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PREFACE.

In the Directory will be found some important Acts of Parliament and Ordinances of Synod which will prove of interest to all Churchmen, and of especial value to those holding any office in the Church. It would be well, therefore, if the Churchwardens of each parish would purchase copies for the use of the Clergy and Church Officers.

"The Church of England Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902," together with the Amended Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church, the "Sydney Church Ordinance of 1912," and a guide to the conduct of Annual Vestry Meetings thereunder, and the Presentation Ordinances of 1895, 1912 and 1919, have been included.

The Acts relating to property held upon trust for the use, benefit or purposes of the Church of England in Dioceses within New South Wales, and the Acts conferring powers upon the Synods with reference to such property, having been declared to be "numerous, ambiguous, and discursive," it was resolved to obtain an Act of Parliament to consolidate and amend the same. This Act, known as the "Church of England Trust Property Act 1917," will be found in the Directory. The Act is not to apply to the Diocese of Newcastle until the Synod of that Diocese shall make an Ordinance declaring a desire to have the benefit of it.

The Directory also contains lists of the names and addresses of all clergymen officiating in Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand, Melanesia, British New Guinea, and Polynesia.

Alterations have recently been made in the Regulations regarding Faculties for alterations in Churches, the erection of Memorials, etc. The Regulations, approved by the Archbishop in Council, and Instructions and Regulations relating to other matters, will be found in the book.

A volume containing all Ordinances of Synod in the Diocese up to 1907 has been published, and may be had at the Diocesan Registry, price five shillings ; postage additional, threepence halfpenny within the Commonwealth, one shilling and a halfpenny elsewhere. The Ordinances passed since the volume was published may also be obtained at the Diocesan Registry.

The Church of England in Australia and Tasmania.

THE story of The Church of England in Australia and Tasmania forms an exceedingly striking chapter in the history of the Anglican Church. In a Directory of the Mother Diocese it is impossible to present more than the barest statement of facts, but even that will give plain indications of rapid growth and substantial consolidation.

The Rev. Richard Johnson landed in Port Jackson with the "First Fleet" in 1788, and it is recorded that on the Sunday after the landing Divine Service was performed under a great tree. Dr. Arthur Bowes, surgeon of the "Lady Penrhyn," states in his diary that this Sunday was 3rd February, 1788, and on the first Sunday in February in each year a Church Service is held as near as possible to the historic spot in Macquarie Place. A movement is now on foot to commemorate the event by the erection of a memorial on the site of the first Church in Australia, which was erected by Mr. Johnson at the corner of Bligh and Hunter streets. In 1794 Mr. Johnson was joined by the Rev. Samuel Marsden, well-known for his good works in Australia, better and more widely known still as The Apostle of New Zealand. In 1809, some years after Mr. Johnson returned home, the Rev. William Cowper arrived as Assistant Chaplain. In those early days the growth of the Church was slow, the Clergy were increased very gradually, and not sufficiently in proportion to the increase of population, so that in 1833 a population of 61,000 had only 16 Clergy. In 1825 the Ven. Thomas Hobbes Scott had been appointed Archdeacon of Australia within the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Calcutta. He was succeeded in 1829 by

Archdeacon Broughton, who, after seven years of arduous and devoted work, was consecrated first Bishop of Australia. At the time of his consecration there were 17 Churches and Chapels in the whole of Australia, and the Clergy were very few in number, but from the commencement of his episcopate down to this year of grace, 1920, the history of the Church has been a history of steady growth and vigorous development. At the present time (exclusive of New Zealand, which was nominally part of Bishop Broughton's charge), the one Diocese of Australia has given place to 24. The little handful of Clergy who in early days toiled so bravely for the Church amid so many difficulties has grown into a band of upwards of 1,500. Stately Cathedrals already form the centres of Church work and Church organization in many of our Dioceses, and neat, and in many cases handsome, Churches are found in both town and country parishes of our land. Not that native Australian Churchmen have worked out these results by their own unaided efforts; the Church in Australia looks with loving reverence and affection to the Mother Church in England for the fostering care which has, from time to time, given us some of the best of her sons to preside over our Dioceses; which has so generously, from time to time, replenished the ranks of the Clergy with devoted men, and which, especially through the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge, the Colonial Bishops' Council, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society, has practically endowed the Church with large sums of money to enable her the better to carry on her work. To the first-named society a debt of gratitude is owing, which can never be repaid, for the generous support both in money and Clergy rendered throughout the first century of our Church's existence in this country, and it is in no forgetful or ungrateful spirit that the Church rejoices now in her increasing ability to find among Australia's sons candidates for the ministry, among her Australian Clergy "godly and well-learned" men for her episcopate, and in the strength of a vigorous maturity, opportunity to do her part as a missionary Church, not only to her own people, but to the heathen in her midst and in the adjacent isles of the Southern

Seas, and even in the far-off mission fields of the Orient. May it be her privilege ever to enlarge the place of her tent, to lengthen her cords, and strengthen her stakes, and so break forth on the right and on the left, that her seed may inherit the Gentiles, and make the desolate cities to be inhabited.

It has long been realized amongst Australian Churchmen that as the years pass by we must rely more and more upon ourselves for men for the Ministry, and for the higher offices in the Church, and our ability to do this is increasingly evident. During the past year out of twenty-four Dioceses in the Commonwealth of Australia, three became vacant. The Diocese of Newcastle lost its fourth Bishop by the lamented demise of the scholarly John Francis Stretch, LL.B., D.D., and has been fortunate in securing in his place Bishop Reginald Stephen, translated from Tasmania. Bishop Stephen was a brilliant scholar of the Univ. of Melbourne (Trin. Coll.). The See of Tasmania has been filled by the election of the Very Reverend Robert Snowdon Hay, of Hatfield Hall, Durham, who, after some years' work in the Province of Queensland, became Dean of Hobart in 1916, whilst the See of Bendigo, vacant by the resignation, after twelve years' arduous work, of Bishop John D. Langley, has recently been filled by the election of the Rev. Donald Baker, who was ordained Deacon and Priest in the Diocese of Sydney, and who after about three years' work in Sydney went to St. Matthew's, Cambridge, returned to Sydney in 1912, and has since been working in Sydney and Tasmania.



Special Services for Various Occasions.

The undermentioned Special Services, prepared by authority of the Bishops in Australia and Tasmania, are in use in this Diocese :—

1. Order of service to be observed on laying the Foundation or Corner stone of a Church.
2. Order of service for the Consecration or Solemn Dedication of Churches.
3. Order of service for the Institution or Induction of a Priest to the Cure of Souls.
4. Order of service on occasion of Special Intercession for Missions.
5. Order of service for Consecration of a Cemetery.
6. Special Burial service approved for use in cases in which the regular office for the burial of the dead cannot be, or is not, used.

The undermentioned services are also in use in this Diocese :—

1. Form of service for use at Confirmations, with Special Hymns approved by the Archbishop.
2. Office for the admission of a Deaconess.
3. Office for the admission of a Lay Reader.
4. Form of service of admission into membership with the Church of England of those who have been members of some other Church organization.
5. Order of Service for Dedication of an Enlargement of a Church.

Functions of Rural Deans.

RURAL Deans occupy a most important position in Diocesan life.

They are representatives in this Diocese of the Archbishop. They represent the centralizing principle in its economy of small detail.

They undertake such work as the Archdeacons are unable to fulfil, often assisting the Archdeacon at his request, or at the request of the Archbishop, to consider the various problems that are constantly arising in our widely-scattered field of Church life.

In contrast with the work of the Archdeacons, Rural Deans contribute the particularized and localized knowledge, and can devote attention to the progress of work which the Archdeacons can, as a rule, consider only in general outline.

The Rural Dean reports to the Archbishop, except in such cases as the Archdeacon has been deputed to act for him.

Some of the functions of the Rural Deans may be codified as under :—

1. To act with the Archdeacons as an informal Council to the Archbishop.
2. To assist the Archbishop in making arrangements for the Confirmations needed in the Rural Deanery, and where possible to attend him at the Confirmation.
3. To assist the Archbishop in conducting enquiries as to difficulties reported from districts in his Rural Deanery.

4. To keep a vigilant eye and to report *proprio motu* upon such matters as provision of new sites, formation of conventional districts, condition of fabrics in church buildings, etc.
5. To see that all buildings are properly insured, and the premiums regularly paid.
6. To secure careful return of statistics from parishes of the Rural Deanery, and, in particular, to stimulate regular payment of parochial assessments.
7. To take such steps as may be needed to secure, so far as is possible, proper religious instruction of Church children in State Schools.
8. To report upon any matters appertaining to the welfare of the Church in the Rural Deanery.
9. To hold Ruri-Decanal Chapters ; but it is not desirable that the cost should fall upon the Rural Deans. A small contribution from the members or parishes would meet the case.

The Archbishop proposes to appoint Rural Deans for a limited period only, though always with possibility of re-appointment. He is of opinion that the office should be held by those alone who are equal to the fulfilment of its responsible duties.



THE RURIDECANAL CHAPTER.

1. The Ruridecanal Chapter shall consist of :—
 - (a) All Clergymen and Catechists licensed in the Diocese, who are resident within the Rural Deanery, or whose sphere of work lies within it.
 - (b) Lay Representatives in such numbers as may be arranged in each Rural Deanery by the Rural Dean and clergy,
 - (c) The Rural Dean, at his discretion, can call a meeting of the Clergy only.

2. The objects of the Ruridecanal Chapter shall be :—
- (a) The edification of the members, and the promotion of religious education within the Rural Deanery and throughout the Church.
 - (b) The proposal of such measures for the sustentation and extension of the Ordinances of religion and of Church organisations as may seem expedient.
 - (c) The encouragement of bringing together Clergy and Laity for devotion, study, and discussion of ecclesiastical questions of current interest.
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Confirmation.

THE Archbishop will endeavour to hold Confirmations once a year for all the City and Suburban parishes; and will arrange for Confirmations in the Country districts, from time to time, as may be most convenient to the Country Clergy.

The Archbishop issues the following instructions as to Confirmation, and hopes that all concerned will attend to them:—

- (1.) The age of the persons to be confirmed should (as a rule) be not less than fourteen years. Clergy desiring to present candidates under that age should write beforehand to the Archbishop, giving particulars.
- (2.) Lists containing the names and ages of the candidates, signed by the presenting clergyman, should be ready for submission to the Archbishop before the Confirmation, and should be either given to the Archbishop or sent to the Diocesan Registry immediately afterwards.
- (3.) According to old custom in the Diocese, a collection is made at the Confirmation service, and the offerings of the congregation are devoted to "The Church Society," now known as "The Home Mission Society."
- (4.) It is the express wish of the Archbishop that the Clergy will urge upon all female candidates for Confirmation that the dress used upon the occasion should be simple, and not of a nature to distract the attention either of the candidate or of the congregation. Girls should wear a proper Confirmation cap. A small bow will not be deemed sufficient.
- (5.) The Archbishop also desires that every candidate should be provided either with Prayer-book and Hymn-book, or with a printed form of Confirmation Service* sanctioned by the Archbishop; and that care should be taken to provide proper kneeling accommodation for each candidate.

Instructions to Candidates for Holy Orders.

ALL persons intending to be Candidates for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Sydney will be expected to show such evidence of personal godliness, and of sincerity of motive in seeking to enter the Christian ministry, as the Archbishop may deem fit to require, previously to technical examinations.

Candidates who are not graduates of a recognised University, and graduates who have had no Theological training, must (as a general rule) have passed through a course of instruction either at Moore College, or at some other Theological Institution approved by the Archbishop, before they will be accepted.

The Archbishop will judge of exceptional cases on their merits as each case arises.

Candidates for Ordination (either to the Diaconate or to the Priesthood) must send in their applications to the Archbishop not less than *three months* beforehand. A paper of questions will then be sent to the Candidate, who will fill it up and return it to the Archbishop as soon as possible.

Papers to be transmitted to the Diocesan Registry, George-street, Sydney, *at least one month previous* to the day fixed for Ordination, are as follows:—

(a) BY CANDIDATES FOR DEACON'S ORDERS.

1. Certificate of Baptism.
2. Letters Testimonial from authorities of the University or of the College where the Candidate has studied.
3. Letters Testimonial* from three beneficed or licensed Clergymen of the Church of England, of not less than three years' standing from their Ordination. If any of the subscribing Clergymen are not in the Diocese of Sydney, the counter signature must be obtained of the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Clergyman is beneficed or licensed.

4. *Si quis*,* or notice to be read in the Church of the place where the Candidate is resident five weeks before the day of Ordination, and attested by the Officiating Minister and at least one of the Churchwardens.

Nomination* to a Curacy.

(b) BY CANDIDATES FOR PRIEST'S ORDERS.

1. *Si quis*.*

2. A special testimonial from the Incumbent under whom the Deacon has served, testifying to the manner in which he has behaved himself in his Diaconate, and that he is worthy to be called to higher ministries in the Church.

3. Letters Testimonial* from two other benefited or licensed Clergymen as above prescribed (a 3).

4. In the case of a Deacon who has not served as a Curate, Letters Testimonial from *three* Clergymen, qualified as aforesaid, will be required, or the special personal approval of some Bishop. No Candidate for Priest's Orders from another Diocese will be admitted without the concurrence and sanction of the Bishop in whose Diocese he has served as Deacon.

Officiating Ministers.

NO PERSON TO OFFICIATE UNLESS DULY LICENSED.

By the 17th Section of the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," it is ordained that "No person shall be permitted to celebrate Divine Service, administer the Sacraments, perform any other Rite or Ordinance of the Church of England or preach any sermon in any Church unless he be first licensed or approved by the Archbishop."

INSTITUTION OR INDUCTION.

When a Minister is licensed to a Cure, he should arrange with the Archbishop as to Institution.

The "Order of Service for the Institution or Induction of a Priest to the Cure of Souls" * prescribes that "upon the Sunday next preceding the day appointed for the Institution, the following notice shall be read during the time of Divine Service, and a copy of the same placed on the Church door:—

"Notice is hereby given that on next
at o'clock, Divine Service will be held in this
Church, and the Reverend publicly
instituted to the Cure of Souls in this parish. The
Parishioners are invited to be present, and to join
in prayer to Almighty God for a blessing on his
ministry.'"

Curates, Catechists and Lay Workers.

Forms of nomination may be obtained on application to the Registrar, Diocesan Registry, George-street, Sydney.

RESIGNATION.

Clergymen and Lay Workers holding the Archbishop's license, on giving up the appointment to which they have been licensed, should forward to the Archbishop a formal resignation, in order that the fact of such resignation may be duly recorded in the Register.

Instructions to Lay Readers.

INSTRUCTIONS TO LICENSED LAY READERS OTHER THAN LOCAL LAY READERS.

1. In reading the Service, the Lay Reader is not to use the "Absolution," or the "Blessing," at the end of the Communion Service; but may use

(a) Instead of the "Absolution," the Collect, "O God, whose nature and property," &c., or the Collect for the 24th Sunday after Trinity.

(b) Instead of the "Blessing," the following: "The Lord bless us and keep us: the Lord lift up the light of His countenance upon us, and give us peace, now, and for evermore. Amen."

2. If the Ante-Communion Service is read by a Lay Reader, the Archbishop prefers that, as a matter of order, it should be read from the Prayer-desk, and not within the Communion rails.

3. In cases of special emergency, the Lay Reader is authorised to baptise Infants; but in all such cases notice should be given at once to the Incumbent, or, when a Cure is vacant, to the Archbishop's Chaplain for the Lay Readers.

4. If the Baptism takes place in the Church, the Office of Public Baptism of Infants may be used, with the omission of the words (in the fourth of the short prayers after the Questions and Answers), "whosoever is here dedicated to Thee by our office and ministry," for which shall be substituted the words, "he [*or she*] who is now dedicated to Thee in Holy Baptism."

5. In case of illness of the child, or of Baptism not in the Church, the Ministration of Private Baptism should be used, beginning with the Lord's Prayer, to be followed, when possible, by the first Collect in the office of Public Baptism, and the four prayers, "O Merciful God, grant," &c., with the same alteration as above prescribed; after which should follow the formula of Baptism itself, the Thanksgiving, "We Yield Thee Hearty Thanks," &c.; and "The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ," &c.

N.B.—The Clergyman of the Parish (or, with the Archbishop's permission, some other Clergyman) should be requested to arrange afterwards as soon as conveniently may be for the public reception of the child, as provided for in the Prayer Book.

6. In cases of special emergency the Lay Reader has authority to use the Service for Churching of Women, and the Burial Service, provided that in such case notice is given at once to the Incumbent, or, when a Cure is vacant, to the Archbishop.

7. The Surplice should, as a general rule, be worn by the Lay Reader when officiating in Church. The Reader may also wear such tippet, or other badge, as may from time to time be authorised by the Archbishop; and if the practice of the Church is to use the cassock, the cassock may also be used.

8. The Lay Reader may assist a Clergyman in the conduct of Divine Service when the Clergyman, in the absence of clerical aid, desires such assistance.

9. Lay Readers are permitted to preach from manuscript or otherwise, on obtaining a license from the Archbishop to do so.

Instructions regarding Local Lay Readers.

1. The Incumbent of a parish wishing to recommend a person for the office of Local Lay Reader, may obtain the necessary forms of Application and Certificate from the Registrar of the Diocese.

2. The Incumbent is required to certify that, having made due enquiry, he believes the person recommended to be a Communicant, of pious, sober, and honest life, sound in the faith as held and taught by the Church of England, and of competent knowledge of the Holy Scriptures; and further to personally testify to his ability to read aloud, with distinct voice and in an edifying manner, the Services of the Church.

3. The Incumbent should transmit the above forms duly completed to the Archbishop's Chaplain for the Lay Readers, together with a private letter giving such information for the use of the Archbishop about the person recommended as the Incumbent deems desirable; *specifying the duties he wishes the Reader to perform*, and supplying the Chaplain with the names of two or more Communicants who are ready to testify to the character and fitness of the proposed Reader.

4. The Reader nominated must be ready, if so desired by the Archbishop, to submit to examination.

5. The Reader may, subject to the direction and approval of the Incumbent, read prayers and read the Holy Scriptures in the Church or in other places within the parish, and generally render aid to the Incumbent in all ministrations which do not strictly require the services of a Minister in Holy Orders.

6. The Reader is only allowed to officiate ordinarily in the parish in which he is licensed, and during the Incumbency of the Minister by whom he has been recommended; but in cases of emergency he may officiate in another parish, each case of this sort to be forthwith reported by the Reader to the Chaplain, who will communicate it to the Archbishop.

7. The Reader, when giving up the appointment to which he has been licensed, should return his license to the Registry, and must relinquish his work and return his license when requested by the Archbishop to do so.

Instructions regarding Women Workers.

All Women Workers who are paid, wholly or in part, for their services from Diocesan Funds, must hold authority from the Archbishop, and must have their names registered at the Diocesan Registry.

Women Workers shall be classified as Parish Helpers, Bible Women, or Deaconesses.

The title DEACONESS is to be used in the Diocese of Sydney by those only who have been set apart by the Archbishop with the Laying on of hands.

PARISH HELPERS AND BIBLE WOMEN.

A Rector who wishes to have payment from Diocesan Funds for the services of a Woman Worker in his Parish must submit her name to the Archbishop in writing, certifying that she is a Communicant member of the Church of England, and testifying to her fitness for the work ; at the same time he shall specify to the Archbishop the sort of work he wishes her to undertake.

The Rector of the Parish employing such worker shall inform the Archbishop in the case of her ceasing to work in his parish, and shall at the same time return the Archbishop's authority to the Diocesan Registry.

The Archbishop's authority may be revoked at his own discretion.

DEACONESES.

A Candidate for the office of Deaconess must be nominated either by the Superintendent or Chaplain of the Church of England Deaconess' Institution, or any other Institution approved by the Archbishop, or by the Rector of a parish who is desirous of using her services.

Every Candidate must produce Certificate of Baptism, and must also supply the Archbishop with the names of two or more Communicants, who can testify as to her character and fitness.

In nominating the Candidate to the Archbishop, the Superintendent or Chaplain of the Deaconess' Institution, or the Rector of the Parish, as the case may be, shall specify in writing the duties which he wishes the Deaconess to undertake.

In the case of a Candidate who has not been trained at the Deaconess' House, Newtown, or any other approved Deaconess' Institution, the Archbishop may require her to work for a period as probationer under the Rector who nominates her, before setting her apart.

Every Candidate may be required to pass such examination as the Archbishop deems necessary.

Each Deaconess set apart will be licensed to work in some position, parish, or district, and she will not be at liberty to undertake work in any other position, parish, or district, without the authority in writing of the Archbishop and the Rector of the parish in which she proposes to work.

Any Deaconess giving up her work, or leaving the Diocese, or removing to another parish, shall return her authority to the Archbishop; she shall also return it if required at any time by him to do so.

N.B.—The subjects for Examination will be, as a general rule, the following:—

- (1) General questions on the Old Testament.
- (2) General questions on the New Testament.
- (3) Questions on the contents and subject matter of the Book of Common Prayer and the Thirty-nine Articles.
- (4) Questions on Church History.

Building of Churches, etc.

By the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912" (sec. 10), it is ordained that all lands thereafter acquired for Church purposes shall be vested in the Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney. Under section 14 the approval of the Archbishop must be obtained for the position and the plans and specifications of all buildings intended for Church purposes before the erection thereof.

On the 15th July, 1884, the Synod passed the following Resolutions:—

"That with regard to every building intended to be used for a Church, Parsonage, School, or other Ecclesiastical purpose, it is desirable that before it is allowed to be reckoned or dealt with as such, a Certificate be obtained by the person or persons intending so to use it that such building is in point of legal title, architectural fitness, and other qualities, suited to be reckoned as part of the Church property of the Diocese."

"That the Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint a proper officer by whom, in consideration of a fee to be arranged for by the Bishop, the Certificate may be granted, such fee to be paid by the person obtaining the Certificate."

"That the Bishop, and also the Trustees and Managers of all funds from which aid is afforded towards the building of Churches, Parsonages, Schools, and other Ecclesiastical Buildings in the Diocese, be requested severally to take such steps as may be in their power to give effect to the foregoing resolutions."

The Archbishop will in all cases require the plans and specifications to be submitted to the Diocesan Building Surveyor, and a Certificate obtained from him that the proposed building will be, "in point of architectural fitness and other qualities," suited to be reckoned as part of the Church property of the Diocese. A copy of the plan must be lodged in the Diocesan Registry.

The Archbishop has appointed Mr. Burcham Clamp, 122 Pitt-street, Sydney, to be Diocesan Building Surveyor.

The arrangement with the Diocesan Building Surveyor as to fees is as follows :—

For works, alterations, additions, &c., costing less than about £100, the fee will be 10s. 6d.

For works between £100 and £500 in value the fee will be £1 1s.

For works exceeding £500 in value the fee will be £2 2s.

These estimates to be exclusive of the cost of the site.

No fee will be charged for the Certificate in any case where the Diocesan Building Surveyor is himself the Architect at the time when the Certificate is required.

It is also considered desirable that the evidences of title should be forwarded to the Diocesan Registry in order that the same may be laid before the Standing Committee.

Preparations in Order to the Consecrating of a Church.

WHENEVER it is desired to obtain the Consecration of a Church, application should be made to the Archbishop, who will fix a time for such Consecration.

The Title Deeds, if not deposited in the Diocesan Registry, should be forwarded to the Registrar of the Diocese, who will prepare the necessary petition.

The Church is to be furnished with Seats, a Font of stone, and a Communion Table, with Linen and Vessels for the same; also with a great Bible and Book of Common Prayer, a Reading Desk, a Pulpit and Cushion, and a Surplice.

An intimation of the Archbishop's intention to consecrate the Church, with the day and hour appointed, is to be affixed to the Church door at least three days before the day appointed for the consecration.*

Dedication of School Churches, &c.

IN the case of School-Churches and other buildings proposed to be used for Divine Service, but not intended to be consecrated, the Title Deeds, if not deposited in the Diocesan Registry, should be forwarded to the Registrar of the Diocese, and application made for the Archbishop's license for the use of such building.

In the case of Dedication of temporary buildings, it shall suffice to use the Service appointed for the consecration or solemn dedication of Churches down to the end of the prayer "O Eternal God," &c., with the Intercessions "Regard O Lord," &c., to the end of the prayer "Now unto the King.....for ever and ever. Amen."*



Preparations in Order to the Consecrating of a Burial Ground.

APPLICATION should be made to the Archbishop, who will fix a time for such Consecration.

The Title Deeds†, if not deposited in the Diocesan Registry, should be forwarded to the Registrar of the Diocese, who will prepare the necessary petition.

The ground must be securely enclosed with a paling or other sufficient fence, and gates, to prevent the intrusion of animals; and otherwise be put into decent order prior to the consecration.*

The Law relating to Baptisms, Marriages and Burials.

THE attention of the Clergy is directed to the Acts passed by the Legislature in 1899 relating to Marriage, and to the Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages.

A Clergyman desiring to celebrate a Marriage should be satisfied that his name is on the authorised list. (See Sec. iii (1) and Sec. xxi (1).

The following are the sections of the Acts above referred to which specially affect the Clergy :—

ACT No. 15, 1899.

An Act to Consolidate the Acts relating to Marriage.
[Assented to, 20th November, 1899.]

Persons authorised to celebrate Marriages.

Sec. III. (1) No marriage shall be celebrated except by some Minister of religion ordinarily officiating as such, whose name, designation, and usual residence have been and then continue registered in the office of the Registrar-General for Marriages in Sydney, or by a District Registrar.

Witnesses.

Sec. IV. Every marriage shall be celebrated in the presence of two witnesses at least.

Declaration.

Sec. V. (1) No marriage shall be celebrated unless and until each of the parties about to be married has made on oath, or solemn affirmation, before the Minister or Registrar celebrating the marriage, a declaration in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto.

Signing declaration.

Sec. V. (2) Such declaration shall be indorsed upon the certificate of marriage hereinafter prescribed, and shall be signed by each of the parties about to be married and by the Minister or Registrar.

Certificate.

Sec. V. (3) Every Certificate of Marriage shall be in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto, and every such certificate and every copy thereof shall have indorsed thereon the form of declaration set forth in the said Schedule, and at the foot of every certificate there shall be printed in red ink a note in the form of the said Schedule referring to such declaration.

Signing certificate.

Sec. V. (4) After the celebration of the marriage the Certificate of Marriage shall be signed by the Minister or Registrar and by the parties and by the witnesses.

Copy certificate for parties.

Sec. V. (5) Immediately after the marriage the Minister or Registrar shall deliver a copy of such certificate, signed by himself, to one of the parties to the marriage.

Essentials for valid Marriage.

Sec. VI. Every marriage celebrated by any such Minister or Registrar as aforesaid, after oath or solemn affirmation so made, shall be a legal and valid marriage to all intents and purposes, and no other marriage, except as hereinafter provided, shall be valid for any purpose.

Transmission of original certificate.

Sec. VII. Within one month after the marriage the Minister celebrating the marriage shall transmit the original certificate to the Registrar of the district within which the marriage was celebrated.

Registrar-General to supply forms.

Sec. VIII. The Registrar-General shall, at the public expense, furnish forms of marriage certificates, with the declaration indorsed thereon as prescribed by this Act, to every District Registrar of Marriages and to every duly registered officiating Minister.

IN THE CASE OF MINORS.

Consent in case of minority.

Sec. IX. If either party to any intended marriage not being a widower or widow is under the age of twenty-one years, such marriage shall not take place without production to the Minister or Registrar about to celebrate the same—

- (a) of the written consent of the father of such party, if within New South Wales, or if not within New South Wales, then of a guardian appointed by the father ; or
- (b) if there be no such guardian in New South Wales, then the written consent of the mother of such party if within New South Wales ; or
- (c) where there is no such parent or guardian in New South Wales, or he or she is incapable of duly consenting by reason of distance, habitual intoxication, or mental incapacity, then the written consent of some Justice of the Peace appointed for that purpose. Such Justice shall make inquiry on oath as to the facts and circumstances of the case before giving his consent.

Appointment of Justices to consent.

Sec. X. (1) For the purposes mentioned in the foregoing section the Judges of the Supreme Court shall appoint from time to time one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace in every Registrar's district, who shall by virtue of such appointment give consent in such cases as aforesaid.

Notification of appointment.

Sec. X. (2) Every such appointment shall be notified by the said Judges in the *Gazette*.

Consent to be indorsed on Certificate.

Sec. XI. When a marriage is celebrated upon the production of any such written consent as aforesaid a statement of the fact of such consent shall be indorsed on the Certificate of such marriage and on the copy thereof, signed respectively by the Minister or Registrar celebrating the same.

PENALTIES.

Minister celebrating Marriage when unregistered.

Sec. XXI. (1) Every Minister, or person officiating as such, who celebrates any marriage knowing that his name, designation, or usual residence has not been, or is not then, duly registered, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, being convicted thereof, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Pounds, either alone or with imprisonment not exceeding five years; or (2) If the omission was accidental or by inadvertence, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty Pounds, to be recovered by proceeding in a summary way before two Justices of the Peace.

Omission to transmit Certificate.

Sec. XXII. (1) Every Minister or person having celebrated any marriage who fails to comply with the provisions of this Act, or any of them, respecting the certificate to be transmitted to the District Registrar, shall be liable to a fine of not less than Ten, and not exceeding Fifty, Pounds, to be recovered by proceeding in a summary way before two Justices of the Peace.

Celebrating Marriage without complying with Act.

Sec. XXIII. Every Minister, District Registrar, or other person who celebrates, or professes or attempts to celebrate, any marriage in any case contrary to any of the provisions of this Act, or where any provisions or requirements of this Act have not been complied with, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, being convicted thereof, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Pounds, either alone or with imprisonment not exceeding five years.

Knowingly celebrating Marriage of a Minor without consent.

Sec. XXV. Every Minister, District Registrar, or other person who celebrates, or professes or attempts to celebrate, marriage in the case of any person under the age of twenty-one years, not being a widower or widow, without a written

consent as required by Section Nine hereof, knowing him or her to be under that age, or knowing that the consent produced is not by the appropriate person, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, being convicted thereof, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Pounds, either alone or with imprisonment not exceeding five years.

Affirmation instead of Oath.

Sec. XXVII. (1) Every person who objects to take an oath under the provisions of this Act may make in lieu thereof a solemn affirmation, or be examined, as the case may be, upon his solemn affirmation.

An Act to consolidate the Acts relating to the Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages. [Assented to, 20th November, 1899.]

Name given after Registration of Birth.

Sec. XXIII. (1) Where a name is duly given to a child at any time after the registration of its birth the parent shall, within seven days after the giving of such name, procure and deliver to the District Registrar in whose custody the register of the birth of such child then happens to be, a certificate according to the form in the Third Schedule hereto signed by the Minister or other person who gave such name.

Fee payable.

Sec. XXIII. (2) Such Minister or other person shall deliver the said certificate whenever demanded on payment of the fee of One Shilling.

Certificates of Deaths and Burials.

Sec. XXX. (1) Every District Registrar immediately upon registering any death, or as soon thereafter as he is required so to do, shall, without fee or reward, deliver to the Undertaker, or other person having charge of the funeral, a Certificate under his hand according to the form in the Sixth Schedule hereto that such death has been duly registered.

- (2) Such certificate shall be delivered by such Undertaker or other person to the Minister or officiating person required to bury or perform any religious service for the burial.
- (3) If any dead body is buried for which no certificate has been so delivered, the person who buries the same, or performs any funeral or religious service for the burial, or who in any other way disposes of the body, shall forthwith give notice of the facts to the District Registrar.
- (4) The Coroner or Magistrate holding an inquest or inquiry upon any dead body for which no certificate has been delivered as aforesaid, may order the body to be buried before registration, and shall in such case give a Certificate of his order in writing under his hand according to the form in the Seventh Schedule hereto to such Undertaker or other person having charge of the funeral.
- (5) Every Undertaker or other person who buries or otherwise disposes of any dead body shall forthwith cause to be transmitted to the District Registrar a Certificate thereof in the form or to the effect set forth in the Eighth Schedule hereto, countersigned by two respectable householders.

REGISTRATION OF MINISTERS FOR CELEBRATING MARRIAGES.

Sec. XXXI. (1) The Registrar-General, upon receiving from any Minister of religion ordinarily officiating as such a requisition that he may be registered as a Minister for celebrating marriages within New South Wales, shall forth with, without fee or reward, register the name of such Minister, with the particulars mentioned in Sub-section (3), in a register book, to be kept by him expressly for that purpose.

(2) Such requisition shall be in writing under the hand of the Minister making the requisition, or of the head of the denomination to which he belongs.

(3) Such requisition shall specify the name, religious denomination, designation, and residence of the Minister.

Changes of Ministers' Residence.

Sec. XXXII. Whenever any Minister so registered ceases to reside in the Registrar's district within which his registered, or last registered, residence was situated, or is not properly designated by the name or description so registered, he shall within three months next following cause his name and new residence or designation (as the case may be) to be registered anew with the Registrar-General, or in default thereof such Minister shall not be deemed registered within the meaning of the Marriage Act, 1899.

Registrar-General to furnish Books.

Sec. XXXV. The Registrar-General shall from time to time, at the public expense, furnish to every officiating Minister so registered books for the registry of marriages.

Minister may make inquiries regarding Marriages.

Sec. XXXVI. Any officiating Minister may ask of any person married, or about to be married, the several particulars required to be registered touching any such marriage.

Persons pretending to be Ministers.

Sec. XL. Every person who causes his name to be registered under this Act as an ordinarily officiating Minister of religion, he being at the time not such a Minister, and knowing himself not to be such, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and be liable to a fine not exceeding Two Hundred Pounds, or to imprisonment not exceeding two years.

Clerical Fees not prejudiced.

Sec. XLIII. Nothing herein contained shall affect the right of any officiating Minister to receive the fees now usually paid for the performance of any religious rite of baptism, marriage, or burial.

REGISTRATION OF BAPTISMS, MARRIAGES AND BURIALS.

At the Session of the Provincial Synod held in 1895, an Ordinance was passed making provision for the Registration by the Clergy of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials, and for other matters connected therewith. The Ordinance has been accepted by the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney, and, at the request of the Standing Committee, the Bishop has addressed a circular to the Clergy and Churchwardens throughout the Diocese, inviting them to take the necessary steps to carry out the provisions of the Ordinance, and drawing especial attention to the following matters:—

NOTE.—All necessary forms will be supplied on application to the Registrar General or the District Registrar.

The necessary books are to be provided at the expense of the parish, and are to be according to the forms in the Schedules to the Ordinance. It is the duty of the Minister to make the entries in the books. In the case of General Cemeteries, where books are provided by the Trustees of such Cemeteries, separate Registers will not be required. The Minister is to have the charge, and be responsible for the safe custody, of all parish Registers. During a vacancy in the Cure such custody and responsibility will attach to the Churchwardens, or, if there be no Churchwardens, then to some person appointed by the Bishop for that purpose. The Registers shall be the property of the parish. The Minister is authorised to make search in, and furnish extracts from, the Registers, and he is to be entitled to the fees payable for searches and extracts. The provisions of the Ordinance apply to all existing Registers.

In many cases the existing *Baptism* Registers probably meet the requirements of the Ordinance; if not, they can be made to do so either by inserting "No" at the extreme left of each entry, or by ruling a perpendicular line to the left of that which is now at the extreme left of the page, placing "No" at the head of the column so formed. The *Marriage* Register books supplied by the Registrar-General are all that are required by the Ordinance. With regard to *Burials* it may be necessary, in most cases, to provide new books. The Ordinance requires that the "*place of interment*" shall be recorded, and the present Registers will scarcely permit of this being done in a satisfactory manner.

Consolidation of Marriage Regulations.

APPROVED BY THE BISHOPS IN THE PROVINCE OF NEW SOUTH WALES, 1902.

FOR THE USE OF THE CLERGY.

We, the undersigned Bishops of the Dioceses in the Province of New South Wales, concur in laying down the following regulations concerning Marriage, and the Re-marriage of Divorced Persons.

MARRIAGES.

1. The time for celebration of Marriages shall be from sunrise until 8.30 p.m.

2. As a rule all marriages shall be celebrated in a Church, or accustomed place of worship. Exceptions to the rule may be made by written permission of the Bishop in cases where reasons of distance (three miles or more), or peculiar circumstances, to be notified to the Bishop, are by him considered to warrant the performance of the marriage elsewhere than in Church.

3. The Publication of Banns, or issue of Episcopal License shall, as a general rule, be required before celebration of a Marriage.

MARRIAGE OF A DECEASED WIFE'S SISTER.

We desire to say that, although marriage with a deceased wife's sister is recognised by the law of the State, this law imposes no duty or obligation upon the Clergy with regard thereto.* In the present state of Church law such marriage is forbidden by the Church of England.

*NOTE 1—Since the above regulations were issued, the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney has adopted the following:—

(1.)—That the table of kindred and affinity is not a part of the Prayer Book registered in the Archives.

(2.)—That the marriage of any person with his deceased wife's sister is valid and of full force and effect, if celebrated within the State.

(3.)—That the marriage of any person with his deceased wife's sister is not prohibited by the Holy Scriptures.

(4.)—That neither the contracting of such marriage by any person, nor the celebration of such marriage by any Minister, is in contravention of any law of the Church legally binding upon such person or Minister in this State.

*NOTE 2—It should also be noted that the marriage of a deceased wife's sister has now been made legal by Act of Parliament in England, notwithstanding the prohibition of it in "The Table of Kindred and Affinity" which stands in the Prayer Book. This fact seems to make it dubious whether a Bishop should absolutely forbid the celebration of such marriage in a Church where the Minister is willing to celebrate it.

