The Anzac Services on Sunday, 22nd April, were well attended. We were fortunate in having Rev. J. R. Le Huray, Rector of St. James', Croydon, as our special preacher, at the 11 o'clock service. NEWS OF THE RECTOR

Dear Friends at All Saints',

On March 17 I left Lambeth to go to Springfield (Diocese of Chelmsford) to assist the Vicar of Holy Trinity—the Rev. A. L. Whitehorn—during the Holy Week and Easter. The Vicar is known to many people in Sydney, being a former tutor and Vice-Principal of Moore College, during which time he was in charge of St. Alban's, Darlington. Springfield is really a suburb of Chelmsford (the county town of Essex), and is within easy walking distance of the Cathedral. I had a happy time at Holy Trinity with the Vicar and his people, sharing in the Holy Week Services, assisting at the Celebrations, and preaching in the morning on Palm Sunday, and in the evening on Easter Day. You will be surprised to know we had a snow storm on Easter Eve! Easter Day, however, dawned fine and bright; you were much in my thoughts at this time. Although Easter was so early, the parish church was beautifully decorated for the festival, daffodils and narcissi predominating among the spring flowers.

Through the courtesy of the Vicar and his senior lay-reader, Mr. A. F. Lowen, we were able to see a good deal of Essex on Easter Monday, particularly its many beautiful parish churches. Included in this very pleasant day's outing was a visit to Beeleigh Abbey, the residence of Mr. W. A. Foyle, who has the largest book-shop in London, indeed, some claim it is the biggest in the world. The Abbey is of great antiquity, and although

it has been made comfortable according to modern standards, it still retains the best features of antiquity—the old refectory is now the dining room, the monks' dormitory is the library, and there is a small chapel (where our church services are still held) containing the organ upon which Handel composed his well-known "Largo." One day I hope to tell you something of the library at Beeleigh—never have I seen anything to equal the treasures of these rare and beautifully bound books, indicative of the enthusiasm of a bibliophile, who is also a very charming and gracious gentleman, and who personally conducted us over his lovely home.

You will be interested to know that Miss Dorothy Wheatley and I were happily married at The King's Chapel of the Savoy, in London, by Prebendary W. L. Cottrell, on Monday afternoon, April 2nd. Although our wedding was a quiet one, we did have the Chapel Organist (or "Master of the Music," as he is called) presiding at the organ. Both bride and bridegroom were unattended, the bride being given away by her old friend, Colonel A. S. Herbert, who, though Australian-born, has lived for many years in England. After the ceremony, we and our friends were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. L. Page, at their home at Ealing. I am glad to relate, in passing, there were no speeches!

The next day we commenced a tour of Devon and Cornwall, making Torquay our headquarters in the former, and Penzance in the latter county. We now know what people mean when they speak of "glorious Devon"! The unspoiled beauty of Cockington Village, with its lovely parish church; the dignity of Buckfast Abbey; the sheer beauty of Anstey's Cove and Bishop's Walk; the lovely drive across Dartmoor to Widdecombe (reminiscent of the old song, "Widdecombe Fair"!) with its fine church, called "the Cathedral of the Moors"; the city of Exeter (badly bombed in the last war) with its imposing Cathedral; Brixham, the quaint, little fishing village, with All Saints', Lower Brixham, where Henry F. Lyte was Vicar; and Berry Head House, where he wrote "Abide With Me"—a hymn loved and sung by Christians of all ages.

Then I would take you to Cornwall, which has a magnetic attraction for me, since both my father and mother were Cornish folk, hailing from Cambourne, which we have visited. I would speak of the grandeur of Land's End; the picturesque Porthcurnow Cove, with its attractive beach (composed not of sand, but of the finest sea-shell) where is situated the Cable and Wireless Station, especially interesting to me, an ex-cable man! I could go on to describe the villages of St. Ives, Newlyn, and Mousehole (pronounced "Mow-sel"!), all on the coast, and each a veritable artists' paradise; and I would take you to St. Gulval's Church (one mile from Penzance Station) containing many lovely things in memory of the Bolitho family, who have been most generous benefactors. Here we received a hearty welcome from the Vicar last Sunday morning (15/4/51) and enjoyed the friendly atmosphere of corporate worship in "The Little Church Among the Trees," as it is called, a feature of which is the pointing and singing of psalms and canticles by a comparatively small, though obviously well-trained, village choir. The adjacent wall of the lych-gate leading to St. Gulval's churchyard bears the inscription, "The fibre of every noble life is interwoven for ever in the work of the world." How true that is, and how frequently we forget that no good deed is ever wasted, though we are tempted to wonder sometimes whether the struggle to do the good thing, the right thing, is worth while!

But I must stop, lest I trespass upon the limited space of "The Chronicle"! I am happy to hear from the acting-Rector that you had good Easter services, and that all goes smoothly.

We were gladdened by the kindness of those who sent us cables and letters of congratulation and good wishes. We have tried to answer them individually, but if anyone has been overlooked, we hope they will accept our grateful thanks through this letter.

With kind remembrances to you **ALL**, in which my wife joins, and praying God's blessing upon all your work and worship as we approach the Festivals of Ascension and Whitsunday.

EASTER VESTRY MEETING

The acting-Rector, Rev. W. T. Price, B.A., presided at our Easter Vestry Meeting, which was held in the Parish Hall, on Tuesday evening, 17th April. The attendance of parishioners was larger than usual and keen interest was shown in the proceedings. In the absence, through illness, of the Honorary Treasurer, the Financial Statements were presented by Mr. L. C. Calver, Hon. Secretary of the Parish Council, who, at the request of the Chairman, also reviewed the Parochial year. In the course of his remarks, Mr. Calver emphasised the great loss the Parish had suffered by the passing of Ernest King, who had given many years of faithful and efficient service to the Church. He also expressed the thanks of the Wardens to the District Visitors, and to the members of the Women's Guild, whose work had been of great value to the Parish. Mr. Calver stressed the need for additional members for all parochial organisations so that the Church may be further strengthened. Mr. A. J. Harris was re-appointed Rector's Warden, and Messrs. L. C. Calver and W. Sopwith were re-elected People's Wardens. The Chairman also notified the meeting of the Rector's re-appointment of Colonel C. H. Granville, together with Messrs. A. H. Thomas and A. E. Carruthers, to the Parish Council. The election of nine Councillors was keenly contested and resulted in the following gentlemen completing the Parish Council: Messrs. R. Atkinson, J. M. Boyle, T. H. Bosward, H. G. Brodie, D. Cooke, K. Grant, D. B. Hunter, M.L.A., H. F. Jones and N. Scott. The meeting then elected Messrs. L. C. Calver, D. B. Hunter, M.L.A., J. M. Boyle, R. F. Atkinson and N. Scott as Parochial Nominators and Messrs. E. W. Brooks and S. L. Derrett as Honorary Auditors. In closing the meeting, the acting-Rector expressed his thanks to the various parochial organisations for their work during the past year and appealed for continued support in the period ahead.
