A TRIBUTE TO PAST-PRESIDENT LUCELLE KING:

Lucelle went "quickly and peacefully to heaven" in the early hours of November 3 after a short time in hospital - she had maintained a keen ongoing interest in ACW even as her health declined in recent years.

Lucelle first came as a Baptist Representative onto the ACW Council in 1977 and contributed to the organisation in many roles, becoming President in 1994. She was a lady whose reputation was legendary - she had exceptional talents and was popular in many fields - as a Song Leader, Soloist and a very able Speaker, often incorporating her sketching and in demand for Special Days in local branches. Using her artistic skills she was responsible for the design of the ACW Banner and the cover for the National World Community Day Order of Service.

In 2000 Lucelle was awarded Life Membership - we now have only 6 remaining State Life Members.

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Two of Lucelle's enduring contributions were:

The writing of our Mission Statement:

"Australian Church Women believe that there is one God - Father, Son and Holy Spirit; one God, Three-in-One.

We believe that Scripture teaches that salvation is only through faith in the atoning death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, God's only Son."

One of our members has the original hand-written version of this as Lucelle created it. Anglicans, Baptist, Catholic, Churches of Christ, Congregational, Presbyterian, Salvation Army and Uniting were all comfortable and wholeheartedly in agreement with this Statement. To gain such an endorsement was no mean achievement.

In collaboration with her daughter, composing the music and lyrics of our ACW Theme Chorus:

*We being many are one in the Lord
Each one is different but we're trusting in His Word
for we are part of God's family through Jesus Christ His Son
Tho' we are many, yet in Christ we are one
We being many, in Christ we are one.*

The full emotional impact of these words is felt when large groups of women of diverse forms of worship unite to sing it with great feeling at our functions.

Lucelle's family acknowledged ACW's special place in her heart by including mention of her Life Membership in her Death Notice. It was an honour to be asked, as the current State President, to speak at her Thanksgiving Service, held in Forster, at which I concluded by using the letters of her name:

*Leader
Uncompromising in her Christian beliefs and values
Committed, creative, caring, crusader
Energetic
Loyal
Liberal with the use of her time and talents
Enduring to the end.*

Such ambassadors for any organisation are very rare.

Commencing with Kindergarten Superintendent, I followed with Sunday school teaching, Adult Sunday School leader, Bible Study leader, elder, delegate to Synod, Secretary and President of various church and secular organisations. I have always loved being active in church life and I look forward to serving my Lord as your President from for the next two years. In God's strength and with your prayerful support we will survive.

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ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP of NSW STATE UNIT:

These were all prayerfully considered and debated as to what would best suit ACW.

We needed to be able to offer “Associate Membership” not just to retiring Council Members but also to those who attend Branch Special Days and other gatherings - people who are genuinely interested and supportive of Australian Church Women and want to be kept in touch.

At November Council Meeting recommendations from the Executive were adopted and in the coming year will begin to be implemented. In this initial period the procedures will be my responsibility of, but once up and running will become part of the brief of the Membership Secretary.

New Associate Membership Forms have been designed and include not just the aims and objectives of the organisation, but also explanation of the benefits and Application Form.

What the changes actually mean:

- Greater participation from local branches in making/maintaining contact with people who are in their area.
- Local branches are to be encouraged to push Associate Membership at their Special Days Functions with literature and Application Forms clearly visible.
- If there is no local branch? Well, contacts will be followed up by myself and ultimately the Membership Secretary.

Associate Members may attend Council Meetings and would be covered by our Public Liability Insurance but would not be entitled to vote. As at present, their membership subscription of \$15 per year would include receiving Newsette. Personal contact will be the key to maintaining their interest and hopefully will encourage wider involvement - maybe from these ranks in the future we will see future Denominational Delegates!

SOCIAL ISSUES:

Greetings! I wish you every blessing for a holy and healthy New Year.

Social Justice Issues have not stood still

NSW is still 82% in draught despite the recent heavy rains and flooding in the north and north-west - more rain is needed for the flow to reach the Murray/Darling and save the livelihood of farmers there and in S.A. regions. Can we help? What needs to be done? The extreme heat and

bush fires have with the grace of God not taken any lives.

