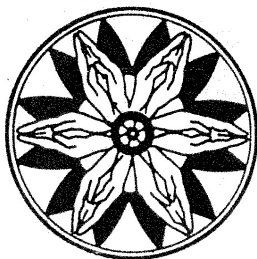

Foreword

The 50th Anniversary of Australian Church Women NSW State Unit was marked with the production of a history to 1988 written by Deaconess Mary Andrews. This publication introduces the women who have served in the role of President of the NSW Women's Inter Church Council which became the NSW State Unit of Australian Church Women. 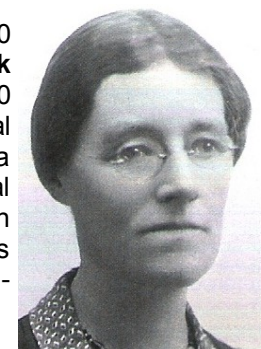

Amy Roseby believed passionately in peace, and was well versed in world affairs. She was a teacher, headmistress, including over 30 years at Redlands, Neutral Bay, and was awarded an OBE for services to education in 1958. She was active in National Council of Women.

Foundation member of NSW WICC, Rebecca Swann was known for her interest in children, in both religious and educational settings. A teacher, headmistress and active unionist, her widely varied interests included the recognition of the needs of slow learners, equal pay, tree planting, improved conditions for Aborigines, peace, temperance, the needs of crippled children. In 1950 was a delegate to World Council of Churches Commission on Evangelism. 'She was kind, good humoured, with a great gift of common sense.'

Mary Clouston worked to help country people, visiting women and children when they were sent to Sydney for hospital treatment. She also helped finance distribution of Scriptures with Bourke as the chief centre. She visited Chinese women in their homes. Mary was active in the many organisations in the Presbyterian Church, and advocated union of them for better effect. 1929-30 was spent speaking to women's groups in Scotland, England and Ireland. She was one of the instigators of NSW WICC.

Elsie Deane served with her husband as a missionary in Fiji for nine years, before returning to Australia and ministering in many parts of NSW. From 1940-47 they were at Methodist Ladies College Burwood. Support for the Temperance Alliance was another of her interests.

Regina Stolz was involved with NSW WICC nearly 40 years before the Lutheran church gave permission for its members to join. She saw great value in praying and worshipping together. Other involvements included Women's World Day of Prayer, National Council of Women, Travellers' Aid Society and PPSEAWA.

With a teaching background Mary Millar became the wife of a minister, first in country NSW and then in Brisbane, involved in women's ministry and in the choir. During WW II she helped establish a hostel for servicemen in Brisbane. Another initiative was a hostel for farm children to stay near school during the week, returning home at weekends. She was interested in the Oxford Group, an attempt to go beyond denominational boundaries. Very involved in Wybalena.

Annie Deans emigrated to Perth WA with her husband to start a church under the auspices of the Colonial Missionary Society. Their moves were then to Kalgoorlie, Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne. She was very active in social work, women's groups and Sunday schools, promoting motherhood and family life. Annie Deans was a keen writer and speaker. She 'showed the confidence of those who know God and trust in His providing'.

Sylvia Lew served with her husband in appointments around NSW, including parishes and the Methodist Ladies' College Burwood. She used her musical talents training choirs and organising concerts. A gifted soprano, she was a soloist in presentations of The Messiah. With her husband Sylvia Lew attended the second Assembly of the World Council of Churches at Evanston in 1954.

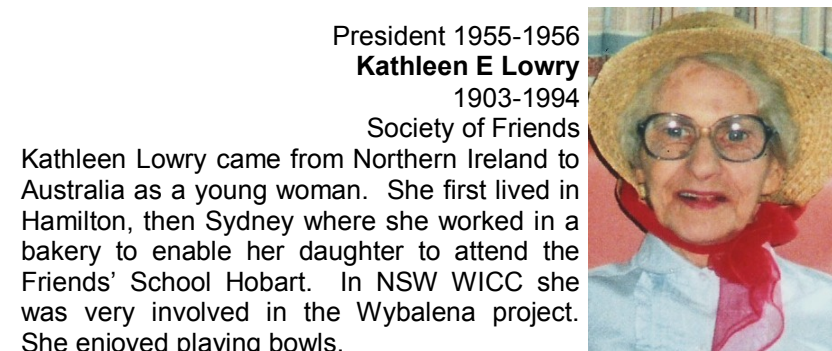

 Kathleen Lowry came from Northern Ireland to Australia as a young woman. She first lived in Hamilton, then Sydney where she worked in a bakery to enable her daughter to attend the Friends’ School Hobart. In NSW WICC she was very involved in the Wybalena project. She enjoyed playing bowls.

