THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
21st February, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

One of the advantages of a Harvest Thanksgiving is that it serves to remind us that we should be continually relating our religion to what we call the ordinary things of life. At the Annual Harvest Festival we are reminded that the God we worship is the God of Nature, and that what we call the ordinary processes of Nature, which reach their climax at harvest time, are, in fact, miracles of God's working. Harvest Thanksgiving will never fail, because it renders thanks to God for the fruits of the good earth. It provides a healthy corrective to much of our modern thought by reminding us that man is utterly dependent upon his Maker.

We record our sincere thanks for ALL our parishioners who co-operated in making our Harvest Festival so successful. Particularly are we grateful to those who decorated the church so beautifully; to the choir for its effective work in the Service of Praise, which is so important a factor in such services; and to those who sent the many useful gifts, which included a fine response from the Kindergarten and Senior Sunday Schools at their own service. We appreciate, too, the practical help of Mr. A. H. Thomas and his helpers in transporting our gifts to the Home of Peace after the Evening Service, where they were very gratefully received. We would like to have seen more people at the morning services, but that was the only disappointment in an otherwise happy day of real thanksgiving. Gratitude has been called "the clue to successful living": some of us have not yet found the clue!

This letter is written at the beginning of Lent, when we are challenged once again to look into our own lives to see whether we are really fighting all that leaves God out, or whether we are taking the line of least resistance and just following the crowd. We who live in 1953, who have seen vast realms of new knowledge made available for man; who have seen so great an enrichment of the material side of life; we, who, in the light of all these privileges, **ought** to be able to see the glory and grandeur of God as no generation has ever yet seen them, are largely failing to see God in it at all, which accounts in no small measure for the unhappy state of our world.

We hope you will make use of the opportunities your Church provides for the proper observance of Lent and Holy Week, which commences on Palm Sunday, March 29, and includes Good Friday. Once again we protest against everything that mars the solemnity of this, the most sacred day in the whole year. What right have we to call ourselves a Christian nation when we permit the day on which our Lord was crucified for us and for all men to be used as a day devoted to pleasure and material gain? In this issue you will find details of the services arranged for Holy Week and Easter Day.

Lenten Boxes and Envelopes for our self-denial offerings have already been issued. All our Lenten gifts received in this way are given for the work of the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Notwithstanding the needs of our own parish—and this year they are very great—I trust we shall not fall behind with our Lenten gifts for the missionary work of the Church.

We commend to you the Jubilee Fund (launched on Christmas Day) for church renovation. The first need is a new church roof which will be a very costly job. We do need the utmost support and co-operation of every Anglican family in the parish and all our friends. May we count on YOUR help? If you are a church-goer you will obtain the special box for the Jubilee Fund when next you come; if you are not, ask your District Visitor, who will gladly procure one for you.

The next "Chronicle" will be issued on Easter Day. Gifts of white flowers for the Festival will be very acceptable and should be left at the Church or Rectory on Saturday morning, April 4.

With all good wishes for a holy, happy Easter.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

The next Sewing Day at the Home will be Monday, 9th March, and we hope many will attend as there is plenty of work to be done. Reunion of Confirmees.—His Grace, The Archbishop, will take a Reunion Service in the Cathedral for all who have been confirmed either during the past year or in previous years, on the Monday evening in Holy Week, **March 30th**, at 7.45 p.m. The Rector hopes that many of the young people from this parish will be present at that service.

Sunday School.—On the morning of Sunday, February 15th, a large number of boys and girls were seen converging on All Saints' carrying various objects, some wrapped in paper and some unwrapped. These objects were many kinds of fruit and vegetables, eggs (yes, eggs despite their high cost), and all manner of groceries, all being gifts for the Children's Harvest Thanksgiving Service.

The artistic manner in which our church was decorated, the display of produce, the singing of the Harvest Hymns, the story of "Big Bill the Blacksmith," the big attendance of scholars and the presentation of the gifts, all combined to make a very happy service and impressed on all that in the words of the well-known hymn: "All good things around us are sent from Heaven above." We wish to thank the scholars for their splendid effort and also thank parents for their co-operation.

Lenten self-denial boxes have been issued to scholars and we trust that parents will encourage their children in this effort to help on the work of missions.—R. F. ATKINSON, Superintendent.

Y.C.I.—The Forty-second Annual Meeting of the Y.C.I., which is the men's club of the Parish, was held in the Institute's Club Room on Friday, 20th February, 1953. The Rector, who is our president, was chairman, and there was a large attendance of members although the weather was unfavourable. The Hon. Secretary's Report disclosed that, despite many discouragements, the syllabus had been carried out in its entirety and the spirit of good fellowship was ever present. "Our most important gathering is the Annual Communion Service at St. Andrew's Cathedral followed by a Corporate Breakfast. This year's service will be held on Sunday, 15th March, at 8.30 a.m. and the speaker at the Breakfast to follow at C.E.N.E.F. will be Mr. Justice Athol Richardson of the Supreme Court of New South Wales."
