## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
St Mark and Anzac Day, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

We were fortunate in having perfect weather for Easter, which added to the joy and uplift of the Festival services. Mrs. Morris, with her usual artistry, made the Church look beautiful with the good supply of lovely white flowers available, which included many fine blooms from the dahlia garden of Mr. and Mrs. Bosward, from which source came a constant supply for many weeks prior to the Festival. The choir, though not up to full strength numerically, gave loyal and efficient service throughout the day. I was glad to have the assistance of the Rev. A. E. Gardner.

Anzac Day comes this year with special significance, for there are definite and hopeful signs of Korean peace. We should especially remember at this time those in positions of great responsibility. I cannot help feeling that for many, Anzac Day is but "another holiday." Unless we strive to be worthy of the tremendous sacrifices made for us at Anzac, in World War II, and in Korea, all the outward and visible commemorations are valueless. The illusion of human self-sufficiency—the most popular form of modern atheism—dies hard. Two world wars and the fear of a third should have killed the notion that every day in every way mankind grows better and better; but strange to say, the idea, that man can still contrive his own salvation, still lives and thrives. It is the greatest obstacle we have to break down. Man's self-satisfaction, not in the vulgar sense of conceit, but in the more general sense of **not** being aware of his limitations, still dominates his mind. Does it mean that man must exhaust his self-pride and confidence in the hard school of failure and disaster before he will yield his will to God? Until we **do** allow God to come in and help us, until we **do** realise our dependence upon Him, there can be nothing ahead but failure.

At the annual vestry meeting, held on April 22, Mr. W. Sopwith and Colonel C. H. Granville were re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. L. C. Calver accepted my nomination as Rector's Warden. Messrs. R. F. Atkinson, J. M. Boyle, H. G. Brodie, D. Cooke, F. P. Gunner, D. B. Hunter, H. F. Jones, B. T. Sayers and A. H. Thomas were the people's nominees to the Parish Council, and were duly elected. Messrs. T. H. Bosward, A. E. Carruthers and K. N. Oldfield are my nominees to the Council.

Messrs. R. F. Atkinson, T. H. Bosward, J. M. Boyle, L. C. Calver and D. B. Hunter were elected Parish Representatives under "The Presentation and Exchange Ordinance 1933." This means, that should this Parish become vacant during the next 12 months, responsibility falls upon these Parochial Nominators. Mr. S. L. Derrett and Mr. E. W. Brooks were again elected as our Honorary Auditors. We would like to be able to publish the encouraging reports submitted by the secretaries of the various parochial organisations. The need for increased membership in each one of them was stressed. Being human, we all feel the need of fellowship of some kind; and a hearty welcome awaits those who could greatly strengthen our guilds, clubs and societies by becoming active members. Perhaps this means **YOU**; if so, don't just read this, without **doing** something about it! Attention was drawn by the Superintendent to the need for more teachers in the Sunday School. We especially commend this work to you: it is unspectacular, it will demand a good deal of your time and patience, but it is one of the most interesting and worthwhile jobs in the whole Church. It is the laying of firm foundations, upon which is built the church of the future.

We record our sincere thanks to all the people of this Parish within and without its various organisations, who have so willingly and generously co-operated in all efforts during the past financial year for the building of God's Kingdom and the welfare of our Church and Parish.


Wide public interest has been awakened by the recent vigorous action on the part of the Roman Catholic Church. It was to be expected that the matter should come up for discussion at our vestry meeting. No matter how much we may disagree with the doctrines of that church, no matter how much we deplore its intolerance (and, by the way, intolerance is not confined to Roman Catholics), we must surely agree that we have been given a lesson in Loyalty. There is a definite challenge here to us, and to all non-Roman churches to "snap out" of the apathy and indifference which is too often our attitude to our Church and her witness. Read again and ponder the teaching of your own Church, given at the last Lambeth Conference.