RE-MARRIAGE OF DIVORCED PERSONS.

1. The Church of England recognises Divorce (as distinguished from "Judicial Separation") for ONE CAUSE only, viz., adultery.

2. No guilty party in a Divorce Suit may be re-married by a Clergyman of the Church of England.

3. No re-marriage of the "innocent party" in a Divorce Suit may be celebrated without previous reference to the Bishop of the Diocese, and no permission can be given for re-marriage, except where the Divorce is for the cause aforesaid.

MARRIAGE OF FOREIGNERS.

Circular issued to the Clergy of the Diocese of Sydney
by the Most Reverend the Archbishop, September,
1902.

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,—

The question as to the validity in Foreign Countries of Marriages celebrated in this Country between Foreigners, or between Foreigners and British subjects, has been brought under my notice, and I have been in correspondence with the various Consuls here with a view to ascertain the actual condition of the law with regard to such Marriages. I have also obtained copy of a Blue Book containing "Reports on the Laws on Marriage and Divorce in Foreign Countries," presented to the House of Commons by command of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in 1894.

The Reports therein contained indicate that Marriages between such persons will only be regarded as legal in the Country to which the Foreign parties belong, provided that the Marriage Laws of that Country have been strictly complied with.

With the view, therefore, of conserving, as far as possible, the sacredness of the Marriage tie, and protecting the Clergy from becoming parties to a Marriage which an unscrupulous person may be led to repudiate, I request that the Clergy will, in all cases where they may be requested to marry persons of Foreign nationality, require from such

persons the production of a Certificate from the Consul of the Country to which they belong that the requirements of the Marriage Law of that Country have been complied with.

Where one of the parties to any proposed Marriage is a Foreigner and the other a British subject, I would further request the Clergyman to whom application may be made to distinctly warn such persons of the serious consequences likely to ensue in the event of non-observance of the necessary legal requirements, and advise them to obtain the Consul's approval, by endorsement upon the Marriage Certificate, in order that, should the parties at any time go to reside in the Foreigner's Country, the Marriage may be duly recorded.

In Belgium, for instance, this record is required to be made within three months after the return of the Foreigner into his own Country. If a Married Couple should go from here to Belgium without the Marriage Certificate being first approved by the Belgian Consul resident here, it might not be possible to obtain such approval, and the further legalisation of the Consul's signature by the Minister of Foreign Affairs at Brussels, within the prescribed time.

The requirements in the various Countries are of such diverse character that it would not be possible, within the limits of an ordinary Circular, to give definite information to the Clergy with regard to the Marriage Laws of the various Countries. Full information on the subject may, however, be obtained on application at the Diocesan Registry.

MARRIAGE OF FOREIGNERS IN THE LONDON DIOCESE.

We have received, through the courtesy of Prebendary Glendinning Nash, Editor of the *London Diocesan Magazine*, a copy of the following Order by the Bishop of London in relation to the Marriage of Foreigners in the Diocese of London :—

“Marriages in England of Foreigners, or of Foreigners with British subjects, are, if performed in accordance with the requirements of English law, valid throughout the British Empire. But marriages in England of or with Foreigners will not be necessarily valid unless the legal requirements of the countries to which they belong are complied with.

“The Bishop is informed that every year cases arise in which English women, who have been married to foreigners in this country without complying with the marriage law of the country to which the foreigners belong, have been deserted or repudiated.

“The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has made an international arrangement under which the Consuls or other representatives of a foreign State in this country are required, on application, to ascertain if the legal requirements of the foreign State have been complied with, and to *furnish a certificate to that effect.*

“The Bishop, therefore, directs that where a foreigner, whose permanent residence is in England is a party to a marriage by banns, with an English subject, in the Diocese of London, the clergyman of the parish shall require, *before* the solemnisation of the marriage, the production of a certificate from the Consul of the country to which the foreigner belongs, that all the *legal requirements* necessary to the validity of the marriage in that country have been complied with.

The Bishop further directs that where *both parties* to a marriage in the Diocese of London are foreigners, or where one of the parties is a foreigner *without a permanent*

residence in England, the marriage shall be by license, which will not be granted unless the Chancellor of London is satisfied that there has been compliance with the law of the foreign country to which either belongs.

“The following is the certificate agreed upon between the British and French Governments with regard to mixed marriages in the United Kingdom between British subjects and French citizens, which the legal adviser to the British Ambassador in Paris considers will constitute a satisfactory guarantee against a repetition of the disastrous consequences which have hitherto, not unfrequently, been the result of mixed marriages:—

“The French Consul at _____ declares:—

“1. That French [citizens] cannot contract marriage without having previously published, in France, the notices of their marriage, and obtained the consent of their parents, or of other persons, as prescribed by law.

“2. That from the papers and documents produced:—

“(a) It results that M. [*insert surname, Christian names, and calling*], born at _____, on the _____, residing at _____, who proposes to contract marriage with [*insert surname, Christian names, and calling*], born at _____, on the _____, residing at _____, is of French nationality;

(b) That the notices of his [her] intended marriage, prescribed by the law of France, have been duly published at the domiciles specified by law;

“(c) That the intended husband has produced the papers [*here note them*] which establish, either that he has obtained for his marriage the consent of the parents, or other persons whose consent is required, or that the parents whose consent would have been necessary are deceased, or that ‘respectful summonses’ have been notified to the parents, which summonses serve instead of their consent. [*The Consul may note here from what persons the consent emanates.*]

“(d) That no opposition to this marriage has been raised up to this date, and that if none be offered up to the moment of the celebration of the marriage, the parties would be competent to contract marriage in France.

“The Consul declares, moreover, that marriage contracted in a foreign country between a French citizen and a foreigner is valid if it has been celebrated in accordance with the laws of the country, and provided :—

“1. That the legal notices in France and the [notifications of] consent exacted by law have preceded the marriage (Arts. 148 to 159 of the Civil Code).

“2. That the parties to the intended marriage be of the age required by law—*i.e.*, eighteen years for the bridegroom and fifteen years for the bride (Art. 144 of the Civil Code).

“3. That the consent of each of the parties have been absolutely free (Art. 146 of the Civil Code).

“4. That neither of the parties be bound by a previous marriage (Art. 147 of the Civil Code).

“5. That the intended marriage do not violate the prohibitions of marriage between relations within the forbidden degrees (Arts. 161 to 163 of the Civil Code).

“The Consul also declares that a foreign woman marrying a Frenchman becomes French through the sole fact of her marriage, and that the children issue of the marriage, even when born in a foreign country, are French (Arts. 12 and 312 of the Civil Code).

“In faith of which we have issued the present certificate, to be of all reasonable force and effect.

“The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has obtained reports on the Marriage Law in Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Chili, Denmark, Mexico, Netherlands, Portugal, Roumania, Russia, Servia, Spain, Sweden and Norway, Switzerland, and the United States. *The Blue Book* containing the reports is sold by Harrison and Sons, St. Martin’s-lane, and by Eyre and Spottiswoode, East Harding-street, Fleet-street, price 1s. 6½d., and the Bishop recommends all Incumbents within the diocese to obtain copies for reference.

“The list of Foreign Ministers and Consuls residing in London is published in *The Blue Book*, 1901, on pp. 61-70, and in *Kelly’s* and the principal London Directories.”

Alterations in Churches, Ornaments, Monuments, Faculties.

THE attention of Clergymen, Churchwardens, Parish Councils, and Church Committees is directed to sections 21 and 22 of the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," relating to alterations in Churches and the erection of Monuments therein, and to the subjoined Regulations regarding Faculties.

"SYDNEY CHURCH ORDINANCE, 1912."

Alterations, Ornaments and Monuments.

21. It shall not be lawful to make any alteration by way of addition or diminution in the fabric utensils ornaments or furniture of a Church or the internal arrangements thereof or otherwise howsoever nor to place any monument in any part of a Church save with the sanction of the Archbishop to be given by a Faculty or other form of permit provided that no such alteration utensils ornaments furniture or other things shall be permitted placed or remain in any Church nor in any such position therein as would be illegal in any Church of England in England.

Faculties, etc.

22. Subject to any regulations made hereunder applications for such sanction as aforesaid shall be made by the Minister and by the Parish Council of the Parish in which the Church concerned is situated or if there be no Parish Council then by the Minister and the Church Committee or if there be also no Church Committee then by the Minister and the Churchwardens of such Church.

REGULATIONS.

Alterations in the Church.

1. Whenever any change in the fabric or in the internal arrangement of a Church is contemplated, a Faculty or other permit from the Archbishop must be applied for and obtained.

NOTE—"No alteration either by way of addition or diminution in the fabric or utensils or ornaments of the Church, ought, according to strict law, to be made without the legal sanction of the Ordinary. That legal sanction is expressed by the issue of an instrument called a Faculty, and in no other way."—(*Phillimore's Ecclesiastical Law.*)

2. Application for a Faculty must be made in the manner provided by the 22nd section of the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," and the Regulations made thereunder.

3. The application must be accompanied by a plan showing the alterations proposed to be made in the Church. A copy of the plan is to be deposited in the Registry. In the case of the erection of a Stained Glass Window a tracing of the Window must be furnished, for deposit in the Diocesan Registry, together with a copy of the intended inscription.

4. Notice of application for a Faculty must be affixed to the Church doors for fourteen days.

5. Tablets, Monuments, or Memorial Windows already erected in the Church must not be interfered with except with the consent of the persons by whom they were erected or their representatives.

Monuments.

Whenever the erection of a Tablet or ordinary Monument is contemplated, the persons interested should apply for a Faculty, and the application should be endorsed with the consent of the Minister and the Parish Council or Church Committee or Churchwardens as the case may be. A copy of the design, and of the intended inscription, for deposit in the Diocesan Registry, together with the fee for the Faculty, should accompany the application.

REGULATIONS *re* FACULTIES.

In pursuance of the 23rd section of the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," the Archbishop in Council hereby makes, approves of, and prescribes the following Regulations, Forms, and Fees, that is to say :

1. Every application for the sanction of the Archbishop under the 21st section of the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," shall be made in writing in accordance with the form contained in the 1st schedule hereto, with such variations, if any, as the circumstances require.

Form of *
application
for Faculty.

* *Forms of Application and Notice may be obtained from the Registrar of the Diocese.*

- Application to be Signed. 2. Saving as next hereinafter provided every such written application shall be signed by the Minister and by a majority of the members of the Parish Council of the Parish in which the Church concerned is situated, or if there be no Parish Council then by the Minister and a majority of the members of the Church Committee, or, if there be also no Church Committee, then by the Minister and a majority of the Churchwardens of such Church. Provided, however, that an application for the erection of a Memorial Tablet or Monument may be signed by the promoters thereof, but in such case there must be endorsed upon the application the consent of the Minister and such other persons as are required to sign the application in this Regulation first mentioned.
- Other applications. 3. An application with regard to any alteration, utensils, ornaments, furniture, or other things placed or remaining in any Church or in any position therein which it is claimed would be illegal in any Church of England in England, may be made by any parishioner of the Church in question in writing in a form similar to the form contained in the 1st schedule hereto, with such variations as the circumstances may require, and signed by such parishioner.
- Application to be lodged. 4. Every such written application shall be lodged at the office of the Registrar of the Diocese.
- Plans, etc., to be lodged. 5. The applicants shall lodge as part of the application all such plans and drawings as shall be necessary to define precisely the subject matter of the application, including in the cases of Memorial Windows, Memorial Tablets, or Monuments, a Tracing of the Design and a copy of the proposed Inscription.
- Notice of application. 6. Upon any such application being made as aforesaid, the Registrar shall issue to the Minister and the Churchwardens a sufficient number of notices in accordance with one of the forms contained in the 2nd schedule hereto with such variations, if any, as the circumstances may require, and such notices shall be placed by the Churchwardens in a prominent position at each entrance to the Church for at least fourteen clear days before such application shall be heard by the Archbishop.
- Vestry Meeting may be directed. 7. The Archbishop may, if he think fit, and shall, if required by writing signed by at least ten parishioners of the Church in question, direct the Minister and the Churchwardens to convene a Vestry Meeting, and such Vestry Meeting shall be convened by the Minister and the Churchwardens in the manner provided by the "Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912," for such time and place and in such form of words as the Archbishop shall direct. The Chairman shall promptly report in writing to the Archbishop the proceedings thereof.

8. The Archbishop may, from time to time, if he think fit, convene other Meetings of Parishioners, and such other Meetings shall be convened in such manner and for such times and places, and in such form of words as the Archbishop shall determine. The Archbishop shall appoint Chairmen to preside at such Meetings, and such Chairmen shall respectively promptly report in writing to the Archbishop the proceedings of such Meetings.

Other Meetings may be directed. Chairmen may be appointed.

9. Objection in writing, signed by any parishioner of the Church in question, may be lodged with the Registrar against any application at any time before the expiration of the fourteen clear days referred to in Regulation 6 or within seven days thereafter, or such further time not exceeding twenty-one days, as the Archbishop may permit, and such parishioner shall specify the grounds of objection to such application.

Objection to application.

10. In any case where objection is lodged against any application, the Registrar shall forward to the applicant and to the persons so lodging objection as aforesaid, and hereinafter called objectors, a notification of the time and place fixed by the Archbishop for the hearing of such application, such notification to be forwarded by post addressed to such applicants and objectors at the addresses respectively supplied for the purpose by such applicants and objectors in time to be delivered in the ordinary course of the post at least fourteen days before the said time fixed for the hearing of the application.

Notice of hearing in case of objection.

11. Any of the applicants or objectors may appear on the hearing, either in person or by Counsel or Solicitor.

Appearance at hearing.

12. Where no objection is lodged against an application the same shall be determined *ex parte*.

Where no objection is lodged.

13. All such written applications, and all such plans, drawings, tracings, and copies of inscriptions, and all such written objections to such applications as aforesaid, with minutes of the proceedings and the determination of such application shall be kept as a record by the Registrar, and inspection of the same may be had in each case by any parishioner of the Church in question. A copy of the application and of all such plans, drawings, tracings, and inscriptions as aforesaid, shall be kept within the Parish at a place to be stated in the application available for inspection by any parishioner of the Church from the lodging of the application until the determination of the same.

Record and inspection.

14. In the absence of the Archbishop from the State of New South Wales the powers by this Ordinance vested in him shall (subject to such limitations as he may prescribe) be exercised by a Commissary appointed by him, and in default of such appointment or if the Archbishop be in-

Absence, etc., of Archbishop.

capable of acting then by the person who if the See were vacant would be the Administrator of the Diocese, and if the See be vacant then by such Administrator.

Table of Fees. 15. The fees specified in the Table of Fees contained in the 3rd schedule hereto, shall be payable to the Registrar in respect of the several matters specified opposite to the specification of the said Fees in the said Table.

TABLE OF FEES.

On lodging application and for notices. Two shillings and sixpence.

On lodging objection. Five shillings.

On each inspection of Record in Registry. One shilling.

For Faculty or other form of permit according to the nature and value of the work, from five shillings to two guineas, as may be determined by the Archbishop.

Forms of Application and Notice may be obtained from the Registrar of the Diocese.

Exhumation and Removal of a Corpse.

WHENEVER it is desired to exhume a corpse for the purpose of removal from one burial ground to another, or from one grave to another in the same ground, the person entitled to ask for such exhumation and removal must apply, in writing, to the Secretary, Department of Public Health, Sydney, and the application must be accompanied by a certified copy of the registration of death.

Trustees and others in charge of burial grounds should see that this requirement is observed, as the unauthorised removal of a corpse is a misdemeanour.

The necessary permission having been obtained, application should then be made to the Trustees of the burial ground from which the corpse is to be removed.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH WITH REGARD
TO REMOVALS.

Bodies which were originally encased in lead.

1. Permission to exhume bodies which were encased in lead before the original burial may be granted at any date, irrespective of the nature of the registered cause of death, either for the purpose of removal to another grave in the same burial-ground, or for removal to some other burial-ground, subject only to repair of any defect in the leaden casing before removal.

*Bodies which were not originally encased in lead.
Burial in the wrong Grave.*

2. If a body has been buried in a wrong grave, permission to exhume it for the purpose of transfer to another part of *the same* burial-ground may be granted, provided application be made, and the transfer effected, within seven days of burial. If granted, it shall not be necessary to enclose the coffin in lead before removing it.

Transfer to some other part of the Burial-ground.

3. Permission to exhume a body which has been buried longer than the time contemplated in the last preceding Regulation for the purpose of transfer to some other part of *the same* burial-ground may be granted provided that (a) the registered cause of death be not an infectious disease and (b) more than twelve months have elapsed since the date of the original burial. If granted it shall not be necessary to enclose the coffin in lead before transferring it.

Transfer to some other Burial-ground.

4. Permission to exhume a body for the purpose of transferring it to some other burial-ground may be granted provided that (a) the registered cause of death be not an infectious disease, (b) seven years have elapsed since the date of burial, and (c) the coffin be enclosed in lead securely soldered, and in an outer shell of wood, immediately after having been exhumed, and before removal.

Transfer of Bones to China.

5. Permission to exhume for the purpose of transferring bones to China may be granted, provided that (a) the registered cause of death be not an infectious disease, (b) a term of ten years has elapsed since burial, (c) the bones be placed in metal cases securely soldered before being taken outside the burial-ground.

Infectious disease the registered cause of death.

6. Permission to exhume shall not be given when the registered cause of death is an infectious disease, except in accordance with Regulation No. 1 above. For the purposes of these Regulations the following are deemed to be infectious diseases :—

Anthrax	Plague
Cholera	Smallpox
Leprosy	

Currency of permits.

7. When permission to exhume has been given, the permit shall remain in force for three months from the date thereof, and no longer. Failure to observe all the conditions therein mentioned will lead to prosecution of the person or persons offending.

ACT No. 21, 1917.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts relating to property held upon any trust for or for the use, benefit, or purposes of the Church of England in dioceses within New South Wales, and the Acts conferring powers upon the synods of the said dioceses with reference to the said property; and for other purposes. [Assented to, 7th November, 1917.]

Preamble.

WHEREAS the Acts relating to property held upon any trust for or for the use, benefit, or purposes of the Church of England in dioceses within New South Wales, and the Acts conferring powers upon the synods of the dioceses with reference to the said property are numerous, ambiguous, and discursive, and it is therefore expedient to consolidate and amend the same: Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the “Church of England Trust Property Act, 1917,” and is divided into Parts as follows :—

PART I.

REPEAL AND AMENDMENT.

2. (1) The Acts mentioned in the Schedule to this Act are hereby repealed, but notwithstanding the said repeal the said Acts shall continue to apply as if unrepealed to the Diocese of Newcastle and to all the trust property matters and things of or pertaining to the said diocese until the synod of the said diocese shall make an ordinance declaring a desire to have the benefit of this Act, and shall in the name and under the hand of the Bishop of the said diocese notify such ordinance in the Gazette, and immediately upon such notification and thenceforth the provisions of this Act shall apply to the said diocese and to all the trust property matters and things of or pertaining to the said diocese.

Repeal.

(2) The said repeal shall not affect ordinances passed, trustees constituted as bodies politic and corporate, persons elected or appointed trustees or

members of bodies politic and corporate, property vested, acts and things validated, or certificates given under the said Acts, or any of them.

(3) Except so far as there is anything in this Act inconsistent therewith, this Act shall apply to all matters and things made, done, or commenced under the said repealed Acts, and at the commencement of this Act of any force or effect or capable of acquiring any force or effect by virtue of the said repealed Acts as if this Act had been in force at the time they were made, done, or commenced, and they were made, done, or commenced hereunder.

Amendment 3. (1) Sections five and seven of the Church of England Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902 and clauses three and six of the Schedule to the said Act and all Acts and parts of Acts relating to church trust property shall, so far as may be necessary for the purposes of this Act, be read as amended and supplemented by this Act.

(2) In the case of the Diocese of Sydney the following subsections shall apply:—

- (a) The present members of the council referred to in Saint James' School Compensation Trust Act, assented to the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and such persons as shall from time to time be members of the said council, including the Archbishop of Sydney for the time being as ex officio president, shall be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of "Sydney Church of England Grammar School Council," and by such name they shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall sue and be sued, or shall otherwise appear and answer and be answered, and may take and hold to them and their successors by grant, will, or otherwise, any real or personal property, and for any estate or interest therein.

- (b) All property real and personal which immediately before the passing of this Act was vested in any person or persons other than the Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney upon any trust for the purposes of the school referred to in the said Saint James's School Compensation Trust Act shall by virtue of this Act and without any other instrument vest in the said body constituted by subsection (a) upon the same trusts respectively for the purposes of the said school upon which the said property was held immediately before the passing of this Act, and it shall be lawful for the Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney by deed or deeds under its corporate seal to assign and transfer to the said body constituted by subsection (a) at one time or from time to time all or any part or parts of other real and personal property now or hereafter to be held by the said church property trust upon any trust for the purposes of the said school.
- (c) This Act shall be deemed not to apply to nor to affect any property real or personal held or to be held upon any trust for the purposes of The King's School, or The King's School Council Act, or The King's School Council Act Amendment Act of 1894.

PART II.

INTERPRETATION.

4. In this Act unless inconsistent with the context **Definitions** or subject matter—

“Bishop” includes Archbishop and the Bishop or Archbishop for the time being.

“Church of England” means Church of England within New South Wales.

- “ Church trust property ” includes all or any part of any real and personal property which may for the time being be subject to any trust whether by dedication, consecration, trust instrument, or otherwise, for or for the use, benefit, or purposes of the Church of England in any diocese, and each such diocese is referred to as the diocese for which the church trust property in question is held.
- “ Corporate trustees ” and “ Corporate body of trustees ” respectively include corporate bodies of trustees now or hereafter to be constituted for any diocese under the provisions of the Church of England Trust Property Incorporation Act, 1881, hereby repealed or of this Act.
- “ Diocese ” includes any diocese now or hereafter to be formed and situated within New South Wales, and the identity of a diocese shall be deemed not to be affected by the formation wholly or partly thereof of a new diocese nor by any other alteration of boundaries or area nor by any change of name.
- “ Parish ” includes any parish or ecclesiastical district now or hereafter to be formed and situated within New South Wales.
- “ Parish council ” means the body of persons, if any, in which the general powers of governing the affairs of a parish are for the time being vested under the provisions of any ordinance of the synod of a diocese.
- “ Person ” includes corporate trustees and a bishop.
- “ Purposes ” includes religious, educational, cemetery, and all other purposes of the Church of England, whether such purposes are within or beyond the diocese or the State.
- “ Standing committee ” includes any general governing council of a diocese created by or under the authority of its synod.

“Synod” includes any synod now or hereafter to be convened or held in pursuance of the provisions of the Church of England Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902, or any Act amending or taking the place of the same.

“Trust instrument” includes ordinances of synod and Acts of Parliament, though not expressly mentioned herein.

“Trustee,” “new trustee,” respectively, include corporate trustees and a bishop.

PART III.

TRUSTEES CONSTITUTION AND SUCCESSION.

5. The following bodies, that is to say—

Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney ;

Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Goulburn ;

The Corporate Trustees of the Diocese of Grafton and Armidale ;

Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Bathurst ;

Trustees of the Church Property for the Diocese of Riverina ;

Existing
corporate
bodies.

The Corporate Trustees of the Diocese of Grafton, are hereby declared to have been duly constituted as bodies politic and corporate by the said names respectively, under the provisions of the Church of England Trust Property Incorporation Act, 1881, and notwithstanding the repeal of the said Act they shall remain so constituted as aforesaid, and, except so far as there is anything in this Act inconsistent therewith, this Act shall apply to them as if this Act had been in force at

the time they were constituted and they were constituted hereunder.

The bishop of a diocese shall ex officio be a member of the corporate body so constituted as aforesaid for such diocese, and the number of members shall be increased by one for the said purpose.

New corpor-
ate bodies.

6. The synod of each diocese, other than the dioceses for which the said bodies in the preceding section mentioned were and remain so constituted as aforesaid may at any time elect such persons as such synod desires, should together with the bishop of the diocese, ex officio be incorporated as trustees for such diocese, and the bishop of such diocese shall notify such election in the Gazette, and immediately upon such notification and thenceforth the said persons and such persons as may from time to time be members of such body, together with the bishop of the diocese, ex officio, shall be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of incorporation mentioned in such notification, and by such name they shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall sue and be sued, or shall otherwise appear and answer and be answered, and may take and hold to them and their successors by grant, will, or otherwise any real or personal property, and for any estate or interest therein.

7. The members for the time being of each corporate body of trustees shall have the custody of the common seal of such corporate body, and the form of such seal and all other matters relating thereto shall from time to time be determined at a meeting of the said corporate body, and three members for the time being of the said corporate body shall constitute a quorum.

8. Any deed or instrument, executed or signed, and any other act, matter, or thing done by any three members of any such corporate body as aforesaid, in pursuance of a resolution of the said corporate body and under the common seal of the said corporate body, shall be as effectual as if the same had been executed, signed or done by all the members of the said corporate body

9. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese from time to time, by ordinance, to vary the provisions of sections seven and eight, in so far as the same relate to such diocese, and the said provisions shall, with reference to the said diocese and to all the church trust property matters and things of or held for or pertaining to the said diocese, be read from time to time as so varied by ordinance as aforesaid.

10. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese from time to time, by ordinance, to change the name of the corporate body of trustees constituted for such diocese.

Change of
name.

11. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese from time to time, by ordinance, to declare what shall be the number of members of the corporate body of trustees constituted for such diocese, and in case of increase in the number such increase shall be effected by the synod of such diocese electing an additional member, or additional members, and in case of decrease in the number such decrease shall be effected by the synod of such diocese not electing a person, or persons, to fill a vacancy, or vacancies, declared under the provisions of this Act.

12. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese from time to time, by resolution, to declare the existence of a vacancy, or vacancies, in the office of member of the corporate body of trustees of such diocese by reason of one or more of the members for the time being of such corporate body having died, resigned office, refused or neglected or having become incapable to act in the said office, or having for the space of six months ceased to reside within the said diocese, or by reason of some other matter to be specified in such resolution, and thereupon or at any time thereafter the synod of the said diocese may elect a person or persons to be, and such person or persons shall thereupon become a member or members of the said body in the place or places of the member or members referred to in the said resolution.

13. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held from time to time, by ordinance, to declare what shall be the number of trustees of such property, and in case of increase in the number such increase shall be effected by the synod of such diocese electing a new trustee, or new trustees, by way of addition, and in case of decrease in the number such decrease shall be effected by the synod of such diocese not electing a person, or persons, to fill a vacancy, or vacancies, declared under the provisions of this Act.

14. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held from time to time by resolution to declare the existence of a vacancy or vacancies in the office of trustee of such property, by reason of one or more of the trustees having died, resigned office, refused or neglected, or having become incapable to act in the said office, or having for the space of six months ceased to reside within the said diocese, or by reason of some other matter to be specified in such resolution, and thereupon or at any time thereafter the synod of the said diocese may elect or by resolution provide for the election of a person or persons to be, and such person or persons shall upon such election become a trustee or trustees in the place or places of the trustee or trustees referred to in the said resolution.

15. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese to elect a new trustee or new trustees respectively for church trust property, which may be allocated under the provisions of this Act for such diocese.

Separate
trustees.

16. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held by ordinance to provide for the election of separate trustees for any part or parts of such property, and to elect such separate trustees.

Provision
cumulative.

17. The provisions contained in section fourteen are in addition to any other provision for the time being applicable to any church trust property.

18. Every person for the time being acting and recognised as being the bishop of a diocese, and having been consecrated according to the manner and form prescribed and used by the Church of England, shall in the construction of all Statutes, Acts, grants, deeds, and other instruments be deemed to be and shall be the successor of the bishop of such diocese, notwithstanding that such bishop may not have been appointed under letters patent from the Crown, or may have been consecrated in New South Wales or elsewhere without any mandate or license being issued by the Crown for such consecration, and shall in all respects within such diocese have and enjoy all and singular the same rights, powers, and privileges, whether created by Statute, Act, grant, deed, or other instrument whatsoever as were enjoyed or possessed therein by the bishops his predecessors, and in the case of the diocese of Sydney the Most Reverend John Charles Wright, D.D., the present Archbishop, and all other persons for the time being acting and recognised and consecrated as aforesaid, shall in the construction of such instruments as aforesaid be deemed to be and shall be the successors from time to time of the Bishop of Australia and the Bishop of Sydney.

PART IV.

VESTING TRUST PROPERTY.

19. Any church trust property which may at any time belong to or be vested in any trustee or trustees shall upon the consent of such trustee or trustees, or the majority of them given in writing, or upon the consent of the synod of the diocese for which such property is held, given by or under an ordinance of the synod of such diocese by virtue of such consent and without other assurance in the law, become vested in the corporate trustees of such diocese: Provided that if in consequence of death or disability the consent of any trustee or trustees cannot be obtained it shall be lawful

for the bishop of the diocese to consent in the place of any such trustee.

20. All church trust property which may at any time belong to or be vested in the bishop of a diocese shall by force of this Act vest from time to time in the person who for the time being is or is deemed to be the successor of the bishop of such diocese as if such property had belonged or had been originally granted or conveyed to the bishop of such diocese and his successors as a body corporate, and notwithstanding that such person may not have been appointed bishop of such diocese under letters patent from the Crown or may have been consecrated in New South Wales or elsewhere without any mandate or license being issued by the Crown for such consecration.

21. Upon the election or appointment of a new trustee or new trustees under the provisions of this Act or of any ordinance in force for the time being in any diocese, all the church trust property in respect of which such election or appointment is made shall by virtue of such election or appointment and without other assurance in the law become vested in such new trustee or trustees, either alone or jointly with the surviving or continuing trustee or trustees as the case may require, and every new trustee so elected or appointed as aforesaid shall have the same powers, authorities, and discretions, and shall in all respects act as if he had been originally made a trustee on the creation of the trust.

In case of
new dioceses,
etc.

22. In each case where, by reason of the formation or proposed formation of a new diocese, or the alteration or proposed alteration of the boundaries or area of a diocese or otherwise, it shall seem expedient to the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held, it shall be lawful for the synod of such diocese by ordinance to allocate such church trust property for any other diocese or proposed diocese, and by virtue of such ordinance and without other assurance in the law such church trust property shall, from the times respectively in such ordinance provided, be held

for such other diocese or proposed diocese instead of the diocese making such ordinance and be vested in the new trustee or new trustees respectively then or thereafter to be elected for such church trust property under the provisions of this Act, in the place of the trustee or trustees thereof for the time being, and upon the trusts to which the same shall for the time being be subject, but for or for the use, benefit, or purposes of the Church of England in the diocese or proposed diocese for which the same shall have been so allocated as aforesaid in the place of the diocese making such ordinance.

23. Upon the election of separate trustees under the provisions of any ordinance in force for the time being in a diocese, the church trust property mentioned in such ordinance shall, by virtue of such election and without other assurance in the law, become vested in such separate trustees in the place of the trustees thereof for the time being, and the said separate trustees shall, with respect to such church trust property, have the same powers, authorities, and discretions, and shall in all respects act as if they had been originally made trustees on the creation of the trust.

PART V.

MANAGEMENT AND INVESTMENT OF TRUST PROPERTY.

24. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held, from time to time by ordinance, to provide and to vary any provision now or hereafter to be made for governing and controlling the management and user of such property for the purposes for which the same is for the time being held in trust, and for all things incidental to such government and control, including constitutions of councils, committees, and other bodies, whether incorporated or not, and such property shall be held, managed, and used under and in accordance with such ordinance accordingly, the provisions of the trust instrument or instruments (if any) to the contrary notwithstanding.

Management.

Investment. 25. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held, from time to time by ordinance, to provide and to vary any provision now or hereafter to be made for the investment of such property, and for the pooling of separate church trust properties for the purpose of investment, and for averaging gains, losses, and interests, and for all other matters and things incidental to such investment and pooling.

PART VI.

SALE, EXCHANGE, MORTGAGE, LEASE, &C., OF TRUST PROPERTY.

Synod may direct sales, etc. 26. It shall be lawful for the synod of the diocese for which any church trust property is for the time being held if it shall appear to such synod expedient by reason of circumstances subsequent to the creation of the trusts of such property by ordinance to direct that such property be sold, exchanged, mortgaged, or let on mining, building, occupation, or other leases, or otherwise dealt with in manner provided by such ordinance, and to provide for accepting the surrender of any lease thereof and for laying out and dedicating parts thereof for any purpose or purposes, and to provide for the application of the real and personal property arising from any such sale, exchange, mortgage, letting, or other dealing as aforesaid: Provided that in the cases of the dioceses of Sydney and Goulburn no such ordinance in respect of property held for the sole benefit of some particular parish shall be assented to under the Church of England Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902, or any Act amending or taking the place of the same, without the consent in writing of a majority of the members of the parish council (if any) for the time being of the parish, and in the case of property gratuitously granted or assured within twenty years preceding the time being by any private donor without the like consent of such donor if living.

27. It shall be lawful for the synod of a diocese by ordinance to direct what person or persons shall execute the deed or deeds or other instrument or instruments and do all acts, measures, and things necessary for the purpose of carrying into effect the sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing directed by ordinance of the synod of such diocese under the provisions of this Act, and the deed or deeds, or other instrument or instruments executed, and the acts, measures, and things done by such person or persons shall take effect as if the trust instrument relating to the church trust property comprised in the said ordinance had contained a power enabling such person or persons to effect such sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing, and so as to operate, if necessary, by way of revocation and appointment of the use or otherwise as the said ordinance shall direct.

Deeds of conveyance, etc.

28. A corporate body of trustees may let the church trust property vested in such body on lease for such term or terms as shall from time to time be approved of by the synod of the diocese for which such corporate body is constituted, or if the synod be not in session then as shall be approved of by the standing committee of such diocese: Provided, however, that until the first session of such synod after this Act comes into force in such diocese such corporate body may let such church trust property for any term of years not exceeding seven.

Power of corporate trustees to let in certain cases.

29. No purchaser, mortgagee, lessee, or other person, or the Registrar-General, upon any sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing purporting to be made under the powers granted by or under this Act, shall be concerned to see or inquire into the necessity or propriety thereof, or the mode of exercising the same, nor be affected by notice that the exercise of the power is unauthorised, irregular, or improper, nor be concerned to see to the application or disposition of any purchase, mortgage, or other money or rent paid by him.

Protection of purchasers, etc.

30. The moneys (if any) arising from any sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing purporting

Discharge for purchase moneys, etc.

to be made under the powers granted by or under this Act shall be paid to the trustee or trustees in whom the property, the subject matter of such sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing immediately theretofore vested, or to such other person or persons as the ordinance (if any) directing such sale, exchange, mortgage, lease, or other dealing may provide. And the receipt of the said trustee or trustees, or other person or persons, as the case may be, shall be an effectual discharge therefor.

Temporary
investments

31. Pending the application of any moneys to arise as aforesaid, the same may, after payment thereof of all proper costs, charges and expenses, be invested in Government or real securities in New South Wales or in the Commonwealth of Australia, or on fixed deposit in any bank, or otherwise as the ordinance directing such dealing, or any ordinance of the synod of the said diocese in force for the time being and applicable thereto may provide.

PART VII.

VARIATION OF TRUSTS.

Power of
synod to
vary trusts,
etc.

32. In each case where by reason of circumstances subsequent to the creation of the trusts, including trusts declared under this section, to which any church trust property is for the time being subject, it has in the opinion of the synod of the diocese for which such property is held become impossible or inexpedient to carry out or observe such trusts, it shall be lawful for the synod of such diocese by ordinance to declare such their opinion, and by the same or any subsequent ordinance to declare other trusts for or for the use, benefit, or purposes of the Church of England within the said diocese instead of such first-mentioned trusts, and such first-mentioned trusts shall thereupon by force of the said ordinance cease and determine, and such property shall thereupon be held upon such other trusts accordingly: Provided that such property shall be

dealt with and applied for the benefit of the Church of England in the parish or parishes (if any) for the benefit of which such property was immediately before such ordinance held in trust, and for the same purposes as nearly as may be as the purposes for which such property was immediately before such ordinance held unless the synod of such diocese shall by ordinance declare that by reason of circumstances, subsequent to the creation of the first-mentioned trusts, it is, in the opinion of the synod, impossible or inexpedient to deal with or apply such property or some part thereof for the use or benefit of such parish or parishes or for the same or the like purposes, in which case such property or such part thereof may be dealt with and applied for the use and benefit of the Church of England for such other purposes and in such other parish or parishes in the said diocese or otherwise as shall be declared by ordinance of the synod of the said diocese.

PART VIII.

EVIDENCE.

33. A certificate signed by the bishop of a diocese for which there is for the time being a corporate body of trustees shall be prima facie evidence and in favour of all persons purchasing, advancing moneys on, leasing, or otherwise acquiring or possessing any estate or interest in the church trust property therein referred to, and the Registrar-General shall be conclusive evidence that the persons named in such certificate are the duly constituted members of such corporate body of trustees and that they became such members at the date or respective dates mentioned in such certificate. Membership of corporate bodies.

34. A certificate signed by the bishop of a diocese for which any church trust property in such certificate referred to is for the time being held shall be prima facie evidence and in favour of all persons purchasing, advancing moneys on, leasing, or otherwise acquiring or possessing any estate or interest in such property, Trusteeship.

and the Registrar-General shall be conclusive evidence that the persons named in such certificate are the duly constituted trustees of such property, and that they became such trustees at the date or respective dates and in the manner mentioned in such certificate, and in the case of lands under the operation of the Real Property Act, 1900, or any Act amending or taking the place of the same shall entitle such trustees to be registered as the proprietors thereof accordingly, and to have a certificate of title issued to them without any formal transfer.

