**All Saints' Church.**—The necessary renovations of the Church are being undertaken gradually by the Wardens. Considerable repairs have been necessary to make the roof watertight and when they have been shown to be effectual the interior must be taken in hand. At present damp stains and discoloration make the walls very unsightly and the east-end much needs renewal. It is intended to have the work completed by the middle of August when the Jubilee will be celebrated. If anyone desires to place any memorial in the Church the present is a most suitable time for doing so.

**All Saints' Church.**—The annual social gathering of parishoners will this year be held in connection with the celebration of the Jubilee and will take the usual form of the Tea-meeting followed however by a more social arrangement than usual. The first meeting to make the necessary preparations for this Parochial Pleasant Evening will be held in the Vestry of All Saints' on Wednesday 13th July at 8.15, after Evensong. As there will be, this Jubilee year, more to undertake than usual, we earnestly ask all who can do so, both ladies and gentlemen to attend this first meeting of preparation.

**C.E.M.S.**—At the last meeting the members were much interested in the sketch of the history of the Parish given by the Rector, and in the various documents which were shewn to illustrate the history. In view of the jubilee of the first service held in Petersham the meeting asked the Wardens to prepare some plan of making a permanent memorial of the event. It was suggested that a new and substantial fence and gates in Stanmore Road would form a suitable memorial. The next meeting will be held on Monday 11th July at 8 p.m. in the School Hall when a paper will be read by Mr. Williamson on Holy Communion.

**The Church Choir.**—The Rector and Choirmaster would be glad to add to the strength of the Choir which is at present somewhat weak in tenors and basses, not through any inefficiency in those who compose it, but simply through lack of numbers. We are at the present time especially in need of three or four tenors, and again take the opportunity of appealing to the members of our congregation who are gifted with musical voices to earnestly consider why they should not offer themselves for this work. If God has given them good voices and a certain amount of ability to what better use can they turn their gifts than leading the praises in God's House! We do not wish any to join who cannot sing in tune, or have not sufficient ability to read music of the simpler sort, *i.e.* chants and hymn tunes, or cannot attend the services and practices regularly, and who would not aim to behave in general as good and consistent Churchmen should do. But we believe there may be members of our congregation who have all these qualifications, and yet hesitate to come forward to help in the Choir, or who have not perhaps considered the matter before. We are glad to know that there are those who, from their places in the body of the Church, help considerably in the singing, and we do not wish our services simply confined to the Chancel. On the contrary, we desire to promote good congregational singing and chanting, and to this end we have repeatedly urged our people to provide themselves with the Cathedral Psalter and Church Hymns with music, and to attend the practices. But good congregational singing and chanting requires a good efficient choir to lead, and we therefore would ask those who would endeavour to fill up the vacant places in the Choir stalls and assist in making our services bright, reverent and hearty, and help our Choir to retain the good name it has enjoyed in the past, to communicate with the Clergy or Choirmaster at the Choir Vestry on Thursday evenings between 7.15 and 7.45, before Practice. The Choir Secretary, Mr. F. Quick, "Ardesia," Belgrave Street, Petersham, will be glad to give any information that may be required.

**Choristers' Outing.**—On Saturday afternoon 21st May the Choir Boys had an enjoyable outing in a four-horse drag kindly provided by Arthur C. J. Wood Esq., brother of the Choirmaster. The boys were accompanied by the Curate, the Choirmaster and others, and after an enjoyable drive had afternoon-tea at Coogee, which was kindly provided by the ladies of the Choir. A vote of thanks was accorded to Mr. Arthur Wood for his kindness in providing the drag, and to those who had helped to make the outing such a pleasant one.

**Ladies' Handiwork Society.**—This Society is an effort made by the ladies to assist the Wardens with Church funds. It is proposed to meet monthly and to do work of various kinds—plain sewing, fancy work, artistic work, Church embroidery,—for the annual sale or for orders that may be received. The work will mainly be done at home, and the business of the Society, the reception of finished articles, and the distribution of fresh work will occupy the time at the monthly meeting. Mrs. Martin of St. Clements' Rectory, Marrickville, has kindly promised to attend the first meeting on Tuesday 19th July, and explain the working of a similar society working in the Marrickville Parish. The Ladies' Committee cordially invite the ladies of the parish to be present on that occasion in Class Room of School Hall.

**All Saints' Church Council.**—At the quarterly meeting on June 27th, which was well attended, the celebration of the jubilee of the Church of England in this parish was considered at some length, and eventually the meeting adjourned till Monday 4th July when the Wardens have promised to present required information for the guidance of the Council. At this adjourned meeting it is hoped that every member of the Council will be present, as the success of the commemoration of the jubilee depends in great measure upon the unanimity with which it is entertained and prepared for.

**Mothers' Union.**—There was a fair attendance of members and other mothers at the last monthly meeting of the Union. An address was given by Mrs Radford, which was highly appreciated, on the vocation of womanhood and motherhood. It was shewn that this vocation involved a call from God and a response from us and that there was much in the restlessness and pleasure-seeking of modern life in the decay of the sympathy, simplicity and discipline of home to prevent the realization of God's vocation. It was pointed out that religion is the salt of the home, that the means of grace of prayers, church-going, Holy Communion, Sunday observance tended to preserve the purity and stability of home and that the religion of the home, depended upon the way in which women and mothers recognised that they had a call from God and tried to "walk worthy of the vocation wherewith they were called."

**All Saints' Sunday School.**—The Conference of Teachers of this School, held in January, was felt to be so useful that it was agreed to hold a similar one at a future date. This is now arranged for Tuesday 26th July. We hope that both the gentlemen and lady teachers will take a note of the date and keep the evening disengaged.