This, as you know, is our Jubilee Year, in which we are endeavouring to re-roof our Church, in addition to our annual commitment for our Parish Hall debt. To endeavour to raise £1,500 this financial year seems to some people an inaccessible goal; but with the co-operation of **EVERYONE**—church-goers and non-church-goers, parishioners past and present, it should not be an impossibility. In an incumbency of 22 years, I have never found All Saints' people to fail in any appeal for their Church; and even though we are aiming very high, I do not see why this should be an exception. Of course, it will mean much self sacrifice from us **ALL**, it will mean giving and giving, "until its hurts," and it will mean working when we would much prefer to take things easy; but nothing lasting or worthwhile has ever been accomplished without some measure of sacrifice.

We commend to you the services for Ascension Day and Whitsunday. Because Ascension Day must fall on a Thursday, it is not so easy to observe it as the great Church Festival it is; but most people with a little effort could come to one service at least.

The Primate's Appeal for South-East Asia is to be launched on Ascension Day. Our response is being made through the Women's Guild's Special Effort for Missions in memory of its late President, to which reference is made elsewhere.

#### MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

**Ascension, Whitsunday and Trinity.**—We remind you of the approach of these Festivals: Ascension Day, May 14, Whitsunday, May 24 and Trinity Sunday, May 31. On Ascension Day there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7.30 and 10.30 a.m. and Evening Prayer at 7.45 p.m. There will be the usual services on Whitsunday, and on Trinity Sunday, Coronation Services will be held, for which a special form of service is being issued.

**Focus on South-East Asia.**—On Ascension Day, May 14, the Primate's appeal for South-East Asia is to be launched in the Diocese of Sydney. Special services will be held in St. Andrew's Cathedral during the day. Holy Communion will be celebrated at 8.30 a.m. and 11 a.m. There will be two other special services during the day. At both of these services the Most Reverend, the Primate, will speak about the urgent immediate needs of South-East Asia. The services are as follows: 1.15 p.m., a short lunch hour service; 7.30 p.m., a Missionary Service for the whole Diocese. All church people are invited to be present. At this service an announcement will be made of the plans of the A.B.M. and the C.M.S. in acceptance of the Primate's challenge to seize the present opportunities of South-East Asia. To meet

the convenience of those already in the city who wish to remain for the Evening Service, arrangements are being made for a light tea in the Chapter House from 5.30 p.m.

**Lenten Offerings.**—We record our thanks for your Lenten Offerings for the Missionary Work of the Church. So far we have received £13/2/9 for A.B.M., and £14/9/- for C.M.S. To these amounts must be added the Sunday School's record response of £30 for the Children's Lenten Offerings for A.B.M., making a total of £57/11/9.

**Women's Guild.**—The main meeting for April was the Women's Luncheon, held on Thursday, 23rd, which was well attended and enjoyed by all. The chief reason for this luncheon was to launch the Annual Missionary Appeal, which this year is for at least £100 to help the Church Missionary Society's work in Borneo. Mrs. H. W. K. Mowl, wife of the Primate, was our guest speaker, and gave a very interesting address on the missionary needs of Borneo, which she visited during her recent trip through South-East Asia. We are grateful to Mrs. Mowl for coming to us, and are always pleased to welcome her to our Parish. The Guild was assisted by the Young Married's Club, and several other members of the congregation, whose help was much appreciated. We were pleased to see members of other Churches at the luncheon. Mrs. Sayers, Mrs. Gunner and Mrs. Clifton Smith provided an enjoyable musical programme. The function was also a financial success, bringing £20 to the Guild funds. Miss Joy Sanderson has kindly taken over Palace Street temporarily. We would like to hear of two more volunteers for this important work.

