" SOMETHING BEAUTIFUL FOR GOD"

As you probably know, this title given to the book written by Malcom Muggeridge about Mother Teresa, this year's recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize. We are not all called to do great things: but, if each morning we say in faith "Lord God, I give you all my thoughts, words, actions for this day, use me for Thy Will, through Christ Our Lord", and honestly do our best: we too are doing something beautiful for God.

Mother Teresa of Calcutta was born Teresa Boyax in in Skopji, 69 years ago.

In 1971 she was awarded the first Pope John XXIII Peace Prize: earlier in 1962, she was awarded \$10,000 in Manila for promoting understanding in Asia. Again, in 1973, she stood before Prince Philip in London to be the first person to receive the Templeton Foundation Prize for "progression in religion".

So, with all this behind her, why did this woman have darts in her cardigan when seen in Melbourne? Why was she out amongst her poor in the streets when she got the news of her last and greatest award? ... Why did she simply look up and say "thanks be to God".

Perhaps an extract from the Catholic Leader Oct.28th will answer some of these questions:-

"It was the terrible world of the poor that brought Mother Teresa from a convent school to the streets of Calcutta. Born in what is now Southern Yugoslavia, she joined the Sisters of Loretta, trained at Rathfarnham, Ireland, and went to India in 1929 to teach, and eventually became head-mistress of a girls school. In 1948 word came through from Rome releasing her from her Loretto Convent, to don the cheap white cotton sari edged with blue; a small Crucifix attached to the left-hand shoulder with a safety-pin is her only ornament: open sandals on her feet"

As we come to this the end of the Year of the Child and we look back:- yes, we have tried.

We have listened to talks on radio and T.V. We have read a lot. We have been to lots of meetings and a few beautiful Church Services, in order to make this world a better place for our children and grand-children to live in. But, have we really done something practical for some child less fortunate than our own? It is 'nt easy, but there are plenty of opportunities, if we look around us and really try. Our own street, our neighbourhood, could become another street in Calcutta.

On the 3rd Oct. the Rev. Mary Au, who has been awarded a W.K.S. (limited) for 1980, arrived in Sydney, with her friend Rev. Jane Hwang.

Rev. Au was ordained a minister in the Anglican Church in Hong Kong in 1976. She was born and educated in China. A parish in the resettlement area of Hanloong has been the scene of Mary's labours. She has a great concern for the large number of "teddy" boys and girls in the colony where she has been a school chaplain.

In order to help with their problems, she has enrolled in the Victoria University in Wellington, New Zealand. Here she hopes to undertake studies in educational psychology and counselling. During holiday periods, she expects to do some theological studies in St. John's College, Auckland.

The former A.S.W. Working Committee entertained the Rev Au and her companion at morning tea at the Women's Club and later they met members of the N.S.W. Executive at a luncheon at the C.M.S. restaurant.

It was a pleasure to meet Mary, who is a gifted, loving person: for whom, I believe, God has a very important Ministry. She is grateful to A.C.F. for the scholarship.
