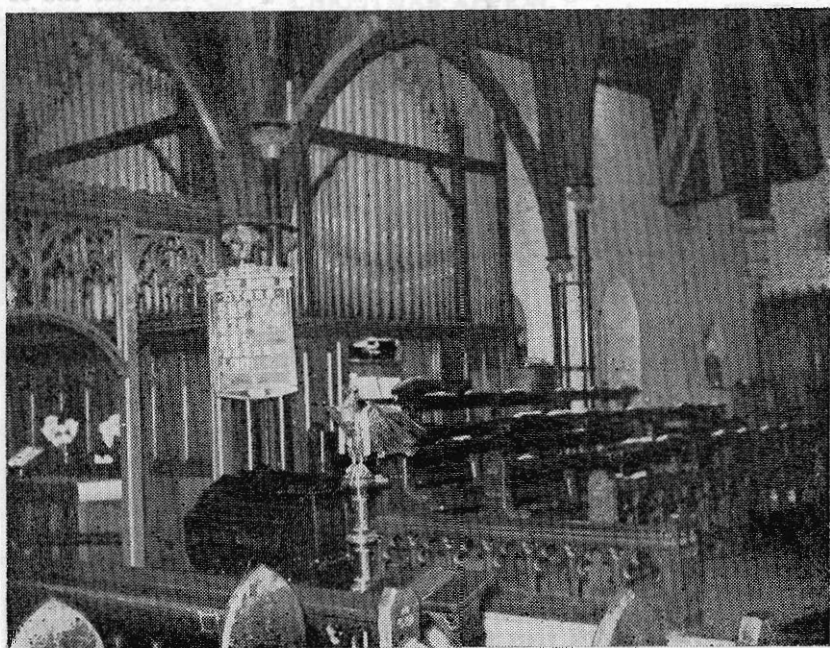

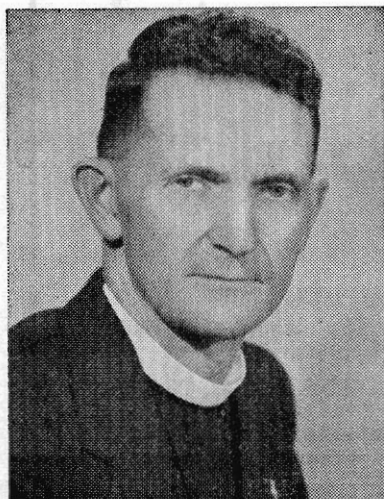

BISHOP KERLE

CONFIRMATION SERVICE

This is a last minute reminder that our Annual Confirmation Service will be held on Tuesday, 5th November at 8 p.m. The Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered this year by the Right Reverend R. C. Kerle, B.A., Bishop Coadjutor of Sydney.

This is a Service which should be supported by all parishioners, who by their presence, may show their personal interest in and encouragement of the young folk seeking to be confirmed.

We stress that this Service is on a Tuesday and **not** a Sunday night.

MEMORIAL TO MR. J. M. BOYLE

The memorial being erected to Mr. J. M. Boyle at the west end of the Church grounds is now almost complete, the lamp having been installed in mid-October. We are now awaiting suitable bricks for laying at the base of the pillar.

The Rector and Wardens would be pleased to receive donations from parishioners and parish organisations towards the cost of providing this memorial to Mr. Boyle.

DIOCESAN SYNOD REPORT

During October, the first Ordinary Session of the 33rd Synod was held. Synodsmen are elected for three year periods, and being the first session of such a period, there were thus a lot of "new boys" on this occasion. They were determined to show how good they were, and the result was a lot of repetition in their speeches.

In his presidential address, the Archbishop suggested that churchmen, especially the younger ones, might well do better for the Church by spending less time on the work of clubs and societies within the Church, and by taking a greater part in, for example, politics, where they could introduce a much-needed Christian influence.

The Archbishop stressed that Bishop Kerle's report on youth, which had been laughed off three years back, had now been born out by actual happenings, especially at Bathurst.

Important decisions taken by Synod were to increase the General Assessment, the Special Assessment (covering Marriage Guidance, Adult Education, and the Board of Diocesan Missions), and to increase clergy stipends, which was a move in the right direction.

PATRONAL FESTIVAL

Our 1963 Patronal Festival will be celebrated on Sunday, 3rd November, being the Sunday following All Saints' Day. Special Services have been arranged to commemorate this Festival of All Saints', and guest preachers for the occasion will be the Rev. John McDonald, Th.L., Rector of St. Augustine's, Stanmore, at 11 a.m., and the Rev. John Green, of St. Luke's, Ennmore at 7.15 p.m. It is of particular interest that each of these clergymen served our Rector as lay-readers in his previous parish at St. Mary's, and therefore we look forward with added interest to the messages that they will bring to us.

