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PREFACE

THIS devotion enables all who are present to take an active part, both in what is said and in what is sung. A words edition is available for the use of the congregation.

Each of the seven sections contains an anthem and a hymn. It is not intended that both of these should be used throughout : they are, in the main, to be regarded as alternatives, the proportion between them being decided according to local conditions.

If a hymn is not known by the congregation it may be sung by the choir alone, or another may be substituted.

It is suggested that the collection be taken at the doors after the service, and that this, with any other points of detail, should be announced before the service begins.

Transposed up a tone, and note values halved. The words are from 'Lydney's Prayers', which form a section of Henry Bull's *Christian Prayers and Holy Meditations*, 1568. This anthem has been attributed to Richard Farrant, but his name was never associated with it till late in the 18th century. The earlier MSS. agree in ascribing it to the elder John Hilton, of Trinity College, Cambridge, and there is no good reason to doubt that he was the composer. The contrapuntal Amen which has sometimes been printed at the conclusion, is not found in any text older than the beginning of the 18th century; it was probably first composed and added at about that date.
