

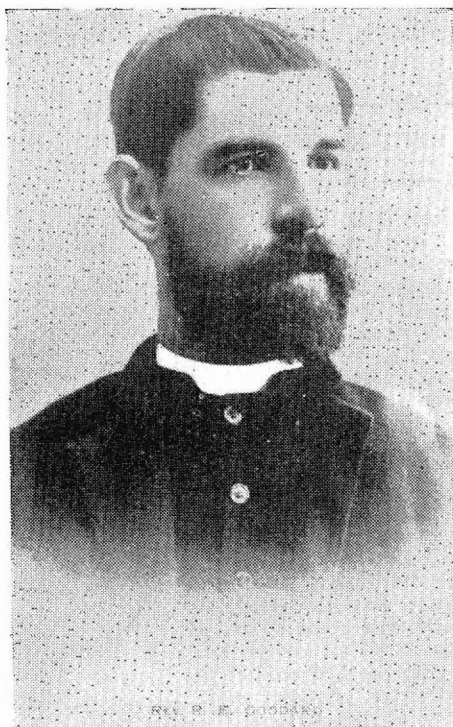

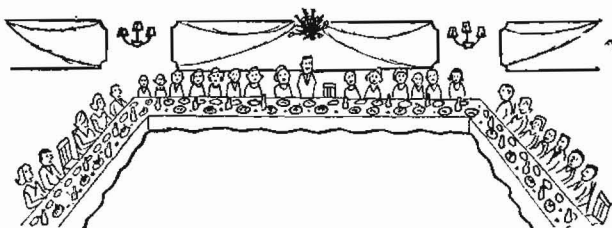

Special Services and Parish Tea

When the Reverend Canon R. E. Goddard became Rector of All Saints' in 1895, he soon realised that the debt on the church building was not only depressing to the parishioners, but a serious hindrance to the progress of the parish. He launched a campaign which culminated in a Golden Offertory on Sunday, 18th January, 1903, the success of which was reported in our Parish Paper of the following month:

"At the close of evening service, the large congregation, including many who usually attend the morning services only, sang several appropriate hymns during the collection of the Offertory, which the Wardens counted in the Vestry before it was presented at the Holy Table. With unfeigned pleasure, the Rector announced that the offering for the day exceeded by £95 the amount required to remove the debt. The Te Deum was then sung most impressively."

The debt being lifted, the Church became eligible for consecration, the ceremony of which was performed by Dr. Stanton, Bishop of Newcastle, on Saturday, 15th August, 1903. At the same time, various memorials were dedicated including a stained glass window, marble steps to the Sanctuary, and oaken Sanctuary rails on brass standards.

The Consecration of a Church is thus an important milestone in its history, and we at All Saints' commemorate it each year with special services and the annual parish tea.

Consecration Festival Services

These will be held on Sunday, 17th August. Please note that the mid-morning Family Service will take place at the special time of 10.30 a.m., when our Guest Preacher will be the Rev. W. V. Payne, Director of Counselling Services for the Home Mission Society. This work covers adoptions, the courts, new housing areas, and provision for spiritual and material comfort to those in need and trouble. Mr. Payne will be well worth hearing, and we hope for a large congregation for this special service.

The Rector will preach at the 8 a.m. and 6.30 p.m. Services on this Sunday.

Parish Tea — Friday, 15th August

On the Friday night before these Services, our annual Parish Tea will be held in the Parish Hall. There will be a hot meal at 6.15 p.m., Community Hymn Singing with introductory organ recital in the Church at 7 p.m., and a Social Programme in the Hall at 8 p.m.

Mr. David Hunter, M.L.A., who will be known to you as a most enjoyable speaker, will tell of his recent round-world trip to represent the Parliament of N.S.W. at the Commonwealth Parliament Association meeting in the Bahamas.

We cordially invite all parishioners, past parishioners and their friends to join us at this popular social event. Meal charges will be 50c. for adults, 25c. for children. Although this means the first increase in price since 1957, you still could not get a better hot meal anywhere in Sydney for twice this charge!

Visit of Canon R. E. Goddard

Last month, we were pleased to have a visit from Canon R. E. Goddard, grandson of the former Rector referred to above. The present Canon is a London Rector and a Chaplain to the House of Lords at Westminster. In the Rector's absence on holidays, the Canon was shown around All Saints' by Rev. A. H. Gallop, and reported that he was most impressed by the many improvements that had been made,

Further details of the history of our lovely parish church can be read in "The First Hundred Years" published in 1960 to mark the centenary of the first Anglican service in this district. Copies of the history, written by the late Mr. L. C. Calver, may be obtained on application to the Rector.

THE BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

THE EPISTLE TO THE HEBREWS



This Letter, unique in the New Testament, gives us no indication who wrote it, or indeed, to whom it was written. The suggestion that the Apostle Paul was the author is a late one and nothing in the earliest manuscripts of this Letter indicates that it comes from the hand of Paul. Many suggestions have been made as to who the author was, but they remain at the best, informed guesses.

We are in almost the same ignorance when the question is asked to whom was the Letter written. The title "to the Hebrews" is again absent from the earliest manuscripts and appears no earlier than the third Century.

The more productive questions are along the lines, why was this Letter written, and what is its message.