**Personal.**—We offer our sincerest sympathy to the following parishioners and friends: Mr. Greer and his family, upon the very sudden passing of his wife at Wentworth Falls. The service was conducted by the Rev. L. S. Richards at Holy Trinity Church, Dulwich Hill, the Rector of Petersham assisting; Mrs. Atterton and Narelle, and their relatives, in the sudden death of Henry James Frederick Atterton, who collapsed at his work and passed away very shortly afterwards. Our thoughts, too, are with Bishop G. H. Cranswick, Mr. H. L. Cranswick, and the Bishop of Tasmania (and their families) in the passing of their Mother, Edith Cranswick, after a long life of leadership and service in the Church. Her late husband, Canon E. G. Cranswick was this Rector's first Rector, and the friendship of those at All Saints' Rectory with the Cranswick family goes back many years. In these expressions of sympathy, we would include the people of St. John's, Balmain, and St. Cuthbert's, Naremburn, in the recent passing of their Rectors. May the God of all consolation comfort and strengthen all who are bereaved.

**Mother's Day.**—Sunday, May 10, will be observed as Mother's Day. We try to keep it in some practical way. We ask that our special gifts shall be given to the Society for Promotion of Christian Knowledge, which has been for many years a "mother" society of our Church. The secretary for S.P.C.K. in Sydney Diocese writes: "... there is the constant call for

an adequate supply of Christian literature. It is not only that the Christian faith must be published abroad—a work of first importance—but false faiths and subversive philosophies need to be wisely controverted in works that bear the marks of Christian scholarship and charity. These must be painstakingly prepared, and arrangements made for their distribution. How great is this demand no one can truly tell, for the need is very great. During the year 1951/52 the Society's port chaplains have continued to meet and commend emigrants, visit ships and maintain contact with the shipping companies. Twenty-six migrant ships have sailed to Australia, and only one has been without a chaplain. The allocation of chaplains for this voyage is now the joint responsibility of the Secretary to the Inter-Church Migration Committee in Melbourne, and the General Secretary of S.P.C.K., and the result has been that the clergy engaged in the work find a better understanding of their requirements and difficulties, and the whole scheme has been working more smoothly. Including those who served on the Australian run, 80 voyage chaplains have been appointed during the year, and the number of emigrants commended through the Society has doubled. The expenses of the Society have been so great this past year that they have had to take the drastic step of selling the freehold of the Society's Headquarters in London in order to repay the very heavy bank overdraft, which has hampered the work for so many years. This appears to me to indicate that the financial position is far from satisfactory and, therefore, your generous contributions will, as heretofore, be warmly welcomed."

**"Raise the Roof"**.—A variety show with this most apposite title will be presented in the Parish Hall on Friday, May 8, at 8 p.m. We commend this Young People's effort for the Jubilee Fund to all our people. Tickets may be obtained from any member of the Choir or at the Rectory.

**The Sunday School.**—Each year, for sometime past, the scholars have collected a little over £20 by means of the Lenten Self-Denial Boxes, and we set out to raise a similar amount this year, but we are very pleased to report we have broken all records by raising £30, which will be forwarded to the Australian Board of Missions. It is most pleasing to be able to send a larger donation this year, as missions are greatly in need of more finance. Thank you, girls and boys for your splendid effort. It is pleasing to welcome Mr. Colin Trounce to the staff.—R. F. ATKINSON, Supt.

### WHAT YOUR OWN CHURCH TEACHES

The Lambeth Conference urges all Church people to look upon their membership of Christ in the Church as the central fact in their lives. They should regard themselves as individually sharing responsibility for the corporate life and witness of the Church in the places where they live. They should discharge this responsibility and give a distinctive witness:—

- (a) by the regularity of their attendance at public worship, and especially at the Holy Communion;
- (b) by the practice of private prayer, Bible reading, and self-discipline;
- (c) by bringing the teaching and example of Christ into their everyday lives;
- (d) by the boldness of their spoken witness to their faith in Christ;
- (e) by personal service to Church and community;
- (f) by the offering of money, according to their means, for the support of the work of the Church, at home and overseas.