Ecology is important - much more than a human problem but a conversion in our lives to reflect on the delights of the natural world that God created.

Raising the Drinking Age - will this lead to less violence, fewer road accidents? Or more use of other drugs?

Suicide - a tragedy not only for the one who dies but also their family and friends left behind. A recent survey by Lifeline Australia records that a quarter of adults believe that suicide is not preventable. Education programs are necessary, as well as compassion, attention and prevention.

Homelessness continues to increase even though jobless numbers have dropped. Costs of rent and access to reasonable accommodation are rising. Fair wages need to be available to cover living costs. Youth assistance is necessary Do you know what is being done in your area, your church?

Health Issues - keeping our hospitals in good repair, conditions, staff.

Young Disabled - suitable care and accommodation - mentors or volunteers to visit young people in care.

Migrants - what are their needs? Do you welcome them in your community? Christians are fleeing Iraq as well as Africa because of persecution, lack of jobs and services.

Death Penalty - Write to your Federal Member, C/- Parliament House, Canberra and ask him or her to remind the Prime Minister of his promise to appeal to Indonesian President if Scott Rush's Appeal is denied in courts in April.

Protection for Seafarers - Ask the Australian Government to ratify the International Bill protecting seafarers rights, including minimum age limit, regulated watch-hours, wages and leave, medical attention, food and safety regulations - the same conditions other workers take for granted.

Please keep in your prayers the people of Haiti.

NSW ECUMENICAL COUNCIL:

The half-yearly meeting of the NSW Ecumenical Council in November was held at Newcastle in an attempt to emphasise that it is a Council for NSW and not just for Sydney.

Rev Dr Gerard Kelly from the Catholic Institute spoke on "*Receptive Ecumenism*" - stating that although formal divisions remain between churches, more is being done and many church people find a new energy when they come together with others. He suggested we should be self-critical and open to change, considering what we might learn from others, looking at what we do and seeing how others do some things better.

Doug Hewitt spoke of a visit by ten Australians to Israel and Palestine, meeting with Palestinians and Israelis, and becoming informed in an

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attempt to see what can be done to promote the possibility that justice might prevail in that country.

Other speakers told of initiatives on the local level to promote ecumenical activity. These included coming together in a suburb for the great Christian festivals of Easter and Christmas, and combined services perhaps when there is a fifth Sunday in a month. Another successful venture was the opening of church properties to allow the revival of a community jazz festival which had lapsed because insurance had made costs excessive.

The participation of ACW in the work of the Council is encouraged, and in return we are pleased to have Council staff attend our functions.

PAN PACIFIC & SEASIA WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION:

In the final months of 2009 our PPSEAWA meetings continued to be interesting and challenging.

In *August* the speaker was *Dr Bronwen Gould*, a Guide leader working with children who have had a raw deal, with research into child death, also in homeless women. Around *The Domain* a band of 35 women and men help those in need, some with mental health problems, others with intellectual disabilities or just family problems. *Dr Gould* told some heart-breaking stories.

At the *September* meeting *Dianne Madden*, told of *Camp Kookaburra*, a program that offers free weekend camps and activity days for children 8-16 years living in families affected by mental illness - some of these children become 'carers' at an early age and miss out on the fun of childhood. The program, has been operating in the *St George* area of Sydney for 10 years and now has 147 children on its books

In *October* the President's Luncheon was held and several of the corporate organisations presidents attended. *Biljana Milosevic* spoke of the *Jannawi Family Program* at *Lakemba Family Centre*, established in 1978, was one of the first child protection services in Australia - it is a specialist non-government child protection service, working with children at risk of harm of abuse or neglect, aged 0-9 and their families. *Community Connections* is a bi-lingual program to support vulnerable families with children 0-8 years living at *Wiley Park, Lakemba* and *Punchbowl*.

The *November* meeting wound up the year, looking at plans for 2010.
