THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

26th April, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints',

It is with feelings of deep gratitude that I am able, once again, to write of our Easter Day Services. I would place on record our thanks to **ALL** who contributed in any way to this great Festival of our Church. Particularly would I mention the service of the choir members who by their loyalty and consistently good work rendered no small part in the inspirational character of our Easter Services. White flowers were somewhat scarce this year, but good use was made of those we had; and though not so much decorating could be attempted, the result was none the less pleasing and artistic.

The Easter message came to us this year with redoubled intensity. The time through which we are passing is not unlike the first Good Friday, when the powers of darkness seemed to have triumphed. Once again the powers of darkness are abroad in the earth, and most of us have our moments when we stand, like those disciples around the Cross, mourning over the cruel triumphs of wickedness. What we need is the faith to believe that the darkest night will pass, that righteousness will triumph, and that, at long last, victory remains with truth and goodness. All through the New Testament you may trace this unwavering faith of the early Church. However dark the night of trial and persecution the disciples lived and worked in the certain hope of victory. That is why we may face the present in the same confidence: the night will be long and very dark, but we may believe that the cause of righteousness will emerge triumphant. When loved ones do not return from the struggle, and the night of sorrow overtakes us, it is the pledge of the first Easter morning that gives us courage to go on again in patience and quiet hope.


Yesterday at our Easter services we were remembering that Anzac Day has its religious significance and has its place in the things of the spirit. The Anzacs live in the memories and hearts of those who love and care, and they live, too, in the life and consciousness of the nation. Those great words, which, centuries before Christ, Thucydides, the Greek historian, places in the mouth of Pericles, the Athenian Statesman and General, as he spoke the memorial address for the Athenians who died for their city, are equally apt and applicable on Anzac Day: "So they gave their bodies to the Commonwealth, and received each for his own memory praise that will never die . . . They live on, woven into the stuff of other men's lives." The ideal, the cause for which these men died in the last war is woven into the very stuff of our national life, but, alas, not into the **whole** of it. If we **really** want to attain to these ideals—the ideals of freedom and peace—we must be prepared to make some sacrifice for them; and it is quite useless to observe Anzac as a Day of Remembrance unless we are prepared to make it also a Day of Resolution—resolving that, insofar as we are able, we will face up to the problem of our personal relationship with God, and our Christian relationship with each other; that is, that there shall be a renewal of personal religion. The Anzac spirit still lives, and while it lives it will help to keep the way open for advance in Christian discipleship which a victory for our enemies would go far to close. But when that way has successfully been kept open, we still have to advance along it, and we shall not do that unless we dedicate ourselves to the doing of God's will.

A little story came to me in an unexpected way to-day, and I pass it on to you for its simple directness and truth. A certain prominent politician whom we will call Mr. X, visited a country town a long, long way from here, and the people rolled up in force to hear him. When next a few of them went to Church, the Roman Catholic priest attacked his

flock with words something like these: "Sure, ye'll roll up in your best to hear the promises of 'Mister X, but ye won't come on Sunday to hear the promises of One who can KEEP them!" I said to the man who told me the story, "That's very true, but it doesn't apply ONLY to Roman Catholics."

I would remind you of two great Festivals of the Church falling within the next few weeks. Ascension Day (June 3) comes before another "Chronicle" will reach you, and Whitsunday, June 13. Ascension Day is not recognised by many people, even by many Church people, yet it ranks with Easter and Whitsunday in the Prayer Book, having proper psalms and a proper Preface in the Holy Communion Service.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

Added to this, Mrs. Day is kindly arranging the musical programme, and the ladies are providing a delectable menu. Now, as you all have lunch somewhere, why not have it with us on **Tuesday, May 11**, at the Parish Hall? Tickets are 1/6 each, and may be had from Guild members or at the Rectory.