The only evidence lies within the Letter itself and New Testament scholars suggest several lines of approach to answer the question. In general terms, it is held that this Letter was written to prevent Jewish Christians from abandoning the Gospel and returning to the faith of their fathers. The Letter also urges the readers to break with an Old Testament past and to enter fully into the new Faith and to embrace its world mission to the nations.

Alongside these lines of thought there is the clear teaching of the Epistle of the absolute superiority of Christ and his achievement over every other form of religious activity.

We see this clearly illustrated as we turn to the Letter itself. In the first ten chapters it sets out the superiority of Christ in every sphere. First, He is demonstrated, from the Old Testament Scriptures, to be superior to the angels who occupy so prominent a place in the then current Jewish mythology. After this, His superiority over the great Jewish leaders Moses and Aaron is argued in chapters 2 and 3. Then His ascendancy over the whole Jewish system of priesthood is argued through chapters 5 to 7 and lastly, the New Covenant and the final sacrifice of Jesus is shown not only to transcend the worship of the Old Testament but also shown to be effective and relevant for all men everywhere. Chapters 10, 11 and 12 give us some of the most powerful writing in the New Testament on the examples and the achievement of Faith.

The Letter ends with words of personal encouragement and instruction to its readers. Like other Letters in the New Testament, the errors that this Letter seeks to correct may not be the errors of our time, but the answers that it gives are eternal and form an integral part of total theology of the New Testament.

As this Epistle ends, it speaks of a Kingdom that cannot be shaken and we may well find this the greatest message of this Letter for our time, as we give thanks for the unshakeable Kingdom which we have inherited, which endures when all other things, it seems, in our day are being shaken before our eyes and beneath our feet.

"OF SPECIAL INTEREST"

● **Confirmation, 1969:** The preparation class is now being held at the Rectory each Wednesday evening at 7 p.m.; the Rector hopes for the regular attendance of all enrolled. In addition, those who are in either the Extension Group or Sunday School must also attend each Sunday morning for the additional tuition being given in these classes.

● **Evensong:** Our Sunday evening services will start at 6.30 p.m. throughout August, but will revert to 7 p.m. as from Sunday, 7th September.

● **All Saints' Centenary:** The centenary of the present All Saints' church building will be marked by celebrations extending from November, 1970 (when the laying of the original foundation stone will be commemorated) to October, 1971 (the 100th anniversary of the actual completion of building). The Parish Council's Steering Committee has put forward a varied list of events appropriate to the Centenary year, while it is hoped that all organisations will also play an active role in this great year. In particular, we hope that it can lead to an increase in our congregations and a return to the greater scale of parish activities that we were privileged to enjoy in former years.

● **Movement of Anglicans:** Speaking of falling numbers, the Rector of our neighbouring parish of Holy Trinity, Dulwich Hill quotes some interesting figures which we believe apply similarly to Petersham. Until recent years, he had some 2,000 Anglican families, but due to people moving out, this number has fallen to 520. In fact, he has been approached three times in the last two years to sell Holy Trinity to another community which seeks a Church in Dulwich Hill! In Dulwich Hill as in Petersham, it will take the faithful support of all parishioners to maintain the Church in a realistic manner while there is still time.

● **Education Sunday:** All parishioners, and particularly schoolchildren and their parents, are invited to attend All Saints' Education Week Service on Sunday, 10th August at 11 a.m. A special form of service will be used, and our speaker will be Miss J. A. Richardson, Inspector of Schools. Miss Richardson spoke at the recent Guild Luncheon and the Rector is sure that her message will be an appealing one to both young and old alike. He hopes for a good congregation.

Due to the special form of service, Holy Communion will not be celebration at 11 a.m. on 10th August.

"A DYING CHURCH"

A MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHBISHOP

Dear Friends,

You will be aware that the State Government has decided to hold a referendum in September or October on the question of Sunday hotel trading. This is a decision which should be applauded by all who have expressed concern about the possible course of further legislation in connection with the liquor laws.

There should now be no question of Government-sponsored legislation for which the voting public has not given a clear mandate.

The fact that a referendum is to be held gives us all the opportunity to register our own view on this question. If the majority is in favour, the minority must recognise that they do not carry enough weight to influence the decision. If the majority is not in favour, the minority must recognise that they are not justified in seeking to change the law.

I can only say that for my own part I hope the result of the referendum will be a resounding NO.

Bishop Hulme-Moir is President of the Committee for Responsible Liquor Reform which has been set up by the N.S.W. Council of Churches to lead the campaign against the opening of hotels on Sunday.

May I urge your support of the campaign and the Committee's request for assistance. The Standing Committee at its meeting last month

voted a sum of \$1000 to assist the Committee, but it is looking for much wider support from local Churches of every denomination.

New members are always welcome, there are prizes, and afternoon tea is provided. Your donation is voluntary and we can assure you of a pleasant way to spend an afternoon.

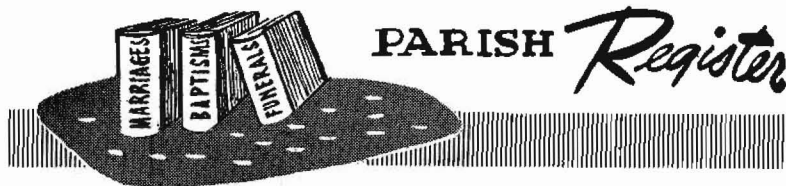
