

THIS IS OUR HOPE


We're weary with dissensions, strife, suspicion and unrest:



### THE PEACE OF CHRISTMAS

We have come very near to the Eve of Christmas, and in that spirit I give you the old Christian salutation. Peace be to your house and home. Peace be to yourself and to them that love you. Peace be to the children of your house, little ones sleeping upstairs or bigger ones with more open-eyed dreams of life. May Christmas bring you peace, peace deep down in the heart of you, peace in the midst of you as you gather round your table, peace in your going out and in your coming in, not only on this one day of the year but on all the days of all the years that are yet to be.

Now I wonder if that seems to you an empty wish, like the casual thought that people stir into their Christmas pudding. For all I know your life may be a weary one. You may be anxious and troubled about many things. You may be tired out — you probably are — or ill or lonely. How then can there be peace for you? Or you may be thinking of this strange world that we are living in, so full of unrest just now, so tense with crises and alarms, so disturbed with clamorous voices that it would seem hard enough for any of us this year to hear the angels sing!

Yet the peace of which I am speaking never depends on circumstances, upon whether things are going well or ill with us or upon the state of the world around us. It is, as the apostle reminds us, one of the fruits of the Spirit. It may be ours, whatever the conditions of our lives may be, if in our innermost selves we are attuned to that unseen world of spirit where beyond these voices there is always peace. If you ask

how a man can have peace within him when his life is clouded and stormy, when he is aching painfully in body or mind, when the future holds, so far as we can see, nothing but disappointment and despair and defeat, I would bid you think once again of Him who was born on the first Christmas Day. He knew, as you and I can never know, the stress and strain of our human life, the tragedy of its selfishness and sinfulness, the pathos of its ignorance and weakness, and He felt, as we can never feel, the throb of all our human agony. But through it all and in it all He had this peace, this deep inward calm that nothing could touch or disturb. Life never threw Him into a panic, never frightened Him, never agitated Him. He moved quietly on from what looked like success to what looked like failure, from friendliness to loneliness, from the dear familiar hills of Nazareth to the desolate hill of Golgotha, always content to do the will of God and to rest His Spirit in the love of God, so that in His darkest hours before He suffered He could turn to those about Him and bequeath to them His richest legacy. "Peace I leave with you, My peace give I unto you; not as the world giveth give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

And you and I in our time and in our circumstances, whatever they may be, can share that peace if we are sure of God, as Christ was sure, sure of God's love to care for us, sure of God's power to protect us, sure of God's hand to guide us, sure of God's Presence to go with us in all that we have to bear or do. If that sort of faith, very simple but of course very searching, is too hard for us, Christmas Day should help. For Christmas Day reminds us that we are not to think only of God above us or God around us but of God with us. "They shall call His name Emmanuel, which being interpreted, is God with us."

The life of Christ, begun at Bethlehem and ended, though never ended, on Golgotha, is the full assurance of God's abiding Presence with those who seek to do His will, of God's continual care for us and ours, of God's eternal wisdom and understanding, of God's power, despite the very worst that this world can do, to bring out to a final triumph those things in human life (and only those things) that are good and true and faithful, inspired by the love of God Himself and devoted to the service of man. That is why the angels sang at Bethlehem. That is why also there will be singing in your heart on Christmas morning, if only you can believe in God and trust Him in much the same way as your children, looking forward so eagerly to Christmas, believe in you and trust in you. So pray for peace. The world needs it. Open your heart to peace. You need it, and I.