Making of
ordinances.

35. A document purporting to be a copy ordinance certified and recorded in accordance with this Act or any Act repealed by this Act or a certified or office copy thereof shall be prima facie evidence and in favour of all persons purchasing, advancing moneys on, leasing, or otherwise acquiring or possessing any estate or interest in the property therein referred to shall be conclusive evidence that an ordinance in terms of such copy was duly made and assented to, and that all necessary consent and directions were duly given, and that all proceedings in connection therewith were regular and in due form, and that such ordinance was not repealed or amended except, if at all, by such ordinance or ordinances as shall for the time being be certified and recorded in accordance with this Act or any such repealed Act.

Notification
in Gazette.

36. A copy of the Gazette containing a notification purporting to be published in pursuance of the provisions or any of the provisions of this Act, or any Act repealed by this Act, shall be prima facie evidence of the matters therein notified and the notification of which is authorised by this Act or any such repealed Act.

PART IX.

GENERAL.

Repeal or
amendment
of
ordinances.

37. Subject and without prejudice to any past operation of any ordinance made or to be made under the provisions of this Act or any Act hereby repealed, and

subject and without prejudice to any estate, right, privilege, obligation, or liability vested, acquired, accrued, or incurred under any such ordinance, the synod of a diocese may repeal or from time to time amend any ordinance made or to be made by the synod of such diocese.

38. During the absence from New South Wales of a bishop of a diocese, a commissary appointed by such bishop may exercise all the powers and functions, and do and make all the things referred to in this Act, or such of them as shall be referred to in such appointment, as the case may be, in the place of such bishop.

39. During the absence of a bishop as aforesaid and in cases where no commissary is appointed as aforesaid or some only of such powers, functions, and things are referred to in the appointment of such commissary, or during the incapacity of a bishop of a diocese arising from illness or any cause other than such absence as aforesaid, or during a vacancy in the see, the person or persons appointed for the purpose or purposes by ordinance of the synod of such diocese or in default of such ordinance or so far as the same shall not extend to any of such purposes the person next in ecclesiastical rank or degree in such diocese and resident therein may exercise all the powers and functions and do and make all the things referred to in this Act or such of them as are not referred to in any such appointment of a commissary as aforesaid, as the case may be, in the place of such bishop.

Delegation

40. During the recess of the synod of a diocese such committee, council, or other body of persons (if any) as shall from time to time be constituted or appointed for the purpose by or under ordinance of the synod of such diocese may, in place of the synod of such diocese, exercise such of the powers and functions, and do and make such of the things referred to in this Act as shall from time to time be determined by ordinance of the synod of such diocese, and the synod of such diocese may, for the purpose aforesaid, from time to time by

ordinance regulate the procedure of such committee, council, or other body of persons: Provided that no ordinance passed by any such committee, council, or other body of persons as aforesaid shall take effect or have any validity unless within one month after the passing thereof the same shall be assented to under the Church of England Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902, or some Act amending or taking the place of the same.

Validity of

41. The preceding provisions of this Act shall, so far as applicable, apply to all powers, functions, and things so exercised, done, and made in the place of the bishop of the diocese and in the place of the synod of the diocese as in this Part respectively provided for, as if such powers, functions, and things had been validly exercised, done, and made by the bishop of the diocese, or by the synod of the diocese, as the case may be.

Notification
as to
trustees.

42. Each ordinance made under this Act under sections nine, ten, eleven, thirteen, or sixteen, and each resolution and election made under sections twelve, fourteen, fifteen, or sixteen, and each consent given under section nineteen, shall be forthwith notified in the Gazette under the hand of the bishop of the diocese.

Record of
ordinances.

43. Each ordinance made under this Act under sections twenty-two, twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, thirty-two, thirty-seven, thirty-nine, or forty, may be recorded as follows:—

- (a) In case any lands therein referred to are under the provisions of the Real Property Act, 1900, or any Act amending or taking the place of the said Act, a copy of such ordinance, certified by the bishop of the diocese, shall be deposited with the Registrar-General for safe custody and reference in accordance with the provisions of the Act.
- (b) In case any lands therein referred to are not under the provisions of the Real Property Act, 1900, or any Act amending or taking the

place of the said Act, a copy of such ordinance certified by the bishop of the diocese shall be filed in the office of the Registrar-General in accordance with the provisions of the Registration of Deeds Act, 1897, or any Act amending or taking the place of the said Act.

Regulations re Ordinances under the Church of England Trust Property Act 1917.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the procedure in the initiation of Ordinances under the "Church of England Trust Property Act 1917" (No. 21) and to delegate certain powers and functions in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act.

The Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales and by the "Church of England Trust Property Act 1917" (No. 21) and of all other powers thereunto enabling it ordains declares determines directs and rules as follows:—

1. No Rule or Ordinance shall be initiated under the provisions of the "Church of England Trust Property Act 1917" (No. 21) except upon a petition first presented with at least twenty printed or type-written copies of the proposed Ordinance which petition shall be signed by one or more of the parties applying.

2. No such petition shall be presented unless a notice containing the matters hereinafter mentioned shall, within two months immediately before the presentation thereof have been published once in at least one daily morning newspaper published in Sydney and if any parish or district affected by the proposed Ordinance be beyond the County of Cumberland also in at least one newspaper published in or nearest to such parish or district. In addition to such published notice a similar notice shall during a period of twenty-one days before the presentation of such Petition be posted at or upon the main entrance door of the principal Church of any parish affected by such proposed Ordinance and of any Branch Church of such parish which may be specially affected by the same, and the members of the congregation of such Church or Churches shall be referred to the terms of such notice by the Clergy officiating at such Church or Churches at the ordinary services held on at least one Sunday during such period of twenty-one days.

3. Every such notice shall state the intention to apply to the Synod for the proposed Ordinance and the general objects of such Ordinance and shall also contain a notification that every petition in opposition to such Ordinance shall be presented before a date mentioned in such notification and being at least eight weeks after the first publication of such notice.

4. Every such petition shall state that such notice has been given as aforesaid and the production of such newspapers as aforesaid (to be filed with the Secretary of the Standing Committee) shall be sufficient proof of such notice having been given.

5. Every such petition shall be addressed to the Synod but shall be presented to the Standing Committee on behalf of the Synod.

6. Every such Ordinance shall be reported on by the Standing Committee—"Standing Committee" in this Ordinance means the members of the Standing Committee for the time being holding office under the provisions of the "Standing Committee Ordinance of 1897" or any Ordinance amending or taking the place of the same.

7. The Standing Committee shall have power to entertain any such proposed Ordinance as aforesaid during the recess and notwithstanding that leave to bring in such Ordinance has not been obtained from the Synod and to report to the Synod at the following session.

8. Before the proposed Ordinance is read a first time such number of copies thereof as the Standing Committee or a sub-Committee thereof shall require shall be printed at the expense of the parties applying and shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Standing Committee for the use of the Synod.

9. Before any Ordinance shall be read a first time the sum of five pounds shall be paid to the Standing Committee of the Synod to meet the expenses attendant on such Ordinance and a Certificate of that sum having been paid signed by the Secretary of the Standing Committee shall be produced by the member having charge of the Ordinance.

10. Every such proposed Ordinance shall contain a preamble reciting the circumstances on which such Ordinance is founded and bringing the case within the provisions of the above-mentioned Act and stating the matters in reference to which the Ordinance is sought, and the Standing Committee shall require proof of the allegations contained in the preamble.

11. If it shall appear to the Standing Committee that the notice or the publication thereof is not in conformity with these rules the Standing Committee may allow the proposed Ordinance to be reported on after such further notice or publication of notice as the justice of the case shall in the opinion of the Standing Committee require.

12. Every petition in opposition to any such proposed Ordinance as aforesaid shall be addressed and may be presented in manner respectively aforesaid at any time before the date hereinbefore prescribed and shall distinctly specify the grounds of opposition, and may be received and dealt with by the Standing Committee

on behalf of the Synod. Such Petition shall state the name and address of some person upon whom and at which any notice relating to such counter Petition may be served and unless such Petition contains such name and address it shall not be considered.

13. Persons applying for a proposed Ordinance shall if required at their own expense provide a competent shorthand writer to be approved of by the Standing Committee or a sub-committee thereof appointed under this Ordinance for the purpose of taking down the evidence adduced before the Standing Committee or such sub-committee. The Standing Committee or such sub-committee shall hear the parties in person or by counsel or solicitor if it be desired and may take such oral or other evidence as they think requisite and the Standing Committee shall report to Synod whether they approve of the proposed Ordinance or think it should be amended and their report shall specify:—

- (a) Whether the preamble has been proved and if not in what respects.
- (b) What amendments (if any) are required in the Ordinance.
- (c) The Standing Committee's opinion on all matters at issue between the promoters of the Ordinance and any person opposing it, and
- (d) The reasons why the Standing Committee are of opinion that the Ordinance should or should not be passed.

14. A copy of the oral evidence given at any meeting of the Standing Committee or any such sub-committee shall within five days thereafter be furnished to the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

15. The Standing Committee shall annex to their report a transcript of the evidence taken and a copy of the proposed Ordinance as agreed to by them and the promoters showing the amendments (if any) which the Standing Committee recommend and which the promoters do not accept.

16. Provided always that if the Standing Committee shall by resolution declare any matter to be one of special urgency the Standing Committee may suspend any part of the above regulations in relation to the matter in question and the matter may thereupon proceed accordingly.

17. For the purposes aforesaid the Standing Committee may from time to time appoint a sub-committee or sub-committees and may refer either all Ordinances generally or only specified Ordinances or classes of Ordinances to such sub-committee or sub-committees respectively for enquiry and report to the Standing Committee.

18. The Standing Committee is hereby appointed for the purpose of exercising and accordingly may during the recess of the Synod of the Diocese exercise in the place of such Synod all or any of the powers and functions and do and make all or any of the things referred to in Sections 26 to 31 (inclusive) constituting Part VI. of the "Church of England Trust Property Act 1917" (No. 21).

19. The procedure of the Standing Committee in acting under Section 18 hereof shall be in accordance with the Standing Orders of Synod for the time being *mutatis mutandis* and in accordance with the foregoing sections hereof except that the Standing Committee instead of reporting to the Synod as herein provided shall from time to time report specially to Synod all action by the Standing Committee under the said 18th Section.

20. The Regulations passed by the Synod on the twenty-ninth day of September One thousand nine hundred and eleven are hereby repealed.

An Act to repeal the Act 30 Victoria, intituled an Act to enable the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in New South Wales to manage the property of the said Church ; to authorise the substitution of the name Church of England for the name hitherto used of United Church of England and Ireland ; to give legal force and effect to the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales contained in the Schedule to this Bill ; and for other purposes connected with or incidental to the above object. [Assented to, 24th December, 1902.]

Preamble.

Whereas by an ordinance duly passed by the Church of England Provincial Synod of the Province of New South Wales, intituled the Amendment of Constitutions Application Ordinance of 1895, it was ordained and ruled that application should be made to Parliament to pass an Act to repeal the Act 30 Victoria, intituled an Act to enable the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in New South Wales to manage the property of the said Church, assented to on the fourth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, but without prejudice to anything done under the said Act before the repeal thereof, and to authorise the substitution in all statutes, acts, grants, deeds and other instruments of the name Church of England for the name hitherto used of United Church of England and Ireland, and to

give legal force and effect to certain Constitutions contained in the schedule to the said ordinance now in recital: And whereas the Executive Committee of the said Synod were, by the said ordinance now in recital, authorised and empowered to carry into effect the provisions of the same so soon as the Metropolitan should have reported to them that every diocese in the said Province had accepted the same: And whereas every diocese in the said Province has accepted the said ordinance, and the Metropolitan has so reported to the said Executive Committee: And whereas legal force and effect cannot be given to the said Constitutions so far as regards the management of the property of the Church of England without the aid of the Legislature in the manner hereinafter provided: And whereas the Constitutions contained in the schedule to the said ordinance are embodied and contained in the schedule to this Act. Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

I.—This Act may be cited as the “Church of England Short title.
Constitutions Act Amendment Act of 1902.”

I.—The Act thirty Victoria, intituled an Act to enable Repeal.
the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in New South Wales to manage the property of the said Church, is hereby repealed, but such repeal shall not prejudice or affect the previous operation of the said Act, or any proceeding, matter, or thing lawfully done or contracted to be done under the said Act before the commencement of this Act.

III.—The name Church of England shall be substituted Name of
Church.
and read in all statutes, acts, grants, deeds, ordinances, and rules of Synod, and other instruments

now in force or in existence for and instead of the name United Church of England and Ireland whenever occurring in any such statute, act, grant, deed, ordinance, rule, or other instrument.

Constitutions to be binding.

IV.—The several articles and provisions of the Constitutions contained in the schedule to this Act, and any ordinances and rules to be made under or by virtue or in pursuance thereof, are and shall be for all purposes connected with or in any way relating to the property of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales binding upon the members of the said Church.

Church property to be held subject to constitutions.

V.—All persons now or at any time hereafter holding any real or personal estate in trust for or in any way on behalf or for the use of the Church of England except in so far as such real or personal estate may be the subject of any express trust, and then so far as such express trust shall not extend, and except lands, the management of which may be already specially provided for by ordinance of Synod or by Act of Parliament, shall hold the said real and personal estate subject to the provisions of the said Constitutions and of any ordinances or rules made thereunder, and shall be bound thereby as fully in all respects as if the said Constitutions, ordinances, and rules were contained in a deed of conveyance and trust of the said real and personal estate.

No ordinance or rule to be in contravention of law.

VI.—No ordinance or rule to be made under or by virtue or in pursuance of the said Constitutions shall be in contravention of any law or statute in force for the time being in this State.

Not to affect other Church Acts.

VII.—This Act shall not repeal or in any way cut down or abridge the provisions of the Church of England Trust Property Incorporation Act, 1881, the Sydney Bishopric and Church Property Act, 1887, the Church of England Property Act of 1889, or the Church Acts Repealing Act of 1897.

SCHEDULE.

CONSTITUTIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND GOOD GOVERNMENT OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND WITHIN THE STATE OF NEW SOUTH WALES.

Whereas it is expedient that the Constitutions for the management and good government of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the State of New South Wales, approved by the members of a General Conference of the Bishops and Clerical and Lay Representatives of the Dioceses then existing in April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, be now altered and amended.

We, the members of the aforesaid Church, herein and hereafter to be described and designated as the Church of England within the said State, present at a Synod of the Bishops and clerical and lay representatives of the existing Dioceses of the said Church, convened and presided over by the Most Reverend William Saumarez, Lord Bishop of Sydney and Metropolitan, and held in the city of Sydney in the month of July, *anno domini* one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, do agree to and accept the underwritten articles and provisions as Constitutions for the management and good government of the said Church.

DIOCESAN SYNOD TO BE HELD.

I.—The members of the said Church of England in any Diocese now existing, or at any time hereafter to be constituted, within the State shall meet in Synod as hereinafter provided.

PRESIDENT AND TIME OF HOLDING.

II.—The Synod in each Diocese shall be convened in the manner herein provided, save in so far as the same may be altered by a Synod acting under the provisions hereinafter contained. And such Synod shall be convened and holden once in every year by summons of the Bishop of the Diocese,

stating the time and place of meeting. And the Bishop of the Diocese, or in his absence a Commissary appointed by him in writing, shall be President of the Synod, and may adjourn, prorogue, and dissolve the same with the concurrence of the Synod. And a new Synod shall be elected and convened at least once in every three years. And it shall not be lawful for the President to vote on any question or matter arising in the Synod. And the provisions hereinbefore contained shall be applicable to any Diocese which may be hereafter constituted within the State. Provided always that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be binding on such Diocese within a less period than three years after it has been constituted.

POWER OF SYNOD GENERALLY.

II.—The Synod of each Diocese may make ordinances upon and in respect of all matters and things concerning the order and good government of the Church of England and the regulation of its affairs within the Diocese, including the management and disposal of all Church property, moneys, and revenues (not diverting any specifically appropriated, or the subject of any specific trust, nor interfering with any vested rights), except in accordance with the provisions of any Act of Parliament, and for the election or appointment of churchwardens and trustees of churches, burial grounds, church lands and parsonages. And all ordinances of the Synod shall be binding upon the Bishop and his successors, and all other members of the Church within the Diocese, but only so far as the same may concern their respective rights, duties and liabilities as holding any office in the said Church within the Diocese.

RULES FOR CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.

IV.—The Synod of each diocese may make rules for the conduct of all business coming before it, and for trying the validity of the election of any representative, and for supplying any vacancy in the

Synod which may be occasioned by death, resignation or any other cause, and for determining for what reason any representative shall be disqualified from sitting and voting in the Synod.

RULES FOR FUTURE SYNODS.

V.—The Synod of each Diocese may make rules for altering the periods within which and the manner in which subsequent Synods shall be convened, and the mode of electing representative members, and for regulating the number of the clergy and representative members to be respectively summoned to any future Synod, and as to the manner in which such regulation shall be effected, and as to the number necessary to constitute a quorum. Provided that the declarations hereinafter imposed and no other shall be required either from members of the Church voting at the election of representatives or from such representatives when elected.

MODE OF VOTING AND QUORUM.

VI.—At the first meeting of a Synod in any Diocese the presence of not less than one-fourth of the members of each order shall be necessary to constitute a quorum. And every rule or ordinance of a Synod shall be made by a majority of the clergy and representative members voting collectively. Provided that in any Synod if any five members shall so desire the votes shall be taken by orders. Provided that no such rule or ordinance shall take effect or have any validity unless within one month after the passing of the same the Bishop shall signify his assent thereto in writing. Provided also that any such rule or ordinance to which the Bishop shall not assent may be the subject of reference to and determination by any Provincial Synod composed of the representatives of the Diocesan Synods of the State of New South Wales.

SYNOD MAY CALL FOR ACCOUNTS.

VII.—The Synod of each Diocese may call upon any person holding property belonging to the Church in the Diocese or in any parish thereof, or in which the Church or any such parish is in any manner interested, to render a full account of all such property, and of the manner in which the same and every part thereof is applied and disposed of.

MODE OF CONVENING SYNOD.

VIII.—Subject to any other provision to be made by the Synod of a Diocese, the Bishop shall summon to the Synod of his Diocese each Clergyman licensed to a separate cure of souls therein and Representatives as hereinafter provided. And for electing such Representatives the Bishop of the Diocese shall require each Clergyman licensed to a separate cure of souls to summon a meeting of the members of the Church of the age of twenty-one years, being occupiers of seats in his Church or residents within his parish, at such time within limits which may be prescribed by the Bishop in such manner and at such place within the parish as to such Clergyman may seem convenient; and every member so summoned shall be entitled to vote at such election, but the Clergyman summoning the meeting shall not be entitled to vote at such election save to give a casting-vote.

CONDUCT OF MEETING.

IX.—The Clergyman, if present, shall act as Chairman of the said meeting, and so soon as six persons in addition to the Chairman are assembled, the meeting may proceed to business, and the Chairman shall cause a list to be made of those who are present, and add thereto the names of any who subsequently attend before the proceedings are closed, and the Chairman shall cause minutes to be taken of the proceedings. And every lay member of the Church shall, before taking part in or voting at such meeting, subscribe the following declaration:—

“I, the undersigned A.B., do declare that I am a member of the Church of England.”

REPRESENTATIVES TO BE ELECTED.

X.—Every such meeting shall, subject to any other provision to be made by the Synod of the Diocese, choose as representatives two male persons of the age of twenty-one years, each such person being a Communicant of the Church.

MODE OF ELECTION.

XI.—In case at any such meeting the persons proposed for election exceed the number which the meeting is authorised to elect, the Chairman shall take in writing the votes of the qualified persons present, each of whom may give one vote for such persons proposed as he or she may think fit, but not exceeding the number to be elected, and where the votes for two or more are equal, the Chairman, who shall have no other vote, shall give a casting-vote in favour of either one or more of such persons as the case may require, and the Chairman shall declare to the meeting the names of the persons elected.

CERTIFICATE OF ELECTION.

XII.—The Chairman shall cause to be delivered to each person elected a certificate of his election, and shall sign the minutes of the meeting in token of their correctness, and shall forward them to the Bishop of the Diocese, together with the subscribed declarations, the lists which have been laid before the said meeting, and a certificate of the names, callings and addresses of the persons elected to be laid before the Synod at its opening.

VACANCY IN CURE OR ABSENCE OF CLERGYMAN.

XIII.—If the cure be vacant, or the Clergyman be absent or unable from any other cause to act, the Bishop of the Diocese shall appoint a person to perform all the functions devolving on such clergyman under any of the five preceding sections of these constitutions.

SUMMONING OF CHANCELLOR AND REGISTRAR.

XIV.—The Bishop may summon to the Synod as members thereof the Chancellor and the Registrar of the Diocese, who shall have the same rights, powers and privileges as representative members, and may, also, summon such Clergymen holding distinct official positions in the Diocese as the Bishop may determine. Provided that for every Clergyman so summoned, a Layman may be elected as a Representative member under regulations of the Synod made for the purpose.

REPRESENTATION OF ST. PAUL'S COLLEGE.

XV.—The Warden of St. Paul's College, within the University of Sydney, shall always be summoned to the Synod of that Diocese as a clerical member thereof, and two lay members of the Church, to be elected by the Council of the said College from amongst themselves, shall likewise always be summoned to such Synod as representative members thereof, and the said Warden shall cause to be delivered to each member of the said council so elected and shall also forward to the Bishop a certificate of such election.

ELECTING REPRESENTATIVES FOR DISTRICTS.

XVI.—When a Clergyman has several districts having separate churches under his parochial charge, the Bishop may require such Clergyman to summon a meeting in connection with each of such churches in accordance with the provisions of clause eight to elect one Representative for each such district. Provided that no parochial district shall elect more than three representatives in the aggregate.

DECLARATION TO BE MADE.

XVII.—Each representative shall, before taking part in or voting at any Diocesan Synod, sign and deliver to the President the following declaration:—

“I, the undersigned A B., do declare that I am a communicant of the Church of England.”

SYNOD MAY ESTABLISH TRIBUNAL.

XVIII.—The Synod of each Diocese may establish a Tribunal for the trial of Clergymen licensed by the Bishop within the Diocese for offences, and the Provincial Synod may define such offences, among which shall be included breaches of discipline and questions of doctrine or ritual ; and the Synod of each Diocese may provide for and regulate the initiation and conduct of trials before and the proceedings under such Tribunal. No sentence shall be pronounced other than suspension or deprivation of license or office, and of the rights and emoluments thereto appertaining.

POWERS OF TRIBUNAL.

XIX.—Every such Tribunal shall have the same powers as are by the sixth and sixteenth sections of the Act of New South Wales, 55 Victoria No. 32 (the Arbitration Act, 1892), conferred on arbitrators ; and the seventh, fifteenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth and twenty-second sections of the same Act shall apply to proceedings before such Tribunal in the same manner, *mutatis mutandis*, as by the said Act they apply to arbitrations.

PROVISION FOR INCAPACITY.

XX.—The Synod of each Diocese may also, by ordinance, make provision for dealing with cases of incapacity for, or inefficiency in, the discharge of ministerial duty by Clergymen licensed by the Bishop within the Diocese, and may also make provision for the apportionment of any emoluments appertaining to the office of any such Clergyman between the Clergyman found incapable or inefficient and his successor.

CLERGYMAN'S LICENSE WHEN TO BE WITHDRAWN.

XXI.—The Synod of each Diocese shall have power to determine by ordinance in what cases the license of a Clergyman licensed within the Diocese may be suspended or revoked. Such

license may be suspended or revoked by the Bishop of the Diocese at a Clergyman's own request, or (after opportunity given to him to show cause) in such of the said cases as the Synod shall by ordinance determine. Save as aforesaid, the license shall not be suspended or revoked, except as a consequence of a judgment or finding of the tribunal or of some other court of competent jurisdiction.

PROVISION AS TO NEW DIOCESES.

XXII.—The provisions of these Constitutions shall, save as hereinbefore provided, be held to be binding upon any new Diocese which shall be hereafter constituted in the State.

PROVINCIAL SYNOD MAY BE HELD.

XXIII.—The Bishops and Clerical and Lay Representatives of the Church in the several Dioceses in the State of New South Wales shall meet in Provincial Synod under such articles and provisions as may have been, or may be from time to time, passed by the Provincial Synod, and assented to by all the said Dioceses. And, for the purpose of holding any session of the Provincial Synod the Bishop of Sydney, as the Metropolitan Bishop, shall, by writing under his hand and seal, summon the Bishop of each of the said Dioceses, and also require such Bishop to convene Representatives of the Church in his Diocese at such time and place as the Metropolitan may deem fit.

PROHIBITION IN RESPECT TO ALTERATIONS OF CHURCH
DOCTRINES AND LITURGY.

XXIV.—No rule, ordinance, or determination of any Diocesan or Provincial Synod shall make any alteration in the article liturgy or formularies of the Church, except in conformity with any alteration which may be made therein by any competent authority of the Church of England in England.

DEFECTS AND ERRORS AS TO ELECTIONS, ETC., NOT TO
VITIATE PROCEEDINGS.

XXV.—No rule, ordinance, or determination of any Diocesan Synod, or of any Provincial Synod, shall be vitiated by reason of the non-election, or non-appointment, or non-summoning of any person necessary to be elected, or appointed, or summoned thereto, respectively, or of any informality in or respecting any such election, appointment or summoning.

ABSENCE, ETC., OF BISHOP.

XXVI.—In case of the absence from the State of the Bishop of any Diocese, the powers by these Constitutions vested in him shall be exercised by a Commissary appointed by him, and in case no such Commissary shall have been appointed, or the See be vacant, such powers shall be exercised by the person who shall have been appointed for the purpose by an ordinance of Synod, or in default of such an ordinance by the person who shall then be the next in ecclesiastical rank or degree in the Diocese, and resident therein, until the return of the Bishop or the assumption of office by his successor.

NOTHING IN CONTRAVENTION OF LAW.

XXVII.—Provided always that no rule, ordinance or determination of any Diocesan or Provincial Synod shall be made in contravention of any law or statute in force for the time being in the State.

ORDINANCES TO BE TRANSMITTED TO THE ARCHBISHOP OF
CANTERBURY.

XXVIII.—A copy of ordinances passed by the Synod of each Diocese shall be sent by the Bishop thereof to the Metropolitan, who shall send the same, together with all ordinances passed by the Synod of his own Diocese, and the ordinances and determinations passed by any Provincial Synod to the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Election of Representatives to Synod.

SUGGESTED ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS FOR THE ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES TO THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF SYDNEY UNDER SECTIONS 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 OF THE CONSTITUTIONS.

1. On receiving the Archbishop's Mandate for the election of Representatives to the Synod of the Diocese, the Rector or other person appointed by the Archbishop shall summon a meeting of the Members of the Church, of the age of 21 years (being occupiers of seats in the Church or residents within the Parish) at such time, within the limits prescribed by the Archbishop, in such manner and at such place within the Parish as to such Rector or other person may seem convenient.

2. As soon as six persons, qualified as aforesaid, are present, the Rector, or, in his absence, the person appointed by the Archbishop (in the latter case the authorization should be read), shall take the chair.

NOTE.—In this number of six persons the Chairman is not included.

3. The Chairman, after prayers, shall state the object of the Meeting by reading the notice convening the same.

4. The Chairman shall cause a list to be made of those who are present and add thereto the names of any who subsequently attend before the proceedings are closed; and shall cause Minutes to be taken of the proceedings.

5. The Chairman shall require every Member of the Church present, before taking part in or voting at such Meeting, to subscribe the following Declaration:—

“I the undersigned A.B. do declare that I am a Member of the Church of England.”

6. The Chairman shall state the number of Representatives the Meeting is entitled to elect:—

NOTE.—Each person nominated must be either (a) a layman being a Communicant or (b) a Clergyman not licensed to a separate cure of souls.

7. Nominations are then to be made, and the Chairman, having enquired if any other person desires to make a nomination, and having received the names of all the persons nominated, shall proceed to announce such names to the Meeting.

8. If the nominations received are not in excess of the number of Representatives the Meeting is authorised to elect, the Chairman shall declare the persons nominated to be duly elected.

9. If the nominations are in excess of the number of Representatives the Meeting is authorised to elect, the Chairman shall request each of the qualified persons present to give him in writing the name or names of the person or persons nominated for whom he or she votes. Each person may give one vote for such of the persons proposed as he or she may think fit, but not exceeding the number to be elected.

10. The Chairman shall then announce the result of the voting, and, where the votes for two or more persons are equal, the Chairman, who has no other vote, shall give a casting vote in favour of one or more of such persons as the case may require, and shall then declare to the Meeting the names of the persons elected.

11. The Minutes of the Meeting shall then be written up, read and passed, and shall be signed by the Chairman.

12. The Chairman shall pronounce the Benediction and declare the meeting closed.

SUBSEQUENT PROCEEDINGS.

1. The Chairman shall sign and cause to be delivered to each person elected a certificate of his election.

2. The Chairman shall forward to the Archbishop:—

- (a) The Minutes of the Meeting duly signed.
- (b) The Lists and Declarations subscribed as provided for in Clauses 4 and 5 above.
- (c) A Certificate of the names, callings and addresses of the persons elected.

Should a vacancy occur in the representation of any parish by death, resignation, or otherwise, notice is to be sent to the Archbishop, who will then take the necessary steps, and issue instructions for a fresh election.

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Sydney Church Ordinance, 1912.

AN ORDINANCE providing for Parochial government and for the Management of Church Property, and for other purposes.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make provision for the several matters hereinafter mentioned the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales ordains as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the “SYDNEY CHURCH ORDINANCE 1912” and is divided into parts as follows:—

PART I.—REPEAL.

2. (1) The Sydney Church Ordinance and the Sydney Church Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1898 are hereby repealed but all the provisions thereof with respect to Churchwardens and Parochial Councils shall as to each Church continue in force until the next annual vestry meeting of such Church and notwithstanding part 7 of this Ordinance the provisions of Clause 34 of The Sydney Church Ordinance shall apply so far as they lawfully may until the 1st day of April, 1913.

- (2) The repeal of the said Ordinances shall not affect the past operation thereof nor anything suffered done or commenced nor any right privilege obligation or liability acquired accrued or incurred thereunder.
- (3) All offices established and all persons elected or appointed to and holding any office under the said repealed Ordinances shall continue and save as aforesaid they shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance as if it had been in force at the time such offices were established and such persons were elected and appointed and as if they had been established elected and appointed respectively hereunder.
- (4) Save as aforesaid and except so far as there is anything in this Ordinance inconsistent therewith this Ordinance shall apply to all matters and things made done or commenced under the said repealed Ordinances and at the commencement of this Ordinance of any force or effect or capable of acquiring any force or effect by virtue of the said repealed Ordinances as if this Ordinance had been in force at the time they were made done or commenced and they were made done or commenced hereunder.

PART 2.—INTERPRETATION.

3. In this Ordinance unless inconsistent with the context or subject matter.

- (1) "Archbishop" means the Archbishop of Sydney for the time being.
- (2) "Archbishop in Council" means the Archbishop on the advice of the Standing Committee.
- (3) "Church" when applicable to a building means a building of any Parish Mission District or Conventional District duly consecrated or licensed for the celebration of Divine Service the administration of the Sacraments and the performance of any other Rite or Ordinance of the Church of England and except in parts 5, 9, 10 and 11 includes Chapels and Mission Halls consecrated or licensed as aforesaid.
- (4) "Church of England" means the Church of England within the State of New South Wales.
- (5) "Church Property Trust" means the Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney incorporated under the "Church of England Trust Property Incorporation Act 1881."
- (6) "Financial year" means the period beginning with the 1st day of April and ending with the 31st day of March next following.

- (7) "Minister" means
- (a) as applied to a Parish the Minister duly licensed thereto for the time being by the Archbishop or his Commissary or the Administrator of the Diocese, and subject to such limitations as the said Minister or if the cure be vacant as the Archbishop shall prescribe the Minister duly licensed to officiate in the place of the said Minister or during such vacancy and
 - (b) as applied to a Mission District or Conventional District the Minister for the time being licensed thereto.
- (8) "Parish" means
- (a) a Parish exclusive of any part thereof comprised in any Mission District or any Conventional District
 - (b) a Mission District or
 - (c) a Conventional District.
- (9) "Parishioner" means any member of the Church of England including a married woman who
- (a) has usually during three months within the period of twelve months preceding the time being attended Divine Service in a Church of the Parish or
 - (b) being a resident in the Parish has at least three months but not more than twelve months preceding the time being paid in pew rent or otherwise one pound towards the general purposes of a Church of the Parish in respect of the financial year current at the time of such payment and such member shall be a parishioner of such Church provided that no such member may be a parishioner of more than one Church for the time being.
- (10) "Subscriber" means any member of the Church of England including a married woman who has paid one pound towards the erection of a building intended to become a Church or of the Parsonage for the Minister thereof.
- (11) "Vestry Meeting" means a meeting of the adult parishioners of a Church convened under the provisions of this Ordinance.

PART 3.—TRUSTEES.

Qualification.

4. An adult male member of the Church of England and no other person shall be eligible for election or appointment as a Trustee under this Ordinance.

Disqualification.

5. Any Trustee of any Parochial Church property who

- (1) shall have been absent either from the State for more than twelve months in succession or from more than three meetings of the Trustees in succession and in each case without the consent of his co-trustees and the sanction of the Archbishop.
- (2) shall neglect or refuse to execute a declaration of trust or to act in the trusts or to furnish any account called for under section 7 of this Ordinance.
- (3) shall become bankrupt or lunatic or
- (4) shall in the opinion of the Archbishop in Council be incapable or unworthy of acting

may be removed from his office of Trustee by the Archbishop in Council.

New Trustees.

6. Whenever any Trustee of any Parochial Church Property shall die or shall resign his office with the consent of his co-Trustees or co-Trustee if only one or shall be removed as aforesaid the vacancy thereby caused shall be filled as follows:—

- (1) Where such Church property is held for the sole benefit of some particular parish the Archbishop shall by writing give notice of such vacancy to the Minister and Churchwardens of the Church or the principal Church if more than one of such Parish and they shall within fourteen days call a vestry meeting of such Church and such meeting may by election fill up such vacancy.
- (2) In all other cases the vacancy shall be filled up by election by the Synod of the Diocese or if not so filled up or such Synod be not in session by the Standing Committee.
- (3) A certificate signed by the Archbishop shall in favor of *bona fide* purchasers for value be conclusive evidence that the persons named in such certificate are the duly constituted Trustees of the Parochial Church Property mentioned in such certificate and in the case of lands under the operation of the "Real Property Act 1900" or any Act amending or taking the place of the same shall so far as the Synod may lawfully so provide entitle such Trustees to be registered as the proprietors thereof and to have a Certificate of Title issued to them without any formal transfer.

Accounts.

7. The Synod or if the Synod be not in session the Standing Committee may call upon any Trustees of any Church property for any account of their dealings with the same and may submit such account to Auditors appointed by the Synod and the fees of such Auditors shall be paid by such Trustees out of such Church property.

Auditors.

8. At the first session of each Synod two or more persons shall be appointed by the Synod as Auditors for the purposes aforesaid provided that if no such appointment be made or a vacancy occurs the Standing Committee may make such appointment or fill such vacancy as the case may be.

Register of Trustees.

9. The names occupations and residences of all Trustees of any Parochial Church Property shall be registered in a Book to be kept by the Registrar of the Diocese. The Registrar of the Diocese shall also keep a Terrier of the Trust lands and particulars of other Trust Property held by the aforesaid Trustees.

PART 4.—SITES FOR NEW CHURCHES &C. NEW GLEBE LANDS
NEW BURIAL GROUNDS &C.

Conveyance and Transfer.

10. Whenever any person or persons or corporation shall desire to provide for the use of the members of the Church of England a site for the erection of a Church Parsonage School House or other building or a site with a building suitable for any such purpose already erected thereon or any Glebe Land Burial Ground or other land or any interest in land such person or persons or corporation having first obtained the sanction of the Archbishop and the consent of the Church Property Trust shall cause the said land or interest in land to be conveyed or transferred by instrument duly registered under the form of Conveyance contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance or under such other form of conveyance or transfer as may be approved by the Archbishop in Council.

Declaration of Trust.

11. In any case where such land or interest in land shall be transferred by Memorandum of Transfer under the Real Property Act or any Act amending or taking the place of the same then the Church Property Trust shall at the same time execute a Declaration of Trust in such terms as shall be approved by the Archbishop in Council.

Lodging Declaration of Trust.

12. The person or persons or corporation so causing such

land or interest in land to be transferred by Memorandum of Transfer as aforesaid shall cause such Declaration of Trust or a duplicate or attested copy thereof to be deposited with the Registrar-General.

Title Deeds &c.

13. Upon completion of the said Conveyance or Transfer as the case may be all documents of Title which relate to the land or interest in land so conveyed or transferred as aforesaid and which the Church Property Trust shall be entitled to shall forthwith be delivered to the Church Property Trust or to its order.

PART 5.—BUILDING NEW CHURCHES &C.

Plans &c.

14. The approval in writing of the Archbishop shall be obtained for the position and the plans and specifications of all buildings intended for a Church Parsonage School House or other building for the use of members of the Church of England before the erection thereof on any lands held upon trust for any Church purpose.

Consecration and License.

15. No building shall be consecrated or licensed as a Church until the site upon which it is erected has been so conveyed or transferred as aforesaid and it has been provided with such things as may be requisite for the celebration of Divine Service according to the law and usage of the Church of England.