 After coming to Australia from England via Canada Kathleen Garlick left a successful office career to become a Salvation Army Officer. She worked in corps ministry, and is also noted for her organisation at Divisional level of Bible camps and Rallies for women’s Home League. As well as her contribution to ecumenical activities, she served on the Good Neighbour and the Marriage Guidance Councils.

Mrs Vines fulfilled the traditional role of minister's wife graciously and creatively. She was a good organiser and led women's and young women's groups – brought flair to dramatic presentations. Her caring nature made her much loved. She was active in P & C in Dubbo, learnt watchmaking from her father, and late in life learnt Braille, translating for blind society.

Reta Farr served with her minister husband in both congregations and chaplaincies in SA, Japan, Vic, ACT, NSW, USA. She was involved in NSW WICC and ACW in ACT, and SA. An accomplished singer, Reta sang in church choirs, a trio, and had lead parts in musical theatre. She worked as a librarian and as a secretary to help support the family while in the USA.

Effie Baldwin was the first woman graduate of the NSW Baptist Theological College. She went as a missionary to East Bengal, worked in India for many years and spoke Garo fluently. Back in Australia she served with her husband in several Baptist churches in ministry. A building at Morling Theological College is named in her honour.

The Next Ten Years - 1999-2008

Since 1999 annual Fellowship Day and World Community Day services conducted by local Branches have continued to bring women together for worship and fellowship. These are prepared by the different state and territory units following a fixed rotation, using the theme decided upon for the two years of each National Executive. The offerings from the services support the Winifred Kiek Scholarship, Fellowship of the Least Coin, Asian Church Women's Conference, and a Special Project decided upon by the National Executive. The local Branches are the 'grassroots' of Australian Church Women, the essential element without which state and national cannot function.

The activities of State Council are outlined year by year in what follows. It should be noted that social issues are ongoing, and indeed at times are of an orbital nature, coming to the fore, moving into the background, and returning, sometimes in an altered form. Since the formation of *Australian Women's Coalition in 2002 the selection of social issues has been influenced by requests from AWC for responses to matters which affect women.

Year of the Older Person – Mrs Marjorie Deasey spoke at a mid year luncheon: 'Never too old to be of use'.
 WCD Special Project—The Exodus Foundation Ashfield Coalition 99 (non-government organisations under the auspices of Council on the Ageing) set up committees dealing with aged care, health and transport. Members of ACW attended a number of these.

*Australian Women's Coalition (www.awcaus.org.au) became a separate identity in 2003—one of four secretariats under the auspices of the Office of the Status of Women. It had formerly been overseen by the National Council of Women Australia.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIT

Setting the Scene—1938-1998

- 1938 NSW Women's Inter Church Council formed – Congregational, Presbyterian, Methodist, Churches of Christ, Society of Friends
- 1939 World War II stymied growth but women still met for worship
- 1951 *Wybalena* hostel for country girls studying or working in Sydney
- 1953 Baptist representatives welcomed
- 1955 The Salvation Army represented. Goodwill visit from Church Women United (USA)
- 1958 Anglican women represented officially – had been attending
- 1962 Australia invited to send a representative to Asian Church Women's Conference Assembly in Thailand – no national body of church women. Mrs Edna Beales of Epping attended.
- 1965 Australian Church Women formed, NSW Women's Inter Church Council became the NSW Unit. Connie Tan from Indonesia, the first Winifred Kiek Scholar arrived to do Social Work course.
- 1966 ACW officially represented at ACWC Assembly in Japan – Olga Badger elected to ACWC Committee.
- 1967 Decision to sell *Wybalena*
- 1969 Two observers from Roman Catholic Church
- 1971 Over \$36,000 given to YWCA for *Tremayne* hostel at Kirribilli
- 1973 Roman Catholic women officially members
- 1977 Uniting Church in Australia formed. Presbyterian Church still sent delegates
- 1979 Five women from NSW Unit attended Silver Jubilee of Fellowship of the Least Coin in The Philippines. *Newsette* published for first time. ACW National Conference in Sydney with visitors from Church Women United USA and New Zealand
- 1980 Five NSW women returned visit to Alaska and West Coast USA
- 1981 Group visited Church Women United in New Zealand
- 1982 Dr Thelma Adair, President Church Women United USA visited, as did a group from CWU New Zealand
- 1988 Golden Jubilee of Australian Church Women NSW Unit was celebrated in St Stephen's Macquarie Street Sydney
- 1991 Theme song, *We Being Many are One in the Lord* written by Lucelle King for National Conference held at Collaroy. Social Issues awareness emphasised, convener appointed.



