Dear Friends,

Last Sunday we, the congregation of All Saints' Church, had the opportunity of hearing an interesting address from one of the staff of Bible Society. It was good to know that so many people of the world have God's Word to read in their own language, and that they can buy copies of the Bible at a price they can afford, thanks to the Bible Society.

The coming month, on Sunday, 25th July, we shall have another guest speaker — Mr. Rod West, Headmaster of Trinity Grammar School, Summer Hill. He will be speaking on behalf of Scripture Union. Members of Scripture Union pledge to read the Bible every day.

One might be forgiven for asking, "Isn't this a lot of emphasis upon the Bible?"

True! This is a lot of emphasis upon God's Word — the Bible. We can never give too much emphasis to this book. It is the only knowledge we have of God. It contains all that we need to know about God.

One of the articles of our faith says — “Holy Scripture containeth all things necessary to salvation: so that whatever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man, that it should be believed as an article of faith. . . .”

The teachings and practices of our Church are firmly based on God’s Word.

The emphasis of our Church upon God’s Word is far more than just doctrine or how we do things. Such things are important but equally important is that each and everyone of us needs to mould our daily lives upon God’s Word. To do this we need to know what God is saying to us in the Bible. We need to read and meditate upon it daily.

There are various methods of learning from God’s Word but I would strongly urge everyone to use the Scripture Union method with its helpful notes published three-monthly and costing as little as a dollar or two.

We must become a people who know and obey God, and this can only happen when we earnestly and regularly read God’s Word — the Bible.

I would urge everyone to spend some time each day in reading God’s Word — getting to know Him who is our Friend and Saviour.

We are thrilled to be expecting another "small small" in October—and I'm learning that after your first pregnancy you certainly "look" pregnant more quickly! I knew I wouldn't be able to afford to buy many maternity outfits, and although I know God says not to worry because he provides all things—

I worried.. Well, as always, God does things in such unexpected ways—I was sent money from a friend's mum (whom I've only met a few times), specifically for clothes. God is so good. Sue also made me a smock and a dress.

We are so glad we've been able to make our home open to Sue, and it's wonderful to have her on the staff team here in Melbourne, and especially at Monash.
