ASIAN CHURCH WOMENS CONFERENCE

ANNUAL SERVICE 2000
(NSW UNIT AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN)

Sunday November 5 saw the culmination of the planning and preparation for this year's annual service in which we celebrate the partnership of AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN with the ASIAN CHURCH WOMENS CONFERENCE. This year the venue was the Salvation Army Sydney Korean Corps in Belmore.

Some 125 people gathered for A Pleasant Sunday Afternoon. Participating in the program were members of council and representatives from the participating churches. Items were

presented by the Salvation Army Sydney Korean Corps – two items, one by their Home League Timbrels who presented a wonderful display with choreography, also Lisa and Andrew Kim who played praise choruses on the Flute and Clarinet; also the Salvation Army Bankstown Band who not only accompanied the singing but also presented two items. Two wonderful choirs were present, the Women's Christian Temperance Union Korean Singing Group, who sang 4 very beautiful Korean songs and the All Nations Choir from the Belmore Church of Christ who sang two full choir numbers and their leader Deborah Tin sang a solo. Well known hymns of the Christian church were sung by the congregation in English, Chinese and Korean: "TO GOD BE THE GLORY", "WHAT A FRIEND WE HAVE IN JESUS", and "HOW GREAT THOU ART".

Mrs Jan Harrison, President of the NSW Council chaired the programme, introduced by Major Joan Tong the ACWC Convenor.

A happy time of fellowship concluded the afternoon – the proverbial cup of tea.

REPORT OF ACWC VISIT TO BANGLADESH

GENERAL

There is a population of 13.4 million people in Bangladesh in an area of 54,000 square miles. Upon arrival in Dhaka near midnight on 5/10/00, I was unprepared for the mass of humanity at the airport and in the streets. I quickly found the ACWC sign and met up with Andrew (NCCA-B) who was to be our guide/protector for the duration. As the driver was putting the luggage into the car, a poor boy with one leg appealed to me for money – had I followed my heart I would have been swamped by the needy milling around us. About the traffic on the way to the YWCA – the bicycles and motorized rickshaws are obliged to give way to

the cars etc. The drivers keep their hand on the horns until the rickshaw drivers move out of their way. All this happens at breakneck speed!

The accommodation at the "Y" was basic, clean and comfortable, and we greatly needed the mosquito nets on our beds. The food was similar to Indian, and tasty. I imagine it was a feast compared to what our neighbours may have been eating. The cook did everything to please us. Bananas were plentiful, and we found out the apples were imported.

EXPOSURE

We visited the Baptist Sangha School for Blind Girls, and enjoyed the company of their principal, Manju Samaddar during our meeting and Consultation. The girls sang, "We shall overcome" at our closing liturgy; needless to say it was very moving.

The Director of the Christian Council of Development, Bangladesh, thanked us for our visit and said our presence was so important. He said, "go, listen and cry." Mr. Isaac Baroi of the CCDB took us to an air-conditioned sari shop where some of us purchased beautiful saris whilst sipping tea in comfort. Isaac then took us to the factory (an open ended shed) where children wove the fabric for the saris. There was a little girl of about eight near us, and we were told she worked from dawn to dusk for \$5.00 per MONTH. We felt like taking the saris back. No childhood, education or development for this child.

We were pleased to welcome the President of the National Council of Churches - Bangladesh (NCC-B), Mr. Susanta Adhikari, and Secretary, Mr. Subodh Adhikari to our Consultation and liturgies. Speakers included Rev. Martin Adhikari of World Vision; Ms. Towhida Khondaker who spoke on the social and legal aspects of Violence; and Mr. James Das, a teacher, who answered the question, "Why is the Church silent."

He spoke of the lack of Christian people with higher education. Some people go to America to study and do not return to Bangladesh. "We have buildings, churches, hospitals, but no trained Christian people, only Muslims. We need educators and trainers to help our people to be leaders and move out of our poverty," he said.

Other presenters included our own Nancy Lin, Iluminada Domingo, Rebecca Choi Yin, Somsri Chaayasate and Barbara Lacy. A copy of the Consultation Statement is printed for your interest after this report.

I must comment on the difference our visit made to the Christian women of Bangladesh. At first they were quiet, timid and withdrawn. At the closing liturgy, James Das said to me, "Look at our women." They were smiling, singing and dancing with us. What a privilege to share our Faith and support our sisters in Asia.

ACWC 'VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN' CONSULTATION BANGLADESH, OCTOBER, 2000

At the start of the new millennium, we, Christian women and men of the 17 member countries meeting at Dhaka, Bangladesh, from 12-14 October, 2000, for the Consultation on 'Violence Against Women' organized by Asian Church Women's Conference (A.C.W.C.), strongly express our concern at the continuing violence especially against women and children. We denounce all forms of violence against people.

Our churches, as communities of faith, carry pastoral responsibilities for the abused and the abusers. All people have

the fundamental right to safety. All people have the right to be valued for themselves and their gifts.

Based on the Christian teaching, the Church should provide pre-marital counselling; continuing family counselling, and provide education in family values and parenting skills. The Church should provide professional assistance to both victims and perpetrators of violence with compassion and sensitivity.