District Visitors.—As we close another financial year, a special word of commendation is due to our District Visitors who render an unspic-tacular but worthy service to their Church year by year. For the year ended 31st March, 1943, they collected £272/16/- for the General Fund, and £46/16/9 for the Assistant Clergy Fund, making a total of £319/12/9, which is a record. We mention these figures **not** because they form the main feature of a District Visitor's work; but because they represent much patient service on the part of the Visitor, and show the value of small amounts **regularly given**. The District Visitors render a fine service in keeping in touch with parishioners, in welcoming newcomers to the parish, in reporting cases of sickness or trouble of which the Rector may not know, and in generally assisting him in a way that cannot be computed in terms of money.

Parish Hall Fund 1943.—Seven years ago we said "Good-bye" to the annual fete for our Parish Hall debt, and no one has regretted it! We substituted the system of collecting boxes which are issued on Easter Day. The lateness of Easter, 1943, means that we have three weeks' less time in which to work before the boxes are returned on the day of our Consecration Festival—August 15. Therefore, it is essential you should obtain your box **NOW**. May we again point out to our younger people that this effort concerns them equally with their seniors. Through the various parochial organisations the young people derive much profit and pleasure from the use of a spacious parish hall, and it is only right that they should shoulder at least **some** of the responsibility of paying for it. Please note that moneys collected in this way do **not** go to general church expenses: they are devoted wholly to our parish hall commitments. If you have not yet taken a box, ask for one at Church, or ask your District Visitors to get you one, but please, "**Do it now!**"

All Saints' Sunday School.—A number of the Children's Lenten Missionary Boxes were returned at their service on Easter Day and we must congratulate them on their efforts. The amount received was £12/10/8, which is over £2 more than last year, although there are still some boxes outstanding.

We would be pleased if the parents would remind the children to return these boxes as soon as possible so that the money can be sent on to the Australian Board of Missions.—D. E. Muldoon, Hon. Sec.

Ascension Day.—There will be a celebration of Holy Communion on Ascension Day—June 3—at 7.30 a.m. and Evening Prayer with Intercessions and an address at 7.45.

A.B.M. NEWS SHEET. Missionary Heroes from Papua.—It is with a deep sense of thankfulness to God that we report the safe arrival of the Bishop of New Guinea and Archdeacon Romney Gill in Australia. Archdeacon Gill was at Mamba when the Japanese invaded that part of the North East Coast of Papua.

The Bishop is in Australia for a short term only and mainly for consultation purposes.

Both the Bishop and Archdeacon were present at the great Missionary Rally held in the Town Hall, Sydney, on Monday, March 8th, when the Bishop gave a survey of the events of the past few months beginning with the evacuation of the Mission Office at Samarai to Dogura, until the invasion of Gona.

Three things still standing at Gona as seen by a chaplain were taken by the Bishop as symbols. A large Cross, the doctor's house, and a beautiful red rose in bloom. The Bishop urged that the Cross should be lifted high and its arms stretched to take in all peoples of the world. The doctor's house represented the medical work of the mission, and the red rose, the flower of Christian education.

The Bishop spoke of the missionaries who had laid down their lives: "They saved others, themselves they could not save." He also told of the destruction of mission property, churches, hospitals and dispensaries, and of the urgent need to replace these by bigger and better buildings. Money was needed urgently. Papua had helped to save Australia from invasion. The people in Australia owe a tremendous debt to Papua and her people. Are they prepared to share in the tremendous privilege of Reconstruction.

To-day, in Papua a great door and effectual is opened unto the Church in Australia. Shall we accept the challenge?

Youth Service.—His Grace the Archbishop is arranging for a special Youth Service (as part of the Empire Youth Movement) to be held on Sunday, May 16, at 3 o'clock. This service is for all young people 14 years of age and over. The Rector will be grateful if he might be advised as soon as possible how many young people from this parish will be attending. Will leaders of all young people's organisations please make this service known, and obtain the required information?

Camouflage Nets.—The garnishing or scrimming of twine camouflage nets is a new and urgent job for voluntary workers. The National Defence League has been asked by the military to garnish in future, as well as make, the twine camouflage nets so that these nets will go to battle areas ready for immediate use. This work is very interesting and it is vitally necessary for the men in the forces.
