THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

Dear People of All Saints',—

30th July, 1938.

This letter was commenced 500 miles away from Sydney, where I had opportunities for reading which are so hard to come by at home. I have been very interested in a little book of Donald Soper, called "Popular Fallacies about the Christian Faith," wherein the author deals with the difficulties of people to-day who do not believe in Christianity. He very truly says these people are "held up by ideas ABOUT religion, which they sincerely think are correct, whereas actually they are nothing better than fallacies."

The following fallacy is so very, very common, in fact we meet it every day in one form or another, that I can't help passing it on to you. It is the fallacy that the Christian life was never intended for **everybody**; it is a matter of temperament. On page 4 I pass on to you Mr. Soper's words; they may fall into the hands of someone who has been hindered by this very difficulty.*

The matter claiming our attention is the forthcoming Consecration Festival which we shall commemorate on Sunday, August 21st. We cannot make this festival all that we hope it may be, unless we have **your utmost co-operation**. As you know, we always make this Festival a "Back-to-All-Saints" Sunday, and I hope you are already in touch with former parishioners, extending to them our cordial invitation to come back to their old Parish Church to join with us in worship, at least once on that Sunday. Not only do we wish you to invite past parishioners, but we ask your help in regard to present parishioners, especially those who do not come regularly, or who do not come at all, by extending to them a special invitation to our Festival. Above all, please remember the services in your daily prayers.

We particularly hope that all the men who are Communicants will be present at the early Celebration on August 21, and will accept this invitation to the Men's Communion Breakfast which follows. I refer you to page 5 of this issue, where you will find particulars of the services for our Festival.

Will those parishioners who have collecting boxes which we have been using for the past four months (in lieu of a fete) please return them on August 21? For those who did not take a box, there is a special envelope issued with this "Chronicle," in which you will please place your special offering, representing what you would have expended had a fete been held.

Our Festival will be further marked by the Parish Tea and Social Reunion, on Thursday, August 25. All Saints' Parish Teas have been so wonderfully successful and so greatly appreciated in years gone by, that we feel we have established a standard which must be maintained. Donations are requested from those who may be willing to give a table, or share with others in this gift, and promises of donations in kind will be very welcome. Admission to the Tea and Social Reunion will be by ticket, which costs one shilling, and which may be secured from the District Visitors, or any of the Church Officers. I am sure you will appreciate the value we set upon the sale of tickets. It is only by such sale that we can hope to approximate the number for whom we shall have to provide. If, therefore, you intend coming to the Tea—as we hope you do—will you please buy your ticket as soon as possible?

His Grace the Archbishop has kindly accepted my invitation to be with us at the Tea, and Canon R. B. S. Hammond will speak at the Reunion afterwards.

As already intimated Confirmation Classes will commence on Tuesday, August 2nd, for women and girls, and on Thursday, August 4th, for men and boys, both classes being held at the Rectory, and commencing at half-past seven each week. It is most essential that candidates for Confirmation should attend **regularly**. If you are really in earnest about your Confirmation, the Preparation Classes will come before all other engagements.

I am grateful to Mr. Pattison and all those who assisted him to "keep the flag flying" during my absence—the Reverends David Creighton, R. B.

Robinson, F. A. Walton, A. W. Morton, A. E. Gardner, and Canon Garnsey. Also to Mr. R. F. Atkinson for his address at the Children's Service, and to Miss Atkinson for taking my classes at Petersham Infants' School.

***FROM "POPULAR FALLACIES ABOUT THE CHRISTIAN FAITH."**

(The following is the fallacy to which reference is made in the Rector's Letter.

It may help some of us to get our thinking about the
Christian Religion straight.—Editor.)

"The Christian life was never intended for everybody; it's a matter of temperament. Those who are religious can't help it, and those who are not, can't do anything about it." I always associate this attitude in my mind with those short stories in magazines in which Jones recounts to his friends around the fireside an amazing experience which happened to him when he was big game hunting in '94. I'm sure you will recognise this: "There I stood face to face with that man-eater without a bullet left in my gun. Well, you fellows know that I'm not a religious man, but—etc., etc., etc." Now what is it that Jones is inferring when he says that "he is not a religious man?" He's certainly not apologising for it, but is assuming that being religious or not is no more a question of choice in his case than the names of his parents or the colour of his hair. What he means is—"You know I'm not built that way." People like this will often go on to say, with shameless impudence, that religion is all right for women and children, it suits them—as if it were never intended for their husbands and fathers. I expect that if any parsons read this they will remember having been told by the master of the house where they have been paying a pastoral call, "Oh, yes, my wife comes to your Church—but you see I've got the garden; that's more in my line."

Let us clear some of the mental obstacles out of the way in order to see this contention in its true light. There are infinite varieties of religious experience, that is clear. The mystic way, for example, is not open to all: Seeing visions is a matter of temperament, and the doors that were open to a mystic like St. John of the Cross, are closed to many of us, no matter how devout we are. But mysticism is not the **only** door into the Christian life, or even a main entrance. Again, the life of St. Thomas a Kempis was set against the background of monastic quietness, and was made up largely of prayer and meditation, out of which he wrote the immortal "Imitation of Christ": the life of Keir Hardie was set in the hurly-burly of the political arena, and was largely composed of action and propaganda, out of which sprang the modern working class movement in England. Both were deeply religious men, although their personalities were so widely dissimilar.

It is a fact, which anyone can verify, that the idea of there being a certain type of person like our friend Jones, who is constitutionally unresponsive to the appeal of religion, is quite wrong. Every live Church contains its wrestling Jacobs, its patient Stephens, its Marys and its Marthas. The truth is this: The Christian life is for **ALL**, for we are all made for God; the way in which we live it out is for **EACH**, for each has his own personality through which his religion must be expressed. I am temperamentally unsuited to express the Christianity I cherish as St. John of the Cross did; so I fancy would Jones be; but whether or not the Christian life is for me does not depend on whether I'm like St. John, but whether I'm like God. If, as I believe, we are all His children, then there's a place for us all in His Home. You can't stereotype the religious life, but when it is faithfully lived out in all the variety with which individual believers can adorn it, it's not difficult to see that it is the same in everybody—"a unity of the spirit, in the bond of peace and in righteousness of life." . . .

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.
