souvenir shop and then to Queenscliff on Wednesday afternoon. The weather was not kind, but it was interesting to see something of the countryside beyond Geelong, and to indulge in a cup of coffee in the brief time we had at Queenscliff.



The Conference Dinner was a 'dress up' affair, a meal where we enjoyed being waited on. Food was a notch up from the everyday, rather more like a function. The celebration marked the 21st National Conference - with a 'fake cake' that needed no cutting. We were also entertained by a young woman who sang for us.

"Granny Davis"

Some companies might claim to be the 'best thing since sliced bread' but Associated British Foods (ABF) is sliced bread. ABF introduced sliced bread in the United Kingdom during 1930's.

The first sliced bread is said to have been produced into Australia in 1939 when Henry Gough hand-sliced bread for his customers in Sydney.

"Queen" of sliced bread, actress Myrtle Woods died at the age of 101 in Melbourne in May 2001. (Myrtle has been recognised as the world's oldest performer by the Guinness Book of Records.)

Better known to a generation as "Granny Davis," the actress played the part of the sliced bread marketeer for 17 years from 1963.

It was her role at 63, as "Granny Davis" that won hearts of all ages.

"Into her 90's she was still taking aerobics classes, as though she was young. At her 101st birthday she was high kicking while dancing," said Bert Newton at her funeral.

Her photograph appeared on millions of bread wrappers and her live commercials on Channel 9's 'In Melbourne Tonight' closed with the slogan, spoken with Granny integrity "Granny's bake makes grannies great!"

By slicing bread, the loaf seems to go further and more are fed.

Baker's Dozen





Voice 2. Look at this one. Isn't it just a beautiful thing? It's so elegant and would just fit in that little niche you have on your wall.

Voice 3. What do you think of this? It's such a solid shape, very functional and easy to care for. It would be perfect as a fruit bowl. All it would need is a polish every now and again.

Voice 4. This may be a bit fragile but you can see its contents quite clearly. It would be worth the price just to have it to look at it and just use it on special occasions.

Voice 1 Look, I've found it! This is just right. I know it's been broken and mended but I want something to hold the communion bread at the Ladies Retreat. I don't want something that is beautiful or for fruit or expensive.

This plate is a reminder that God gave His Son for us; whose body was broken for us.

As we remember Jesus in the Breaking of Bread, we are reminded that ordinary though we may be, like this plate, we have a special trust placed on us to bring this message of forgiveness and love to others.

The early disciples did this, as is recorded in Acts 2:42-47. Each of our churches varies in the manner it worships God; in its hierarchy and in its emphasis.

But we have a common link in the call to pass on to future generations the Good News we have received; the grace of God; His love, and the wonder of the forgiveness that is ours.
