THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
25th June, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints':

As time goes on, it is more difficult to get in touch with former All Saints' parishioners, but there are still some whom you could invite to the forty-sixth anniversary of the consecration of our parish Church on Sunday, August 21. We hope you will commence **now** to tell any former parishioners you know of the consecration festival, and invite them to join in an act of dedication, praise and thanksgiving of past and present parishioners, which we endeavour to make an outstanding feature of this festival.

It is a good thing to remind ourselves and our friends what we owe to the Church. Dr. E. Stanley Jones in his little devotional book, "The Way," says: "If you wipe out the Church to-day, you will have to put something in its place to-morrow, for it is rooted in the necessities of human living. With all its faults, the Church is the best serving institution on earth. It has many critics, but no rivals in the work of human redemption. It has filled the earth with schools, hospitals, orphanages, blind and leper asylums, churches—everything to lift the soul of the race to higher levels. . . ."

We hope the social side of our festival will be marked by our annual parish tea and re-union on Wednesday, August 24 (Feast of St. Bartholomew). We once again seek the co-operation of **ALL** our people in making this evening a time of happy social fellowship which it has been for so many years. We shall be happy to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, and also from those who would be willing to help by acting as hostesses at the tea.

Last year we did not quite attain the objective of £200 which the Churchwardens need for our parish hall debt. We hope the boxes now in use and the envelopes which will be issued with next month's "Chronicle" (which are to be returned on our festival Sunday—August 21), will bring in the desired amount. This appeal concerns **ALL** parishioners, young and old, and **ALL** organisations which are privileged to use our spacious parish hall, and we expect their members to respond to it, either individually or collectively.

Parents naturally desire the best for their children to fit them for life in the material sense; but how much more important it is to see that they are trained in the more lasting things which build character!

I ask, therefore, the utmost co-operation of parents and teachers and those who have the care of young people approaching confirmation age. Whilst recognising that parents cannot decide the important question of confirmation **FOR** their children; they **CAN** do much by their encouragement and guidance to help their young people to make a wise decision. I would remind those amongst you who accepted the responsibilities of God-parents, of the solemn charge given you in the Sacrament of Baptism: "Ye are to **take care** that this child be brought to the Bishop **to be confirmed** by him . . ."

It is not uncommon to find adults who, for some reason or other, have never been confirmed. May I express the hope that you will take this opportunity your Church offers you. **No one** is too old to be confirmed; but if you feel a natural diffidence about attending a young people's preparation class, I will very gladly form an adult class if the numbers warrant it.

I am grateful to the Rev. D. A. Ridley for his ministry in my absence, and to the Rector of Christ Church, Enmore, for his assistance. It is a pity Mr. Ridley had such bad weather whilst at the rectory, but, even so, he was able to renew many old friendships.

**THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THOSE APPROACHING
CONFIRMATION AGE.**

Dear Girls and Boys:

Next month we shall be forming preparation classes for confirmation, and I would like to have a word with those who are 14 or over, and those who will reach their 14th birthday before the end of this year.

Confirmation is approached by special training, preparation and instruction for those who wish to become full members of one branch of Christ's Catholic (that is, world-wide) Church.

It would be possible for a boy or girl to be a Christian without being confirmed. But no boy (or girl) can be a complete, happy and useful Christian without joining himself definitely with other Christians either in the Church of England—as in your case—or in some other branch of the world-wide Christian Church. Don't take any notice of those people who say, "You can be just as good a Christian without joining a Church." It isn't true! It is quite impossible to play cricket or football without joining with others; if you want a real game you must join a team.

Therefore, special classes are formed to help you to be ready to take your place and play your part in the Christian "team." These classes lead up to a definite public act in the Service of Confirmation, which admits us to responsible membership in the most wonderful society in the world—Christ's Church. Although we may have friends whose actions might lead us to think otherwise, don't ever forget that it is a very great honour and privilege to become a full member of the Christian Church.

Confirmation comes to our aid at a time in our lives when we specially need it. We are growing up, and that means in mind, body and spirit we are obliged to face new temptations, challenges and difficulties, as we try to form a sound character, which is the most important thing in life.

I write to invite you to join the preparation classes. If, after very careful thought and prayer, you decide to do so (and no one but **YOU** can make this decision), please hand to me before July 31 your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your baptism. Classes commence on Tuesday, August 2, for boys, and on Thursday, August 4, for girls, both classes being held at the rectory and commencing at 7.15 p.m. It is most essential that you should attend **REGULARLY**.

Hoping to have the opportunity and the privilege of preparing you for your confirmation, and with all good wishes.

Property Acquired by Diocese of Sydney.—The Archbishop of Sydney (Dr. Mowll) has acquired an attractive property in the village of Menangle called "Gilbulla" for the purpose of holding retreats, quiet week-ends, and conferences, and, when not in use for these purposes, supplying accommodation for individuals who are desiring spiritual and physical refreshment in comfortable and attractive surroundings and in the heart of lovely country scenery. The house is surrounded by 14 acres of garden and parkland.

Writing about "Gilbulla," His Grace the Archbishop says: "I write to invite you and your parishioners to inspect it either on Tuesday, July 5, or on Saturday, July 9, and will be grateful if you can let the Treasurer of the S.D.C.A., Mrs. W. A. Richards, know if you are able to go on either of those days, and how many will probably be in the party. Her office is at the C.E.N.E.F. Memorial Centre, 201 Castlereagh Street (telephone MA 9641). If trains are running again to Menangle on those days she will be able to let you know, and if buses can meet the 10.30 train from Central Station to Campbelltown, she will arrange for buses at a cost of 3/- per head return.

"Will you bring your lunch on July 5 or 9? At 2 o'clock I will hope to give a short talk, after which afternoon tea will be served so that all may return before darkness falls. . . ."

Bush Church Aid Society.—Dr. Freda Gibson, O.B.E., the B.C.A. Flying Doctor in South Australia, is remaining at her post despite the death of her husband, Dr. Roy Gibson. Dr. Freda is a very gallant lady, doing a remarkable work with little publicity. The B.C.A. Flying Medical Services, with three doctors, 20 nurses, a chemist and other assistants, is a unique organisation doing splendid work without Government subsidies. The whole work is owned, financed and staffed by the Church through B.C.A., and is managed on a Christian missionary basis. Nurses with two certificates are urgently needed to join this remarkable team to work for the extension of the Kingdom of God outback. Sister M. Horsburgh, of Tullamore, N.S.W., recently joined the staff, but five more nurses are urgently needed.
