THE REVEREND JOHN BASKIN

The Rev. John Baskin, who died on 10th December last at the age of 58, was ordained in the Diocese of Goulburn, in which he served the greater part of his ministry. He served as a Chaplain with the 8th Division during World War II., and afterwards in India until 1948.

Mr. Baskin came to Sydney in 1964 where he had Authority to Officiate and helped with the parish work of St. Basil's, Artarmon.

The funeral service was conducted at St. Basil's by the Bishop of Canberra and Goulburn, who paid tribute to his work as a pastor and chaplain who greatly endeared himself to his people.





Coincidentally, Mrs. D. Jones, who was first to sign the book, also had charge of the Fancy Work Stall, which came first in the list of Fete takings.
