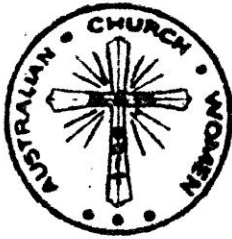

A WORLD SISTERHOOD.

'This is the time of times when the women of the world need to come together in a strong and powerful unit.....It is our bounden duty, hand in hand with the men, to better the worldWe will have definite means by which we can uplift the womanhood of the world into the ecstasy of fulfilling its real mission'.

These convincing and fertile words were spoken in 1923 by Korean student Helen Kim, as she challenged the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the U.S.A. Methodist Episcopal Church with her vision of a world fellowship of Christian women.

The book launched at Nairobi in July 1986, "METHODIST WOMEN: A WORLD SISTERHOOD" (see Newsette February issue) traces the history from those small beginnings to the present day World Federation of Methodist Women (WFMW) a movement of Christian fellowship and concern, reaching into great cities and tiny remote villages through the world, and now holding Consultative Status (Category 2) as a Non Government Organisation with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations.

Realising the need for recording the growth of the Federation and the fact that several valuable resource persons had already passed to their reward, the decision was made in 1981 that a history of WFMW be compiled without delay.

Mrs. Myra Pfeiffer, U.S.A. Chairperson of the Editorial Committee confesses in her Preface that the Committee was unable to find anyone who was present at that momentous meeting in 1923 nor at the signing of the original World Charter in 1939. But valuable historical papers had been handed down and it is from these and other documents that Part One of the book 1923-1956 has been recorded.

Part Two is headed "The Federation Becomes Global 1956-1986 and as well as describing the six World Assemblies to 1981 contains chapters of 'Federation History through the Eyes of its Living Presidents' (5). Australia can be proud of the contribution of Mrs. Freer Latham of Sydney, who was the first World President to visit all WFMW Areas, 1961-1966 welding the Federation into a whole real world-wide Fellowship.

Part Three briefly highlights the contribution of thirty-three "Women with World Wide Horizons" - from China, Africa, Asia, Latin America, etc. and lists the Executive and Area Officers from 1939-1986. Australians listed include Freer Latham (World President 1961-1966), Mrs. H.H. Trigge, Mrs. Ralph Sutton, Miss Jean Skuse (World Secretary 1971-1976), Mrs. George Nash, Mrs. Margaret Ayre and Mrs. Betty Davis.

"METHODIST WOMEN, a WORLD SISTERHOOD" is not only interesting as a history but also because it offers some personal glimpses of the women of six continents who are part of that history. It contains 226 pages with 24 photographs and it is hoped that the book may be available soon at the Unichurch Book Shop, Wesley Arcade, Sydney.