Meeting of Subscribers.

16. Before or within thirty days after any building shall be consecrated or licensed as a Church a meeting of adult Subscribers shall be convened within such time as the Archbishop shall by writing appoint and all the provisions hereinafter contained which are applicable to an Annual Vestry Meeting and which relate to the validity and effect of things done or to be done at an Annual Vestry Meeting shall *mutatis mutandis* apply to such meeting of subscribers and for the purposes aforesaid "Subscriber" shall be read for "parishioner" and the functions of the Minister and Churchwardens shall be performed by such person or persons as the Archbishop shall by writing appoint.

PART 6.—CHURCHES &C. THEIR USES &C.

Person to Officiate.

17. No person shall be permitted to celebrate Divine Service administer the Sacraments perform any other rite or ordinance of the Church of England or preach any sermon in any Church unless he be first licensed or approved by the Archbishop.

Uses.

18. A Church shall not be used for any purpose other than the celebration of Divine Service the administration of the Sacraments the performance of the Rites and Ordinances of the Church of England or the giving of religious instruction except with the consent in writing of the Archbishop and of the Minister if any for the time being thereof and no person except the Archbishop shall be allowed to perform any clerical office in a Church except with the consent of the Minister or if there shall not be a Minister for the time being thereof with the consent of the Archbishop.

Registers and Records.

19. The Minister shall have the charge and be responsible for the safe custody of all Church Registers and Records other than current Books of Account and shall keep the same within the Church or in such other place as the Archbishop shall from time to time in writing appoint and if there be no Minister such custody and responsibility shall belong and attach to the Churchwardens.

Rights of Minister.

20. The Minister shall have free access and admission into the Church at all such time as he shall think fit, and may celebrate Divine Service administer the Sacraments and perform all other Rites and Ordinances of the Church of England therein without any hindrance from any person whomsoever and shall for such purposes have keys of the Church and shall freely have use possess and enjoy the parsonage garden and appurtenances and may freely use the School House and other Parochial buildings for such parochial purposes as he may deem desirable and shall for such purposes have keys thereof and shall have the use of seats in the Church as provided in section 41 (3).

Alterations Ornaments and Monuments.

21. It shall not be lawful to make any alteration by way of addition or diminution in the fabric utensils ornaments or furniture of a Church or in the internal arrangements thereof or otherwise howsoever nor to place any monument in any part of a Church save with the sanction of the Archbishop to be given by a Faculty or other form of permit provided that no such alteration utensils ornaments furniture or other things shall be permitted placed or remain in any Church nor in any such position therein as would be illegal in any Church of England in England.

Faculties &c.

22. Subject to any regulations made hereunder applications for such sanction as aforesaid shall be made by the Minister and by the Parish Council of the Parish in which the Church concerned is situated or if there be no Parish

Council then by the Minister and the Church Committee or if there be also no Church Committee then by the Minister and the Churchwardens of such Church.

Regulations.

23. The Archbishop in Council may from time to time make or approve of regulations for the practice procedure and forms and prescribe fees in respect of all matters arising under sections twenty-one and twenty-two.

Archbishop's Directions.

24. The Archbishop may for the purpose of enabling him to deal with any application made under sections twenty-one and twenty-two of this Ordinance direct all such notices to be given meetings to be summoned and other things to be done and in such manner as he may think fit.

PART 7.—GLEBE LANDS.

Leases.

25. The Trustees for the time being of any Glebe land may with the consent in writing of the Archbishop and as to any part of the said land which may be in the possession or occupation of the Minister for the time being of the Church to which such Glebe land is annexed with the further consent of such Minister let the said Glebe land upon building or other leases for any term not exceeding twenty-eight years reserving the rents and profits thereof to the Trustees for the time being.

Permanent Charges.

26. The Trustees for the time being of Glebe land which has been let in accordance with the provisions of the 21st Section of the Act 8 Wm. IV. No. 5 or of the Sydney Church Ordinance or which shall be let under this Ordinance shall hold the net rents and profits thereof after satisfying thereout from time to time the amounts which are permanently charged thereon by virtue of the original trusts of the said land and the "Church Acts Repealing Act of 1897" or otherwise upon trust to apply the same from time to time as hereinafter provided.

Application of Surplus Rents.

27. The said Trustees after satisfying the said amounts so permanently charged as aforesaid shall from time to time until otherwise determined by Synod apply the remainder if any of such net rents and profits in paying an additional one hundred and fifty pounds yearly to the Minister for the time being of the said Church and in paying one hundred and fifty pounds yearly to the Curate or other Assistant of such Minister and to such other purposes not amounting to a diversion from the purposes to which such Glebe land is devoted within the meaning of the "Church Acts Repealing Act

of 1897" as the Council for the time being of The Home Mission Society of the Diocese of Sydney from time to time with power to vary the same shall appoint and the Archbishop shall sanction and the Council for the time being of the said Society is hereby expressly authorised to make such appointments as aforesaid from time to time and to vary the same.

Minister's Rights.

28. Save as aforesaid the Minister shall be entitled to the Glebe land and to receive the rents and profits thereof and notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the Trustees shall if required by the Minister in cases where the Parsonage shall be situate upon the Glebe reserve and appropriate to the personal use and occupation of the Minister in addition to the amount per annum to be paid to him from the rents and profits of such Glebe such portion of such Glebe as shall be sanctioned by the Archbishop.

PART 8.—BURIAL GROUNDS.

Charge and Administration.

29. All lands including churchyards now or hereafter vested in Trustees and consecrated for the purpose of being used as a Burial Ground for a particular Parish shall be under the charge and administration of the Churchwardens and the Minister of the Parish in which such lands are situated and shall not be used for any purpose other than the burial of the dead according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England. Provided that if and when the Burial Ground of Saint Thomas' North Sydney shall be closed or further interments therein shall be prohibited by or under any Act for the time being in force the charge administration and management thereof may be placed by the Archbishop in the hands of a Committee to be from time to time appointed by him and the said Committee in carrying out the charge administration and management may act in such manner in all respects as they deem expedient and the Archbishop sanction.

Rules Regulations and Fees.

30. The Archbishop and such Trustees as aforesaid may together subject to the proviso in section 29 make and from time to time alter Rules and Regulations and scales of fees—

- (a) For the management of such Burial Ground.
- (b) For interments in such Burial Ground.
- (c) For the enclosure of land therein by kerbing or otherwise.
- (d) For any other matters including the application of any such fees.

Monuments and Vaults.

31. Subject to such Rules and Regulations and to the proviso in section 29 the Minister and Churchwardens may permit any monument to be erected or placed and any vault to be dug and made in any part of the Burial Ground and any alteration or addition to be made in or to any monument or vault.

PART 9.—VESTRY MEETINGS.

Convening.

32. Vestry Meetings may be convened by the Minister and Churchwardens of the Church and shall be convened by writing placed in a prominent position at each entrance to the Church and announcement at the morning and evening services or the service if only one at least two Sundays before such meeting stating the time and place of such meeting. Provided that in cases where service is for the time being celebrated less frequently than each Sunday such announcement may be made at the service or services celebrated on one Sunday only before such meeting.

Vestry Meetings may be convened at any time for the consideration of any business or matter connected with the Church.

Annual Vestry Meeting.

33. A Vestry Meeting shall be convened in respect of each Church in every year for some date later than the 31st day of March and within twenty-one days after Easter Monday unless the Archbishop in any case by writing either before or after such date shall have elapsed shall prescribe some other limit of time and such meeting shall be known as the Annual Vestry Meeting.

Quorum.

34. Six adult parishioners or the Minister and five adult parishioners shall constitute a quorum at any Vestry Meeting or adjourned Vestry Meeting.

If no quorum be present within half an hour after the time appointed for the meeting the Meeting shall stand adjourned for seven days the time and place for the adjourned meeting being the same as those appointed for the first meeting and the adult parishioners present at such adjourned meeting shall constitute a quorum for such meeting.

If a quorum be present at a Vestry Meeting or adjourned Vestry Meeting the meeting may from time to time be adjourned to such time and place as the Meeting may determine.

Chairman.

35. The Minister if present shall be the Chairman of the Vestry Meeting or any adjourned Vestry Meeting and if the Minister shall not be present at any time the meeting before

proceeding to or with business shall subject to an appointment under section 55 elect a Chairman who shall preside during the absence of the Minister. The Chairman shall have a casting vote only.

Business of Annual Vestry Meeting.

36. Each Annual Vestry Meeting shall—
- (1) Receive and pass or otherwise determine upon the accounts of the Churchwardens.
 - (2) Give directions as to the printing and distribution of the accounts of the Churchwardens.
 - (3) Elect two qualified persons to be Churchwardens.
 - (4) Appoint a person or persons to audit the accounts of the Churchwardens for the ensuing year.
 - (5) If it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of one of two or more Churches of a Parish determine whether or not there shall be a Church Committee and if in the affirmative elect three six or nine qualified persons to be members thereof.
 - (6) If it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of the only Church of a Parish—
 - (a) Determine whether or not there shall be a Parish Council and if in the affirmative
 - (b) Elect three six or nine qualified persons to be members thereof and
 - (c) Determine whether or not the rights powers and duties of a Church Committee shall vest in such Parish Council.
 - (7) Subject to any modification in particular cases under section 43 (2) if there be more than one Church of the Parish and it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of the principal Church elect three or six persons to be members of the Parish Council.
 - (8) Transact such other business connected with the Church as the meeting may desire.

Minister's Appointments.

37. The Minister shall at each Annual Vestry Meeting appoint one qualified person to be a Churchwarden and shall within three days after such meeting appoint one qualified person to be a member of the Parish Council and Church Committee respectively for each three persons elected at such meeting to be members thereof.

PART 10.—CHURCHWARDENS.

Qualifications.

38. Any male adult parishioner who is a Communicant member of the Church of England and no other person shall be qualified to be elected or appointed a Churchwarden.

New Churchwardens.

39. The office of a Churchwarden shall become vacant if he shall die resign or become bankrupt or lunatic or otherwise incapable of acting and the vacancy thereby caused shall be filled as follows:—

- (a) If he held office by virtue of election the Minister and Churchwardens shall within twenty-one days after the vacancy arises convene a Vestry Meeting and such Vestry Meeting shall elect a Churchwarden in his place.
- (b) If he held office by virtue of appointment the Minister shall within twenty-one days after the vacancy arises appoint a Churchwarden in his place.

Tenure of Office.

40. The persons so elected and appointed Churchwardens as aforesaid shall hold and execute the office of Churchwardens subject as aforesaid until the ensuing Annual Vestry Meeting and any act done by them or the majority of them as Churchwardens shall be deemed to be the act of the Churchwardens.

Rights Powers and Duties.

41. The rights powers and duties of Churchwardens besides those prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer shall be—

- (1) To have the charge and administration of all Parochial Church Funds and Property not by the Trusts under which they are held excluded from such charge or administration.
- (2) To keep order in the Church and Churchyard.
- (3) To have the superintendence and direction of all matters connected with the arrangement assignment and letting of seats in the Church provided that a sufficient number of the seats shall be reserved and always appropriated to the gratuitous use of the Minister.
- (4) To collect all seat rents and other moneys if any payable to the Churchwardens.
- (5) To have the care of the Church and its furniture and of other things appertaining to the celebration of Divine Service and to see that everything is fit and in proper order for the due performance thereof.
- (6) To report to the Archbishop any grave irregularities in the performance of Divine Service any wilful neglect of duty or any flagrant misconduct on the part of the Minister.
- (7) To report forthwith to the Registrar of the Diocese the names addresses and occupations of all persons

elected or appointed to be Trustees Churchwardens members of Church Committees or members of Parish Councils.

- (8) To insure the Church or Churches the fittings fixtures and furniture therein and the parsonage schools and all other buildings with the appurtenances thereof taking care that the insurances are in the names of the proper persons and are otherwise in order.
- (9) Before every Annual Vestry Meeting to prepare a statement of all moneys received and expended by them during the previous financial year and a balance sheet for the said year in such form as the Archbishop in Council may from time to time prescribe which shall be duly certified by their own signatures and by the signatures of the Auditor or Auditors duly appointed as hereinbefore mentioned and to produce at the Annual Vestry Meeting such statement and balance sheets so certified and to forward copies thereof to the Registrar of the Diocese and to deliver to their successors the book or books containing the accounts of such moneys and likewise all vouchers for payments together with such balance as shall appear by the said accounts to be remaining in their hands. Also to prepare and submit to the Meeting an account showing all moneys received by them after the termination of the financial year and all payments made thereout for stipends and salaries and urgent expenses connected with Divine worship and hand over the balance of such moneys to their successors and also to cause statements of account to be printed and distributed as directed by the Annual Vestry Meeting.

Rights &c. if no Church Committee or no Parish Council.

42. (a) If there be only one Church of the Parish and the Annual Vestry Meeting shall not have determined that the rights powers and duties of a Church Committee shall vest in the Parish Council such rights powers and duties shall for the ensuing year vest in the Minister and Churchwardens and if there be no Parish Council the rights powers and duties of a Parish Council shall also for the ensuing year vest in the Minister and Churchwardens.
- (b) If the Annual Vestry Meeting shall not have determined under section 36 that there shall be a Church Committee the rights powers and duties of a Church Committee shall for the ensuing year vest in the Minister and Churchwardens.

PART 11.—PARISH COUNCILS AND CHURCH
COMMITTEES.

Constitution of Parish Councils.

43. (1) If there be only one Church of the Parish and the Annual Vestry Meeting shall have determined that there shall be a Parish Council there shall for the ensuing year be a Parish Council which shall consist of the Minister and Churchwardens and such persons so elected and appointed thereto at and after such Annual Vestry Meeting as aforesaid.
- (2) If there be more than one Church of the Parish there shall be a Parish Council which shall consist of the Minister and Churchwardens of the principal Church and such persons so elected and appointed thereto at and after the Annual Vestry Meeting as aforesaid and also of such one of the Churchwardens of each other Church of the Parish as shall be appointed thereto from time to time by such Churchwardens. Provided that on the application of the Churchwardens of any Church of the Parish the Archbishop in Council may make any modification of the Constitution of the Parish Council in the particular case of such Parish.

Constitution of Church Committees.

44. If the Annual Vestry Meeting shall have determined under section 36 that there shall be a Church Committee there shall for the ensuing year be a Church Committee which shall consist of the Minister and Churchwardens and of such persons so elected and appointed thereto at and after such Annual Vestry Meeting as aforesaid.

Qualification.

45. Any male adult parishioner who is a Communicant member of the Church of England and no other person shall be qualified to be elected or appointed a member of the Parish Council and Church Committee respectively.

Filling up Vacancies.

46. The office of member of a Parish Council or Church Committee shall become vacant if he shall die resign or become bankrupt or lunatic or otherwise incapable of acting and the vacancy thereby caused shall be filled as follows:—

- (a) If he held office by virtue of election the Minister and the Churchwardens of the Church at the Vestry Meeting whereof he was elected shall within twenty-one days after the vacancy arises convene a Vestry Meeting and such Vestry Meeting shall elect a person in his place.

- (b) If he held office by virtue of an appointment by the Minister the Minister shall within twenty-one days after the vacancy arises appoint a person in his place.

Tenure of Office.

47. The persons so elected and appointed members of the Parish Council and Church Committee respectively as aforesaid shall hold office subject as aforesaid until the ensuing Annual Vestry Meeting.

Meetings.

48. The first meeting of the Parish Council shall be called by the Minister or the Churchwardens of the principal or only Church as the case may be and the first meeting of the Church Committee shall be called by the Minister or the Churchwardens of the Church and all subsequent meetings shall be called by such persons and at such times as the Council or Committee respectively shall determine. Provided that the Minister or a majority of the Council or Committee respectively may call a special meeting of the Council or Committee respectively at any time by written notice to each member thereof.

Chairman.

49. The Minister shall be Chairman but if he be not present the members shall elect a Chairman who shall preside during the absence of the Minister. The Chairman shall have a casting vote only.

Quorum.

50. At all meetings of the Council or Committee respectively one-third of the existing number of members thereof shall constitute a quorum.

Rights etc. of Parish Councils.

51. The rights powers and duties of a Parish Council but without imposing on the members thereof any legal liability shall be :—

- (1) To fix and with the consent of the Minister and Archbishop or if the cure be vacant with the consent of the Archbishop alone from time to time to alter the stipend of the Minister provided that any endowment or other income-producing gift for or towards or supplementing the stipend of the Minister shall not affect an alteration of the stipend so fixed or altered as aforesaid, but the annual amount of such gift when received by the Minister shall be deemed to have been received on account of the current year's stipend.
- (2) Where there are two or more Churches of the Parish also to fix and from time to time to alter the proportion of the stipend to be contributed by each Church provided that the Parish Council shall forthwith give to the Churchwardens

of each Church of the Parish notice of any determination under this sub-section and the Churchwardens of any such Church may within sixty days after receiving such notice appeal from such determination to the Archbishop and the decision of the Archbishop thereon shall be final.

- (3) To fix with the consent of the Minister the stipend of any Curate or of any Catechist or other lay worker.
- (4) To consult and take proper action either *proprio motu* or on reference by a Vestry Meeting or the Minister upon all measures of general interest to the Parish.

Rights etc. of Church Committees.

52. The rights powers and duties of a Church Committee but without imposing on the members thereof any legal liability shall be:—

- (1) To provide moneys for special or general Church purposes.
- (2) To control the funds and property of the Church except so far as the same are by the trusts under which they are held excluded from such control provided that no school building shall be used for any purpose not sanctioned by the Minister.
- (3) To fix and from time to time to alter the salaries to be paid to any lay persons holding any office in or about the Church.
- (4) To repair the Church or Churches the fittings fixtures and furniture therein and the Parsonage Schools and all other buildings with the appurtenances thereof.
- (5) To provide the Minister with sufficient means for the safe custody of all Church Registers and records.
- (6) To provide the Minister with funds towards the relief of the poor of the parish or district.
- (7) To direct the expenditure or investment of any surplus funds.
- (8) From time to time to fix the terms of the agreements which the Churchwardens may make with persons for the letting to them of seats and to vary any arrangement existing with regard to seats being rented or free (provided that at least one-third of the seats shall always be free) and to increase or reduce the rent which shall have been previously fixed for such seats. Provided that three months' notice of such increase or reduction be given to existing seat-holders and that such increase or reduction shall not take effect until the expiration of any then current tenancy. Provided also that if there is a debt upon the Church Parsonage or School buildings for which any persons are personally liable no such reduction shall take place nor shall the number of free seats be increased without the consent in writing of such persons.
- (9) To fill up any vacancy in the office of Auditor.
- (10) To confer with another Committee or other Committees upon any matter affecting the Parish or any part thereof.

PART 12.—OFFICERS—APPOINTMENT AND REMOVAL.

53. The Organist and Choir of each Church shall from time to time be appointed and removed by the Minister and all other officers shall be appointed by the Churchwardens of such Church with the concurrence of the Minister.

PART 13.—ABSENCE ETC. OF ARCHBISHOP.

54. In the absence of the Archbishop from the State of New South Wales the powers by this Ordinance vested in him shall (subject to such limitations as he may prescribe) be exercised by a Commissary appointed by him and in default of such appointment or if the Archbishop be incapable of acting then by the person who if the See were vacant would be the administrator of the Diocese and if the See be vacant then by such administrator.

PART 14.—ABSENCE ETC. OF MINISTERS

55. In any case where there shall be no Minister or no Minister competent and willing to discharge the functions or any of the functions devolving upon him under this Ordinance any person appointed by the Archbishop by writing may discharge such functions and such discharge shall have the same validity and effect in all respects as if there had been a Minister competent and willing to discharge and he had discharged the same.

PART 15.—GENERAL.

Exemption of Cathedral.

56. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be held to refer to the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew Sydney or to the lands and property belonging thereto.

Disputes.

57. In all cases where any question or dispute shall arise—

- (1) As to whether any meeting of Subscribers Parishioners or Trustees or
- (2) As to whether any election or appointment of any person or persons to any office established or provided for by this Ordinance

has been effectively provided for or has been called or made in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance such question or dispute may be determined by the Archbishop in Council. And in all cases where any question or dispute shall arise

- (3) As to whether any vacancy has arisen in the office of Churchwarden or of a member of a Parish Council or a Church Committee.
- (4) As to which are for the time being the boundaries of any Parish.
- (5) As to which is for the time being the principal Church of any Parish or

(6) As to which is the Church in respect of which any person is for the time being a parishioner such question or dispute may be determined by the Archbishop alone.

Procedure.

58. The Archbishop or the Archbishop in Council as the case may be shall enter into the consideration of any such question or dispute as aforesaid only upon the application of some person or persons interested therein and for the purpose of determining the same the Archbishop or the Archbishop in Council as the case may be may give all such notices may make such inquiries and do all such things as shall appear reasonable and proper under the circumstances.

In default of Meetings and Appointments.

59. (1) In all cases where
- (a) any meeting of Subscribers Parishioners or Trustees or
 - (b) any election or appointment of any person either originally or in case of a vacancy to any office established or provided for by this Ordinance
- has been ineffectively provided for or shall not be called or made in accordance with the preceding provisions of this Ordinance the Archbishop

The Archbishop may call Meeting.

- (c) may call such meeting by such notice and for such time and place as he may think fit or may by writing appoint some other person to call such meeting for such time and place as aforesaid and to act as Chairman thereof

And make Appointments.

- (d) may by writing appoint to any such office any person duly qualified therefor under this Ordinance.

Validity of such Meetings and Appointments.

- (2) All such meetings and appointments so authorised as aforesaid shall have the same authority validity and effect and be deemed to be the same in all respects as if they had been called and made respectively in accordance with the said provisions.

Archbishop may use Schoolhouse, etc., for Meetings.

60. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained any Schoolhouse or other parochial building shall on the requisition of the Archbishop be available for the purpose of any meeting which the Archbishop may call or appoint some other person to call under this Ordinance.

Marginal Notes.

61. The marginal notes shall not for the purposes of construction be deemed to be part of this Ordinance.

SCHEDULE.

CONVEYANCE TO THE CORPORATE TRUSTEES.

THIS INDENTURE made the _____ day of _____ between A.B. _____ of _____ of the one part and the Church of England Property Trust Diocese of Sydney a body Corporate (hereinafter called the said Church Property Trust) of the other part Witnesseth that at the request of the said Church Property Trust [and in consideration of _____] He the said A.B. doth grant and release unto the said Church Property Trust and their successors all that together with all buildings rights privileges easements and appurtenances to the said hereditaments or any of them appertaining or with the same or any of them now or heretofore enjoyed or reputed as part thereof or appurtenant thereto And all the estate right title and interest of the said A.B. in and to the said premises To hold the said premises hereinbefore expressed to be hereby granted and released unto and to the use of the said Church Property Trust their successors and assigns Upon Trust to permit a [*Church, School, or as may be*] to be erected on the said land to be called _____ and to be subject to the provisions of the "Sydney Church Ordinance 1912" or any other Ordinance of the Diocese of Sydney for the time being in force and applicable to the said land.

A Guide to the Conduct of Vestry Meetings under the Sydney Church Ordinance 1912.

Prepared at the request of the Standing Committee by
T. C. J. FOSTER, ESQ., Barrister-at-Law.

Vestry Meetings are divided into "The Annual Vestry Meeting" and "Vestry Meetings"; but the provisions of the Ordinance apply equally to all except when specially distinguished.

Vestry Meetings can only be held in connection with a Church (s. 33 and s. 3 ss. 3). A Chapel or Mission Hall, though consecrated and licensed, is not a Church for the purpose of having a Vestry Meeting (*ibid*). With these two exceptions every Church and every Parish, Mission District or Conventional District, having a Minister and Churchwardens, is a Church entitled to have a Vestry Meeting.

Convening.

1. Vestry Meetings must be convened by the Minister and Churchwardens (s. 32) (except in case under sec. 59 of the Ordinance, when the Archbishop is empowered to call the meeting). Section of Ordinance.

2. By writing placed in a prominent position at each entrance to the Church (s. 32).

3. By announcement at the morning and evening services at least two Sundays before such meeting. When there is only one service, the announcement must be made at such service. Where there is service less frequently than each Sunday, the announcement may be made at the service or services celebrated on one Sunday only before such meeting (s. 32). Sec. 32

These provisions are not in the alternative; all of them must be complied with.

Vestry Meetings may be convened at any time for the consideration of any Church business or matters (s. 32).

Annual Vestry Meeting.

1. The Annual Vestry Meeting must be convened in respect of each Church in every year (s. 33). Sec. 33

2. It must be convened for some date later than 31st of March (the end of the Financial Year), and within twenty-one days after Easter Monday, unless the Archbishop by writing prescribes some other limit of time, which he may do either before or after the proper time for holding the meeting has elapsed. This meeting is to be known as the Annual Vestry Meeting (s. 33).

It is important that the preceding provisions as to convening should be duly carried out, as any failure to fulfil the requirements of sections 32 and 33 of the Ordinance to the letter will probably lead to the setting aside of all that has been done, and the whole procedure having to be begun *de novo*. (Sections 57, 58, 59 of the Ordinance).

Quorum.

Six adult parishioners, or the Minister and five adult parishioners, shall constitute a quorum at any Vestry Meeting or adjourned Vestry Meeting (s. 34). If the meeting stands adjourned

Sec. 34

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in consequence of no quorum being present within half an hour after the time appointed for the meeting, the adult parishioners present at the adjourned meeting shall constitute a quorum for such meeting (s. 34); that is to say, that the adult parishioners present at the adjourned meeting, be they more or fewer than 5 or 6 as the case may be, are sufficient to carry on the adjourned meeting and so prevent an absolute stoppage.

It should be noted that where a Parish has the right to elect nominators under the Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912, the election of such nominators should take place at the Annual Vestry Meeting, or if there is more than one Church of the Parish at such one of the Annual Vestry Meetings of the Parish as the Archbishop shall direct, but the quorum necessary for such purpose is increased to nine duly qualified persons. And see note to s. 36 (8) post.

Adjournment.

Sec. 34

If no quorum is present at a Vestry Meeting within half an hour after the time appointed, the meeting shall stand adjourned for seven days, the time and place appointed for the adjourned meeting being the same as those appointed for the first meeting (s. 34).

If a quorum is present at a Vestry Meeting or adjourned Vestry Meeting, the meeting may be adjourned from time to time to such time and place as the meeting may determine (s. 34).

No provision has been made in the Ordinance for notice of such adjourned meeting, but it would be advisable that some announcement in Church should be made of the time and place and, when such adjournment was from want of a quorum, urging a larger attendance.

Chairman.

Sec. 35

The Minister, if present, shall be the Chairman of the meeting or adjourned meeting. If the Minister is not present at any time, the meeting before proceeding to or with business shall (if the Archbishop has not before appointed any person to discharge the functions of the Minister, in which case such person shall be the Chairman) elect a Chairman who shall preside during the absence of the Minister (s. 35).

The Chairman shall have a casting vote only (s. 35).

The word Minister is defined in the interpretation section of the Ordinance (s. 3, ss. 7). In the case of a Parish it is the Minister duly licensed thereto, or if the cure be vacant the Minister licensed to officiate in place of the said Minister during such vacancy (s. 3, ss. 7 (a)). In the case of a Mission District or Conventional District it is the Minister for the time being licensed thereto (s. 3, ss. 7 (b)). A Curate does not come within any of these definitions unless there are special words in his license which bring him within either of them.

Who may Vote and take part in the Proceedings at a Vestry Meeting. Section of Ordinance.

All adult parishioners are entitled to vote and take part in the proceedings at Vestry Meetings. A parishioner is defined in the Interpretation Section (3) ss. 9, to be any member of the Church of England including a married woman who

- (a) has usually during three months within the period of twelve months preceding the time being attended Divine Service in a Church of the Parish; or
- (b) being a resident in the Parish has at least three months but not more than twelve months preceding the time being paid in pew rent or otherwise one pound towards the general purposes of a Church of the Parish in respect of the financial year current at the time of such payment; and such member shall be a parishioner of such Church. But no such member may be a parishioner of more than one Church for the time being (s. 3, ss. 9).

No provision has been made in the Ordinance for determining whether a person claiming to vote as a parishioner is so entitled or not, but in the event of a disputed election on the ground that a person was elected to an office by reason of votes being counted which were given by persons not qualified to vote, the Ordinance provides in s. 59 ss. (b) and (d), that "in all cases where any election to any office provided for by this Ordinance has not been made in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance the Archbishop may appoint to such office any person duly qualified therefor." The qualification of a parishioner is in the alternative, and a person in arrears with pew rent, etc., under s. 3, ss. (b), may still claim to vote by virtue of his attendance under s. 3, ss. (a). The Ordinance does not provide for plural voting; each parishioner is entitled to one vote only, irrespective of the number of sittings he rents or the amount he has contributed.

Business of Annual Vestry Meeting.

It is desirable that the order of business as given in the Ordinance should be strictly followed, as tending to prevent confusion. Each Annual Vestry Meeting shall

- (1) Receive and pass or otherwise determine upon the accounts of the Churchwardens. Sec. 36

The retiring Churchwardens must before the Annual Vestry Meeting prepare a statement of all moneys received and expended by them during the previous Financial Year (the period from 1st of April to 31st of March inclusive). They must also prepare a balance sheet in the prescribed form, duly certified by their own signatures, and the signatures of the Auditors duly appointed. They must produce this statement and the balance sheets so

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certified to the Annual Vestry Meeting. The meeting will then proceed to discuss and pass or otherwise determine as to the accounts. Copies of the statement and balance sheet must be sent by the Churchwardens to the Registrar of the Diocese.

The retiring Churchwardens must also prepare and submit to the meeting an account showing all moneys received by them since the termination of the financial year (i.e., 31st March) and all payments made by them thereout for stipends and salaries and urgent expenses connected with Divine Worship. If the previous Annual Vestry Meeting has so directed, the Churchwardens must cause statements of account and balance sheet to be distributed as directed.

Sec. 36

- (2) Give directions as to the printing and distribution of the accounts of the Churchwardens.

This is generally done in regard to the accounts for the coming year, but if no directions were given at the previous Annual Vestry Meeting it may be done at this stage.

Sec. 36

- (3) Elect two qualified persons to be Churchwardens.

This is the proper stage for this proceeding. The qualifications of a Churchwarden are: He must be a male adult parishioner and a communicant member of the Church of England. No other person can be elected or appointed as a Churchwarden (s. 38). Three Churchwardens in all are required, one appointed by the Minister at the Annual Vestry Meeting (s. 37), and two elected by the adult parishioners at the same meeting. The power of Trustees to appoint a Churchwarden has been abolished by the repeal of the previous Sydney Church Ordinance.

If more than the required number of persons are duly nominated, the two who obtain a majority of the votes of those present and qualified to vote, will be the duly elected Churchwardens. The Ordinance does not provide for any method in which votes are to be taken. In some cases a show of hands might be sufficient, but in most cases a vote by ballot would be required, and probably the most suitable way of doing this would be for each voter to write on a slip of paper the name or names (to the required number) of those nominated for whom he wishes to vote, and these slips of paper having been collected and the votes counted by scrutineers appointed by the meeting or the chairman, the chairman should declare the result in accordance with the report of the scrutineers, and the persons obtaining the majority of votes should be declared elected Churchwardens for the ensuing year. Adult parishioners only are allowed to vote for the election of

Churchwardens. The Minister must at the same meeting as the Churchwardens are elected, appoint one qualified person to be a Churchwarden (s. 37), which is usually done by announcing his appointment to the meeting. Both elected and appointed Churchwardens must be adult male parishioners and communicants of the Church of England. Section of Ordinance.

- (4) Elect a person or persons to audit the accounts of the Churchwardens for the ensuing year. Sec. 36

Care should be taken to elect competent men to this important office. Their signatures are a certificate to the correctness of the accounts and should never be given until the items in the books of accounts and the vouchers have been carefully compared. If the accounts are not properly kept or if there are any unexplained items, a note calling the attention of the meeting to this should be made on the balance sheet by the Auditors.

- (5) If it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of one of two or more Churches of a Parish, determine whether or not there shall be a Church Committee, and if in the affirmative elect three, six, or nine qualified persons to be members thereof. Sec. 36

Church Committee is a new term in the Ordinance and takes the place to some extent of the old Parochial Council (now abolished). It consists of the Minister and Churchwardens, and of such persons as are elected and appointed at the Annual Vestry Meeting. If the Annual Vestry Meeting has determined that there shall be a Church Committee, then they also determine whether there shall be three, six, or nine persons elected to it, and elect the number decided upon in the same way as Churchwardens are elected. Members of a Church Committee must have the same qualifications as Churchwardens, *i.e.*, they must be male adult Parishioners and Communicants of the Church of England. The Minister has the right, which he must exercise, of appointing one qualified person to be a member of the Church Committee for every three persons elected by the parishioners at the Annual Vestry Meeting; but the Minister has three days after the meeting within which to make his appointments (s. 37). If the meeting does not determine to elect a Church Committee, then the rights, powers, and duties of such Church Committee vest in the Minister and Churchwardens (s. 42), except in cases under the next following sub-section (c).

- (6) If it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of the only Church of the Parish Sec. 36

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Ordinance.

- (a) Determine whether or not there shall be a Parish Council, and if in the affirmative
- (b) Elect three, six, or nine qualified persons to be members thereof, and
- (c) Determine whether or not the rights, powers, and duties of a Church Committee shall vest in such Parish Council.

The number of members to be elected to the Council having been determined, the meeting will elect them in a similar manner to that in which Churchwardens or members of Church Committees are elected (see ante). The Minister must appoint a qualified person or persons in the proportion of one to every three elected, as in the case of a Church Committee. If it is not determined that there shall be a Parish Council the necessity for determining whether the rights, etc., of a Church Committee shall vest in it or not will not arise, and such rights, etc., will vest in the Minister and Churchwardens under s. 42.

Sec. 34

- (7) Subject to any modification in particular cases under s. 43 (2) if there be more than one Church of the Parish, and it is the Annual Vestry Meeting of the Principal Church, elect three or six persons to be members of the Parish Council.

In the previous sub-section (6) the matter of deciding whether there shall or not be a Parish Council rests with the meeting. In the present instance, however, the matter is already decided; it is compulsory to have a Parish Council. The number to be elected in this case must not exceed six nor be less than three, and the Minister's appointments to it are two or one respectively. The elected and appointed members, together with the Minister and Churchwardens form the Parish Council. Under s. 43, ss. 2, the Parish Council is made up of the Minister and Churchwardens of the Principal Church of the Parish, and either three or six members elected at the Annual Vestry Meeting, and one or two appointed by the Minister, as the case may be. To these must be added one appointed member for each Church of the Parish other than the Principal Church. This appointed member must be a Churchwarden of the Church he represents, and is appointed by the Churchwardens of that Church, and the appointment may be made at any time. To give an instance of the constitution of a Parish Council under this sub-section. The Principal Church would have the

Minister and three Churchwardens, (say) six elected members, and two appointed by the Minister. To these would be added if there were two Churches besides the Principal Church, two members appointed by the Churchwardens of those Churches, and the full strength of the Parish Council would be 12 from the Principal Church and two from the other Churches. As in some cases the relative importance of the Churches in a parish may be equal or nearly so, the Archbishop in Council is empowered under the sub-section on the application of the Churchwardens of any Church of the Parish to make any modification of the Constitution of the Parish Council in such cases as he thinks fit (s. 43, ss. 2), and might, if he pleased, make the representation of each Church on the Parish Council equal. If there is any question or dispute as to which is the Principal Church, the Archbishop may determine it alone (s. 57, ss. 5).

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- (8) Transact such other business connected with the Church as the meeting may desire. Sec. 36

Another important item of business connected with the Church to be transacted at the Annual Vestry Meeting is the election of Parish Nominators under the Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912, if the Parish possesses the right of nomination. Attention must, however, be drawn to the fact that for this purpose the meeting must have a quorum of at least nine persons qualified to vote. This qualification is the same as that required for persons voting at Vestry Meetings, *i.e.*, they must be Parishioners. It is important that this quorum should be present as otherwise no election of Parish Nominators can take place, and the right to appoint an Incumbent will vest in the Archbishop. (Presentation Amendment; Ordinance of 1912, s. 10.)

VACANCIES.

A vacancy is caused in the office of a Churchwarden, member of a Church Committee, or member of a Parish Council by the death, resignation, bankruptcy, or lunacy, or other incapability of acting (s. 39, s. 46), and probably the same would apply to the office of Auditor. Sec. 39
Sec. 46

FILLING UP VACANCIES.

On the occurrence of a vacancy, if it arises in the office of a person elected to the office, the Minister and Churchwardens must, within 21 days after the vacancy arises, convene a Vestry Meeting, and such Vestry Meeting shall elect a person to fill the vacant office (s. 39, and s. 46). In the case of vacancies in a Parish Council or Church Committee, the Minister and Churchwardens of the Church at whose Vestry Meeting the election took place, must Sec. 39
Sec. 46

Section of Ordinance. within the time stated, convene a Vestry Meeting, and such Vestry Meeting must elect a person to fill the vacancy (s. 46, ss. (a)). The Vestry Meeting must be convened in the manner set out in sec. 32.

Sec. 39 If the vacancy is in an office held by virtue of appointment, the Minister must, within 21 days after the vacancy arises, fill up the vacancy by appointing a qualified person (s. 39 and s. 46).
 Sec. 46 If there is any question or dispute as to a vacancy having arisen, such question or dispute may be determined by the Archbishop alone (s. 57). The Archbishop will only enter upon the consideration of such question or dispute upon the application of some person or persons interested therein (s. 58).

