CONFIRMATION SERVICE

A good congregation was present on Tuesday evening, 24th October, when the Sacred Rite of Confirmation was administered to 32 Confirmees by the Right Rev. Marcus Loane, M.A., D.D., Th.D., Coadjutor Bishop of Sydney. This was the first Confirmation Service conducted at All Saints' by Bishop Loane.

The Bishop gave as his special text for the Candidates, Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me," and he explained how, having found strength in Christ, St. Paul was able to pass on the benefit of his experience, not only to the people of Philippi, but also to the people of the twentieth Century. The Bishop, in concluding his address, charged the Confirmees to ever remember the principle embodied in this verse and to "continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants unto their lives' end."

Special Message from the Church Treasurer

Once again, we are working for a Fete that, we hope, will gross over £1000. Why is this money needed. We asked the Hon. Treasurer of All Saints' Church, Mr. W. Sopwith to give us the answer:

"The first person I talked to at the last Synod was the Rector of Longueville, the Rev. Alan Pattison, one time Curate of All Saints' and his first remark was, 'I believe you have been doing some repair jobs at Petersham.'

That brings me to the question of what we intend to do with the proceeds of this year's Fete. Buildings, like human beings, have only a certain (or uncertain) expectancy of life. Sooner or later, it becomes obvious that buildings need attention. We have reached that stage at All Saints'; already much has been done. Our Parish Hall, now debt free thanks largely to recent Fetes, has had some attention, and now looks a cared-for building. We have been able to carry out much needed work on the Rectory so that the Rector and his family have a pleasant place to live in, which they thoroughly deserve. We have done much to the Church and surroundings, but much still remains to be done.

The roof work is proceeding, and the cost will have to be met from this year's Fete; some day the interior paint work will need attention—estimated cost is at least £1,500. The proceeds from the Fete will help towards such work.

I hope the Fete will be a financial success. Money, however, isn't everything. Our Fetes are such friendly affairs. I often feel the comradeship, the friendliness, and the happy spirit that prevail at All Saints' Fetes are every bit as important as the financial return. May this year's event be as successful financially and socially as previous Fetes."

Here Now are Some Final Reminders of Help that You Can Give to Some of Our Stalls

An All Saints' Fete wouldn't be complete without ample refreshment. This year we'll have the Refreshment Room, conducted by the Guild, the Hot Dog Stand, Soft Drinks, and a new Fairy Floss Stand. The children will be able to ride on a train, merry-go-round, chair-a-plane and ponies, while we will have Clowns and a Band to play during the day. All this and, for free, Professor Wallace's 'Punch and Judy' Show.

All in all, Saturday, 18th November can be a marvellous day.

SYNOD REPORT

The Second Session of the Thirty-second Synod of our Diocese has just concluded; All Saints' as usual was represented. It was an arduous Session with three highlights.

In the first place, the much vexed question of State Aid to Church Schools was discussed. It was decided that such aid is wrong.

Much time was devoted to Sydney Church Ordinances, which could be described as a list of rules and regulations covering the manner in which churches should control and manage their affairs. A very complete discussion took place in an endeavour to bring up-to-date previous Ordinances and Amendments. One interesting fact should be noted. Young people from 18 years to 21 years of age now have the right to attend and enter into discussions at Vestry Meetings.

Finally, much time was devoted to ways and means of establishing a Superannuation Fund, so that Clerics in the future will be able to anticipate retirement at say, sixty-five, with superannuation.

The atmosphere at Synod was most pleasant. His Grace the Archbishop gave full rein to his sense of humour. It seems obvious that Sessions of Synod, no doubt terrifying ordeals to a new President, will, in future, be highlighted by many flashes of humour. The President was ably assisted by the Chairman of Committees, His Honour, Mr. Justice Richardson, who has taken over the duties carried out so ably in past years by the late Bishop Hilliard.

"OVER THE FENCE"

(Confirmation Continued)

Mrs. Critic moved uneasily in her chair as Mrs. Loyal made it appear that Confirmation was an important event in the life of every true Anglican.

Then she said to her neighbour, Mrs. Loyal, "Lots of folk are confirmed, and don't seem to get much good out of it."

"If all those who are confirmed remained true, we would have a wonderful Church," replied Mrs. Loyal, "but it is sad that so many in this world seem so shallow and unreliable. Of course, a lot depends on the home life. In the vast majority of homes, there is very little religion. The Bible is never read, prayer is unknown, and even at the meal table, they swallow their food like ducks, and never say a word of thanks to God."

"You know, Mrs. Critic," said Mrs. Loyal, "the majority of young people find it difficult to see that religion is practical, because it is not practised in their own homes. Too many people fail to realise that religion is to daily life what oil is to a machine. Nerves get frayed, and tempers run hot when problems arise and there is no good influence to keep things properly balanced. It is amazing how many seek an escape from life by indulging to excess in things like alcohol, to drown their sorrows, and to try and forget their worries. In most cases, they don't drown them—they only irrigate them and cause them to increase!"

Mrs. Loyal continued, "most people have their problems but where a man and wife can kneel in prayer and leave their troubles with God, no pots and pans are thrown about the house, and no hasty words are uttered that will later bring them to the Divorce Court."

"True Christian parents not only have their children baptised, they bring them up in the knowledge and love of God. They teach them that Christianity works in their homes, and then they kneel as a family at the Communion Rail, to receive their Holy Communion together."

"How true it is, Mrs. Critic," she went on, "The family that worships together stays together. Do you know the text, 'The secret of the Lord is with them that fear Him'? The trouble is that so often, people think of religion as a spasmodic turning to the Church in trouble, and then when things are bright again, they forget all about God and His Church."

"They remind me of a funny picture I saw a few years ago. Two men were running in a field from a wild bull, which was gradually gaining on them. The one said to the other, 'Can't you say a prayer?' but the other replied, 'All I can think of is my Grace, For what we are about to receive, may the Lord make us truly thankful!'"

"Properly brought up in the knowledge of God, we know how to act and what to say at the appropriate time."

Mrs. Critic smiled and said, "I suppose you are right, Mrs. Loyal
