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WORLD COMMUNITY DAY, 1981 "PRAYER, PARTNERSHIP  
AND PEACE".

This service was prepared by the Catholic Women of Tasmania. It is hoped this service will bring blessings and will challenge women to pray and strive for peace. The project chosen, "Korean Atomic Bomb Victims from World War 2," should also strengthen us in our quest for peace.

The National Meeting of Australian Church Women for 1981 has come and gone, but what a wonderful time it was for those of us who had the privilege of attending. From the very first moment of our opening worship service, to the final handing-over ceremony, every moment we were conscious of the presence of the "Spirit of God upon us." In this Presence we were able to receive Spiritual uplift, have wonderful fellowship with each other and perform our business very amicably.

Here are a few excerpts from reports given at the council meeting of A.C.W. (Vic. Unit) following this National Meeting.

Rev. Chris Mostert stirred our minds at the opening worship session, to think about the words of Isaiah, who, because he felt compelled to speak to the exiled people with great words of hope, their God had not forsaken them. He would redeem them, and the Presence of the Spirit who is the very origin of their faith, would govern and direct their future paths.

We, who are living in that same world, so many years after are privileged to see the fulfilment of that promise in the advent of the redeeming Lord and the gift of the Holy Spirit in all His comfort and power.

The Spirit drives the Church into mission, this is God's will for us and we need to remember that without a mission, we are not His church. Aust. Church Women, I believe has a real part in that mission.

Prayer, Praise and Partnership were very evident in all our worship sessions. Praise was highlighted by gifted musicians, it was also translated into body movement by a group called the Story-tellers.

Honar Yearsley, an Anglican lay reader, in her Bible Study used verse 3 of Isaiah 61 to highlight the imagery of prose that runs through the Scripture -

1. To give beauty for ashes
2. The oil of joy for mourning
3. The garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness
4. The trees of righteousness
5. The planting of the Lord that He might be glorified.

The third day, Athlea Sansom used Romans 8 - the first 8 verses as the basis of our group discussion.

To summarize the studies - the Spirit who came upon Isaiah and Jesus, anointed them to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim the release of captives and the recovery of sight to the blind and to bring liberty to the oppressed.

The Church betrays her Lord and ignores her driving spirit if she neglects this commission; if she is not concerned with the poor, the oppressed and powerless, the exploited "pushed around" people of our society.

Driven by the Spirit have we, as the Australian Church Women, anything to say which will have the capacity to sound as "Good News?"

I think we can accept this challenge with the triumphant note of the final chorus:

"HALLELUJAH - HE IS KING - HE IS LORD"

THEMES FOR SPECIAL DAYS FOR 1982

<u>Fellowship Day</u>	"Co-Workers in Christ for Renewal"
<u>World Community Day</u>	"Women Dare, Women Care, and Women Act".

At the National Committee Meeting in Hobart the Victorian Unit conducted the final night's devotion and their president, Mrs. Doreen Gordon, gave the following message:

"THE SPIRIT OF THE LORD IS UPON ME".

On a previous trip to Tasmania I had been delighted with the vast lavender fields, and fragrance that was produced from its blooms. Theme - In my minds eye I saw through a mauve haze the lingering, haunting, refreshing fragrance given off by the lavender as symbolic of the Spirit of the Lord upon his people.

... My mind turned to Mary of Bethany who broke her alabaster box and poured her pound of spikenard, upon the Master's head and feet, so that its fragrance filled not only all the room but all the ages since.

I set myself to find out all I could about lavender. I discovered 20 species, evergreen, grew in different types of soils. Although rather nondescript in form and appearance yet it has survived the centuries and claims our attention today because of a unique quality - its pervading perfume. (fragrance).

The true value and beauty of the bloom is only fully apparent AFTER submission to cutting, crushing, distilling and blending under the expertise of a master blender.

**MY GREATEST DISCOVERY.** One form of lavender is used for distillation of an essential oil which is known as the oil of spike. There is every possibility that this oil of spike was used in the ointment Mary used with such lavish abandon to anoint Jesus.

#### **"TO WHAT PURPOSE?"**

Three of the four Evangelists record Jesus anointing at the feast of Simon the leper only a few days before His death (Matt. 26; Mark 14; John 12). Only John, however, discloses that it was Mary of Bethany who broke her alabaster box and poured her pound of spikenard, very precious, upon the Master's head and feet, so that its fragrance filled not only all the room but all the ages since.

Somehow Jesus' teaching about His coming death had penetrated Mary's tender heart more deeply than the hearts of His other friends. She brought the costliest thing she had, and with it her total devotion, even her very life itself, to anoint Him beforehand for His burial. Mary was not among those other women who prepared spices later to embalm the Saviour's dead body; her perceptive love had already poured itself out in fragrant incense upon Him while He was yet with her.

And for her insight and self-giving she was sharply criticized.

All three Gospels recount the disciples' cry of indignation; "To what purpose is this waste?"

"To what purpose?" has ever been asked of those who abandon themselves to Christ. It must have been the thought uppermost in the minds of the desolated disciples at Calvary. It must have existed in the minds of millions who have watched Love's sacrificial giving by the myriad Martyrs, known and unknown, who have poured themselves out for God in the centuries since, with this thought Satan must have tried to tempt the widows of the five young men who died by Auca spears in recent times. "To what purpose is this waste?"

But Jesus rebuked the disciples and accepted Mary's sacrifice as an act of priceless worship; and so He accepts sacrifice today.

For what men see as loss, God sees as eternal gain.

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