A vacancy in the office of Auditor is filled up by the Church Committee s. 52 (9) (if there is one). Where there is no Church Committee the Minister and Churchwardens exercise this power (s. 42, ss. b), unless it has been determined under s. 36, ss. 6, that the rights, etc., of the Church Committee shall vest in the Parish Council.

Rights, Powers, and Duties of Churchwardens besides those prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer.

Sec. 41 1. To have the charge and administration of all Parochial Funds and property not by the trusts under which they are held excluded from such charge or administration.

Sec. 41 2. To keep order in the Church and Churchyard.

Sec. 41 3. To have the superintendence and direction of all matters connected with the arrangement, assignment, and letting of seats in the Church, provided that a sufficient number of the seats shall be reserved and always appropriated to the gratuitous use of the Minister.

The duty of fixing the terms of the agreements for the letting of seats belongs to the Church Committee, as also does the varying of any arrangements existing with regard to seats being rented or free, and the increasing or reduction of the rent for such seats. Where there is no Church Committee these duties are exercised by the Minister and Churchwardens, except where they have been given to the Parish Council under s. 36, ss. 6.

Sec. 41 4. To collect all seat rents and other moneys if any payable to the Churchwardens.

Sec. 41 5. To have the care of the Church and its furniture and of other things appertaining to the celebration of Divine Service, and to see that everything is fit and in proper order for the due performance thereof.

Sec. 41 6. To report to the Archbishop any grave irregularities in the performance of Divine Service, any wilful neglect of duty, or any flagrant misconduct on the part of the Minister.

Sec. 41 7. To report forthwith to the Registrar of the Diocese the names, addresses, and occupations of all persons elected or appointed

to be Trustees, Churchwardens, Members of Church Committees, **Section of Ordinance**
or Members of Parish Councils.

8. To insure the Church or Churches, the fittings, fixtures, **Sec. 41**
and furniture therein, and the Parsonage, Schools, and all other
buildings with the appurtenances thereof, taking care that the
insurances are in the names of the proper persons and are other-
wise in order.

The proper persons to be named in the insurance are those
having an insurable interest. As regards the fabric and permanent
fixtures of the Church, the Trustees or Trustee would be the proper
persons. As regards the furniture and movable fittings, the Church-
wardens would have the insurable interest.

9. Before every Annual Vestry Meeting to prepare a state- **Sec. 41**
ment of all moneys received and expended by them during the
previous financial year and a balance sheet for the said year in
such form as the Archbishop in Council may from time to time
prescribe which shall be duly certified by their own signatures
and by the signatures of the Auditor or Auditors duly appointed
as hereinbefore mentioned and to produce at the Annual Vestry
Meeting such statement and balance sheets so certified and to
forward copies thereof to the Registrar of the Diocese and deliver
to their successors the book or books containing the accounts of
such moneys and likewise all vouchers for payments together with
such balance as shall appear by the said accounts to be remaining
in their hands. Also to prepare and submit to the Meeting an
account showing all moneys received by them after the termination
of the financial year and all payments made thereout for stipends
and salaries and urgent expenses connected with Divine Worship
and hand over the balance of such moneys to their successors, and
also to cause statements of account to be printed and distributed
as directed by the Annual Vestry Meeting.

The Churchwardens have to prepare and produce at the Annual
Vestry Meeting a statement and a balance sheet as well as the
further account relating to moneys received and expended after
the termination of the financial year. The statement and balance
sheet must be in the prescribed form and copies thereof must be
forwarded to the Registrar of the Diocese.

Churchwardens hold office until the ensuing Annual Vestry
Meeting. Any act done by them or the majority of them is deemed
to be the act of the Churchwardens (s. 40).

Parish Councils and Church Committees.

Members of these, whether elected or appointed, hold office
until the ensuing Annual Vestry Meeting (s. 47). The first meet-
ing of a Parish Council must be called by the Minister or the Church-
wardens of the Principal or only Church as the case may be, and
the first meeting of a Church Committee by the Minister or the

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Churchwardens of the Church immediately concerned. Subsequent meetings of Council or Committee are called by such persons and at such times as the Council or Committee respectively shall determine. A special meeting of either body may be called by the Minister or a majority of the Council or Committee respectively at any time by written notice to each member (s. 48).

The Minister shall be Chairman if present, but if he is not, a Chairman to preside during his absence may be elected by the meeting. The Chairman has a casting vote only (s. 49).

The quorum for meetings of the Parish Council or Church Committee is one-third of the existing members thereof (s. 50).

The rights powers and duties of a Parish Council but without imposing on the members thereof any legal liability shall be:—

Sec. 51

- (1) To fix and with the consent of the Minister and Archbishop or if the cure be vacant with the consent of the Archbishop alone from time to time to alter the stipend of the Minister provided that any endowment or other income-producing gift for or towards or supplementing the stipend of the Minister shall not affect an alteration of the stipend so fixed or altered as aforesaid, but the annual amount of such gift when received by the Minister shall be deemed to have been received on account of the current year's stipend.
- (2) Where there are two or more Churches of the Parish also to fix and from time to time to alter the proportion of the stipend to be contributed by each Church provided that the Parish Council shall forthwith give to the Churchwardens of each Church of the Parish notice of any determination under this sub-section and the Churchwardens of any such Church may within sixty days after receiving such notice appeal from such determination to the Archbishop and the decision of the Archbishop thereon shall be final.
- (3) To fix with the consent of the Minister the stipend of any Curate or of any Catechist or other lay worker.
- (4) To consult and take proper action either *proprio motu* or on reference by a Vestry Meeting or the Minister upon all measures of general interest to the Parish.

The rights powers and duties of a Church Committee but without imposing on the members thereof any legal liability shall be:—

Sec. 52

- (1) To provide moneys for special or general Church purposes.
- (2) To control the funds and property of the Church except so far as the same are by the trusts under which they are held excluded from such control provided that no school building shall be used for any purpose not sanctioned by the Minister.

- (3) To fix and from time to time to alter the salaries to be paid to any lay persons holding any office in or about the Church. Section of Ordinance.
 - (4) To repair the Church or Churches the fittings fixtures and furniture therein and the Parsonage Schools and all other buildings with the appurtenances thereof.
 - (5) To provide the Minister with sufficient means for the safe custody of all Church Registers and records.
 - (6) To provide the Minister with funds towards the relief of the poor of the parish or district.
 - (7) To direct the expenditure or investment of any surplus funds.
 - (8) From time to time to fix the terms of the agreements which the Churchwardens may make with persons for the letting to them of seats and to vary any arrangement existing with regard to seats being rented or free (provided that at least one-third of the seats shall always be free) and to increase or reduce the rent which shall have been previously fixed for such seats. Provided that three months' notice of such increase or reduction be given to existing seat-holders and that such increase or reduction shall not take effect until the expiration of any then current tenancy. Provided also that if there is a debt upon the Church Parsonage or School buildings for which any persons are personally liable no such reduction shall take place nor shall the number of free seats be increased without the consent in writing of such persons.
 - (9) To fill up any vacancy in the office of Auditor.
 - (10) To confer with another Committee or other Committees upon any matter affecting the Parish or any part thereof.
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Presentation of Clergymen.

At the Session of Synod, 1912, Clauses 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 13 of the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895" were repealed and other provisions made, and at the Session of Synod in 1919, Clauses 5 and 13 of the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912" were repealed, Clause 16 was amended, and other provisions substituted.

The following are the clauses of the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895" which remain operative:—

AN ORDINANCE for regulating the appointment of Clergymen to the Incumbency of Parishes within the Diocese of Sydney.

WHEREAS it is desirable to regulate the appointment of Clergymen to the Incumbency of Parishes within the Diocese of Sydney. The Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Colony of New South Wales ordains and rules as follows:—

Synod to elect Nominators.

1. During the first Session of every Synod two Clergymen and two Laymen being respectively members of the Synod and Residents in the Diocese shall be elected by the Clergy and Lay Representatives voting collectively to be Nominators for the purpose of this Ordinance to be called the Synod Nominators and to continue in office until other members thereof qualified as aforesaid shall be elected and any vacancy which may occur in the number of Synod Nominators shall within two (2) months after the occurring of such vacancy be filled up by the Synod if in Session or by the Standing Committee of the Synod if the Synod shall not be in Session the member so elected to be and remain a member only till the meeting of the then next Session of Synod. The causes which shall create a vacancy in the number of Synod Nominators shall be death resignation and absence from the Colony for a period of three months or ceasing to be a member of Synod.

Parish may elect Nominators.

2. Repealed.

Board of Nominators constituted on election by Parish of Nominators.

3. Repealed.

Vacancies, how filled.

4. Repealed.

Presentation in case of vacancy.

5. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Incumbency of a Parish which has determined that the right of presentation shall so vest in the Board of Nominators as hereinbefore mentioned the Bishop shall cause each member of the Board of Nominators to be informed in writing of such vacancy and the said Board shall present to the Bishop a duly ordained Clergyman being in the Holy Order of Priesthood to be appointed by the Bishop to the said Incumbency and the Bishop shall appoint and license such Clergyman

to the said Incumbency unless he shall be satisfied that there is good and sufficient reason for refusing to accept the presentation so made to him as aforesaid.

Presentation to accord with votes.

6. Repealed.

Conference with Bishop.

7. Every Board of Nominators shall before proceeding to vote or otherwise exercising the powers and authorities hereinbefore conferred upon it meet in conference with the Bishop such conference to be held at such time and place as the Bishop may by one week's notice in writing addressed and despatched by post to each Member of such Board and to his usual or last known place of residence in the Colony of New South Wales appoint. Provided always that failing an appointment for such conference as aforesaid to be held within one month after such Board of Nominators shall have been informed by the Bishop of the vacancy in the Incumbency the conference herein provided for may in the case of such vacancy be dispensed with.

Failure to present.

8. Repealed.

Further presentation in certain cases.

9. Repealed.

Right of presentation given to those building or endowing Churches.

10. Repealed.

Right of presentation subject to provision for Clergyman.

11. Repealed.

Cases not within provisions of Ordinance.

12. In all cases not falling within the provisions of this Ordinance the right of appointment of Clergymen to the Incumbency of Parishes and Churches shall vest and remain in the Bishop.

Absence, etc., of the Bishop.

13. Repealed.

Ordinances repealed.

14. The Ordinance intituled the "Presentation Ordinance of 1876" and the Ordinance intituled the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1887" are hereby repealed.

Date of coming into operation.

15. This Ordinance shall come into operation on and not before Easter Tuesday now next ensuing provided nevertheless that the election of Synod Nominators as provided in the first clause may take place immediately after the passing of this Ordinance.

Short Title.

16. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895."

The following are the clauses of the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912" which remain operative :—

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Ordinance for regulating the appointment of Clergymen to the Incumbency of Parishes within the Diocese of Sydney.

WHEREAS it is desirable to amend the Ordinance for regulating the appointment of Clergymen to the Incumbency of Parishes within the Diocese of Sydney. The Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales ordains and rules as follows :—

Interpretation Clause.

1. In this Ordinance "Annual Vestry Meeting" means any Annual Vestry Meeting and "Vestry Meeting" means any Vestry Meeting held in pursuance of the provisions of the "Sydney Church Ordinance" or any Ordinance amending or taking the place of the same.

Repeal of Ordinance.

2. Clauses 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 13 of the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895" (hereafter called the Principal Ordinance) are hereby repealed. Such repeal shall not affect or invalidate any act done or appointment or election made under or by virtue of such Clauses and all persons appointed or elected thereunder and holding office at the passing of this Ordinance shall remain in office as if this Ordinance had been in force at the time they were appointed or elected and they had been appointed or elected thereunder and this Ordinance shall apply to them accordingly.

Parochial Nominators.

3. Each Parish shall be entitled subject to clause 13 of this Ordinance to elect five lay persons being males and Communicants of the age of twenty-one years or upwards and resident within the Diocese who shall be designated Parochial Nominators and who when a vacancy in the Incumbency of the Parish shall occur shall together with the Synod Nominators constitute and act as the Board of Nominators for the said Parish for the purposes hereinafter specified.

Method of Electing.

4. The following provisions shall govern the right of election and the election of Parochial Nominators:—

(a) If there be only one Church in the Parish then such Nominators may be elected by the Annual Vestry Meeting of such Church.

(b) If there be two or more Churches in the Parish under the charge of the Rector such Nominators shall be elected by such one of the Annual Vestry Meetings within the said Parish as the Archbishop shall in writing from time to time direct.

(c) No Vestry Meeting shall be entitled to proceed to an election of Parochial Nominators unless there are at least nine persons present qualified to vote.

Proceedings after Election.

5. Repealed.

Vacancies, etc.

6. Vacancies shall be deemed to be caused by death or resignation or absence from the State for fourteen consecutive days during a vacancy in the Incumbency of the Parish without the leave of the Board of Nominators.

7. Save as aforesaid Parochial Nominators shall respectively continue in office until the Annual Vestry Meeting of the Church held next after the Annual Vestry Meeting at which they were elected as aforesaid.

Filling of Vacancies.

8. Any vacancy which shall be caused as aforesaid may be filled by a Vestry Meeting of the Church the Annual Vestry Meeting whereof elected the Nominator whose office shall have so become vacant. If such vacancy be not so filled within four weeks after the vacancy shall have been caused then it may be filled by the remaining Nominator or Nominators and if he or they shall not fill such vacancy within a further period of four weeks the same may be filled by the Archbishop.

9. The respective names, addresses and occupations of all persons elected Nominators shall be communicated in writing to the Archbishop.

Failure to elect Nominators.

10. If Parochial Nominators are not duly elected the right of appointment in the event of a vacancy occurring in an Incumbency shall vest in the Archbishop.

Proceedings of Board of Nominators.

11. To constitute a meeting of a Board of Nominators there must be present a majority of the members thereof including one Synod Nominator and the votes of the members for or against the resolution to make a presentation which may be passed shall be recorded and sent to the Archbishop. No presentation shall

be valid unless such record is sent to the Archbishop and unless the votes supporting such presentation include that of one at least of the Synod Nominators and those of three at least of the Parochial Nominators.

Failure to Present.

12. If within three months after the Board of Nominators is informed of the vacancy no presentation shall be made by the said Board then the right of presentation shall lapse to the Archbishop. If the Archbishop shall refuse to accept any presentation made to him or if the clergyman presented as aforesaid to the Archbishop shall refuse or neglect to accept the proposed appointment within such reasonable time as the Archbishop shall appoint the Archbishop shall as soon as possible inform each member of the Board thereof and the Board shall *toties quoties* be entitled within three months thereafter to make a further presentation provided always that the Archbishop may extend any such time of three months hereinbefore mentioned on being satisfied that due diligence has been shown by the Board of Nominators provided however that if any such vacancy shall not be filled within one year after the same occurring the appointment thereto shall absolutely lapse to the Archbishop.

Right of Presentation Subject to Provision for Clergyman.

13. Repealed.

Exchanges.

14. In the event of Incumbents of Parishes having the right of presentation desiring to exchange Parishes the Archbishop shall cause the whole of the Parochial Nominators of the Parishes concerned to be so informed in writing and if such Parochial Nominators shall in writing inform the Archbishop of their agreement to such proposed exchanges it shall not be necessary for the Synod Nominators or any of them to approve of such exchanges but the approval of the Archbishop to such exchanges shall in all such cases be necessary and sufficient.

Mission and Conventional Districts.

15. For the purposes of the Principal Ordinance and this Ordinance Mission Districts and Conventional Districts shall not be deemed to form any portion of a Parish.

Absence, &c., of the Archbishop.

*"Incapacity" omitted and "inability" inserted in lieu thereof.

16. In the event of the incapacity* from any cause of the Archbishop the powers by the Principal Ordinance and this Ordinance vested in him shall be exercised by a Commissary appointed by him. If the Archbishop be absent from the State such powers may (subject to such limitations as he shall prescribe) be exercised by a Commissary appointed by him. If there be no such Commissary or the See be vacant such powers may be exercised by the Administrator of the Diocese.

Repeals, &c.

17. The words "and Ireland" in the preamble and in Clause 10 of the Principal Ordinance are hereby repealed. The word "Colony" in the preamble and in Clauses 1 and 7 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the word "State" inserted in lieu thereof. The word "Bishop" whenever it occurs in the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the word "Archbishop" inserted in lieu thereof. The words "determined that the right of presentation shall vest in the Board of Nominators as hereinbefore mentioned" in Clause 5 of the Principal Ordinance are hereby repealed and the words "duly elected Parochial Nominators" inserted in lieu thereof.

Short Title.

18. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912" and shall be construed as one with the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895."

The ORDINANCE to amend Sections 5, 13 and 16 of the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912," is as follows :—

The Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England in the State of New South Wales ordains as follows :—

Repeal of Clauses.

1. Clause 5 and Clause 13 of the Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912 are hereby repealed.

Proceedings after Election.

2. The Chairman of each Annual Vestry Meeting which has elected Parochial Nominators in accordance with the said recited Ordinance and the said Amended Ordinance shall forward to the Registrar of the Diocese within thirty days from the date of such meeting a list duly certified by him setting out fully the names occupations and addresses of such elected Nominators. Provided that the omission to send to the Registrar such list duly certified shall not invalidate any election of Nominators but such Nominators may act if the Archbishop is satisfied they were duly elected and so certifies to the Synod Nominators.

Right of Presentation Subject to Provision for Clergymen.

3 The right of presentation as provided by the said recited Ordinance and the said Amendment Ordinance shall apply only to the Parish in which provision shall have been made for securing to the Clergyman (from local sources) a stipend of at least three hundred pounds per annum together with a suitable residence or an adequate allowance in lieu thereof and which Parish has during the financial year preceding the time being paid and provided for and has since continued to pay and provide for the Clergyman such stipend and residence or allowance as aforesaid and which said parish shall have paid all amounts due for Synod and Registry expenses up to the

thirty-first day of March in the preceding financial year. The Archbishop may require proof to his satisfaction that the conditions of this section have been duly complied with and shall so certify to the Board of Nominators before they proceed to nomination.

Provisions not complied with.

4. Should the Archbishop not be satisfied that the provisions of Section 3 of this Ordinance have been complied with, the matter shall be referred to the Archbishop in Council whose decision shall be final.

Incapacity. Inability.

5. In the first line of Clause 16 of the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912" the word "incapacity" is omitted and the word "inability" inserted in lieu thereof.

Archbishop in Council.

6. The words 'Archbishop in Council' in this Ordinance shall be directed to be taken as having the same meaning as the like words in the "Sydney Church Ordinance 1912" or any Ordinance amending or taking the place of the same.

Short Title.

7. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Presentation Further Amendment Ordinance of 1919" and shall be construed as one with the "Presentation Ordinance of 1895" and the "Presentation Amendment Ordinance of 1912."

The Synod of the Diocese.

IN the year 1866 a Conference of the Bishops of the Dioceses in New South Wales, together with Clerical and Lay Representatives from each Diocese, was held for the purpose of drawing up "Constitutions for the management and good government of the United Church of England and Ireland within the colony of New South Wales." The work being successfully completed, Legislative sanction was sought for, and an Act of Parliament was obtained "to enable the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in New South Wales to manage the property of the said Church."

The Bishop of Sydney summoned the first Synod of the Diocese of Sydney to meet in that same year, and the Synod was opened on December 5th, the number of Representatives present at its opening being: Clerical, 49; Lay, 97.

At the Session of Parliament held in 1902, an Act was passed to repeal the Act of 1866, and to give legal force and effect to certain amended Constitutions approved by the Provincial Synod of the Province of New South Wales in the year 1895.

The amended Constitutions will be found in this issue of the Directory.

The Synod meets annually and exists for three years. It elects two Secretaries (one clerical and one lay), a Chairman of Committees, a Committee of Elections and Qualifications, to which are referred all questions relating to the validity of elections of Representatives, and a Standing Committee. The Standing Orders of the Synod are similar to those which are found desirable in other representative and deliberative Assemblies, and as from time to time matters may arise not provided for in the Standing Orders, it is laid down that in such cases "resort shall be had to the Rules, Forms, and Practice of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, so far as they can be applied." At the present time Synod consists of 131 Clergymen and 259 Lay Representatives from the several parishes of the Diocese, including members specially summoned under the Constitutions.

The Bishop of the Diocese is *ex officio* President of the Synod, and in his absence a Commissary appointed by him takes his place.

THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

In 1897 it was considered advisable to enlarge the powers of the Standing Committee of the Synod, and to make further provisions, and an Ordinance was passed to provide for the Constitution of such Committee and to define their powers and duties.

The Standing Committee is to be constituted at the first Session of every Synod, and is to consist of *ex officio* members and elected members. The *ex officio* members are the Archbishop, the Dean, the two Senior Archdeacons, other than the Dean, and the Honorary Secretaries of the Synod for the time being. The elected members are appointed at the first Session of each Synod. In 1915 an Ordinance was passed increasing the number of elected members to ten Clerical and nineteen Lay.

The duties and powers of the Standing Committee are defined in Clause 4 of the Ordinance as follows:—

“4.—(1) It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee to make arrangements for the Sessions of the Synod, and to prepare the business to be brought before the Synod, with power to propose such business as may appear to the Committee to be necessary or desirable to be brought before the Synod, in addition to that arising out of matters which have been referred to them, and to print a Report of the Proceedings of the Synod from time to time, and all documents ordered by the Synod to be printed.

“(2) The Standing Committee are empowered to defray the necessary working expenses of the Synod and of the Standing Committee, and to pay such further sums as may from time to time be authorised by the Synod.

“(3) The Standing Committee shall be a Council of Advice to the Bishop in any matter in which he may desire their advice. The Standing Committee shall consider and report upon any matter which the Synod may from time to time refer to them, and shall carry out or assist in carrying out the resolutions from time to time passed by the Synod and entrusted to them, or not otherwise provided for. The Standing Committee may deliberate and confer upon all

matters affecting the interests of the Church and cognisable by the Synod, may make such inquiries as they shall deem to be requisite, and may communicate with the Government and all such bodies and persons as they shall consider necessary, and may present Petitions and Addresses to all such bodies and persons. Provided that any action taken by the Committee not already sanctioned by the Synod shall have full force unless disallowed by the Synod at its next session.

“(4) The Standing Committee shall discharge such other duties and exercise such other powers as the Synod shall from time to time prescribe.”

The Ordinance also provides that the Standing Committee shall have the custody of all books, documents or other property belonging to the Synod, and all other property belonging to the Church in the Diocese of Sydney not vested in any other body or person.

The Synod elects twelve Clerical and twelve Lay representatives to the Provincial Synod of the Province of New South Wales, and nine Clerical and nine Lay representatives to the General Synod of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania, the number in each case being determined by the number of clergymen duly licensed to officiate within the Diocese. (See Rules General Synod, 1916.).

The General Synod.

THE General Synod of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania is the result of a Conference of the Bishops and Representatives of all the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania held in Sydney in 1872. The Conference having agreed upon a Constitution, resolved itself into a Synod.

Under Section 8 of the Constitution the Determinations of the General Synod are not binding upon the Church in any Diocese, unless and until accepted by the Church in such Diocese; but in the Province of Queensland provision has been made for the acceptance of Determinations by the Provincial Synod, and such acceptance binds the Church in each Diocese in the Province. The General Synod meets once in five years, under the presidency of the Primate.

Under a Determination passed at the session of the General Synod, held in 1900, an addition was made to the Constitution of the General Synod providing for the inclusion of British New Guinea within the territorial limits of the Church of England in Australia and Tasmania, and for the representation in General Synod of the Dioceses now or hereafter established therein. The Determination was finally passed at the session of 1905.

The Dioceses represented in the General Synod are Sydney, Tasmania, Adelaide, Melbourne, Newcastle, Perth, Brisbane, Goulburn, Armidale, Bathurst, Ballarat, North Queensland, Riverina, Rockhampton, British New Guinea, Carpentaria, Bendigo, Wangaratta, Gippsland, Bunbury, North-West Australia, Grafton, Kalgoorlie and Willochra. At the Session of the Synod held in 1896, a Determination was passed providing that "the Metropolitan of each Ecclesiastical Province now in existence or to be hereafter formed under the authority of the General Synod, shall be designated Archbishop of his See as well as Metropolitan of his Province." It was, however, provided that the Determination should not take effect until recognition was given to the designation of

Metropolitans as Archbishops by the Conference of Bishops of the Anglican Communion to be holden in Lambeth in 1897. Recognition having then been given to the designation, the Metropolitans of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, and Western Australia are now styled Archbishops.

Under a Determination of the General Synod, passed in 1905, three new Provinces have been formed, viz. :— VICTORIA, including the Dioceses of Melbourne, Ballarat, Bendigo, Wangaratta, and Gippsland; QUEENSLAND, including the Dioceses of Brisbane, North Queensland, Rockhampton, Carpentaria, and British New Guinea; and WESTERN AUSTRALIA, including the Dioceses of Perth, Bunbury, and Kalgoorlie.

The Metropolitan of the Province of Victoria is the Archbishop of Melbourne, the Metropolitan of the Province of Queensland is the Archbishop of Brisbane, and the Metropolitan of the Province of Western Australia is the Archbishop of Perth.

The Primacy of Australia and Tasmania having been made elective under the Determination of the General Synod, Session 1900, the Bishops in Australia and Tasmania elected in 1910, the Most Reverend John Charles Wright, D.D., Archbishop of Sydney, to be Primate, and His Grace has since presided over the General Synod.

Representatives to the General Synod are elected by the several Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania, the number in each case being determined by the number of clergymen duly licensed to officiate within the respective Dioceses. (See Rules, 1916.).

The Provincial Synod of New South Wales.

UNDER the authority of the "Constitutions," passed in 1866, a Provincial Synod, composed of the Bishops and Clerical and Lay Representatives of the Dioceses in New South Wales, was called into existence. This Synod had two proper functions—the receiving of appeals from any Diocesan Synod against the veto of its Bishop, and the legislating on matters referred to it by all the Diocesan Synods. The first Provincial Synod under these Constitutions was held in 1869, but that Synod has ceased to exist, for under a Determination of the General Synod (1881), providing for the formation of Provinces, New South Wales was treated as having been formed into a Province, and in 1884 a Constitution of a more regular Provincial Synod of larger scope of operation was passed. At its session in 1895 an Ordinance was passed to provide for making application to Parliament to pass an Act to repeal the Act 30 Vic., and to substitute amended "Constitutions." The Act was passed in 1902, and the amended Constitutions provide that the Bishops and Clerical and Lay Representatives of the Church in the several Dioceses in the State of New South Wales shall meet in Provincial Synod under such articles and provisions as may have been or may be from time to time passed by the Provincial Synod, and assented to by all the said Dioceses.

Some doubt having been expressed as to the validity of the Constitution of 1884 since the passing of the "Church of England Constitutions Act of 1902," it was deemed advisable to frame a new Constitution, and in 1907 the new Constitution was passed by the Provincial Synod. Section 8 of the Constitution is as follows :—

The Provincial Synod shall have power to make Ordinances upon and in respect of all matters and things concerning the order and good government of the Church in the Province. Provided that no Ordinance save as is next hereinafter provided shall be binding upon the Church in any Diocese, unless and until such Ordinance shall be accepted by the Church in such Diocese by an Ordinance of its Synod. Provided however that

any Rule or Ordinance passed by any Diocesan Synod to which the Bishop of that Diocese shall not assent may be the subject of reference by such Diocesan Synod to the Provincial Synod, and the decision of the Provincial Synod with reference thereto shall be binding on the Church in the Diocese so referring such Rule or Ordinance.

In 1912 the Ordinance of 1907 was amended. Section 4 was repealed, and further provision made for the convening of the Synod.

Representatives to the Provincial Synod are elected by the several Dioceses in the Province of New South Wales.

Prayer for Synod.

THE following prayer, authorised by the House of Bishops of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England within the Province of New South Wales, to be used in all Churches in the Province on two or more Sundays previous to the meeting of any Provincial or Diocesan Synod, and also during the session of each, has been recommended by the Primate to be used previous to the meeting of the General Synod, and also during the session :—

“ALMIGHTY and most merciful God, who by Thy Son Jesus Christ hast promised to be with Thy Church even to the end of the world, and in answer to the prayers of Thy servants hast ever been present in the Councils of Thy Church, we beseech Thee to be present, by Thy Holy Spirit, with the General Synod (or Synod of this Province or Diocese) assembled in Thy name. Endue them with Thy heavenly wisdom, save them from all pride, prejudice and error, unite them in the bond of brotherly love and mutual forbearance, and of Thy great mercy sanctify them, and guide them in their important work, that through Thy blessing on their deliberations the Gospel of Christ may be faithfully preached and obeyed, and the order and discipline of Thy Church maintained amongst us, to the overthrow of the power of the Evil One, and the final establishment of Thy heavenly kingdom, through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ, Thy Son, our Lord. AMEN.”

St. Andrew's Cathedral.

ST. ANDREW'S CATHEDRAL was originally proposed by Governor Macquarie, towards the end of his term of office, and the first stone of the foundation was laid on Wednesday, September 1st, 1819. At that time Sydney could not have been said to extend southward of King street, although isolated buildings had existed for years before along the line now known as George and Parramatta streets. The whole of its population even in 1828 was only 11,000, and in 1819 could not have exceeded 7,000.

A cemetery is marked in early maps of Sydney upon the site of the present Town Hall. It is there shown as unenclosed in 1802. In 1804 it was enclosed with a fence, because the "pigs rooted up the graves." Afterwards it was surrounded by a brick wall.

In the year 1819 the Cathedral was commenced; the cemetery was closed in that year, and a new burial ground was opened in the "Sand Hills" (now Central Railway Station), and was "consecrated" by the Senior Chaplain in January, 1820. The latest date which appeared on any tombstone in the "old cemetery" was 1818.

Under strange circumstances did Governor Macquarie proceed to commence a "Cathedral" in a country which had no Bishop, and on a site where there could have been no congregation, as it was one-third of a mile from the nearest house, and about half way between Sydney on one side and the "Village-de Brickfield" on the other. New South Wales was originally in the Province of Canterbury, but when the Diocese of Calcutta was formed in 1811, it was made a dependency of that See. In the time of Governor Macquarie five or six Colonial Chaplains were considered sufficient for the whole colony, and it is not to be wondered at if it was thought "premature" in certain quarters to undertake a "Cathedral" on such a scale under such circumstances.

Governor Macquarie was, however, in advance of the age, and the present Cathedral of St Andrew is a monument to his long-sighted views. He proceeded with his arrangements, and on the above-mentioned date he himself laid

the first stone of the foundation, in about the centre of what is now called George-street, if it was laid - "according to ancient custom" - at the north east angle.

It is not easy to make out what kind of a building was intended. No plan or drawing seems to have been in existence when the work was begun again eighteen years afterwards. It is almost certain that it was designed by Mr. Greenway, who had the superintendence of Government buildings, and it is probable that it resembled the present Church of St. James, which was commenced at the same time.

Archdeacon Broughton arrived in Sydney on September 13th, 1829, during the Governorship of Sir R. Darling, and once more a move was made towards carrying on the Cathedral.

During the preceding ten years, whilst the foundations of the Cathedral were lying waste, a great change had come over Sydney. The population had largely increased. The streets between King and Campbell streets were set out and aligned, and the Government maps of the day show that buildings were gradually springing up in all directions.

During the next five years Archdeacon Broughton was engaged in much travelling, and nothing was actually accomplished towards building the Cathedral, although the subject was much discussed, and arrangements were made for future attempts. He went to England in 1834, was consecrated Bishop of Australia in February, 1836, and returned to Sydney in June of the same year.

But now a new element was introduced into the question which does not appear to have been thought of before. Since the days of Governor Macquarie a great change had come over Church architecture, both in England and elsewhere. Classic buildings were called "Pagan," and (for a while at least) had gone out of fashion, "Churchwardens' Gothic" was "used up": everyone turned to the works of the old Church builders in their perplexity, and Gothic architecture was revived.

During the Bishop's visit to England in 1834 and 1835, he saw much of this revival, and fully entered into its spirit: and when upon his return to the Colony the question of the Cathedral was raised, he proposed that its plan should be reconsidered and its style of architecture altered.

It was then discussed, and finally it was determined to take St. Mary's Church at Oxford as the model for the nave and aisles, and the tower of Magdalen College for the steeple—for which latter purpose the Bishop sent home to Oxford for elaborate drawings of the tower itself. Upon these bases an entirely new design was prepared, and a beautiful perspective was drawn by the late Conrad Martens, and was lithographed in England. A copy is deposited in the Diocesan Registry.

All being thus settled, and the arrangements for continuing the work perfected, the old foundation was taken up, and on the 16th day of May, 1837, the stone which had been laid by Governor Macquarie eighteen years before, as the first stone of the original building, was laid again as the first stone of the present building by the then Governor, Sir Richard Bourke. The architect in charge of the work at that time was the late Mr. James Hume.

The Cathedral, thus successfully commenced for the second time, progressed rapidly for a while; the foundations were completed, and the upper walls commenced, and went on until 1839, when the "great drought" and the general depression of all things caused thereby prevented the gathering in of promised subscriptions, and the funds fell off. The works, however, continued to advance slowly, and at irregular intervals, until the end of the year 1842, when they ceased altogether; the gates were closed up, and the Cathedral for a second time was deserted.

At this time the position of the work was as follows:—The whole of the foundation was laid, the side walls of the choir aisle were complete, the east wall of the choir was finished except the gable and the pinnacles; the three walls of the south transept were carried up to the wall plate, and the three walls of the north transept stood of irregular height, from ten to thirty feet; the east window and the six windows in the choir and those in the transepts were merely openings without tracery; and there were no side buttresses to the choir, nor were there any pinnacles.

Early in the year 1846 a number of churchmen, encouraged by the evident revival of colonial interests, and considering that the "time was come for the Lord's House to be built," waited upon the Bishop to suggest a plan for raising the necessary funds. A committee was formed

to consider the best mode of proceeding, a public meeting was held on Tuesday, April 3rd, 1846. the movement was again fairly on foot, and for the "third and last time" arrangements were made to proceed with the work, the late Mr. E. T. Blacket, who had recently arrived from England, being appointed Architect.

During the nine or ten years which had elapsed since the Cathedral was last commenced by Governor Bourke, further changes had come over Sydney. Immigration had brought many new inhabitants; the population had increased, and had run over the old boundaries. Church matters had also progressed. A new parish had been formed still further south of St. Andrew's. Christ Church had been built and consecrated, and it was even in contemplation to commence St. Paul's, Chippendale. As the completion of the Cathedral seemed indefinitely postponed, a temporary building of wood had been erected in the Burial Ground, which was subsequently enlarged, and served as a Cathedral for twenty five years afterwards.

But besides alterations in Sydney, there had been alterations in church architecture. Things had not been asleep since the building was designed ten years ago. At that time it was thought sufficient for the outside of the building to be of stone, while the pillars and arches were to be of brick cemented. The walls were to be plastered, and the roof to be groined in plaster, like St. Peter's Church at Cook's River, which was built about this time, and considered a model of ecclesiastical architecture. For this purpose the walls of the choir of the Cathedral had been left "rough for plaster," as can be seen to this day.

All this was now to be altered, and it was agreed that the whole building should be built of cut stone, both inside and outside, and that the roof should be open timbered and painted. It was also considered that a Cathedral with a tower at the west end was a thing unknown in England, and that the approved arrangement was to place two towers spanning the last bays of the aisles. In York and Canterbury, the two Metropolitan Cathedrals of the Archbishops, this arrangement prevailed, as well as in several other Cathedrals, and most of the Minsters and Abbeys. As Sydney was already the See of a Bishop, who

in course of time would probably be a Metropolitan, it seemed the right thing to prepare for the future, and at any rate to adopt a plan for the building in accord with the traditions and practice of the English Church.

The plan of St. Andrew's Cathedral, as commenced in 1837, contained seven bays, three for the choir, as at present existing, one for the transepts, and three for the nave. Thus the nave and choir would have been exactly alike, and it was thought that if the nave could be lengthened by three bays it would present a more worthy appearance both inside and outside: the nave being six bays long, and the choir three bays long; but it was not to be.

When Governor Macquarie first began the Cathedral he assigned for its building the whole ground reaching from George to Kent streets, as can be seen in the Government maps to this day. But when Sir Richard Bourke came, he took away nearly one-half of the land and "granted" it to other persons, in defiance of the dictum of Washington Irving, that "none but *Great Kings* have a right to give away what does not belong to them."

It was soon found that it was impossible to lengthen the Cathedral to the extent desired, and that an addition of two bays would carry the walls of the nave to the extreme western boundary of the ground. But this proposal to lengthen the nave did not meet with universal acceptance; there was difference of opinion in the Cathedral Committee as elsewhere. Those who remembered the moving of the old foundations in 1836 were not anxious to see it repeated, and were disposed to adhere to the plan as it was, especially as the nave could not be lengthened more than two bays. The Bishop himself also looked doubtfully on the scheme, for he greatly admired the Magdalen Tower, and was desirous of seeing it reproduced in Sydney.

While matters were remaining in this undecided state, the committee being divided between the double towers and the single tower, the preference being rather in favour of the latter, most opportunely Bishop Selwyn came up from New Zealand, and finding how the matter stood he took the side of the double towers very strongly, and discussed the question with all parties, and it was at last finally accepted that the Cathedral should be lengthened

and the two towers erected. Twenty years afterwards he mentioned the subject at a public meeting held in the building just before it was consecrated, and expressed his satisfaction at his share in the transaction ; for it certainly would have been settled otherwise, if he had not arrived.

