JOSHUA

Continuing the Series on the books of the Bible, written by the Rev. Donald Cameron of Moore College

Fired by the leadership of Moses, the children of Israel were brought to the eastern borders of Palestine. They had left Egypt a straggling band of demoralised refugees, but now stood assembled on the banks of the Jordan, a great striking force. However Moses, the man who had made this possible, was dead and lay in an unknown grave across the Jordan. Leadership has passed to his lieutenant, Joshua, upon whom fell the responsibility of bringing the Israelites into the land to possess it for their own. To sustain him, Joshua was given the promise, "As I was with Moses, so shall I be with you, I will not fail you or forsake you."

Joshua's strategy was clear cut. First a direct assault on the centre section of the land led to the capture of Jericho, which then gave entry to the whole country. A treaty with the neighbouring tribes consolidated Israel's hold on the centre of the land, and opened the way to further conquest. Joshua next struck southward, capturing and destroying five city states in the southern part of the country. Then turning north, a great victory was won at Hazor, a dominant city in northern Canaan. Thus, by a great three-pronged thrust, Joshua had established nominal supremacy over the whole land.

The recent work of archeologists has told us much about the land Israel conquered and the devastating nature of the assault. Canaan, prior to the invasion, was a series of loosely allied cities, recognising Egypt as overlord, and enjoying a highly developed culture. Their worship and religion were debased in the extreme, and their concept of God most foreign to modern understanding. Excavation of cities such as Hazor, Bethel and others reveal evidence of devastation in the early twelve hundreds B.C., followed by a complete break in culture as nomad Israel swept over the sedentary civilisation of the Canaanites.

The story of the conquest ends abruptly in Chapter 11, and most of the remainder of Joshua is devoted to a geographical distribution of the territory between the individual tribes, an event which never came to fruition. After the initial successes, Israel had apparently rested on her oars and failed to go on to occupy the whole country. Flushed by first victories, the Israelites were content to remain on the land they had, and to come to terms, both politically and spiritually, with the native Canaanites. With this seemingly innocent compromise a great decline in religion, morals, and national unity set in.

God had commanded them through Moses to go in and possess the land, and had forbidden association with the Canaanites for reasons that the following centuries made only too painfully clear. However, failure to take God at His word, and to render strict obedience, led to future troubles which are told in the next book of the Bible, Judges,

1—Am I so activist in my ministry that I have no time to listen to the still small voice of conscience, truth, inspiration and love?

2—In my ministry of the Word, do I spend enough time waiting for a word from the Lord, and taking hours, if necessary, to put it into a form easily understood, by those who will listen to it?

3—Do I set aside regular times for reading and study, for digesting what I read, for applying it to myself, for seeing its relevance and usefulness in my ministry?

4—Do I bring every duty to God, so that He may give me a touch of insight and love for its performance?

5—Do I say the daily offices to fulfil my sense of dutiful observance, or hurriedly, broodingly, so that some verse may light up with new meaning?

6—When the mind is tired and the heart cold, do I tell God about it simply, and offer the Will?

7—When I am empty do I go to God to be re-filled?

8—Am I ready to drink the cup that is attached to my priesthood—the identification with people in their sins and needs, the responsibility for souls, the pain of personal inadequacy and failure.

9—Do I realise the miracle of Holy Communion, that Our Lord nourishes the souls of His and my people?

10—Do I love people enough to pray for them, in the faith that once I have brought them to God, God has begun to act?

11—Do I see the openness of people at a baptism, a funeral, a wedding, and recognise the opportunity for human warmth and an expression of God's love and care?

12—In my touch with people, do I give the impression that I am too busy for them to bother me with their troubles, or do they feel that I am at their service, so that they can open their hearts about their failings, their anxieties, their doubts and their longings?

13—Do I prepare for the Parish Council meeting, with prayer and faith, seeing it as the heart of the parish, the inner band of fellow-workers, the nerve centre for the Kingdom?

14—Am I quick on the trigger or can I take criticism, opposition and misunderstanding, without becoming hurt or resentful?

15—Am I willing to delegate everything possible to the laity, so that I may have more time to devote to my ministry?