ANNUAL YOUTH SERVICE

The Annual Youth Service on Sunday, 20th October was again well attended.

The Petersham Scouts and Cubs marched behind their band to the Church, and their standard bearers followed the Choir into the Church, where the Rector placed the flags in the Sanctuary. Sunday School members, Girl Guides, and members of the O.E.S. Lodge were also in attendance.

The Guest Preacher, Mr. David Hunter, M.L.A. gave a very interesting talk that was very well received by both the young and old at the Service, and we are grateful for his assistance in this way.

Many thanks to Mr. Alan Jones for his very much appreciated help, also to Messrs Jack Gorman and Ben Pullen for their assistance at the door.

CHRISTMAS APPEAL

STOP PRESS FETE NEWS

Once again, we are making an all-out effort to secure record Fete takings. The Committee's target is £1,500. Why is this money needed? The Treasurer of All Saints', Mr. Bill Sopwith, gives us the answers:

Special Message from the Church Treasurer

As Honorary Treasurer of the Parish, I am writing you these few lines to explain the Church's present financial position. We are over-spent at the moment, but I'm not really worried by this, as I am confident that everyone will rally around at the Fete and lift us out of the "red".

We have been faced with the cost of extra repairs to the church grounds and buildings during the year, while the long due overhaul of the organ will cost some hundreds of pounds. Already, a number of its notes are out of use.

The recent heavy rains have clearly shown everyone that the drainage at the front of the Church must be improved, in order to remove the bog that comes there after each shower. Also, the banks of earth at the west end of the Church need to be restored.

As a result of our higher income last year, largely due to the higher Fete proceeds, we also have to pay higher assessments to the Diocese this year.

If you give the Fete your support, I'm sure that I'll be able to sleep at night when the big day is over."

News From Stalls

Here now are some final reminders of help that you can give some of our stalls:

● **Refreshments:** The ladies have to cater for all meals throughout the day from morning tea onwards, and would appreciate donations of cakes, scones, butter, tea, sugar, or sandwich fillings. It would be especially helpful if you could leave your donations at the Parish Hall kitchen on the day of the Fete.

● **Books, Toys, Art Jewellery:** These are three of the main lines on Mrs. Millarey's Stall. Other items include Stamps, Games, Comics, China and Cosmetics. If you've not yet had a look over your book-shelves, or through your cupboards, do so in the next day or so before it's too late, and if you've got something along these lines, please ring Mrs. Millarey at LM 1643, and she will gladly collect them from you.

● **Pottery:** Once again Mrs. Champion and Mrs. Ingoldsby-Brown will be conducting this stall, with special stocks of pottery from Fowlers, as well as other items. Any donations towards stocks would be greatly appreciated.

● **Plants and Flowers:** As well as potted plants, Mrs. Sopwith hopes to do good business this year with cut flowers. The latter have a ready sale, and gifts of such flowers would be greatly appreciated.

● **Groceries and Jams:** The Sunday School pupils have been very busy bringing gifts of groceries for this stall, but donations of home-made jams would also be greatly appreciated, as these always sell very well at our Fetes.

● **Vegetables:** Stocks will be bought direct from Chinese market gardens on the morning of the Fete. Actual vegetables for sale will depend on what is available that week, but in the past we have always secured lovely fresh **carrots**, lettuce, beetroot, spinach, rhubarb and shallots.

● **White Elephant:** This stall sells what other people do not want! Tethered this year in a special marquee at the front of the hall, we hope that all parishioners will assist in supplying the "Elephant's" insatiable

appetite for stocks of unwanted items. If you have anything at all at home for which you've no more use, please let the Rector or a Y.C.I. member know, and they will gladly collect it from you. Popular items last year were mowers, old crockery, tools, hats, and ladies handbags.

Added Attractions

Ample refreshments have been organised to keep you going throughout the day and night. The Guild will conduct the Refreshment Room at the rear of the Hall, the Y.C.I. will be serving tasty Hot Dogs, and the Fellowship will provide Soft Drinks and Ice Cream. You will be able to play hoop-la and the new game "Knock-em", and ride on the ponies and merry-go-round, and there will be a band playing in the morning. All this, and for free, the famous James Bell "Punch and Judy" shows at 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m.

WILL THIS BE YOU?

I recently saw a Church notice board which contained the following message:

"SO LIVE THAT THE CLERGYMAN CAN TELL THE TRUTH ABOUT YOU AT YOUR FUNERAL".