All these preliminaries being thus arranged, tenders were accepted for the alterations to the foundations, required by the enlargement of the Cathedral, and in the next month of September, 1846, the work was once more commenced, never again to be wholly stopped until all was complete.

It is unnecessary to trace in detail the progress of the building through the successive contracts, taken up as funds came in, from the commencement of the building in 1846 to its completion in 1868. It will be sufficient to mark a few points of special interest during this long course of years.

During the month of October, 1850, was held a Conference of the Bishops of the "Province of Australasia," and the six Bishops paid a visit to the Cathedral, in company with the committee and a number of subscribers. During their visit it was proposed that some enduring remembrance be set up in the building to record the fact, and as there were six Bishops and six pillars in the nave, it was suggested that these six pillars should be set up as the "Bishops' pillars," and that each of their names should be carved upon a band of stone to be left for that purpose. Several gentlemen formed themselves into a committee—subscriptions were obtained, and the work put in hand ; but the bands bearing the names of the Bishops were not carved for sixteen years afterwards, when the final arrangements were made for completion.

In May, 1851, an event occurred which altered the whole aspect of things in Australia. Gold was discovered at Louisa Creek, and as it was said at the time, a small struggling colony was "precipitated into a nation." The effect of the first intelligence was startling. The idea of finding lumps of gold worth hundreds of pounds each, was too much for men working for £2 per week, and a general rush took place to the diggings.

So many men having left their work in Sydney, caused the wages of those remaining to rise rapidly; every week made fresh demands. Masons who had 6s. per day, and would have been well satisfied with 6s. 6d a month ago, now had 10s., and during the year there was advance upon advance, until at last they rose to 26s. per day. Builders who had taken contracts at old rates were in despair, and those who had not would not tender at all, or except at fabulous prices; and in June the Cathedral Committee resolved not to take any further contracts, on account of the "state of the labour market," and the completion of the four lantern pillars and the two tower piers, which had already been agreed to were deferred. Good times and bad times alike seemed unfavourable to the Cathedral.

While the work was going on, several persons had communicated with members of the committee concerning the proposed arrangements for glazing the windows. As it was evident that the whole of the windows would, sooner or later, be provided by private liberality, the Committee agreed upon a scheme whereby the various subjects of the windows should be classified in a regular order, instead of leaving it to individual tastes. No one of the intending givers of the windows made any objection to this arrangement, and one by one they were appropriated, and in November, 1861, it was reported that all the windows of the nave, twelve in number, and the windows in the north transept were actually in process of execution in England. In a few months afterwards the windows in the choir were disposed of in a similar manner, and a special subscription was commenced for the east window, to be erected in memory of the late Bishop Broughton.

During the last few months much consultation had been held concerning the nature of the intended floor, and it was finally resolved to send home drawings of the building to obtain plans and estimates for laying the choir in patterns in marble, and the rest of the floor in encaustic tiles.

When the old burial ground in George-street was closed in 1820, it was left under no particular guardianship. Persons of all creeds and conditions lay in it, and no person or church had any power to exercise authority. The consequence was that the trees were soon gone, and

openings were broken through the walls in various places, the tombstones disappeared year after year, and the whole place became a public nuisance, and a nightly resort of undesirable people. Many complaints were made and many proposals were suggested; but at last the Government determined to set it apart as a place for "public recreation," and it was placed in the hands of trustees for this purpose. As no funds, however, were provided by the Government to carry out their own intentions, the trustees were unable to do anything in the matter. It was hoped that the ground would be eventually put in order as intended, in which case it would afford a most ready and suitable approach to the Cathedral, but the Municipal Council, notwithstanding much opposition, eventually obtained the grant of it as the site of the Town Hall. It was, however, agreed that sixty feet adjoining the Cathedral ground should be given to the Church to prevent unseemly proximity to the service.

In March of this year (1868) the Duke of Edinburgh paid a visit to the Cathedral, a vast concourse of people attended in consequence, and in his presence an organ recital was given. A few days afterwards he was shot at Clontarf. In the month of May the Duke, having recovered from the effects of the unfriendly shot, again visited the Cathedral, passing through it on his way to the burial ground, where he laid the first stone of the new Town Hall.

The building, being at last complete, was consecrated on St. Andrew's Day (November 30th, 1868), and on this occasion was used for the first time the noble Communion Service presented to the Cathedral by the late William Charles Wentworth, Esq.

When Bishop Broughton obtained the consent of the Government in 1842 for the erection of the temporary wooden Cathedral in the old burial ground (to take the place of a building which had been destroyed by fire), it was a part of the bargain that it should be removed as soon as the Cathedral was opened, in order that George-street might be widened. That time had now arrived (1870), and the wooden structure was taken away. By the Act of 1869 the corporation was bound to enclose their land with stone

walls and iron palisading, and it was evidently much to be desired that the Cathedral grounds should be enclosed in a similar manner, and to facilitate this the municipal authorities undertook to pay for the walls and railing round the three sides of the Church grounds. This was carried out during the year 1870. The Chapter, however, provided the gates.

A contract was taken for completing the two western towers of the Cathedral, which work occupied over twelve months, and was finally completed in November, 1874.

So long as human opinions are liable to change, no Cathedral can ever be said to be absolutely "finished," but it may be affirmed in a secondary sense, when everything has been effected that was originally proposed, and when nothing of importance has been neglected. This may be fairly asserted of St. Andrew's at the completion of the western towers in 1874.

It must, however, be added that, on all special occasions, the Cathedral is found to be far too small for present needs. The question of its enlargement must be considered at no distant time.

The Jubilee of the Consecration of the Cathedral was celebrated on St Andrew's Eve, 29th November, 1918.

There was a Choral Celebration in the Cathedral at 11 a.m., and the Festival Service was held at 7.30 p.m.

During the day, the Primate, the Governor, and many leading Churchmen attended a Luncheon in the Chapter House.

The expenditure on the Cathedral up to 1868, so far as the accounts available disclose, was about £60,000, but the total must have been larger.

A CATHEDRAL SCHOOL is carried on under the direction of the Precentor, and the training therein received by the choir boys has conduced materially to the more effective rendering of the Cathedral services.

The funds for the maintenance of the Choir and Choir School are provided partly by annual subscription, and those funds should receive the cordial help of all who desire to see our Cathedral services carried on in a manner worthy of the Mother Diocese of Australia. The School greatly needs some endowment.

A Bursary Fund has been started to help boys on leaving the School.

THE DEANERY.

In August, 1871, a contract was entered into for building the Deanery on the land recently acquired from the old burial ground. The Deanery works continued the whole of the year 1872, and were finally completed in December: the garden around it and the Cathedral was also finished at the same time. The building having ceased to be occupied as a Deanery it was resolved to convert it into a DIOCESAN CHURCH HOUSE, and an Act of Parliament was obtained (No. 18, 1916) which authorised the Trustees to alter and make additions to the buildings, and permit the same to be used as a residence for the chief officiating minister of the said Cathedral, a Church House and offices, and otherwise in connection with the said Cathedral, and the administration of the affairs of the Church of England in the Diocese of Sydney. In addition to the Diocesan Registry and Committee Rooms, accommodation has been provided for the Archbishop, the Dean, and the Cathedral Clergy. Rooms have also been set apart for The Home Mission Society, the Ladies' Home Mission Union, the Church of England Men's Society, *The Diocesan Magazine*, the Board of Education, the Committee on Religious Instruction in Public Schools, the Sunday School Institute, the Mothers' Union and Girls' Friendly Society, with quarters for the Caretaker. The Theological Library occupies a room on the first floor, and a room on the ground floor has been reserved for the use of the Clergy of the Diocese. At the western end of the building is an excellent Choir School, with roof playground. The large committee room is called the "Cowper Room," in memory of the late Dean Cowper.

THE CHAPTER HOUSE.

In 1883 a movement was set on foot to raise a memorial to the late Bishop Barker, and it was after much distussion resolved that the memorial should be a Chapter House annexed to the Cathedral, to serve also as a Synod Hall. This appeared to many the most appropriate form which a memorial to the late Bishop could assume, since it was

during his episcopate that Synodical action had been entered upon in the Diocese of Sydney, and it was also known to have been his long cherished desire that such an important and necessary addition should be made to the Cathedral.

This building, designed by Messrs. Blacket Brothers, was duly completed, and the Synod Hall was opened by his Excellency the Governor, Lord Carrington, and used for the first time at the Session of the General Synod, in October, 1886. The building, having been found too small for the purpose of a Synod Hall, has been considerably enlarged. In addition to the Main Hall there is now a Lower Hall, with a room for the Archbishop, a tea room and offices.

The architects for the whole of the work of enlargement were Messrs. H. A. Wilshire and Day, and the contractors Messrs. John Grant and Sons.

The bell originally provided for the Cathedral, although a remarkably fine one, was a clock bell, and entirely unsuited to the purpose for which it was required, and the Chapter, finding it impossible to make proper provision for ringing it, disposed of it, and with the proceeds purchased a suitable bell, which is now rung at the principal services.

At the enthronement of the Bishop (Dr. Barry) in 1884, his Lordship appealed for funds for a new Reredos, which was greatly needed, the former one having partially fallen down. This appeal resulted in the contribution of a sum of £455, and a new Reredos from a design by J. L. Pearson, Esq., R.A., was erected. The Reredos, which is executed in alabaster, includes three panels containing the bas-reliefs of the Transfiguration, Resurrection and Ascension of Our Lord.

In 1896-7 the Chapter was enabled to add much needed choir vestries to the Cathedral, at a cost of £636. Towards this amount the trustees of St. Philip's, Glebe, contributed £200, and the trustees of St. James' Glebe, £200. The balance was collected by the Very Rev. Dean Cowper.

In order to permit of the extension of the Chapter House the vestries abovementioned were removed in 1916, and

more commodious Vestries erected on the northern side of the Cathedral, with rooms for the Precentor and the Organist.

During the year 1899 the organ was taken down, thoroughly cleaned and repaired. At the same time some new stops were added, and hydraulic power was provided for blowing.

The cost of the work amounted to about £780, the funds having been obtained through the instrumentality of the Dean, with the kind co-operation of a number of ladies.

With a view to improving the effect of the musical services, the Chapter had the Choir stalls raised. The greater portion of the expense was met by contributions from members of the Chapter.

The Chapter also removed the Pulpit, the Dean's seat, and the Choir stalls one bay to the eastward, and brought forward the seats in the nave and aisles. The effect of these alterations has been that the Preacher and the Choir are more distinctly heard throughout the Cathedral. The cost was defrayed without trenching upon the funds of the Chapter. A handsome carved stand has recently been provided for the Lectern, and a plate thereon bears the following inscription: "In Memoriam, Most Reverend Alfred Barry, D.D., D.C.L., Bishop of Sydney, Metropolitan and Primate, 1884-1889." Electric lighting has been installed in the Cathedral.

SOLDIERS' WELCOME—The building for the use of our Soldiers erected upon the Cathedral grounds, and largely used by the men, has now been removed.

CATHEDRAL DEBT.

The consolidated debt on the Cathedral property, amounting to £7,250, caused the Chapter much anxiety, and in the month of May, 1898, a meeting of churchmen was held at Government House, by the kind permission of his Excellency the Governor, Viscount Hampden, for the purpose of setting on foot a special effort for the extinction of the debt, and, if possible, providing some addition to the endowment.

An influential committee was formed, and an appeal for subscriptions was issued. The debt was paid off, but the Endowment Fund of the Cathedral was not increased.

It has often been remarked that few people, when disposing of their wealth to pious and charitable uses, remember the claims of the Cathedral. It is hoped, however, that ere long the Chapter will be enabled to add some more names to the list of benefactors.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

"I give and bequeath to the Cathedral Church of Saint Andrew, Sydney, the sum of _____ pounds, free of legacy duty, which I direct to be paid out of such part of my personal estate as by law I can charge therewith, to be applied to the general purposes of the said Cathedral; and I declare that the receipt of the Trustees for the time being of the said Cathedral shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors."

CHAPTER HOUSE.

THE CATHEDRAL.

The style of architecture adopted for the Cathedral was the Perpendicular, or the last stage of true Gothic, which was at its best in England in about the year 1500.

The general plan of the building is cramped and not in good proportion, especially the transepts, which, being aisles, appear far too high for their width.

The whole building is of Sydney sandstone, much of that used in the earlier part coming from Flagstaff Hill, the latter from Pymont. The length of time spent in the erection, and the many stoppages, have left their mark in the building itself in the want of perpendicularity in the four main pillars (which settled away from the aisle arches, there being none across the nave to balance them), and the mixed style of stone masonry.

There is a continuous chancel, choir, and nave of 157 feet long, divided into nine bays by the clerestory arcade, which latter is formed by large clustered columns, much larger than would now be considered necessary; but when built there was great doubt as to the value of the stone used, there being no previous experience.

The width of the nave is 26 feet, and of the aisles 17 feet 6 inches, making 61 feet full width of building inside, with a height to ridges of roof of 66 feet, the aisle walls being 29 feet.

The transepts are only 14 feet 7 inches wide, which makes the intersection of the two roofs mitre unevenly.

The roof is open, carried on hammer-beam principals, the spandrels being filled with tracery, the whole being decorated with bright colours.

The two western towers are a very good specimen of their style, and spring from the last bay of the nave. The lower story (really the west end of the aisle) is used, the north as a baptistery, the south as a porch from the Chapter House entry. From the foundation to the top of the stonework these measure 130 feet, and are divided into belfry and ringing floor.

The whole of the floor of the building is laid with tiles, that in the chancel and choir of a highly ornamental character for its date, the remainder of a more ordinary character.

The fittings of the choir, including vestries, throne, pulpit and lectern, are of American oak, carved in the style of the architectural date of the building. The remaining portion of the building is seated in plain kauri.

The central tower, which is not included in any of the early ideas, is very squat, and as the different lengths of the sides were not sightly, it was deemed advisable to keep this feature rather in the background.

The acoustic properties of the Cathedral are not satisfactory, as might be expected of a building altered so often. With a view to improvement, a proposal was made to place a stone spandrel on an arch across the nave at each of the central tower piers, on a level with the clerestory arches, plans of which were submitted in 1862 to Bishop Barker, but in lieu of it the unsightly wires now existing were placed on the walls, with no apparent effect.

As the building is far too small for its purpose, proposals were made in 1886 to reverse the orientation, making the main entrance from George-street, after extending the building two bays, adding aisles to the transepts and removing the central tower with its large columns, making an open octagon in its place; putting the reredos across between the western tower columns, and using the space behind as vestries.

The Cathedral will accommodate about 1,500 persons, but on special occasions as many as 2,000 have been admitted.

The side walls of the building have been covered up to level of aisle sills with tiles, leaving openings for memorials, many of which have been already filled in. The tiling is divided into sections—Australian Bishops on the north side in choir aisle, Canons on the south side in choir aisle and part of the nave, the other portions of the nave being reserved for memorials of those who have rendered special service to the Church, or distinguished public service.

THE CHAPTER HOUSE.

This building had to be so arranged as to leave room for future extensions of the Cathedral, and yet fit into a rather confined piece of land. To meet these requirements a double apsidal plan was adopted.

The building is of stone (taken from what is known as the Bishop's quarry at Randwick), and in the perpendicular style of architecture, to harmonise with the Cathedral.

The upper story is used as a Synod Hall, with raised dais and galleries. The lower Hall is used for various purposes.

The roof is open hammer-beam principals, the struts for which spring from stone corbels, four of which are now carved with the arms of the late Bishops Broughton, Barker, Barry, and Saumarez-Smith, the remainder are left rough for future use. The end of the hammer-beams carry shields for future decoration.

The spandrels in the roof, which were intended to be filled in with tracery, have been left open for the present, funds not being available for their completion.

The Synod Hall is connected with the south-western tower by a cloister, the arches of which, on the street side, raise their apex as they ascend the steps.

The contract for the building was taken September 1st, 1885, the work being finished in October of the following year, at a cost of about £6,900. A further sum of upwards of £8,000 has been expended in the enlargement of the building, before referred to.

A Tablet erected on the southern wall records the fact that the building was erected as a memorial to Bishop Barker.

The Cloister has been enclosed with Cathedral glass by the generosity of the late Archbishop Saumarez-Smith.



THE SIX PILLARS IN THE NAVE

bear the names and designations of the six Bishops who met in Conference, in Sydney, in the year 1850. They are: William Grant Broughton, Bishop of Sydney and Metropolitan; George Augustus Selwyn, Bishop of New Zealand; Francis Russell Nixon, Bishop of Tasmania; Augustus Short, Bishop of Adelaide; Charles Perry, Bishop of Melbourne; William Tyrrell, Bishop of Newcastle.

THE ORGAN

was the gift of the ladies of the Diocese, and is placed in a gallery in the south transept. It was built in 1866 by Messrs. Hill and Sons, of London, under the direction of Dr. Monk, the Organist of York Minster, and may certainly be pronounced a magnificent instrument, the whole work being of the most delicate finish throughout.

The following is a detailed description of the Organ:—

It contains 40 speaking stops, and over 2,490 pipes, and has eight couplers, five composition pedals acting on pedal stops, and 14 combination pistons operating the manual stops. The compass of the manuals is from CC to A, fifty-eight notes; and the pedals CCC to F, thirty notes.

In 1899 the old tracker action was dispensed with and Tubular Pneumatic put in. Wind is supplied by two large bellows, one of which is used for the pedal organ, the other for the three manuals. The quality of tone of all the stops is very fine. Each of the stops runs through the entire compass of the manual or pedal organ to which it belongs.

THE PULPIT

was the gift of Robert Towns, Esquire, presented in the joint names of himself and Mrs. Towns; and their initials appear, accordingly, on the panels in front. The carving of the ornaments on these, and of the acorns and oak leaves bordering the top, deserves special mention.

THE FONT

was erected by the contributions of the children of the Diocese, the contributors being exclusively those who were not confirmed. The basin and capitals are of Otago stone, and the pillars of Gabo Island granite.

THE TILES AND MARBLE FLOORING

for the Sanctuary and Choir were executed under direction of Sir Gilbert Scott, R.A.

AN ALTAR TOMB

stands in the north aisle of the choir as a memorial to Bishop Broughton. It is surmounted by a stone effigy of the deceased prelate, and is a *fac-simile* of his tomb in Canterbury Cathedral, where his remains were deposited.

A BRASS TABLET

in memory of the late Dean Cowper has been placed by the Chapter on the western wall of the north Transept.

The tablet bears the following inscription :—“ In grateful memory of William Macquarie Cowper, M.A., Oxon., born at Sydney, July 3, 1810 : died in the Deanery

June 14, 1902. He was Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, Sydney, from 1858. As Pastor, Preacher, Teacher, and Administrator, he earned affectionate esteem from all classes of the community. His long and devoted service to the Diocese was marked by Christian humility, justice, earnestness, and courtesy. He laboured loyally for Christ in defence and confirmation of the Gospel, and finished his earthly course in the tranquillity of trust, set upon Christ his Saviour. 'Not I, but the Grace of God which was with me.' This Tablet is erected by the Chapter."

A MEMORIAL BRASS

has been placed on the south wall of the nave by the Officers, Non-Com. Officers, Gunners, Drivers, and Trumpeters of the N. S. Wales Field Battery of Artillery, Soudan Contingent, 1885, in memory of Captain Willows, Vet. Surgeon, Gunners Coburne and Lewis, and Driver Robertson, who died during the campaign.

A TABLET

has been erected in the north Transept to the memory of the officers and men of the New South Wales Contingents who gave their lives for Queen and Country in South Africa, 1899-1902.

His Excellency Admiral Sir Harry H. Rawson erected a brass tablet in the north Transept in memory of the late Lady Rawson, and Miss Rawson has erected a similar tablet in memory of her father, the late Sir Harry H. Rawson.

In 1908 a Tablet was erected on the western wall of the north transept in memory of the late Rev. Richard Johnson, Chaplain in the first fleet. The inscription on the Tablet is as follows:—"In grateful memory of Rev. Richard Johnson, B.A., Magd. Coll. Cambr., who came as Chaplain to the settlement in N.S.W. in the first fleet, reaching Sydney 26th January, 1788. Erected first Church 1793. Laboured with earnest self-devotion amid great difficulties for twelve years. Returned to England 1800, where he died 1827."

Archbishop Saumarez Smith presented to the Cathedral two very handsome carved oak kneeling desks for the Sanctuary, also three stained glass windows which have been erected in the Clerestory on the north side of the Chancel, two of which, Nos. 20 and 22, are of ornamental geometric design, and the middle one, No. 21, represents St. Aidan preaching to the Northumbrians, with King Oswald interpreting. This is an adaptation of a Fresco picture of the same subject painted on the walls of the Chapel of St. Aidan's College, Birkenhead, England, where the Archbishop was Principal for twenty years.

The oak chairs in the Archbishop's Vestry were presented by Dean Cowper.

The handsome brass pulpit desk was presented to the Cathedral by Mrs. Walter Hall.

A Bronze Memorial Tablet has been erected in the North Transept in memory of the late Archbishop Saumarez-Smith, bearing the following inscription:—

Weddings in St. Andrew's Cathedral.

At all Weddings celebrated in the Cathedral, admission shall be given only by ticket. Such tickets to be issued by the Chapter, and distributed by the parties interested in the Wedding.

Tickets shall not exceed 1,000, except with the sanction of the Archbishop.

Except in the case of persons ordinarily attending the Cathedral, or residing in the Cathedral district, the Marriage Fee is £3 3s. In addition to the fee, all expenses incurred are to be defrayed by the parties interested, the necessary work being done under the direction of the Dean.

No Decorations shall be put up in the Cathedral without the sanction of the Dean.

Dean Cowper Memorial Deanery Endowment Fund for St. Andrew's Cathedral.

On the decease of Dean Cowper, who for 44 years occupied the position of Dean and Archdeacon of Sydney, the stipend of £460 p.a., paid to him by the State, ceased, and the Chapter was compelled to appeal for funds for the Endowment of the Deanery. The fund now amounts to about £3,000. Additions thereto would be gratefully received by the Cathedral Chapter.

The Home Mission Society.

(OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE CHURCH SOCIETY)

THE Home Mission Society for the Diocese of Sydney was established in the year 1856. It had its origin in the pressing necessities of the Church in the Diocese. The restriction of State aid to the older Parishes, and the gradual withdrawal of the measure of assistance formerly afforded by the great Missionary Societies of the Mother Country, together with the constantly increasing population consequent upon the gold discoveries, rendered it incumbent on the members of the Church, by union and combined effort, to make provision for sustaining and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout the then vast Diocese of Sydney, which comprised, besides the present Diocese, the extensive Dioceses of Goulburn, Bathurst, and Riverina. In the absence of any Synod or other representative body of the Church, the Bishop of Sydney, after consulting with the Rev. Canon Allwood, for many years subsequently Hon. Secretary of the Society, and other clerical and lay members of the Church, took steps to form a Society which should have for its objects :—

1. The support of Clergymen, Missionaries to the Aborigines, and Catechists.
2. The Endowment of Churches.
3. The Erection of Churches and Parsonage Houses.
4. The Circulation of the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer, and other religious and useful publications.

The scope of the Society was subsequently enlarged, and its objects became :—

1. The support in part or wholly of Clergymen and Catechists, who may also act as Schoolmasters, including grants for the payment of passage-money, and assisting Clergymen or Catechists employed by the Society to reach their destination.
2. The support in part or wholly of Missionaries to the Aborigines.

3. The endowment of Churches.
4. The erection and repair of Churches and Parsonages.
5. To assist poor Parishes or Ecclesiastical Districts in discharging pecuniary obligations imposed upon them or the Clergyman licensed to any such Parish or District by Ordinance or resolution of the Synod.
6. To provide Pensions for aged and infirm clergy.
7. To provide in part or wholly for the training and support of Lay Evangelists.
8. To support in part or wholly the work of women in the Church.

Care was taken that if, on the establishment of a Synod, it should be deemed advisable to provide for the maintenance of Church ministrations by some other plan, no difficulty should arise from the existence of the Society; it being expressly provided by the 31st Rule that on the establishment of a Diocesan Synod, "The organisation shall merge in the Synod." The Society commended itself very generally to the members of the Church. In the first report, for the year 1856, it is stated that consequent upon the work of the Society the number of the Clergy increased from forty-eight to seventy, with six Catechists, whilst grants were made in aid of the erection of Church buildings, for the purchase of glebes and for defraying the expenses of Clergymen from England. The receipts amounted on the 31st December, 1856, to £4,398 4s. 7d. The affairs of the Society were entrusted to the management of a Committee consisting of a Patron, a President (the Bishop of the Diocese), twelve Laymen chosen by the subscribers at the annual meeting, and Representative Members of Parochial and District Associations. This organisation continued until the meeting of the first Diocesan Synod, which, in its second session, adopted an amended code of rules and regulations for the Society, "bringing it into harmonizing action with the Synod. and defining more correctly the important objects which the Church Society is intended to promote."

In the sixth year of its establishment the Bishop of Sydney was enabled to say:—"In June, 1856, the Church Society was formed: in five years it raised and expended

£44,000; it maintains, annually, thirty-one additional Clergymen, and has been the means, under God, of increasing the number of the Clergy from forty-eight to ninety-two: three Catechists are also maintained; the Society has paid for the passage of many Clergymen and Catechists, and assisted in the erection of fifty-two churches and ten parsonage houses. It has also purchased glebes for the endowment of two parishes."

In the year 1860 a proposal was made to the Committee, by Mr. Justice Wise, that a special fund should be raised for the endowment of Parishes. The history and present position of this fund will be found in another place.

In the year 1863 the separation of the Diocese of Goulburn from the Diocese of Sydney enabled the Committee of the Society to extend their operations in the Western District. In the tenth annual report we find the Bishop of Sydney thus adverting to the origin and work of the Society:—"In the year 1856 I was joined by the late much lamented Mr. Kemp and by Mr. Allwood in forming the Church Society, and no sooner was it established than its success was evident. It struck root in the mind of the Church of England, and at the present time the Bishops and Clergy are doubled in number; there are two Bishops and upwards of one hundred Clergymen in what was then the Diocese of Sydney, and more than one hundred places of worship in connection with the Church have been opened in ten years." In the year 1866 the first Synod of the Diocese having met, adopted the following resolution, "That the Synod, recognising the great benefits that have been conferred on the Diocese through the means of the Church Society, adopts it as its agent, for the promotion of the great objects for which it was instituted." In the following year amended rules and regulations were adopted; the fourth object was omitted as belonging properly to the Diocesan Book Society. The Committee of Management was appointed, twelve members of Synod, annually chosen, replacing the twelve members heretofore elected by the general body of subscribers. In the year 1869 the Diocese of Bathurst was formed. The Society, however, continued to render aid to the newly-formed diocese until the close of the year 1873. In the year 1871, in order to further

the objects of the Society, and extend its usefulness, a Sub-Committee was appointed, called the "Auxiliaries Committee," consisting of four members (two Clergymen and two Laymen). elected annually from the members of the General Committee at the first meeting after the session of Synod in each year. This Committee was, in later years, enlarged, and designated "The Sub-Committee of General Purposes." In the year 1872 the Synod passed a resolution to the following effect:—"That this Synod recommends all the Licensed Clergymen, and Catechists, and all the Churchwardens in the Diocese to devote the whole of their collections on the first Sunday in Advent and on the first Sunday after Easter to the General Fund of the Church Society, and that the President be requested to communicate this resolution accordingly." This resolution was attended with very beneficial results. The average collections in churches rose from less than £200 to upwards of £1,000. Subsequently, Trinity Sunday was substituted for the first Sunday after Easter, and the recommendation is now so generally complied with that few Parishes fail to give at least one collection in aid of the Society. The average receipts from these offertories, together with those at Confirmation Services, may be placed at £1,000 per annum. In the year 1872 assistance was first given to the northern portion of Queensland; this assistance was continued until the establishment of the Diocese of North Queensland in the year 1878, when a final grant was made.

In the year 1879, by order of Synod, the objects of the Society were extended to enable it "to assist poor Parishes or ecclesiastical districts in discharging pecuniary obligations imposed upon them or the Clergyman licensed to any such Parish or District by Ordinance or Resolution of Synod," and in 1887 a sixth object was added, viz., "to provide Pensions for aged and infirm Clergy," and a Pension Fund was constituted, the nucleus of which was a capital sum of £3,369, representing certain legacies which from time to time had been received. This has since been increased to over £7,000. In the year 1888 a Perpetual Subscribers' Fund was established. This now amounts to £712 5s. 11d

The following extract from a speech delivered at the Thirtieth Annual Meeting, by his Excellency Lord Carrington, states very plainly the main objects and principles of the Society :—“The Church Society has two main objects—1. Church Extension and Sustentation, by grants in aid of stipends, and (secondarily) in aid of building churches, schools and parsonages, both in Parishes newly formed and in those in which the population is permanently poor. The former grants are gradually diminished as the Parishes become self-supporting; the latter are permanently maintained. Without this branch of the Society’s work it would be impossible to occupy new ground and form new parochial districts (about ten have been formed in the last two years) and to maintain the Church in the poorer city and country districts. 2. The formation of a central stipend fund, out of which, rather than directly from the Parishes, the stipends of the Clergy should be paid. In all cases in which the stipend is aided by the Society, and in others wherever the Parishes please, the contribution for the Parish is paid to the Society, and by it (augmented or unaugmented) to the Clergy, so as to secure regularity, and diminish the sense of dependence. This fund, called the ‘Appropriated Fund,’ amounts to about £17,000 a year. This side of the Society’s operation wants emphasising, for, important as it is, its usefulness is far less obvious than that of the other.”

During the year 1906 the Jubilee of the Society was celebrated. Special sermons were preached in most of our Churches on Sunday, 20th May. The Jubilee meeting, at which His Excellency the Governor, Admiral Sir H. H. Rawson, presided, was held in the hall of the Y.M.C.A. on Thursday, June 28th. Ruridecanal gatherings took place in August and September, and the celebrations concluded with the Festival Service in St Andrew’s Cathedral on Monday, October 8th, when Archdeacon Günther preached.

In 1911 the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney passed an Ordinance reorganising the Society and changing its name. The Ordinance states that “The title of the Society shall

be The Home Mission Society (otherwise known as the Church Society of the Diocese of Sydney),” and that its objects are :—

To PROVIDE wholly or in part for—

The Stipends of Clergy and Catechists,
The training and support of Lay Evangelists,
The work of women in the Church,
Pensions for aged and infirm Clergy :

To ASSIST—

Clergymen and Catechists to reach their destinations by payment of passage money,
Poor Parishes or Districts in discharging pecuniary obligations imposed upon them or the Clergymen licensed to any such Parish or District by Ordinance or Resolution of Synod,
In the erection or repair of Churches, Rectories and School Houses :

To REGULATE AND CONTROL, as branches of the Society—

The Church Buildings' Loan Fund,
The Mission Zone Fund,
The Church of England Welcome Agency for Oversea Arrivals,
Any other Church Fund which may be transferred to or brought under the control of the Society by virtue of any Ordinance of Synod or otherwise :

To MAKE PROVISION FOR—

The regular payment of Parochial Stipends :

To UNDERTAKE—

Any other work that may properly be brought within the scope of the Society.

The Archbishop of Sydney, writing in the “*Sydney Diocesan Magazine*” in November, 1911, soon after the passing of the Ordinance, said :—“ I have every confidence that the Diocese will be glad that it has created so solid and business-like a body for the management of some of its most important affairs, and my experience of the first meeting of the new Council confirms me in that impression.”

During 1917 the Ordinance was amended and now provides that the Society shall be under the management and control of a Council consisting of:—

- (a) The Archbishop who shall be President (*ex officio*).
- (b) The Dean of Sydney and the Archdeacons who shall be Vice-Presidents (*ex officio*).
- (c) A Secretary or Secretaries.
- (d) An Honorary Lay Treasurer.
- (e) Twelve Clergymen elected by Synod.
- (f) Twelve Laymen elected by Synod.
- (g) Six Members nominated by the Archbishop
- (h) Representatives of Parochial Associations.

The sum total collected through the Society from its commencement to the 31st March, 1919, amounted to £1,037,833 12s. 6d. Of this sum, £722,673 7s. 0d. was received for stipend, while during the same period the stipends of Clergymen and Catechists have been augmented to the extent of £168,318 3s. 10d. Churches and Parsonages have been assisted by grants of £22,032 8s. 9d. In bringing Clergymen to the colony and assisting them to reach their destination, £6,127 19s. 4d. has been expended, and by grants in many other directions has the Society promoted the work of the Church in the Diocese. In addition to all this, during the past three years the Society has expended for work amongst the Soldiers in the various camps the sum of £6,945 11s. 0d.

The organisation known as the Ladies' Home Mission Union was inaugurated in May, 1911, for the purpose of bringing the churchwomen of the Diocese more closely into touch with one another, and to make them more thoroughly acquainted with the work now carried on by The Home Mission Society and the Mission Zone Fund

THE MISSION ZONE FUND OF THE HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

The Mission Zone Fund is a distinct and definite Church of England organisation, working in the congested areas of Sydney. The fund was inaugurated by the Church in the year 1901 for the purpose of providing living agents and the building of Mission Halls within the crowded areas of the Metropolis.

It has 4 clergymen, 3 lay evangelists, 8 women workers and one general worker at work in the district of Woolloomooloo, Waterloo, Surry Hills, Erskinville, Darlingtongton and Ultimo. No fewer than 36,000 visits to the homes in these areas were made by the agents during the year ending March 31st, 1919.

The primary aim of the fund is to bring the redeeming love of God in Jesus Christ into the lives of the tens of thousands who dwell in the crowded areas of the great city of Sydney.

The nature of the agents' work is that of house to house visitation; open air services; factory and cottage meetings; religious teaching of the children in schools; mothers' meetings and girls' classes; boys' clubs and men's gatherings; relief and rescue work.

In these slum parishes there are the outcast and fallen who need to be lifted and inspired with hope; the vicious, intemperate and criminal who need the regenerating power of religion; the unemployed, who claim our sympathy; the unemployable, who deserve our pity; the great mass of indifferent and callous, who need the warm handshake of Christian friendship; the children, often neglected, and undisciplined. Hence the grave concern of the fund is the building up of Christian character, worthy of Australian nationhood.

In addition to this, cases of urgent distress receive attention and the fullest sympathy. Care is taken to avoid the danger of pauperising people. They are encouraged to self-respect, self-reliance and to a sense of responsibility.

The slum areas of Sydney present an overwhelming call to the Church's most vigorous activities. Hosts of social problems face the Church there. Deep undertones of sad need vibrate from the depths of human life within our crowded city areas.

The Mission Zone Fund agents are down amongst these human cries—stretching out the hand of friendship and sympathy—speaking the word of comfort to the lonely and friendless—helping people very materially in their battle of life.

Will you not stand behind the Church as she, in the person of her living agents—ministers to the material, moral and spiritual need of Sydney's crowded areas—serves for Christ and humanity?

The Church Buildings' Loan Fund for the Diocese of Sydney.

THE origin of the Church Buildings' Loan Fund was a desire to commemorate, in some practical way which should be beneficial to the Diocese, the completion of the 25th year of the Episcopate of the late Bishop Barker.

A meeting was held in December, 1879, when the first steps were taken. The Bishop himself took the matter up warmly, and subscribed the sum of £500, and personally canvassed for subscriptions till his illness, which came on towards the end of 1880, prevented further action.

The sum of £10,000 was asked for to be paid by instalments extending over four years. The instalments have all been paid, and the fund, including interest received, now amounts to £12,191.

I.—NATURE AND OBJECTS.

The Church Buildings' Loan Fund for the Diocese of Sydney shall be formed by Subscriptions, Donations, Legacies, and such moneys arising from other sources as may become applicable to the purposes of the Fund.

The objects of the Fund shall be to encourage and assist the payment of debts on Church buildings, and to promote the erection, enlargement, or improvement of Churches, Parsonages, and School-houses in the Diocese of Sydney by Loans without interest.

II.—RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The Fund shall be administered by a Committee appointed by the Committee of the Church Society, selected from among the contributors to the Fund, and all vacancies that may from time to time occur in such Committee shall in the like manner be filled up by the Committee of the Church Society.

2. There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary of the Fund who shall be appointed by the Committee of the Church Society, and shall be *ex officio* members of the Committee of the Fund.

3. All moneys of the Fund shall be deposited from time to time to its credit in one of the Sydney banks, and its account shall be operated upon only by the joint signatures of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Fund for the time being, and by order of the Committee.

4. The Committee shall meet quarterly for the purpose of considering applications and granting loans.

5. Loans may be made of amounts from £50 to £500, and shall be repaid in quarterly or half-yearly instalments over a period to be determined by the Committee in each case, but in no instance exceeding six years. A charge of interest at the rate of seven per cent. per annum shall be made on all overdue instalments.

6. Of the debts proposed to be liquidated, or of sums proposed to be expended in new erections, enlargements, or repairs, a certain proportion to be determined by the Committee shall be raised by local effort within a specified time.

7. Trustees or others obtaining Loans from the Fund shall give such security as the Committee shall deem sufficient for the due repayment of the same and the fulfilment of the conditions attached thereto.

8. Applications for Loans from the Fund shall not, as a general rule, be entertained unless the property upon which the same is to be expended is duly secured to the Church of England in the Diocese of Sydney, and unless the Parish in which such property is situated has, or will engage to establish within a time to be agreed upon, an Auxiliary in the Church Society.

THIS fund was originated in the year 1860, at the suggestion of the late Mr. Justice Wise and other gentlemen, with a view to provide endowments in land for the Church in the Diocese of Sydney.

