## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,  
27th September, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints' —

A feature of modern Church life is the attention given to the training of the young. The Christian Church no longer regards the child as one that has to be kept out of the way, lest he should become troublesome. It welcomes him cordially, and like its Master, ever seeks to place the child "in the midst." The children are the Church of the future. When a few more years have come, the place which knows us now will know us no more; who, then, but the children will do the work we do? As someone has said, "The nation marches forward on the feet of little children."

During the month of October and as we approach All Saints' Day, we bring the children and young people of the parish prominently before you, as the most interesting and most valuable disciples in the Church of Christ. There is a tremendous amount of work expended on behalf of the young, and it is often hindered by the indifference of parents, especially with regard

to the religious education of the child. There can be no joy equal to the joy of parents whose children voluntarily choose the good; and no sorrow like that which comes to parents whose children prefer the evil. Admittedly, we cannot **compel** goodness; but we can help to induce it, wherever we are given an opportunity to do so, and the need for regular, systematic religious education of the children was never more clamant than it is to-day.


On Sunday, October 24th, we have our annual Children's Festival, followed by the Children's Festival Tea on Monday, the twenty-fifth. In addition to the ordinary work of the Sunday School, much additional religious instruction is given in this parish in the four large day schools, where girls and boys (from kindergarten to high-school standard) are taught each week; and we have a right to expect that **ALL PARENTS** will have sufficient interest in their children, and in what their Church is doing for them, to attend, without fail, at least one of the Services arranged for the Children's Festival.

Before the issue of the next "Chronicle," the Sacred Rite of Confirmation will have been administered on Sunday morning, October 31st, and I specially invite the parents and friends of the Confirmation Candidates to be present at that service. Where it is possible the Godparents of the Candidates should also be invited, in order that they may have the joy of witnessing the Confirmees taking upon themselves the responsibilities which their Godparents accepted for them in infancy. The newly confirmed will make their First Communion at the early Celebration on Sunday, November 7, which is within the Octave of our Patronal Festival, and for which special services are being arranged. They are also expected to be present at the Communion Breakfast after their First Communion. On page eight you will find full details of the services and music for our Festival Sundays. It is anticipated that all loyal All Saints' people will be present.

As in former years, I hope all those young people whom I have had the privilege of preparing for Confirmation will accept this special invitation to be present at the Celebration on November 7, both as an **Act of Remembrance** of their own Confirmation and First Communion, and also as an **Act of Fellowship** with those young people who will then be entering into full membership of the Church.

It is almost twelve months ago since I was able to report the receipt of generous donations for our Kindergarten Hall. We hoped it would be an accomplished fact by now, but we have not yet sufficient funds in hand. I suggest we make the month of October a special "drive" for Kindergarten Funds. There must be numbers of parishioners who have not yet contributed to this fund. Send or bring your donations to Mr. Pattison or myself, but please "do it NOW!"

#### MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

**Women's Guild.**—The Quarterly Rally of the Guild on 14th September was most enthusiastic, and was largely attended. It was the members' annual Grocery Afternoon for the B.C.A., and the response was most gratifying. Miss Ashe was the guest of the afternoon, and she spoke on the work of the B.C.A., dealing especially with the Kirkby Memorial Hospital at Cook.
