THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

27th June, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

Next month we hope to observe the Forty-ninth Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. Will you commence now to get in touch with former parishioners and invite them to join with us in the Special Services which are being arranged for the Consecration Festival, on August 17th? Many of the older people have passed away and it is not so easy to preserve the "Back-to-All Saints" character of the Festival. Still, there must be many who would welcome the opportunity of sharing in an Act of Dedication, Praise and Thanksgiving, which all parishioners, past and present, will endeavour to make an outstanding feature of this Festival.

Every time you look at your Church—this Church, or any other—you may say to yourself: "So long as those doors remain open there is hope for the world." The question for each one of us is: "What am I doing to keep the doors of the Church open?" Whether men listen or refuse to listen, so long as there is a redeemed community in their midst, where the Gospel of God's grace in Christ is proclaimed, and people's lives are changed, the door of opportunity is still open. What we are doing in Church—what we are doing when we strive to be loyal to Christ and His truth in this rebellious world—is simply to keep open the door of divine opportunity. What if the Church were NOT in this city? What if there were no consecrated Christian personalities here and there throughout this community keeping its life sweet and clean? Many who never darken the Church's doors would shrink from such a prospect. Whether we listen or refuse to listen, we know that a society with no Church, no Gospel, no Christian personalities, would be a society with no hope. But so long as there is somewhere in the heart of this community a witness to God and His Christ, and a Gospel that can change human nature and create fellowship, there is still a chance.

The social side of our Festival will be marked by the Annual Parish Tea, on Wednesday, 20th August. We shall be glad to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, and from those who could assist by acting as hostesses at the Tea. We ask the co-operation of all our people in making the Festival Tea a time of happy fellowship which it has been for so many years.


The boxes now in use will be recalled on our Festival Sunday, August 17. A Special Envelope will be issued with next month's "Chronicle" for the use of those who have no box. It has been urged that we should reduce our interest bill, and the Wardens will be happy to do so. They can, however, do this only insofar as they receive a generous response from all parishioners for the Parish Hall debt. This appeal concerns us all, and we expect all organisations which use the hall to respond to it either individually or collectively.

I commend to you the Missionary Appeal, to which reference was made last month, which is being sponsored by the Women's Guild in memory of their late President.

Will you please note the dates of Professor Wilkinson's visit to the Rural Deanery of Petersham next month and endeavour to attend the various meetings.

If you know of any approaching Confirmation age, I'd be glad if you will see that they have an opportunity of reading the letter which follows this.

**THE RECTOR'S LETTER
TO THOSE APPROACHING CONFIRMATION AGE**

Dear Girls and Boys,

Next month we hope to commence our preparation classes for Confirmation, so this letter is for those who are 14 and over and those who will reach their 14th birthday before the end of this year.

Like many things in life, religion is something you take for granted for quite a time; but, in the long run, if it is to be something **real** in your life, you've just got to discover it for yourself. Many people, I think, pick up some rather queer ideas about what the Christian religion is when they are quite young. It is possible that you have some ideas that you will have to leave behind. You may be quite certain that a boy (or girl) whose religion does not grow up with him, will, in the end, grow out of it, and then he gives it up altogether.

At your Confirmation you stand up and make a solemn promise "in the presence of God and of this congregation," and it's a promise which had already been made for you once before—when you were baptised. Because you were then too young to have any idea what it was all about, your God-parents made the promise in your name and so became responsible for seeing that you were brought up faithful to the things that were promised—and that when you were old enough, you should take over the promise for yourself. That's the promise you make at your Confirmation.

It is a promise about how you're going to live. I don't suppose you have thought much about that so far—as a child one takes life very much as it comes, and doesn't bother much as to what it's all about. But that won't do as one grows up. You can't just drift along, without any idea where you're going, or even where you want to go. Sooner or later, you have to make up your mind what you think life is for, and what you're going to do about it. And that's exactly what you do when you're preparing for Confirmation. In our preparation we try to find answers to questions such as these: (1) How much does religion matter? And what am I going to do about it? (2) How much part should God play in my life? (3) What things am I going to try to develop in myself and what am I going to try to get rid of? And Why? (4) Am I going to get all I can out of life? Or put all I can into it?

I don't see how a girl or boy can go through life without answering questions like these. I know lots of people don't answer them—but they have to live somehow, and the way they live is really the answer they give to them, without thinking them out.

If, after careful thought and prayer, you decide to join the preparation classes, please hand to me before the 31st July, your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your Baptism. I hope to commence classes on Tuesday, August 5, for boys, and on Thursday, August 7, for girls; both classes being held at the Rectory, commencing at 7.15 p.m. It is most important you should attend **regularly**.

On this occasion he dealt with the city of Winchester and his comments were greatly appreciated by members. At the previous meeting we had the pleasure of a visit from an old member, Doctor Louis Jabour, of Casino. Opportunity was taken to hear of the Doctor's experiences since leaving our active ranks many years ago. Mr. Don Frame wrote to the Institute regarding his impressions of Gilgandra, and whilst regretting this member's temporary absence from our meetings, we look forward to the time when he will be able to resume his active association with the Y.C.I.—L.C.C.

Personal.—It was with deep regret that we learned of the tragic loss of Richard James Hoseason, at Heard Island, on May 26. In a letter written to his mother, giving a detailed account of the tragedy, the Director, Antarctic Division, says: "Apparently the seas which caught the three men developed rather suddenly. The manner in which each man in turn went fearlessly to the aid of the others in the struggle against the breakers provides a bright light in an otherwise dark and grim story." Alec Forbes, who made a gallant attempt to reach the Station after Dick Hoseason had gone, died from exposure.

When the writer first knew Dick he was a small boy, of about seven or eight, in the Sunday School. Later he joined the choir and he was confirmed here in 1938. He became a wireless operator, and a particularly good one, for whatever Dick took up he did well. He left for Heard Island with the Australian Antarctic Research Expedition last February. In such high regard is he held by his colleagues at Overseas Telecommunications, that they have offered to place a mural tablet to Dick's memory in All Saints' Church, and this, we hope, will shortly be erected.