For some years, owing principally to the various other claims upon the liberality of those who are interested in the progress of the Church, nothing was done towards the accomplishment of this design, but the fund was managed by a Provisional Committee of the Church Society, and the following extracts from the rules and regulations, which were adopted by the General Committee of the Church Society, will indicate the uses to which the fund was for some years applied.

“That it shall be competent for the Committee to lend portions of the fund—in aid of any church work in the Diocese ; provided that by such loans the fund shall sustain no loss in the shape of costs or diminished interest, and that substantial security shall in every case be obtained for the repayment of the loan and interest.”

“That all applications for loans under the last rule shall be made in writing, and addressed to the Chairman of the Endowment Fund Committee, stating the amount of loan desired, the purpose to which it is to be applied, the time for which the loan is required, and the security proposed to be given for the repayment of the loan and interest.”

It was the intention of the originators of the fund that no effort should be made to purchase land with a view to Endowment until such time as the subscribers numbered one hundred, and it was not until the year 1884, when a special effort was made to induce subscriptions, that the required number of subscribers was obtained. In November of that year a meeting of the subscribers was convened, under the presidency of Bishop Barry, at which a resolution was unanimously carried appointing a committee “to manage the Endowment Fund, with liberty to invest the fund in the purchase of land, or any other securities as opportunity offers.” The Committee of Management is elected at the Annual Meeting. Investments have been made in land and advances made on mortgage, and on March 31, 1919, the fund was valued at £14,704 2s. 7d. In this estimate the investments have been valued at their cost price.

Within the last few years a further step has been taken. The Committee has, on the recommendation of a Select Committee of the Synod, endorsed in each case by the Rural Dean and by the Archbishop, purchased over fifty sites for Church purposes in various localities. A low rate of interest on the cost is charged, and the parochial authorities enter into agreements to take over the sites so secured at cost price within a term of years.

The Committee is prepared to purchase sites on similar terms in other suitable localities. Applications may be made through the Secretary, to whom contributions to the fund may be sent.

Centennial Church Extension Fund.

DIocese OF SYDNEY

THE idea of this fund originated in the Ruri-decanal Chapter of West Sydney, through a motion moved by the Rev. F. B. Boyce, subsequently Archdeacon of West Sydney. Its establishment was intended to mark the centenary of the foundation of the Church in Australia. The Provincial Synod of 1887 adopted the proposal, and formulated a scheme having for its objects church extension—

- (1.) By Living Agents :—
 - (a) Provision of Clergy and Religious Instructors, especially in new districts ;
 - (b) Extension, when possible, of the Episcopate ;
 - (c) Extension of Missionary Agency.
- (2.) By Material Machinery :—
 - (d) Grant or loan for Church building in struggling districts ;
 - (e) Loans on security without interest for extinction of existing Church debts.

Subsequently the last-named object (Loans on Security without Interest, &c) was excluded from the scope of the fund on the ground that the Church Buildings' Loan Fund served the purpose stated.

The total subscriptions, donations, &c., received, amounted to £29,415 16s. 7d., of which sum £7,302 15s. 1d. was specially appropriated to Parochial, Diocesan, or special purposes. The interest earned by the General or Diocesan Fund on bank balances and investments to March 31, 1919, was £24,358, all of which, with the exception of the small amounts for working charges, as shown in the annual balance sheets, has been paid in grants towards stipends and building of churches and schools in new districts.

The sum of £4,000 was applied by the Diocese of Sydney to extra-Diocesan objects, and the interest of one-fourth of this sum, viz, £1,000, is secured in perpetuity for Church extension by Living Agents to the Diocese of Goulburn; the interest of another fourth part to the Diocese of Riverina, and the interest of another fourth was

appropriated toward the same object to the Diocese of Bathurst for five years from January 1st, 1895, and of the fourth £1,000 to the Diocese of Grafton and Armidale for ten years from the same date. On the urgent representation of the Bishop of Bathurst of the needs of his Diocese the Executive Committee extended the grant of interest for a further period of three years.

During the year ending 31st March, 1915, the Trustees of the Centennial Fund paid over to the Corporate Trustees of the Diocese of Grafton the capital sum of £1000—which had been held as the stimulating nucleus of the Endowment Fund for that new See.

The Provincial Synod of 1895 passed the following resolution :—

“With reference to the Centennial Fund this Synod resolves :—

- (i.) That the capital sum or sums shall remain in the hands of the several Dioceses in which they are now held, and shall be transferred to such permanent Diocesan body as the Diocesan Synod may determine, and shall be dealt with by them in accordance with a deed to be prepared, provided that the moneys now held by the treasurers of the Board for the Dioceses of Goulburn and Riverina shall be transferred and dealt with in like manner.
- (ii.) That the capital sums of £1,000 each, now held in trust for two proposed new Dioceses in connection with the Dioceses of Grafton and Armidale and the Diocese of Bathurst respectively, shall be held by the Corporate Body of Trustees of the Diocese of Sydney, to be dealt with by them in accordance with a deed to be prepared.
- (iii.) That the Synod of each Diocese shall have power to administer the interest of the Fund for the purposes of Church Extension—(1) by Living Agents, (2) Material Machinery.
- (iv.) That in every case the deed or deeds herein referred to shall be approved by the Metropolitan.
- (v.) That the Centennial Board, having completed its work, shall cease to exist.

The invested funds (General or Diocesan, and Extra Diocesan Funds), including bank balances, total £18,268.

This Fund, with which are amalgamated the Clergy Superannuation Fund and the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Sydney, has (according to the Certificate of a well-known Actuary, given after recent investigation) an actual surplus of £35,000.

The accumulated Funds amount to over £120,000.

The annual income is over £12,000.

The Pensions already paid to members amount to over £38,000.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any Bishop, Assistant or Coadjutor Bishop, or Clergyman installed or licensed in any Diocese in Australia, Tasmania, or British New Guinea, or any old member wheresoever resident, may, upon proof of health satisfactory to the medical adviser of the Board and with the approval of the Board, become a member of the Fund under any one of the Tables following, either for Superannuation Annuity or for Widows' and Orphans' Pensions, or for both.

SUBSCRIPTIONS.

Acting under Actuarial advice and with the sanction of an Ordinance of Synod, the Board will during the next ten years apply portion of the Income of the surplus in allowing a bonus of £2 10s per annum in reduction of subscriptions payable on each branch of the Fund. After allowing this bonus the subscriptions actually payable will be as follows :—

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

On the death of a member subscribing to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, at any time after admission to membership, his widow becomes entitled to an annual allowance of £30. After ten years' subscriptions, the following additional annual allowance will be payable for each additional year of subscription paid to the fund, viz. :—

The widow's pension ceases on re-marriage.

INCREASE OF PENSIONS.

Acting under Actuarial advice and with the authority of the Ordinance of Synod, the Board will set apart the sum of £250 a year, and apply the same in payment of the sum of £5 per annum to each Superannuation pensioner and to each Widow in addition to the above allowance. The increased allowance of £5 per annum will be allotted in order of priority if the sum of £250 shall not be sufficient to provide for an increased pension to every Pensioner or Widow entitled to a pension.

CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES.

In addition to the widow's pension, £8 per annum for each surviving child till such child attains 16. Maximum allowance for any one family, £50.

The above allowances apply to the case of new members under the Clergy Provident Fund only; the subscriptions and benefits of old members, under the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Clergy Superannuation Fund, remain unaltered, and their claims form a first charge on the respective amounts of the assets transferred by those funds to the new fund.

MEMBERS IN DIOCESE OF SYDNEY.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS.

The Ordinance requires that special collections for the fund shall be made at services throughout the Diocese of Sydney on the Second Sunday in August of every year, or on such other Sunday as the parochial authorities may elect.

The total amount of the special collections (after providing out of the collections from any parish for the parish contributions for an old member if licensed as minister of such parish) is divisible into as many portions as there are new members in the Diocese of Sydney on the following first day of January in each year, and the dividend will be deducted from their subscriptions for that year.

RESERVE FUND.

The Board is directed to set apart £5000 out of the funds transferred by the C. W. and O. Fund, and may apply the income thereof in making grants (not exceeding £5 per annum) to new members towards the payment of their subscriptions, but a new member must be a subscriber to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund in order to be entitled to this grant.

WALTER & ELIZA HALL FUND.

The Board, by arrangement with the Archbishop of Sydney, is empowered to recommend grants from the Walter and Eliza Hall Fund in aid of Members' annual subscriptions, where considered necessary.

The Board of Directors meets on the third Tuesday in each month.

THIS Society has for its objects the formation and encouragement of Public Schools for the education of youth in the principles of the Church of England, and for the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer, the Homilies, and other books and tracts contained in the catalogues of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, together with other approved works of a like character and tendency. The means by which these objects are carried out are :—

By grants in aid of Religious Instruction in Church, Day, and State Schools, books for use in Sunday Schools, and New Churches, Libraries, and other like objects.

RULE XI. That the Subscribing Members do pay annually a sum of not less than Ten Shillings.

Diocesan Theological Library.

THE Diocese of Sydney is fortunate in possessing a collection of books which, already valuable and extensive, should become, with adequate attention, a really good library.

The history of the collection is as follows: In the year 1809—when Port Jackson was regarded as part of the Diocese of London—the Rev. S. Marsden, the principal Chaplain, applied for and obtained a grant of a few standard theological works from “The Associates of the late Dr. Bray,” a Trust which preserves the name of “a person most eminent and exemplary in his age for a truly apostolic zeal as the projector and promoter of almost every scheme for the propagation and improvement of Christianity.” To these no additions were made until 1835, when a second donation of books, to the value of fifty pounds, was received from the same source, and the then Archdeacon Broughton applied part of a money grant from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge to the extension of the still very slender library. Many more works were obtained by purchase a few years later, as Dr. Broughton, by that time Bishop of Australia, could avail himself of funds which had been subscribed in England for the service of his vast Diocese—mainly through the exertions of the Rev. E. Coleridge, of Eton College. Mr. Coleridge, not contenting himself with inducing subscriptions, spared no pains to bring the literary needs of the infant Colonial Church under the notice of friends of piety and learning in the mother country, and a result of his efforts was that gifts of books began to flow in rapidly.

A complete list of donors would exceed the prescribed limits of the present notice. It would be headed by “The Associates” of the zealous founder of libraries, Dr. Bray. Next in order would stand the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge. There would follow some well-known names—the Revs. W. Jacobson (late Bishop of Chester), Dr. Wordsworth (late Bishop of Lincoln), A. P. Stanley (late
n of Westminster), J. H. Newman (once Vicar of

St. Mary's, and afterwards a Roman Cardinal), Dr. Pusey, E. Coleridge, George Selwyn and R. J. Wilberforce; Sir John Richardson, Sir Robert Inglis, and Mr. Justice Coleridge (afterwards Lord Chief Justice); Messrs. A. J. Beresford Hope, Edward Bellasis and John Marshall. An expression of gratitude would have to be accorded to others who preferred to remain anonymous—"Some Fellows of Oriel," "Various individuals resident at Cambridge," "Some Bachelors and Undergraduates of the University of Oxford." It must be enough to remark in passing that a label in each volume preserves the names—in not a few cases, the autographs—of many distinguished men who, in former years, gave practical evidence of a deep interest in the welfare of the Australian Church.

Brief mention having been made of benefactors, the next thing is to give some general idea of the contents of a library which consists, at the present time, of upwards of three thousand volumes. Naturally the distinctly theological element is predominant. The Early Fathers are well represented by folio editions of (among others) the writings of Cyril of Alexandria, Jerome, Basil, Origen, Gregory Nazianzen and Augustine. There are the works of the Venerable Bede, of Anselm of Bec and Canterbury, of Bernard of Clairvaux. There are early, sometimes contemporaneous, editions of the works of Luther and Erasmus, of Cardinal Cajetan, of Bishop Latimer, of Jewell, and Hooker. There are the complete works (translated) of Calvin, and Strype's "Annals," "Memorials," and "Lives." There is a goodly array of Anglican Divines; as Burnet, Cudworth, Cosin, Stillingfleet, Beveridge, Comber, Wall and Waterland. Biographies, Ecclesiastical Histories, Books of Reference are numerous—there are the works of Lardner and Calmet and Bingham; a translation of Fleury's Ecclesiastical History, Collier's Ecclesiastical History of Britain, and Bruey's *Histoire des Papes*; Heylin's "Laud," and the "Lives" of Isaac Walton. There is the "Eikon Basilike," the "Sacra Privata" of the saintly Bishop Wilson of Sodor and Man, and the once famous "Tracts for the Times."

But the collection is by no means exclusively theological in its nature. It contains some store of what, for present

purposes, may be roughly classified as general literature. There are some volumes of "The Rambler," "The Old Englishman or Anti-Jacobin Examiner" (which has a present interest in view of Home Rule for Ireland), and "The Trifler" for 1788. There are the works of Plato and Thucydides, of Epictetus, of Seneca, of Diodorus Siculus, Plutarch's "Lives," and the letters of the younger Pliny. There is Clarendon's History of the Rebellion, Prideaux's Mahomet, the "De L'Allemagne" of Madame De Stael Holstein, a finely illustrated Life of Nelson, a very early edition (in the Spanish) of the Comedies of Cervantes, "The Courtier" (in the original) of Baldassar Castiglione, and a splendid copy of Pope's works with the "Memoirs of Martinus Scriblerus." Nor is this admixture in a Diocesan Library of the so-called secular and the sacred a thing to be deprecated. It has a profound significance. It points in the direction of a true Catholicity. It bids the theological student and the clergyman enter heart and soul into the manifoldness of human life. It suggests that their ministrations will be all the more fruitful as they keep in mind the words of Terence—*Homo sum, humani nihil a me alienum puto.*

There are but few books in the library which, from a collector's point of view, are of any considerable importance. If there be "gems of the collection," their value (with one or two exceptions) scarcely consists in the price they might command; it lies rather in their historical associations, in their rich suggestiveness for the people of a young country. Where the surroundings are characterised by newness, where distance from the old world renders it difficult to realise the meaning and the lessons of a past which goes back further than the close of the eighteenth century, it is helpful exceedingly to be able to point to volumes which—far from being "dead things in stiff bindings"—are instinct with the life of their day and generation. Such books are actually to hand in the library of the Diocese. There is, to begin with, a handsome edition (with illuminated capitals) of the "De Civitate Dei" of Augustine; it comes down from the times illustrated by "The last of the Barons" and "Quentin Durward"; it

bears the trade mark of one whose name is for ever associated with the names of Fust and Gutenberg, Peter Schœffer of Gernsheim ; it issued from the celebrated press at Maintz in Germany at a day (1473) when Caxton had not yet established himself "at the red pale" in the Almonry in Westminster. Here, again, is a copy of Bede's Homilies—it was published when Wolsey was but lately deceased, in the very year (1534) that the Act of the Supremacy was passed ; it may have been used in some monastery, which felt the rough hand of Thomas Cromwell. There, too, is a fine old Augsburg Missal—it came from the press of one Sabert Mayer, who carried on his trade in that town of Dillingen where Cardinal Otho Truchsess was founding his University in the hope of checking the progress of the new opinions ; it dates from the same year (1555) that the "Peace of Religion" was signed at Augsburg. Of deep interest is a copy of the second edition of the "Bishops' Bible" (sometimes called the "Parker," or the "Treacle," or the "Leda." Bible). Only a short time before its appearance Pope Pius V. had launched his Bull of Deposition against Elizabeth : the year of its publication (1572) was marked by the massacre of St. Bartholomew ; its first readers were men whose eyes would continually turn to the Low Countries, where Alva was busy with his bloody work ; for aught one can tell, its pages may have been turned by Gloriana herself, by Shakespeare and Spenser, by the judicious Hooker, and the poet-priest of Bemerton. Hardly less interesting are copies of the Geneva (or "Breeches" Bible), and of that "Rhemish" version which came from Cardinal Allen's English College at Douai and Rheims. There is also a first impression of the so-called "Authorised Version" or King James's Bible of 1611—the edition known to collectors as the "He" Bible. But enough has been said to show that the library is well worth visiting. There are, it is true, no richly illuminated manuscripts from the scriptoria of great religious houses or trade-guilds ; hardly anything to carry one back to days when the printing press was in its earliest infancy ; but there are plenty of old books which, dating from the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, are not only

interesting in themselves, but may serve, each one as a reminder of memorable scenes, great occurrences, famous personages, of a singularly eventful epoch in European history.

The defects of the library are, however, numerous. They are at once apparent when inquiry is made (and made in vain) for the works of modern authors. Many are the labourers to-day in the various departments of theological research, great and rapid advances have been made of recent years in the field of Biblical criticism, the present age has been richly productive of books of more than temporary merit, the times are such as to render it imperative that the Clergy should be well to the front in the march of knowledge, a demand for information has sprung up among all classes which should stir the Church to action. And this being so, there is all the more occasion to regret that the wise and generous example of those who founded and added to the Diocesan Library in years gone by has found of late so few imitators. It would be only too easy to compile a list of the additions made up to the end of 1909—gifts and purchases might, indeed, be noted, but only at long intervals—there are Smith's "Christian Antiquities," the works of Archbishop Trench, Conybeare and Howson's "St. Paul," Bishop Ryle's "Principles for Churchmen," and these are about all. During 1910 a change was effected. Upwards of two hundred valuable books were purchased and about fifty others were presented by the Ven. Archdeacon Günther and others. High time it is that something more was done to make the Sydney Diocesan Library what it ought to be—a steadily growing and much used collection of all that is best in theological and (within reasonable limits) general literature.

The usefulness and attractiveness of the library would be very considerably enhanced by the addition of some modern theological works. Gifts of such books, or money for the purchase of them, would be thankfully received.

Unless churchmen have these books, and facilities for theological study, so that they may be able to show themselves capable of dealing with the questions so constantly brought before the public, the Church must suffer, and that seriously.

The Library is now lodged in the Diocesan Church House, George-street, Sydney, and is open to members from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

RULES ADOPTED BY THE STANDING COMMITTEE, JUNE, 1903.

1. The control of the Library shall, for the present, be vested in the Honorary Librarian.

2. Licensed Ministers of the Diocese and other members of the Church holding the recommendation (in writing) of a licensed Minister shall be entitled to the use of the Library, on payment of a yearly subscription of 2s. 6d.

3. Each such Minister or Member of the Church shall be entitled to the use from the Library of two books at a time (not being books of reference), and shall not retain any book longer than one month without the permission of the Librarian.

4. Each person using the Library shall be responsible for books while in his or her possession, and all damage and loss must be made good at the discretion of the Librarian.

5. Any person taking a book from the Library shall sign a receipt for the same in a book to be kept for the purpose.

6. If in his management of the Library the Honorary Librarian desires guidance on any point, he shall send the question in writing to the Standing Committee for decision.

7. That a Committee be appointed from among the subscribers, with the Archbishop of Sydney as *ex officio* President, for the purpose of purchasing new books, and obtaining suitable gifts for the Library. That such Committee be elected as soon as twelve persons have subscribed to the Library Funds.

St. Paul's College.

WITHIN THE UNIVERSITY OF SYDNEY.

THE first movement towards the establishment of this, the oldest of the Colleges affiliated to the University of Sydney, dates from 15th December, 1852, when a public meeting took place in Sydney, at which, the Bishop being absent from the colony, the chair was taken by the Chief Justice, Sir Alfred Stephen. Among the resolutions passed at that meeting were the following :—

“That, in the opinion of this meeting, the Legislature of the colony, by the endowment and foundation of the Sydney University, has provided the means of imparting secular knowledge of the highest order and efficiency.

“It is, at the same time, matter of deep regret that circumstances over which the Legislature could exercise no legitimate control, precluded it from conferring upon the University, in addition to the cultivation of science and letters, the charge of the religious and moral teaching of the student—and that it has therefore become the duty of members of the Church of England promptly to make provision for the moral and religious superintendence of their youth by the establishment of a separate College, independent as to its internal discipline and rules, but in permanent alliance with the University as at present constituted.”

Large subscriptions were soon collected, and an Act was passed to incorporate the College (1854). By this Act the government of the College is vested in a Council consisting of the Warden and eighteen Fellows. The Warden and six of the Fellows must be Clergymen of the Church of England in Priest's Orders ; the remaining twelve Fellows must be Laymen. The Fellows are elected by the graduates of the College for six years. Under new by-laws, passed in October, 1911, two Lay Fellows and one Clerical Fellow retire each year, and are eligible for re-election. The Archbishop of Sydney is *ex officio* Visitor of the College. All students must matriculate and attend lectures in the University.

On St. Paul's Day, 25th January, 1856, the foundation stone of the buildings was laid by His Excellency Sir William Denison. So far as already erected, the buildings represent an outlay of about £39,000. The corner stone of the Warden's Lodge was laid by His Excellency Lord

Carrington, on 30th December, 1885. In 1908, the Jubilee of the College buildings, designs were prepared for the erection of the Tower, East Wing, and Chapel, and the collection of funds began. In 1914 the circular of 1908 was under revision for the renewal of the appeal for the whole work, when the war broke out. The Council felt, however, that the needs of the College and the support already received justified their proceeding with the first section of the work. The Library, hitherto used as a Chapel, was taken down, and 18 new rooms were completed in June, 1915, in continuation of the existing East Wing, at a cost of nearly £4,400. The College has now rooms for 52 students, and also for a Sub-Warden and a Tutor. A temporary chapel has been erected in the College grounds. Plans are now in preparation for the remodelling of the administrative quarters, the completion of the quadrangle by the addition of a main entrance with tower, a library, lecture rooms and a permanent Chapel to be regarded as a memorial of those soldier-sons of the College who laid down their lives in the great war. The Council hopes that it may be able eventually to provide accommodation for nearly 200 students, though the plans are so drawn as to permit the work to be done by sections.

The College was founded in the year 1856, under the will of the late Thomas Moore, Esq., at Liverpool, New South Wales, and has since that time been the means of training nearly 400 candidates for the Ministry of the Church of England in the Australian Colonies.

In the year 1889 it was thought desirable to transfer the College to Sydney, and new buildings having been erected on a site closely adjoining St. Paul's College and the University, it was re-opened in the first week of August, 1891.

The Chapel which had been erected at Liverpool in memory of Bishop Broughton was removed to the present site in 1902 and re-opened in January, 1903.

The present buildings consist of Chapel, Dining Hall, Library, Common Room, rooms for Vice-Principal and 14 Students, and the Principal's residence.

The College prepares students for the Examinations of the Australian College of Theology, and is also affiliated with the University of Durham.

At the Session of Synod, 1919, an Ordinance was passed to provide for the management and control of the MOORE THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, and in accordance therewith a Committee has been constituted to have the management and control of the College, subject to the right of the Trustees to appoint the Principal after consultation with the Committee, and to veto any action of the Committee which in the opinion of the Trustees, or a majority of them, is inimical to the interests of the College. Such veto to be in writing and to set out the reasons thereof. (See Clause No. 2).

The duties of the Committee will be found in Clause 4. The Committee is empowered to expend its funds in the manner prescribed in Clause 5, and is required to present an Annual Report and Statement of Accounts to the Synod at every ordinary Session.

ADMISSION AND RESIDENCE.

Candidates applying for admission must—

- (a) be baptised, confirmed, and Communicant members of the Church of England ;
- (b) answer satisfactorily certain questions addressed to them by the Principal ;
- (c) give the names of one Clergyman and two responsible Laymen personally acquainted with their character and past life ;
- (d) send in a testimonial of moral and mental fitness for the Ministry from two Clergymen licensed to Cures in the Church of England, or a certificate of acceptance from the Bishop of the Diocese in which the Candidate intends to take Orders.

Candidates for admission as First Year Students must pass an Entrance Examination, held at the College a few days before the beginning of the Academic year in March. Papers will be set on Elementary Latin and Greek, English Grammar and Composition, including an Essay.

Readers or Catechists working under any Bishop who accepts the Moore College Certificate, may, on passing the Sydney University Matriculation Examination, or its equivalent, be admitted to the College as second year students. Such students must have reached the first year standard in Greek.

University graduates may obtain the College certificate after one year's residence if they pass the *Th.B.* of the Australian College of Theology, or the "*Durham L.Th.*," or an equivalent examination.

Second and third year students as a rule reside in the College ; but exceptions will be made in the case of—

- (a) married men who live with their families.
- (b) single men residing with relatives.

- (c) candidates for Holy Orders who are working as Catechists, and who reside either with the Clergyman under whom they work or in some house approved of by him.

Such students are expected to attend Chapel, and certain meals in Hall.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The full course for non-graduate students extends over three years, including a probationary period before beginning the strictly theological course.

The Probationary Course is planned to lead up to the ordinary college course in Theology, and to guarantee a certain standard of general education in candidates for Holy Orders.

The subjects of this course are :

1. *Latin* — Abbot, via Latina; and Caesar's "Invasion of Britain."
2. *Greek*—H. P. V. Nunn, "The Elements of New Testament Greek."
3. *English*—Morris, "Elementary English Grammar"; Nesfield; "English Grammar and Composition," and selected English authors.
4. *History*—Outlines of English History. Text book, Edith Thompson, "History of England." For reference and general reading. J. R. Green, "Short History of the English People"; G. R. Balleine, "A Layman's History of the Church of England."
5. *Elementary Religious Knowledge* — Bible and Prayer Book, subject matter and text. Recommended for study:—Bishop Drury, "How we got our Prayer Book"; Bishop Barry, "The Teacher's Prayer Book"; Dr. Griffith Thomas, "The Catholic Faith."

An examination in these subjects is held at the end of the Trinity term in each year. Only those candidates who show they have attained a sufficient standard will be allowed to take the ordinary Theological course. Only those students who have been admitted to the ordinary Theo-

logical course are entitled to describe themselves as Moore College Students.

During their second and third years Students are prepared for the examinations for the TH.L. of the Australian College of Theology. The course also serves as a preparation for the First Public and the Final Examinations for a Licence in Theology of the University of Durham, and fully meets the requirements of the various Diocesan Ordination Examinations. Under certain conditions Students may also sit for the Oxford and Cambridge Preliminary Examination for Candidates for Holy Orders.

The strictly Theological Course begins in the Michaelmas Term of each year, and is continued through the Easter and Trinity Terms of the following year, as the examinations of the Australian College of Theology are held at the end of September, annually.

The subjects of the College Course from October, 1919, to September, 1920, will be those set for Part I. of the Th.L. of the Australian College of Theology. From October 1920 to September 1921, the subjects will be those set for Part II. of the same Examination.

Special provision is made for instruction in Sermon Preparation, Reading, Singing, and Pastoralia, and for practical training in Parochial work under adequate supervision.

The Licence in Theology of the Australian College of Theology entitles students to the use of the title of TH.L. and to the wearing of a distinctive Hood.

Students who complete a satisfactory course at Moore College receive the Certificate of the College which entitles them to wear the College Hood. Fuller details of the conditions on which certificates are granted are given in the Prospectus, which can be obtained from the Principal.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE HOOD OF MOORE COLLEGE.

1. That owing to the difference in shape and shade of the Hoods worn by Moore College men, it is desirable that a uniform standard be adopted.
2. That the shape of the Hood submitted by Bishop Barker to the Archbishop of Canterbury about the year 1865, and approved by him, be retained.

3. That the Hood (in accordance with the above pattern) be faced with a strip of light mauve silk, four inches wide, but no silk to show on the neck-band in front.
4. That the Hood shall be made of suitable black stuff, or (having regard to the usage of over 50 years), of black silk.
5. That a standard Hood be made, and left in the charge of the Secretary at the Diocesan Registry.

Special facilities are provided for students who wish to read for the Arts degree at the University of Sydney.

University of Durham. The College is affiliated to the University of Durham, and its students may proceed to the degrees of that University on certain conditions. The degrees available are (1) The Licence in Theology, which entitles students to the use of the title L.T.H., and to the wearing of a distinctive Hood; (2) Degrees in Arts on completion of residence at Durham, and (3) the B.D. and D.D. degrees for which residence at Durham is not necessary.

After 1922 a period of residence at Durham will be required from candidates for the B.D. degree and other changes will come into force.

After December, 1915, all candidates for the Durham L.T.H. must first of all pass the Durham Matriculation Examination or an equivalent examination. The Sydney University Matriculation is recognised as such. This Examination and the two Examinations leading up to the L.T.H. can be taken at Moore College on due notice being given.

Attention is called to the fact that only those who have been awarded the College Certificate or have received the express authorisation of the Principal are entitled to describe themselves as Moore College Students.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are two scholarships, the "Barker" Scholarship and the "Eleanor Abbott" Scholarship, each worth about £30 a year and tenable for one year.

These are awarded by examination, one to a second year student and the other to a third year student, but in the case of the "Barker" Scholarship preference is given to candidates for Orders in the Diocese of Sydney.

Elected candidates are expected to complete the College Course, and to occupy rooms *in* the College.

A Bursary Fund has been raised, which enables the Trustees to provide additional scholarships, and to make grants and loans to deserving students. From this Fund the Trustees have provided, for 1920, two scholarships of £15 each, and two of £10 each, for second and third year men. There are also other small emoluments generally available.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge (S.P.C.K.) grants exhibitions to native-born Students who are recommended by a Bishop for work in his Diocese.

The Colonial and Continental Church Society (C & C.C.S.) makes grants to students who are preparing to work in bush districts.

For full particulars concerning Terms, Fees, &c., apply by letter to the Principal.

Evening Classes are held at the College to prepare for the Entrance Examination. For information apply to the Principal.

The Australian College of Theology.

(Established by the General Synod of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania, Session 1891. Re-constituted, Session 1900. Constitution amended, Sessions 1910-1916.)

THE Australian College of Theology has been founded in order "to foster and direct the systematic study of Divinity, especially among the clergy," and consists of (I.) the Bishops of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania; (II.) other Bishops residing in Australia and Tasmania; (III.) all Clergymen holding the certificate of Fellowship (Th. Soc.); (IV.) such other persons being in Holy Orders and learned in Theology, and not exceeding twelve in number, as a majority of the Bishops of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania shall elect to become Fellows of the College.

The executive business of the College is transacted by a Council of five Delegates, elected by the College from among the Fellows, and holding office for five years, and a Registrar elected by the College and *ex officio* a member of the Council.

The Clauses of the Constitution which define the certificates to be given by the College are as follows :—

7. The following certificates shall be issued after examination only except as hereinafter provided :—

- (a) TH. A., or Associate in Theology : it shall be open to all members of the Church of England in the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania, and to others at the discretion of the College.
- (b) TH. L., or Licentiate in Theology : it shall be open to candidates for Holy Orders and all clergymen holding a Bishop's license who are duly accredited from an approved Theological College or are members of a recognised University, and to such other members of the Church of England as shall be approved by the College.

- (c) TH. SCHOL., or Scholar in Theology: it shall be open to all clergymen holding license as aforesaid who are:—(1) Licentiates in Theology of five years' standing; (2) Licentiates in Theology of three years' standing who have passed in honours; (3) Graduates of any recognised University who are of five years' standing in Priest's Orders; (4) Holders of the certificates of the Oxford and Cambridge Preliminary Theological Examination, or of the Theological Faculty of the University of Durham, or of the Board of Theological Studies of the Church of New Zealand of five years' standing if they have passed without honours, and of three years' standing if they have passed with honours; (5) Licentiates in Theology who are of seven years' standing in Priest's Orders; (6) Clergy of fifteen years' standing in Priest's Orders.
- (d) TH. SOC., or Fellow of the College of Theology: it shall be open to all clergymen holding license as aforesaid who shall have held the TH. SCHOL. certificate of the first class for a period of five years. This certificate may be conferred *honoris causâ* on distinguished Divines without examination by an absolute majority of the Fellows.

8. These certificates, with the exception of that of TH. A. shall confer authority for wearing a distinctive Hood.

SUBJECTS OF EXAMINATION.

(1) For TH. SOC.:—An original treatise on any special Theological subject—both subject and treatise to be approved by the Delegates. A Certificate of Approval of the Candidature from the Bishop of the Diocese is also required.

(2) For TH. SCHOL.:—Holy Scripture, Old Testament (including questions on LXX.), and Greek Testament, together with four of the following subjects for a First Class, two for a Second Class, one for a Pass:—Church History (selected periods), Liturgiology, Dogmatics, Philosophy of Religion, Greek and Latin Fathers, Moral and Social Science Hebrew (selected books), Comparative Study of Religion.

(3) For TH. L. (Essential subjects):—Holy Scripture—General and Selected (including portions of the N.T. in Greek); Prayer Book and Church Doctrine; General and English Church History; Pastoral Theology.

Extra Subjects (two at least required for a First Class—one at least for a Second Class). Hebrew, Criticism of the Old Testament, Textual Criticism of the New Testament, Latin (necessary for First Class), Apologetics, Social Science, Psychology and Religion, Comparative Study of Religion.

(4) For TH. A.:—Holy Scripture: its authority and structure, and the character and scope of the several Books: the Church Services, their construction and language: the Creeds and Articles, their history and meaning: English Church History.

(Candidates passing for TH. SCHOL., TH. L., or TH. A. below a First Class may enter again, with a view to obtaining a higher class.)

DATE OF EXAMINATION.

The Examinations are at present held about the beginning of October of each year. In every Diocese yielding Candidates arrangements for the place of examination and for the necessary supervision will be made by the Bishop.

Candidates for TH. L. (pass), and for TH. A. will be expected to send notice and fee to the Registrar on or before June 30th.

Candidates for TH. L. (honours) and for TH. SCHOL. will be expected to send notice and fee to the Registrar on or before March 31st.

A MANUAL, giving full information about the College of Theology, together with Examination Papers, is published annually, and can be obtained from Messrs Angus and Robertson, Castlereagh-street, Sydney, or from Church Stores, Daking House, Rawson Place, Sydney.

The King's School, PARRAMATTA.

THE founding of The King's School was the result of the efforts made by Archdeacon Broughton and others, extending as far back as 1830, to establish a scheme of higher class education for boys and men approximating to the system of Public Schools and Colleges at home. The Home Government authorised the institution of two Public Schools; one at Parramatta for boarders and day scholars, the other in Sydney for day scholars only. The question of founding a College to complete the scheme was postponed until the circumstances of the colony should require it. The school opened in Sydney was soon closed, owing to the death of the Head Master. The King's School was founded in 1831, and was opened in 1832. Under the headmastership of the Rev. R. Forrest, it soon achieved great success. Subsequently it passed under various hands and through many vicissitudes to its present well-established position.

The School provides a classical, mathematical, scientific, and general education of the highest order, with sound religious teaching in accordance with the principles of the Church of England. There are classical and modern sides, with a Junior or Preparatory School for boys of 8 to 12, at reduced fees; this is in the fullest connection with the main School. Every facility is offered for the preparation of youths for a professional or a mercantile career.

Scholarships and Exhibitions.—There are (I.) Two “Broughton and Forrest” Exhibitions, worth £100 a year each, tenable for four years, on condition of going to Oxford or Cambridge. (II.) One “Burton” Exhibition, of the annual value of £40, tenable at St. Paul’s College, Sydney. (III.) The “Broughton” Scholarship of £25, open to all boys who have been six months in the school, and tenable while they remain there (at present in abeyance). (IV.) The “Burton” (A) Scholarship, tenable by a boarder, under similar conditions and of the same value as III. (V.) The “Macarthur” Entrance Scholarship, for boys between 12 and 14, value £25 (at present in abeyance). (VI.) The “Burton” (B) Entrance Scholarship, open also to boys under 15 already in the school, value £25 per annum. (VII.) The “Burton” (C) Entrance Scholarship, for boys under 15, value £25 per annum. (VIII.) Exhibitions of £25 to £50 each, for sons of clergymen, on the nomination of the Archbishop of Sydney.

The School comprises four "houses," after the system of the great English schools. These "houses" stand in about 40 acres of land. The Parramatta Park, of 250 acres, adjoins the School. A School Hospital affords complete isolation, and the best of nursing care, during the prevalence of any epidemic. There are also a museum, a laboratory, an armoury, and a gymnasium.

There is also a beautiful School Chapel, which was opened on February 6th, 1889.

For all particulars as to fees, &c., application should be made to the Head Master, or to the Clerk of the Council, Ocean House, Moore-street, Sydney.

THIS School was founded in accordance with an Act passed in 1886, entitled the "St. James's School Compensation Trust Act." This Act provided for the establishment "of a school of the highest type, including various departments of education, for all classes of the community, in which the teaching shall be throughout in accordance with the principles of the Church of England, and which shall be placed under the direction of a governing body of Clergy and Laity to be elected by the Synod, the Bishop of the Diocese being *ex officio* President." The government of the School is now regulated by the "Sydney Church of England Grammar School Ordinance of 1894."

The School stands on an elevated position in North Sydney, the School House being the building formerly known as Holterman's Tower. The accommodation for boarders includes a large dining hall, dormitories, lavatories, and studies on the English public school principle. A detached sanatorium is provided for use in case of illness.

The class rooms comprise sixteen commodious and well-lighted rooms, in addition to the School Hall.

There is also a well-equipped School Library and Reading Room which was erected as a Memorial to the Old Boys, who fell in the war in South Africa, from funds contributed by Old Boys and friends of the School.

The Chapel, the foundation stone of which was laid on the twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of the School, was dedicated by the Archbishop on May 4, 1915.

The course of study includes Scriptural teaching, English subjects, classics, modern languages, science, and mathematics. Instruction in woodwork is given in the workshop, and there is a laboratory for the teaching of natural science. There is also a well-equipped gymnasium, where the boys exercise under the supervision of an instructor.

