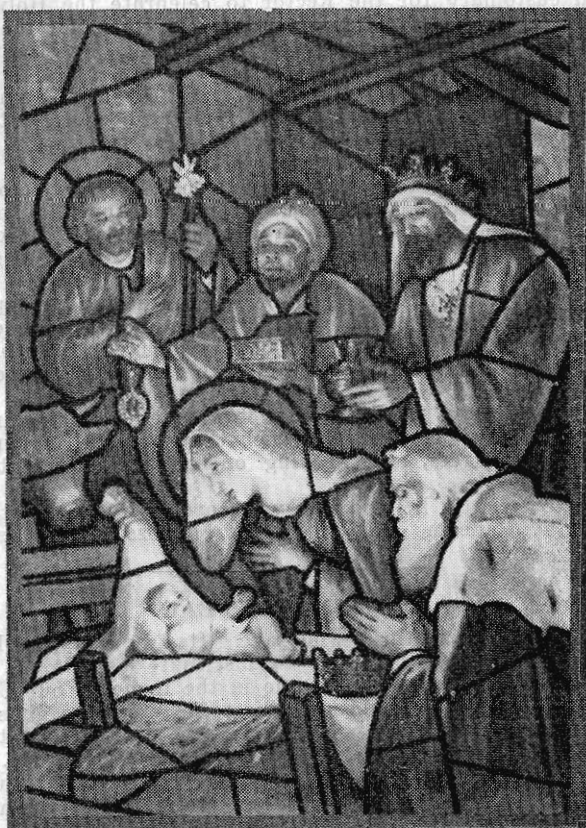

EXPANSION OF HOSPITAL SERVICES

Hospital services in the parish will be expanded in 1962. It has always been customary for the Rector to celebrate the Holy Communion at Christmas and Easter at each of the hospitals, but the past year has seen a growth in this vital ministry, spearheaded by groups of young people from All Saints' Church.

On August 13th a hospital service was held at "Otama" private hospital, in Fort Street. The service took the form of a shortened order of Evening Prayer. The Rev. D. Cobbett, who is now on missionary service in Korea, gave a short address on "Faith."

The success of this service prompted the group to continue the service monthly at different hospitals. A message on "Joy and Peace" was given at "Armon" rest home on November 26th. December 10th saw yet another service at "Roann" private hospital in Morgan Street, at which our parochial Lay Reader, Mr. K. Grant, spoke.

In those hospitals where a service of this nature is impracticable, the "Chronicle" is presented to each patient along with some words of comfort, and other practical help. Those who have been contacted by the chaplains of the large city hospitals are also being visited in their convalescence.

The scripture says: "Religion that is pure and genuine in the sight of God the Father, shows itself by such things as visiting orphans and widows in their distress, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world."

"OVER THE FENCE"

Mrs. Critic sat reading the Church notices in the newspaper when she noticed a reference to "The Epiphany". She thought that this was indeed a strange name, and made a mental note to ask her neighbour, Mrs. Loyal what it meant. Mrs. Loyal goes to Church and she thought she would know all about it. Just as Mrs. Critic was putting the paper down, Mrs. Loyal came in to borrow a cup of sugar, as she had run short and was wanting to make a cake.

"Mrs. Loyal," said Mrs. Critic, "I've been reading the Church notices, and I see that early in January, they have the Feast of the Epiphany. What is it all about?"

"Oh", said Mrs. Loyal, "the word Epiphany is Greek and means 'Manifestation'; on the night when the Christ Child was born, it is said that the Wise Men or Shepherd kings of Arabia saw a large star in the east, and they believed it was the sign that a new king was born. They decided to follow it, and it led them first to Jerusalem, and then on to Bethlehem. It must have taken some days for the Gentile Kings to reach Bethlehem, so the Early Church fixed the date as 6th January, and the Feast is kept up each year on that date.

"The Greek Church does not observe 25th December as we do, but makes much of 6th January when the Christ Child was revealed to the Gentiles. In some years, the season of Epiphany is longer than others. In our Prayer Book, there are Collects, Epistles, and Gospels for six Sundays after the Epiphany, so when Easter is late, we need all these, but when Easter is early, like it was in 1961, we may only use three of them"

Mrs. Critic seemed very interested and said, "why is Easter at a different time each year?"

Mrs. Loyal replied, "Easter Day falls on the Sunday following the full moon coming after the 21st March. A lunar month is only four weeks, while our calendar months have anything from 28 to 31 days. Easter is always fixed by the moon, so sometimes we have it in March, and sometimes in April."

"By the way", said Mrs. Critic, "where do we get the name Easter from?"

Mrs. Loyal told her that it was originally a goddess named "Eostre" who was worshipped in Britain, and whose festival happened about the time of the vernal equinox; the name is probably derived from the same root as 'East' signifying 'to shine.'

Mrs. Loyal continued, "Easter as we know it was originally an observance of the Hebrew Passover Feast, when the Paschal (suffering) lamb was killed and its blood sprinkled on the door posts and lintel of every Hebrew home in Egypt, and the angel of death passed over and spared the inmates. You can read about this in the twelfth chapter of Exodus. Jesus Christ became our Paschal Lamb and gave His life for us."

"Thank you very much" said Mrs. Critic "for explaining this to me. I am sure many would like to hear what you have said."

LENTEN MISSION

In each Rural Deanery of the Diocese of Sydney during Lent, a week-end has been set aside for Conferences of Clergy and lay-workers. The purpose of these Conferences is to deepen the concern for Evangelistic outreach throughout the Diocese, and their title will be, "Mission in Depth for the Church—Mission in Breadth for the Community."

We are situated in the Petersham Rural Deanery, and our Conference will be held from Friday evening, 9th March to Sunday, 11th March. The Ven. H. M. Arrowsmith will be leader of our Conference, but the exact Church within the Rural Deanery at which the meetings will be held, is still to be announced.

It is proposed that Clergy, Church Officers, Sunday School Teachers, and other parishioners interested in putting a new thrust into Evangelism throughout the Diocese, should attend the Conference.