President 1961-1962

Edris M Manefield

1896-1981

Methodist

Mrs Manefield served with her husband in the vast Methodist North-west Mission before moving to the Hunter Valley, and then to Sydney where he worked in the Home Mission Department. For seven years Mrs Manefield was State Superintendent of the Methodist Girls' Comradeship. At the local level she was involved at Lane Cove.

President 1962-1963

Marjory I Verco

1914-2007

Churches of Christ

Following a visit to USA in 1958 Marjory promoted the formation of interdenominational groups for women at the local level. She also suggested co-operation across Australia of state women's inter-church councils. Participation in Fellowship Day, World Community Day and Women's World Day of Prayer was encouraged. Fellowship of the Least Coin and Winifred Kiek Scholarship were introduced. Marjory's vision was 'that they all may be one'.



President 1963-1964

Brucinda Montgomerie

1893-1986

Anglican

Along with her husband, Brucinda Montgomerie ran a soup kitchen in Adelaide during the Depression. She had a special interest in the Church Missionary Society as a foundation member, and her husband was Secretary for Aboriginal Church. A devoted member of Mothers' Union she was also a very keen supporter of Women's World Day of Prayer.



President 1964-1965

Hazel V Cross

1904-1969

Salvation Army

Following work in a number of corps and divisional appointments Hazel Cross distinguished herself as a Training College officer for 17 years. Her final appointment was to women's ministry where she introduced a women's leadership training course for Home League members. In retirement she wrote and taught a series of Bible studies for women officers in the social services. A memorial fund in her honour provides books to the library of the Officer Training College Sydney.

President 1965-1966

Thelma M Adam

1909-1992

Presbyterian

In both country and suburban churches Thelma Adam supported her husband in his work as a minister. She was involved in the Presbyterian Women's Association, and was always ready to extend hospitality and help those in need. She was a great cook, gardener, flower arranger, as well as a painter and potter.

Olga Badger

1918-2006

Congregational



Olga took part in many church activities, holding office and supporting the wider work of the church. She and her husband were often camp parents at youth camps. She was involved with Asian Church Women's Conference and served on the ACWC Executive. Olga was active in helping the WKS scholars who studied in Sydney. She was known for her entertaining of overseas guests, was a great cook, seamstress, gardener and listener.

Carmel Keys

Catholic

Carmel Keys' participation in Catholic Women's League at local, diocesan and state levels, her membership of Broken Bay Diocesan Ecumenical Commission, and attendance at NSW Ecumenical Council meetings have given her a good background for ACW meetings. She is noted for her strong commitment to ecumenism and concern for the welfare of members

Jennifer Pepper

Baptist

Following early involvement in Anglican and Congregational Churches, Jennifer became a member of the Baptist church following her marriage. At Eastwood Baptist Jennifer is fully committed to work in the local church. She has also been active over many years in Baptist Community Services NSW and ACT. Makes good use of her many handicraft skills.

Salvation Army

Olive Carpenter served in a number of corps in the UK where she was responsible for the women's ministries as well as sharing the preaching and pastoral roles with her husband. In 1944 they worked with the Salvation Army in the European War Relief effort until 1953 when they came to Australia. In Newcastle and Central NSW Olive was involved in women's ministries, always keen to promote FLC.

Nancy M Pfeiffer
1911-1992

Presbyterian

After growing up in Adelaide Nancy moved to Melbourne after marriage. She did Social Work there while Norman was in the UK with the RAF. As a minister's wife Nancy supported her husband and was active in all aspects of church life, especially women's meetings. Salvation Army

After being commissioned as a Salvation Army officer Edna studied the Chinese language and served as a corps officer in Tungshan and Canton. She was a chaplain in a refugee camp during Sino-Japanese hostilities working with women and girls. She returned to Australia 1940, married, and was a corps officer in Australia and New Zealand. With her husband she pioneered Salvation Army work in Papua New Guinea. Throughout her ministry she made an important contribution to women's ministry.

Marie McCann became the first Catholic president of ACW NSW, also served a term as National President, and has attended several ACWC conferences. Marie studied to obtain her Master of Theology, has been deeply involved in parish work, used her ability as an organist, has been a member Catholic Women's League, and worked with Meals on Wheels. In recognition of her contributions Marie was awarded an OAM.