Senior Cadet Corps.—Under the new system of Cadets the School contributes two companies to the 18th Battalion (North Sydney and Chatswood Areas) of the Commonwealth Senior Cadets. Major J. Lee Pulling, a member of the School Staff, is in command of this Battalion, and three other Masters hold commissions under him. The Band is instructed by a competent Instructor. Musketry training is given at the Randwick Rifle Range and at a private miniature range on the School grounds. It is pointed out that members of the School Companies have many advantages over those who are trained in the outside companies, as, for example, afternoon parades on the School grounds, in place of night parades elsewhere, use of the extra material and facilities provided by the School, and an extra number of efficient instructors. The uniform is provided free by the Government.

The ground on which the School stands offers every facility for School games, and there is a well stocked boat-house in Berry's Bay.

The Council have recently purchased an area of about 20 acres for Playing Fields at Northbridge.

In addition to the Head Master, there are five masters in residence at the School House, and Mrs. Purves, assisted by a matron, attends to the comfort of boarders.

The Rev. D. Davies, Major J. Lee Pulling, Captain J. O. Harris, and Mr. L. A. Baker take a limited number of boarders at "Cartref," Bay Road, "Bishopsgate," Union Street, and "The Observatory," William Street. All houses are within a few minutes' walk of the School.

Sons of Clergy are received as day boys at reduced fees.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND EXHIBITIONS.

There are at present available :—

- (1) One Annual Church Primary Schools' Scholarship of £29 8s., awarded *after examination* and upon the Head Master's report of the boy's fitness to enter the School. Candidates must be Church Primary School Boys of at least two years' standing
- (2) Two Annual Council's Junior Scholarships of £29 8s. awarded *after examination*. Candidates must be members of the Church of England and not more than 14 years of age. One of these Scholarships is open to boys who have been not less than a year in the School. Candidates for the other must not have entered the School at the time of the examination.
- (3) Two Annual Council's Senior Scholarships of £29 8s., awarded *after examination* and upon consideration of the boy's record in Form-work and the University Public Examinations. Candidates must have been at least two years in attendance at the School and must need assistance to complete their School course.
- (4) One Annual Exhibition for the Sons of Clergy in the Province of New South Wales. The value is £29 8s, and nomination rests with the Archbishop.
- (5) The Old Boys' Union Exhibition of £20 per annum for boys in the Upper School, given upon the nomination of the Head Master.

- (6) The Hodges Exhibition of £10 per annum, awarded at the discretion of the Head Master to deserving pupils. This Exhibition was founded by a friend of the School who desires to remain anonymous, and is intended to commemorate the ten years' services of Mr. C. H. Hodges as Head Master.
- (7) Certain Headmaster's Exhibitions are also provided at his discretion by the Head Master.
- (8) An open Council's Junior Entrance Scholarship of £29 8s. per annum.
- (9) Certain "Walter and Eliza Hall" exhibitions intended for the sons of Country Clergy. These exhibitions are of the value of £75 per annum. Full information may be obtained from the Head Master.

The Examination for Entrance Scholarships will be held at the School, commencing on Thursday and Friday nearest to December 1st.

Barker College, Hornsby.

Barker College, named after the late Bishop Barker, second Bishop of Sydney and Metropolitan of New South Wales, was founded some 25 years ago by the Rev. Henry Plume, M.A., of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. The School was situated on the Kurrajong Heights, but was brought to Hornsby some five years later. Under Mr. Plume's regime the School was severely limited in number, never more than 40 Boarders being in residence. In 1905 the Rev. H. Plume sold the School to Mr. W. C. Carter, of Trinity College, Cambridge, who maintained the policy of limiting the School to Boarders, but allowed an increase of number up to 125. The standing reputation of the School is such that there are pupils in residence from all parts of New South Wales, Queensland, Fiji and New Guinea, and over 200 Old Boys volunteered for active service in the Great War. This, together with the fact that the Old Boys' Union numbers over 300 members, made it desirable, if not imperative, to give permanence to the School by changing its character of merely a proprietary School to that of a Great Public School, governed by a Church Council. It was altogether in line with the traditions of the School that the Church of England should be given the opportunity of taking it over, and on January 1st, 1919, a body of Churchmen acquired the School by purchase and formed a Provisional Council, and in September, 1919, the Synod of the Diocese confirmed the action by passing the "Barker College Ordinance, 1919," by which the School was granted a Constitution under a Council elected largely by the Synod under the Ordinance. The Council consists of the Archbishop of Sydney as President *ex officio*. and seven Clergymen and seven Laymen elected by Synod, and two additional members elected by the Barker College

ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL, for the Daughters of the Clergy, was founded by the late Mrs. Barker in the year 1856. The idea of founding such a school was suggested by observing, in the course of a lengthened tour through the Diocese, which at that time included the greater part of the Colony, the extreme difficulty felt by many of the Clergy of providing suitable education for their daughters.

In the year 1859, the school was removed to the new building, St. Catherine's, Waverley. It stands upon three and a-half acres of land, granted by the Government. The situation is healthy, and the house, which is very convenient and close to the tramline, accommodated sixteen pupils.

In the year 1884, under the authority of Bishop Barry an Advisory Council was formed.

The Council being anxious to extend more widely the advantages of the school as a place of thorough education upon a sound religious basis, and finding that the foundation, even with the aid of the subscriptions at present received, was insufficient to enable them to do this, resolved to admit a number of non-foundations, or daughters of the laity, not exceeding twenty, to be nominated by members of the Council at the usual terms of a first-class school. In order to carry out this resolution, they commenced a considerable extension of the building, which was completed in February, 1886. The extension was carried out at a cost of about £2,500. The additional accommodation provides large dining-hall, two class-rooms-four dormitories, three bath rooms, kitchen, pantries, store-room, laundry, &c. A tennis court has also been provided on the school grounds, as well as a detached hospital and a gymnasium. Since the above additions were carried out four class-rooms were built in 1912, and other improvements added for the pupils' welfare.

The Principal is assisted by a competent staff of resident and visiting teachers.

THE AIM OF THE SCHOOL

is to provide a thorough education, on a sound religious basis, according to the principles of the Church of England.

It is the oldest established school for girls in the State. Originally founded for educating the daughters of the Clergy, those of the laity are now received at moderate terms.

THE PUPILS CONSIST OF

1. *Foundationers*, who must be daughters of duly licensed Clergymen, officiating or having officiated in the Diocese of Sydney, as it existed in the year 1856.

2. *Non-Foundationers*, *i.e.*, daughters of the laity, who are also admitted, and who must be nominated by a member of the Council.

3. *Day Scholars*, who also require the nomination of a member of the Council.

THE SCHOOL COURSE.

I. In the higher forms, English (Language and Literature), History, Geography, Botany, Physiology, French (including Conversational French), Latin, Mathematics (Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry), Theory of Music, Class Singing, Needlework are included in the ordinary work.

II. In the lower form, which is intended for children under 12 years of age, the course of instruction embraces English (Reading, Spelling, Elementary Grammar and Composition), Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Lessons on Natural Objects, Needlework, Freehand Drawing, French, Latin.

Religious instruction is given daily.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

is divided into four terms. One term's notice is required previous to the removal of a pupil, or half a term's fees.

VACATIONS.

Six weeks at Christmas, ten days at Easter, four weeks at Midwinter, and one week at Michaelmas.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The following Scholarships and Exhibitions are open to the Daughters of Clergymen :—

1. "The Sydney Scholarship," open to both pupils and intending pupils, under the age of 15 years, is equal to full fees for one year, and may be held for a second year upon the recommendation of the Principal.

2. "The Ridsdale Exhibition," founded in 1887 with the object of helping to defray the travelling expenses of Daughters of Clergymen from any Diocese, is always given to the pupils who have long distances to travel.

3. "Walter and Eliza Hall" Exhibitions.—Four Exhibitions are given to boarder pupils. Two for pupils already in the school, and two for girls to become pupils. These Exhibitions are to be called the "Walter and Eliza Hall" Exhibitions, and to consist of board and the School Course of tuition.

Parents can provide bed and table linen, towels, spoons and forks ; or they may pay a fee of £3 3s. for each pupil upon entering the school.

A Medical Fee of Two Shillings per term is charged in lieu of fees for attendance.

THE School was founded, at the instance of the Diocesan Synod, in the year 1895, with the object of providing a school where girls might obtain a thorough education, based upon religious instruction in accordance with the teaching of the Church of England.

The School stands in its own grounds in an excellent position in Forbes-street, on the heights of Darlington, and has two tennis courts, a basket ball court and large grounds attached. The school buildings have been carefully designed for the comfort and convenience of the boarders and pupils, and special attention has been paid to the domestic arrangements, which are in the hands of the Matron and Sub-Matron. Boating, Swimming and Tennis Clubs.

A detached cottage for use as a hospital stands in a corner of the school grounds.

The general course of instruction includes English Language and Literature, Geography (Physical and Political), History (Ancient and Modern), the Classics (Latin throughout the School, Greek when desired), Mathematics, French Language and Literature (special attention paid to French conversation), Italian, Needlework (in the Lower School), Drilling.

Classes in Cookery, Dressmaking, &c., are formed as may be desired.

In addition to the Principal, there are seven Teachers in residence at the School, a Matron, and an Assistant Matron ; and, also, three visiting daily teachers.

There is in the school accommodation for about 120 day pupils and 46 boarders.

The school year consists of four quarters of about ten weeks each.

All School Fees to be paid in advance.

Entry Forms must be filled in when application is made or admission.

For further information respecting the School, particulars as to fees, &c., application should be made to the Principal at the School.

There is a scholarship (£25) given by Wilfrid Docker, Esq., and known as the Wilfrid Docker Scholarship, open to boarders entering the School, tenable for one year or more.

There are also, for Daughters of Clergy in New South Wales, three "Walter and Eliza Hall" Exhibitions for Boarders, and five for Day Pupils. Particulars concerning the same can be obtained from the Principal.

There is a Church Primary Schools' Bursary open to annual competition in December.

BRANCH SCHOOL: "YERENBAH," BOWRAL.

The School buildings stand in rather more than two acres of ground, in a central position, not far from the railway station. There are large class rooms, large, airy bedrooms capable of accommodating 26 girls, bathrooms, a good Tennis Court, a large paddock for recreation, stabling for horses for the convenience of those who wish to take riding lessons, vegetable and fruit gardens. The School has its own cow, and plenty of poultry.

Bowral is situated 2,200 feet above sea level, and the climate is most healthy and invigorating; and "Yerenbah" is furnished with every comfort and convenience.

This was opened by the Council in 1911, and now has an enrolment of 113 girls. The property has been recently bought by the Council, and stands in a good position in North Sydney. New modern class rooms have been built, which, with existing rooms, will accommodate 150 girls. There is a Tennis Court on the ground.

OBJECTS.—The moral and religious training of boys who take part in the Daily Service of the Cathedral ; the study of music ; and the imparting of the rudiments of a sound education.

The Choir School consists of (a) Probationers, (b) Choristers of St. Andrew's Cathedral, (c) and more advanced Pupils preparing for Bursary and Special Examinations.

(a) Boys of not less than seven years of age may be admitted to the School for three months. If passed by the Precentor and Organist, such boys will then be enrolled as Choristers.

(b) Choristers of St. Andrew's Cathedral have their education free, provided that their parents or guardians undertake that the boys shall remain at the Choir Schools and that their services shall be at the disposal of the Chapter, until their voices shall so change as to be no longer

serviceable for the Choir, or until the Chapter shall, for any cause, determine to dispense with their services.

Each year two Choristers, of not more than 15 years-winning Bursaries by Examination, may proceed to the Sydney Church of England Grammar School at largely reduced fees—in exceptional cases, altogether free of charge. This has been arranged between the Council of the Grammar School and the Cathedral Authorities, and came into operation for the first time at the close of 1915.

The Organist is responsible for the Musical education of all the boys. Musical Instruction and Voice Production are characteristic features of the School.

Prizes are given annually. The "Maria Logan" Exhibition for proficiency in Music is awarded each year. In December, 1916, it was awarded to Thomas Anderson, in December, 1917, to Alfred Taubman, and in December, 1918, to Austin Cameron. The interest on the "Gertrude Robson" Bequest is devoted to the Choir Prize Fund. A Grant from the "Choir School Bursary Fund," founded Christmas, 1910, and intended to assist deserving lads about to leave for the more exacting duties of life, is made from time to time.

Applications for admission and other matters affecting the Choir and School should be addressed to the Rev. the Precentor, St. Andrew's Cathedral.

We appeal to generous-hearted Churchmen to assist the Choir and the School. They may do so most effectively either by (a) Bequests to the Choir Fund, by (b) Founding Scholarships, by (c) Monetary Donations to the Bursary and Prize Funds, by (d) Gifts of Music (Anthems, Settings of the Canticles, etc.)

Board of Education.

At the Session of the Synod held in 1919 an Ordinance was passed "To establish a Board of Education." The functions of the Board are :—

The promotion of Educational work in accordance with the purposes of the Church of England within the Diocese of Sydney by such means as the Board shall think expedient, including—

- (a) Assisting the acquisition establishment and maintenance of Schools.
- (b) Providing for the official recognition of Schools as Church of England Schools.
- (c) Encouraging Conferences with and amongst the governing bodies of existing Schools.
- (d) Religious Instruction in State Schools.
- (e) Sunday Schools.
- (f) Co-ordination.
- (g) Training of teachers.
- (h) All things incidental to the matters aforesaid.

The Ordinance provides that the Committee for Special Religious Instruction in Public Schools elected by Synod and the Committee of the Sunday School Institute shall, in each case, in the name and within the jurisdiction of the Board, continue their work under their existing constitutions *mutatis mutandis* until other provisions, if any, for the work is made by the Board, after conference with the said committee.

Special Religious Instruction in Public Schools.

The First Synod Committee was appointed in 1879, and its work has been continued by successive committees for 40 years. The present Committee has now come under the direction of the recently created Board of Education, so that its Constitution will be rearranged in the near future. In 1919, due to the enterprise and enthusiasm of the Right Rev. Bishop Pain, D.D., a sufficient sum of money was raised to enable the Committee to appoint a Director for a period of three years. This forward move should lead to a considerable extension of the Committee's work. At present the Committee has in its employment the following seven stipendiary teachers :—

This small band of teachers carries on week by week a most important if unassuming work in the Diocese. Funds are urgently required to increase the present in-

adequate salaries of the teaching staff, to increase the membership of the staff, and to provide for the superannuation of teachers who have served the Committee for a long period of years. The Committee's income for the year 1918-19 was £681 15s 5d. It is now faced with an overdraft. The Committee does not receive the financial support from the parishes of the Diocese which its very important work merits, consequently the extension of the work cannot be undertaken. Donations and subscriptions may be sent to the Director or the Honorary Treasurer. The Committee is responsible for the whole of the Religious Instruction given in various Public Schools. Several parishes, each containing two or more very large schools, are in urgent need of help from the Committee. During the past twelve months more than 80,000 children were taught by the Committee's small staff of teachers, in addition to the numerous classes taught by the parochial clergy and their few voluntary helpers. These numbers are much lower than those of previous years, owing to the effect of the influenza epidemic on school attendances.

OBJECTS :

The extension and improvement of Church of England Sunday Schools.

MEANS :

1. By establishing a centre of communication, through which information as to the best methods of organising and conducting Church of England Sunday Schools may be given and received; and by affiliating the same to the Church of England Sunday School Institute in England.

2. By initiating the formation in each Rural Deanery of Associations of Sunday Schools, to promote the holding, at convenient centres, of Special Services for Teachers, for Scholars, and of Meetings for Conference, and for the delivery of addresses on Sunday School work, and for the giving of training lessons and model lessons.

3. By facilitating the dissemination throughout the Diocese of the publications of the parent Institute, and of such other publications as may be considered useful in Sunday School work.

4. By securing the services of experienced visitors to attend meetings of Sunday School Teachers for the purpose of giving addresses, training lessons and model lessons, and otherwise helping Sunday Schools.

5. By furthering the work of Sunday Schools in such other ways as may be practicable.

An Annual Scholars' Examination is held immediately before Advent.

Full particulars of subjects can be obtained from the Hon. Secretary.

Public Meetings for Teachers and others interested in Sunday School work are arranged as frequently as possible by the Committee.

The Hon. Secretary will be glad to hear at any time from Clergy desirous of receiving a deputation, and to make arrangements for sending the same.

The affiliation fee for Schools in Sydney and the suburbs is 5s., and for country schools 2s. 6d. per annum. Every affiliated School may send a Delegate to the Committee meetings.

THE origin of the Australian Board of Missions dates from a meeting of six Bishops which took place in Sydney in the year 1850—chiefly, it is believed, owing to the efforts of the first Bishop of New Zealand, George Augustus Selwyn. The other Bishops who attended this historic gathering were Bishop Broughton (Sydney), who presided, Bishop Perry (Melbourne), Bishop Tyrrell (Newcastle), Bishop Short (Adelaide), and Bishop Nixon

(Tasmania). The ideal which these Bishops endeavoured to reach—that the Church itself should be a Missionary Society—was a noble one, but one which could not be actualised immediately. It was not until 1872 that any definite action was taken. In that year the General Synod of the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania was constituted, and it was decided, among other matters, that the Synod should have power to make Determinations for “the promoting of Home and Foreign Missions in the Church.” It was held that so important a work should not be left to the zeal of individuals, but that, in her corporate capacity, the Church should, as far as practicable, direct and sanction, and whenever possible, undertake it through formally appointed authorities. A Determination was passed by which “The Bishops forming the House of Bishops in the General Synod” were constituted “The Board of Missions of the Church in the Dioceses in Australia and Tasmania,” and the work of the Board of Missions formed in 1850 was transferred to the new Board. An Executive Council was elected by the General Synod, and each Diocese was invited to form a “Diocesan Corresponding Committee under the presidency of its Bishop.

From time to time experience has shown the desirability of amending, in some respects, the Determination under which the Board was constituted, and at the Session of the General Synod held in 1896, it was determined that the functions of the Board should be “to promote, through its Executive Council, the mission work of the Church among the Aborigines in Australia, New Guinea, and in Islands adjacent, and also among the various immigrant heathen races; to assist in carrying out the Missions established by the Church of England through her Missionary Societies; to co-operate in supporting the Melanesian Mission, and other Missions to the heathen; to seek out, train, and support Missionaries to labour in such Missions as the Board may direct, or may originate; and generally to further unity of effort in the Missions of the Church. Provided that the Board shall not interfere with existing Missionary Institutions, except so far as they may place themselves under its direction.”

The Executive Council was enlarged to consist of the Primate, five other Bishops elected by the Board, the Honorary Secretaries and Honorary Treasurers of Diocesan Corresponding Committees, and six clergymen and six laymen elected by the General Synod at its ordinary Session.

At the General Synod of 1905, an amending Determination was agreed to (No. IX.).

In 1909 the work and policy of the Board as an executive and administrative body were remodelled, with the aim of (1) restoring the Board to its proper function as the Missionary organisation of the Australian Church; (2) effecting a federation of the Missionary organisations belonging to the New Guinea and Melanesian Missions, and bringing both into line with the administrative machinery of the Executive Council. The hope was also expressed that the way would become clear for a closer co-operation with the Church Missionary Association in the future.

At the General Synod of 1916, amended Rules for the constitution of a Board of Missions were agreed to, by which the Board became an elective and executive body to carry on the Missionary work of the Church.

This new Determination came into force on October 25th, 1917, when the first meeting was held in the Cowper Room, Diocesan Church House, Sydney. The members of the new Board are given in page 470 of this Directory.

The New Guinea Mission.

THE Mission to Papua was established as the outcome of a resolution of General Synod 1886, and is therefore a child of the Australian Church. On this ground, and to bring home the responsibility of its maintenance to Australian Church people, the S.P.G. has always refused to make any grant from its funds to the Mission, which it regards as the special Missionary obligation and unique glory of the Australian Church.

Mission work was commenced on August 10th, 1891, in Bartle Bay, on the N.E. coast, and was consecrated by the death of Rev. Albert Maclaren, its founder, on December 27th, from fever. Rev. Copland King, who accompanied the founder, died on 6th October, 1918, after 27 years of faithful service.

A resolution of General Synod 1896 led to the formation of the Diocese of New Guinea by the consecration of the first Bishop, The Right Rev. Montagu J. Stone-Wigg, in Sydney on January 25th, 1898. Bishop Stone-Wigg resigned through ill-health in 1908, and died in Sydney in 1918. The second and present Bishop, Right Rev. Gerald Sharp, was consecrated in Brisbane on April 25th, 1910.

The Missionary Diocese has for its object the conversion to the faith of Christ of the natives living on the north-east coast of Papua, between Cape Ducie to the south and the British boundary to the north, and their advancement in civilisation by means of education, and by instructing them in work suited to the climate and country. Ministrations are also provided as far as possible for the white settlers.

The staff consists of the Bishop, 11 priests (1 native), 5 native deacons, 5 laymen, 10 ladies, 24 South Sea Islanders' and 16 Papuan helpers. Nineteen of the Mission staff have laid down their lives in its service. Twenty-six Mission stations have been established, dealing with over 13,000 Papuans. The day schools are attended by 1,616 children; 386 adults have been baptised, and there are 1847 communicants. The Mission owns 260 head of cattle, and has planted 4,400 coco palm trees. Two nurses offered

their services to the Government of Papua, and were accepted for hospital work amongst the white miners and native labourers on a new alluvial gold field, which was discovered in 1910, and were largely instrumental in staying a terrible mortality arising from malaria, dysentery, beri-beri, and scurvy, and in minimising the sufferings of 300 native victims to these epidemics. The Mission has consistently shown itself ready to meet all the claims, both physical and spiritual, which the pioneers of a new country and their native helpers make upon it, and God has greatly blessed the self-sacrificing labours of the Mission staff. The ordinary revenue of the Mission for the last year under record was about £6,000. In view of the staff to be maintained, the Mission vessels to be kept running, and the needs to be met, this is a wholly inadequate sum. It should be, and could be, doubled, if the Church in Australia realised her obligation to the territory of Papua, and was fully seized with the privilege of mothering the daughter Church, which she has called into being.

In 1911 the Mission launch, "Abiel Abbott Lowe," was totally wrecked, and a year later a new launch built in Sydney, and named the "Whitkirk," was sent up to meet the needs of the Mission. The up-keep of this boat means an additional expenditure of at least £500 per annum.

Yarrabah Aboriginal Mission.

THIS Mission was opened by the late Rev. J. B. Gribble, the "blackfellows' friend," on June 17th, 1892, and after his decease (June 3rd, 1893) was carried on by his eldest son, the Rev. Ernest Gribble, for 17 years, until his resignation of the Superintendentship in June, 1910. The present Superintendent is Mr. S. Lyon, F.R.G.S.

The Mission Reserve consists of about 80 square miles (51,000 acres) of country, near Cairns, in N. Queensland. Its secluded position, cut off from Cairns by ranges of steep hills, and accessible only by water, makes it well suited in that respect for a Missionary Reserve. It is also admirably adapted for the cultivation of many tropical and semi-tropical products. The neighbouring sea affords a great opening for turtle and other kinds of fishing. With the outlay of a little capital, the Mission community, consisting of about 350 souls, could be largely supported by the products of the soil and of the sea.

MANAGEMENT.

Under an arrangement with the A.B.M. the Mission is managed by a committee which meets monthly in Brisbane. The Mission receives a grant of £1,900 per annum from the A.B.M.; to supply these contributions are urgently needed. The Queensland Government assists with a subsidy.

Trubanaman (Mitchell River).

THIS Mission was established in 1905. The prospects are most encouraging, but greater sympathy and larger support are earnestly desired.

The Reserve as now constituted comprises between 500 and 600 square miles of country, and is of a triangular shape, bounded on the north and north-east by the northern branch and main course of the Mitchell River, and on the west by the sea. It includes two large islands forming the delta between the mouths. On the south and east it is bounded by two large cattle runs. It has the great advantage of being on the road to nowhere, and it is therefore easy to keep away undesirable visitors.

The country is well suited for its purpose as an industrial Mission. It is estimated that there are fully 1,000 natives living on the Reserve. The Mission is in touch with about 300 of them. Cattle thrive there admirably. The Reserve could carry many thousands of cattle.

MANAGEMENT.

Under an arrangement with the A.B.M. the Bishop of Carpentaria receives a grant of £1,200 per annum, in addition to the Government grant of £350, and makes himself responsible for the general management of the Mission.

NEEDS.

1. For the purchase of cattle, at least £1 000. The Reserve could carry many thousand head; at present its herd only numbers about 700.
2. For agricultural developments in the immediate future—implements, clearing, fencing, etc., £250.

Forrest River Mission.

Thirty miles inland from the township of Wyndham, in the far North West of Western Australia, the pioneer work of the latest venture of the Church in Aboriginal Missions is being undertaken. The Rev. E. R. B. Gribble is superintendent, and among his helpers are James Noble and his wife, natives of Yarrabah. The first two white women workers arrived in November, 1917. This work is entirely dependent on the offerings of the Church, and the A.B.M. has guaranteed £1,500 per annum.

Torres Straits Mission.

In September, 1914, the Bishop of Carpentaria was invited by the London Missionary Society to take over the Missionary work which had been carried on for more than forty years by that body amongst the natives of Torres Straits. The Bishop laid the matter before the Executive Council of the A.B.M., and emphasized the importance of the work. The offer of the L.M.S. was accepted, and the work of the Mission has been formally taken over by the A.B.M. There are eleven church buildings, mostly of concrete. The latest report shows that there are between five and six hundred communicants.

The natives will supply from their own slender resources, all expenses connected with native helpers and Church buildings. We have no hesitation in stating that this is one of the greatest opportunities ever presented to the Church in Australia. We are glad to report that a good

start has been made, and three Clergy are at work. The annual cost to the Church for this work will be about £1,300, and every Diocese is asked to help, so as to meet the expenses of sending, equipping and supporting the necessary workers for this new responsibility of the Board of Missions.

ST. PAUL'S MISSION, MOA ISLAND.

Situated in the midst of the Torres Straits Islands, and now included in that work is the St. Paul's Mission, which commenced work in 1908. The Anglican Church was encouraged by the Queensland Government to extend its work among South Sea Islanders, carried on for many years at Thursday Island, to the settlement of South Sea Islanders at Moa. The late Deaconess Buchanan, with wonderful devotion, self-sacrifice and ability, laboured here single-handed. The people of Moa have built their own Church.

A training school for native teachers has been established for Torres Straits at St. Paul's, Moa. We appeal most earnestly for support for an enterprise fraught with such rich possibilities for the Kingdom of God.

The Melanesian Mission.

MISSION work in the Islands of the Western Pacific was begun by the Bishop of New Zealand in 1848. In 1861 the Rev. J. C. Patteson was consecrated as first Bishop, and the head-quarters of the Mission were removed from Auckland to Norfolk Island in 1867. After the death of Bishop Patteson, at Nukapu, in 1871, the See remained vacant until 1877, when the Right Rev. J. R. Selwyn—a son of the Bishop of New Zealand—was appointed to the post. Bishop Selwyn resigned in 1891, on account of ill-health. The Right Rev. Cecil Wilson, who was consecrated in 1894, resigned the Diocese in July, 1911, in order to facilitate the carrying out of the new policy of the Mission, under which the Bishop will be mainly resident in the Islands. The Rev. Cecil John Wood, senior-assistant priest of St. Mary's, Wimbledon, was elected to succeed Bishop Wilson, and was consecrated at St. Paul's, Dunedin, on July 14, 1912.

Bishop Wood resigned on December 31, 1918. Rev. J. M. Steward, M A., of Guadalcanar (Solomon Islands), was consecrated Bishop of Melane-ia on September 21st, 1919, at St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral, Wellington, N Z.

The work of the Mission is carried on by a staff of 15 English and 16 native Clergy, assisted by 7 laymen, 16 ladies, and 686 native teachers. The School at Norfolk Island averages 150 boys. There are over 350 Schools and Stations in the Islands, upwards of 14,125 baptised Christians, of whom about 3,000 are Communicants.

The total annual expenditure (stipends of Bishop and Clergy, maintenance of Schools, working expenses of the "Southern Cross," etc.) was last year £22,735 0s. 7d. About £1,200 of the income to meet this amount comes from an endowment fund—a large portion of which was bequeathed by Bishop Patteson—the balance has to be raised by subscriptions, collections, and donations from England, Australia, and New Zealand.

The A.B.M. has allowed £4,000 in its Budget for 1920 towards this Mission.

THE Mission initiated in 1872 by the late Mr. John S. Shearston, when the late Ven. Archdeacon King acted as Hon. Secretary, and the late Sir Edward Knox as Hon. Treasurer was re-organised under the London "Missions to Seamen," in 1895.

The work of the Mission is carried on not only on board ship and by means of a motor launch, but also at the Hospitals and the Gaols, and especially at the Seamen's Institute, George-street North, where socials and concerts are held every night of the week, and a reading-room for sailors is provided, and where every effort is made to provide counter attractions to the evils of a great commercial city. Opportunities are thus afforded for advice, instruction and prayer.

In March, 1899, the Chaplain began to hold Services on Sundays at the Naval Depot at Garden Island, and since March, 1907, visits were made daily to the hospital and gaol there. In November, 1908, this work was taken over by a Naval Chaplain, and the appointment of the Chaplain to R. A. N. R. Forces gazetted. Since the Australian Naval regime, 1914, the Chaplain R.A.N.R. has done duty at all Naval Depots.

Services are held every Sunday at the Institute at 11 a.m., at 11.45 a.m. (Holy Communion), 7 p.m., 8 p.m. (Song Service). Midweek at 7.30. p.m.

The alterations in 1910, to the building now known as the "Rawson Institute for Seamen," at a cost of £6,000, and the addition of a Chaplaincy in 1913, have greatly extended the usefulness of the work among seamen of the Port.

The Mission is entirely supported by voluntary contributions mostly obtained from shipping and commercial firms. The Church of the Diocese gives a small sum. If it were not for our merchants and for the sympathy of captains visiting the port, the work could not be continued. The London Committee pay the salary of the Chaplain Superintendent.

*Average attendances, 50,000 for the year, while 30,000 letters were received or written by seamen.

At the Meeting of Synod held in September, 1919, the following resolution was passed :—“ That this Synod places on record its deep appreciation of the work of seamen of all ranks, especially during the past five years ; its admiration for their heroism, its gratitude for their loyalty to duty, in spite of hardships unknown to men on shore, and its thankfulness for the important services they have rendered in the attainment of the world peace, and commends to the sympathetic support of the Church people, the Church’s agency among sailors—the ‘ Mission to Seamen ’—and calls upon each Parish or District under its jurisdiction to set apart one Sunday in each year when reference may be made and at least part of the offertory devoted to the work in this great port.”

The New South Wales Auxiliary of the Church Missionary Society had already existed for more than eighty years, when in 1892 a Constitution was framed,

with the approval of the Parent Society, under which the Auxiliary was merged into the "New South Wales Church Missionary Association," with greatly enlarged powers of action. The Branch was authorised to select, train and send forth men and women as Missionaries direct from Australia to C.M.S. fields. The maintenance of such Missionaries was provided by the Branch, but their location and oversight in the Mission field was undertaken by the Church Missionary Society. The Branch was also empowered to engage in Missionary work in fields other than those occupied by the C.M.S., as has been done in Australia with the Aborigines and Chinese.

In 1916 the Church Missionary Society of Australia and Tasmania was established, and the Association, by approval of its Constitution, was duly incorporated into the Society, to be known thereafter as a Branch of the Society.

In 1915 the oil launch “Austral” was purchased as a preliminary step to the development of the work to Groote Eylandt, where are many untouched Aborigines.

In 1898 the Australian Board of Missions entrusted to the care of the Branch the Missionary work of the Board amongst the Chinese of the Province. Schools for Chinese are conducted at Waterloo, St. Barnabas, George Street West, Glen Innes and Tamworth. A returned Missionary, the Rev. W. Hipwell, and a Chinese Catechist are employed in the work.

The income of the Branch for the year 1917-1918 was £12,300, which is greatly in increase of the preceding year. The needs of the Branch are increasing, as it is an objective to double the number of Missionaries within the next few years.

Meetings for Prayer are held in the Board Room, 51 Elizabeth-st., one for ladies on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at 2.30 p.m., and another on 3rd Monday at 7.30 p.m.

Persons desirous of equipping themselves for service at home or abroad are invited to join a Preparation Union, which is conducted by the General Secretary, to whom application for membership should be made.

The General Committee meets in the Board Room on the first Monday night of each month, at 6.30 p.m.

Missionary Literature.—An exceedingly heavy stock of the latest Missionary Literature and books suitable for Sunday School Prizes, is now displayed for sale in the Book Department, adjoining the Secretary's office. Here also is the Marten's Memorial Library, with its large collection of valuable books. The Library is open to all who wish to subscribe, the fee being 2s. 6d. per annum.

Missionary Publications.—The "*Gleaner*" is the chief publication of C.M.S.; with the English portion is bound a local addition, giving news of our Australian activities. The C.M.S. "*Review*" and "*Gazette*," and "*Mercy*" and "*Truth*" are also helpful and inspiring. For children, the "*Round World*" and "*Awake*" prove interesting and instructive. The "*Recruit*" is a paper for Australian Boys.

The Ladies' Committee of the Branch manage the Depot on the 4th Floor, Walkon Buildings, which is open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive. Oriental Embroideries, Carved Articles, Silver Ornaments, Drawn Thread Work, imported chiefly from the industrial missions conducted in India, Ceylon

and China, are set forth for the inspection and purchase of the visitors. Hot luncheon and afternoon tea is also obtainable from 12 noon to 4.45 p.m.

OBJECT.—Members of the Lay Readers' Association, acting under the authority of the Archbishop, voluntarily give their services for the purpose of maintaining the ministrations of the Church in suburban and country districts where the Clergymen are unable to cope with the work without such assistance.

MEMBERSHIP.—Candidates for the office of Diocesan Lay Reader must be Communicants of the Church of England, and are required to give, for the purpose of reference, the names of at least one Clergyman (licensed in the Diocese) and two laymen, being communicants, and resident in the Diocese.

After satisfying the Chaplain as to his ability to read the Services of the Church efficiently he shall receive authority from the Archbishop to conduct Services for a period of twelve months, during which time opportunity will be afforded for the increase of efficiency by a system of quarterly examinations in Holy Scripture, Prayer Book Teaching, and Church History, for which it is desired Readers should present themselves.

At the end of twelve months he shall present himself for further examination, and on the recommendation of the Chaplain his name shall be submitted to the Archbishop for Diocesan Reader's License.

Where Clergymen require the assistance of Diocesan Readers the Parish must affiliate with the Association by payment of the subscription—Five shillings per annum, in advance—and the Clergy are held responsible for the payment of the Reader's travelling expenses and accommodation.

Parishes receiving regular help are required to contribute 20/-, 15/-, 10/-, and 5/- per annum (payable before the end of each half year) for assistance rendered on four, three, two, and one Sunday per month respectively.

All Applications for Assistance must be made to the Hon. Secretary, not to individual Readers, and should be sent in as early as possible to avoid disappointment. In the event of casual help, the application must be accompanied by subscription.

The Chaplain or Hon. Secretary will be pleased to hear from Communicant Members of the Church who desire to become Lay Readers, and full details will be sent on application.

In connection with the Deaconess House, there are 45 Associates, with Mrs. Wright as President. These ladies render incalculable help to the head House and its two branch Houses—the Home of Peace and the Children's Home. The Children's Home is at Lisgar, Harrison-street, Marrickville, and has an average of 45 children—boys and girls—ages varying from 2 to 18 for girls, 2 to 9 for boys.

Current expenses, which amount to nearly £5,800, have to be met by the laundry work of the women, the lace-making and chair-caning and sewing by the girls and children. and the contributions of Church people.

- (b) To establish and carry on Homes for Orphans, neglected, necessitous or friendless children.
- (c) To solicit, collect and provide money for the above purposes and for grants or subsidies to other Committees of Church of England Homes, Hostels or Parochial Schools within New South Wales, subject to the approval of the Bishops of the respective Dioceses.

During the first financial year £2,500 was allotted to the Committee of the Church of England Homes at Glebe Point, with which "Arden" was purchased. A Home for boys has been established there, thus carrying out Object "A."

The purchase of a fine house and 16 acres of land occupying an unrivalled position near Normanhurst, and admirably suited for a Home, is the first step towards the achievement of Object "B." The new Home will be occupied about March, and accommodation for about 30 children will be provided.

To carry Object "C" into effect the following grants have been made to other Committees and Dioceses to assist in the provision of Homes and Hostels for Church of England children attending State or Church Schools :— Grafton, £250 ; Dubbo, £250 ; Newcastle, £500.

The Committee depends on the goodwill of Members of the Church of England to provide funds for carrying out the important work of establishing more Homes and Hostels, which are invariably filled very shortly after being opened, thus proving the urgent necessity for these establishments.

It is a religious Society, and its Associates must be members of the Church of England, no such restriction being made with regard to the members. Its object is to inculcate purity, thrift, and respect to parents and employers, amongst all young women and girls with whom it comes in contact, and it pledges itself to receive commended members from England and elsewhere, and to commend its own members in like manner wherever the Society exists. The members of the G.F.S. in England and other places now exceed half a million.

At present there are branches of the Society in all the Dioceses in New South Wales.

The Lodge is for the use of the Members of the Society throughout the Commonwealth of Australia, and those commended to Sydney from England and elsewhere receive a kindly welcome to it. Non-members known to be respectable, or who are well recommended, are also admitted. The Lodge is self-supporting, with the exception of the rent, which is partly provided by Annual Subscriptions. A new Hostel is to be built early in 1920 on a fine site near the University. It is intended to be self supporting, but contributions towards building fund are urgently needed.