Of at least 50% of Australians who die, the following would be a most appropriate funeral sermon:

"My brethren, we gather together to-day on a very sad occasion, to lay to rest all that the late John Brown has bequeathed to God and his Church. He was a baptised and confirmed member of the Church, but neither meant very much to him throughout his life. He was a much better and more loyal member of his lodge and bowling club. He realised that he had a contribution to make to both his lodge and club if they were to survive, but he was very indifferent as to whether the Church continued to exist.

John Brown had no concern whether the next generation would have the benefit of the Church to guide and prepare them for the godless and materialistic conditions which they would have to face. Our brother often deplored the weakness of the Church that he helped to weaken by his spiritual apathy, but he never thought of himself as part of the Church, or as one who should make the maximum effort to assist in every possible way. He often blamed the Clergyman and Parish Council for not being progressive, little realising that if he had pulled his weight, they could have done a better job!

John Brown kept his body healthy and reserved Sunday for physical exercise, but seldom worried about the condition of his soul. Now, at last, his body is worn out, but his soul has been dead for many years! His conscience has not been active for the greater part of his time on earth, and he has drifted spiritually like a leaf on a river, for a very long time.

There are some, like the hotel-keeper, who will miss him now that he has gone. He was fairly temperate in his drinking habits, but it was about the only spiritual food he ever took! The grocer will also miss his cheery smile and pound or two. His friends at the bowling club and lodge will probably say from time to time, "Do you remember John Brown, he didn't do much for the Club, but he never did anyone any harm."

He let his children please themselves, and they have naturally grown up without much religion. Both he and his wife saw that they were baptised—children generally do better physically after Baptism. Oh yes, they were all married in the Church, the brides wore beautiful dresses, and everyone said the parson did a real good job! But they have not been near the Church since, and their neighbours are not sure what religion they follow. They might be Moslems or Hindus.

One of the sons did a "stretch" of three months for stealing—after all he had never learned the Ten Commandments. When he should have been at Sunday School, Dad took him in the car to the beach for a breath of fresh air. Still, it was Government property he took and that belongs to the people. It was hard luck that he got caught.

John Brown saved quite a tidy bit of money during his lifetime. He would have liked to have taken it with him, but did not get the chance, so left it to his family, but you can safely say the Government will get most of it before long. How true is the saying, "We brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out." His son con-

tributes quite a bit to the finances of the Government by liberally patronising poker machines. He loves a bit of fun, and when he has broke, he visits one of the local clergy to ask for food to feed his poor hungry children. As he says, "the Church must practise what it preaches" but he never thinks, as a baptised member of the Church that he should make any contribution to it.

Well, I must not weary you about the sad lot of John Brown. He is dead—in fact, he has been spiritually dead for many years, but now we seek to pay our last respects to his memory. For many years, he paid weekly to a funeral fund to ensure a decent funeral at the last. I regret he made no similar provision for his spiritual welfare by joining the Church's Weekly Freewill Offering Fund. He hoped the Church would still be going by the time he needed it, but he left it to others to maintain the spiritual ministry so that he could have what he styled "a decent farewell". He had insured his life, his house, his furniture, and his car, but had taken no steps to safeguard his soul's salvation by becoming an active, practising member of the Church.

He never thought about the condition of his soul; he consoled himself with the fact that he was as good as his neighbour who went to Church every Sunday, but the Day of Judgement will decide that.

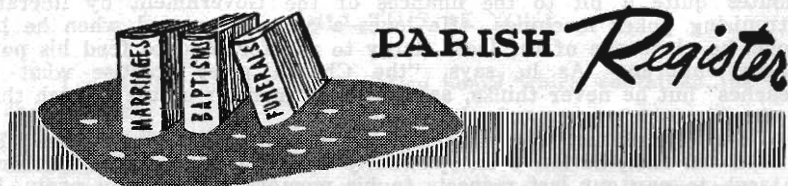
We offer the widow our deepest sympathy; may we conclude by singing our brother's favourite hymn written by Canon F. Quintrell, "Lord her Watch Thy Church is keeping".

"Lord her Watch Thy Church is keeping,
Round the radio today,
Gone for us all care and weeping

Let the few do all the toil.
We share not the Lord's deep anguish,
Though the strong retain the spoil.

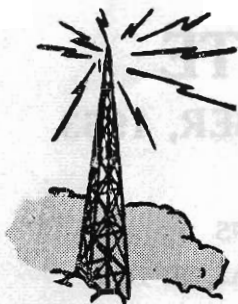
WHICH ONE ARE YOU?
